## County considers bridge closure

The fiscal court is trying to determine what to do with a bridge the state says may need to be closed if it can't be quickly replaced.

The county received a letter in February from Jason Coe, a state engineer for District 8, stating that extreme scour has caused extensive damage to a ford on L. Hancock Road.

Coe said if the bridge were part of a system his office inspected he would recommend a 3 ton gross weight limit be posted with weekly monitoring. With further deterioration, he would recommend closing the ford to all traf-

fic.

Magistrate Billy Rowe told the court Tuesday night that Rep. John "Bam" Carney has been able to get state funding to replace the bridge, but landowner Murrell Burton won't allow it.

The bridge was built in the early 1990s, but easements from local landowners were never properly filed, Rowe said. One landowner told Rowe he signed an easement, but it was never recorded, according to Rowe.

## Edelen to host meeting at Westlake

State Auditor Adam Edelen will host a meeting at Westlake Regional Hospital to talk about the fiscal health of rural hospitals.

The meeting at Westlake will be one of 10 hearings that will be held across the commonwealth and will kick off a study by the auditor's office that seeks to understand the challenges facing small, community hospitals. These hospitals provide health care to 45 percent of Kentuckians and are economic drivers in their communities.

"Rural hospitals are teetering on the edge of survival in many Kentucky counties," Auditor Edelen said. "This

is an effort to understand the degree to which our hospitals are in crisis and what might be done to save them."

The auditor's office is currently soliciting the financial records of some 66 public, non-profit and for-profit hospitals in rural western and eastern Kentucky. A survey asking key questions about their fiscal health will then be conducted. They plan to issue a report this fall.

Everyone is invited to attend the hearings to voice their concerns and experiences in rural hospitals.

The hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 12 at 10 a.m.

## Historic courthouse has new purpose

The downtown courthouse may be a historic building, but it will soon house a business that offers state-of-the-art technology.

Columbia Control Systems owner Matt Baker is busy getting his new office space ready, and he is the first tenant to rent space in the courthouse since government offices moved out four years ago.

The courthouse is a part of the com-

munity about which everyone seems to have an opinion. Some people dare say to tear it down; others vow to protect the beloved building nestled in the center of the community.

Love it or hate it, however, the courthouse needs upkeep, and upkeep is expensive. The county government and the Adair County Heritage Association

## FARMERS' MARKET: Market is family tradition

Darrell Bunnell can be found every Saturday at the Farmers' Market on the Square in Columbia.

From cabbage to sweet potatoes, Bunnell said he grows just about everything, including spaghetti squash and kohlrabi, a vegetable that is described as having the taste and texture of a broccoli stem or cabbage heart, but milder and sweeter.

Darrell and his wife, Cathy, discovered Adair County when they came to help their brother move and realized they could buy more land here to start a farm than they could in Virginia where they had two acres.

They moved to Adair County in 1996 and bought 22 acres in the Coburg community, which is now Coview Farm.

Bunnell says he has been farming all his life.

"This kind of work is very labor intensive," Bunnell said. "You have to really love what you do, and I really love what I do."

Bunnell and his daughter Caitlin were part of the original brain stormers who came up with the Farmers' Market on the Square idea and he has participated since it opened.

Coview Farm also offers a CSA (Community Supported Agriculture), in which a local consumer pays Bunnell a set price and receives a basket of food every week.

"We hear a lot that we put too much food in our baskets," says Bunnell. "But we eat a lot of vegetables at our house so we don't really know what a lot is."

Bunnell isn't the only one in his family

# Adair County native earns Fullbright scholarship

Adair County native Kelsey Castaneda has earned the prestigious Fulbright scholarship. This scholarship will allow Castaneda to spend an entire year teaching English to high school students in Kosice, the second largest town in Slovakia. The Fulbright Program is named after founder U.S. Sen. J William Fulbright, who established the program in 1946 to encourage an exchange of information and improve understanding between Americans and people of other nations in the fields of education, culture and science. It's the

largest exchange program in the U.S. The road to the Fulbright was not an easy one, said Castaneda, who attends Georgetown College. The application process is a very long and strenuous one. "Georgetown has a lot of Fulbright help," she said. It shows, too. Castaneda is 29th Georgetown College student to receive a Fulbright since 1989, according to a press release from the college. A Fulbright scholarship might be lonely as each recipient is sent to a foreign country, but Castaneda's best friend also will be in Ukraine as a Fulbright, only hours away from each other. "At first I was nervous when I started the paperwork," she said, adding that dealing with the government was intimidating. Castaneda, who has been abroad for months on end, is also a bit hesitant about homesickness. "Last time I went abroad I did get homesick," she said. If it wasn't for her brother, Kyle, joining her in Greece the last week it could have been worse, she said. When Castaneda went to England to study at Oxford University, however, she cried because she didn't want to return home. "I think I'll be a little bit homesick, but not too much," adding that her family will visit in May 2015. Castaneda will be going to Slovakia on an English Teaching Assistantship. While abroad, she will be traveling Eastern Europe, doing community service and working with refugees to fulfill her mission. She is the daughter of Freddie and Christi Curl of Columbia. Her grandparents are Charles and Debbie Lemons.

who sells goods at the market. His daughter, Caitlin Helm, and her husband Jimmy can be found under the same tent as Bunnell every Saturday. Helm has learned how to take her love of baking and her love of gardening and make a business out of it. "It is literally what I grew up doing," Helm said. "I was homeschooled so I spent a lot of time helping." Caitlin, Jimmy and their 18-month-old son Aidan live in the Pelham Branch area on their farm called Lonely Acre Farm, a name it earned by being only one acre. She has fruit trees, raspberries, blackberries and

blue berries, and she raises herbs in raised beds. Along with that, she bakes breads, sweet breads, muffins and pretzels. "Every year I come out with two or three new items," Caitlin said. "You have to always be diversified." Caitlin, who describes herself as a full time mom, wife and farmer, says after working on the farm for the last 12 or 13 years, it's now in her blood. "I don't think of it as work," Caitlin said. "I love what I do." Her husband is always her guinea pig and takes any of Caitlin's new creations to his job for his coworkers to try and give their opinions.

"I love to bake," Caitlin said. "I love being in the kitchen." Caitlin is also the Facebook person for the market. Every Friday she posts on their Facebook page the 'Know before you go', which lets fans know exactly who is going to be at the market that week and what produce they will be offering. "I like being able to provide the community with healthy, local alternatives," Caitlin said. 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# COUNTY: Tempers flare over flex funds

County Judge Executive Ann Melton said engineer Greg Eastham went to the area to do soil testing as required by the state, but Burton would not allow him on his property. Eastham provided Melton with a statement to read at Tuesday night's court meeting in which Eastham said he cannot do an engineering study on the bridge without entering Burton's property and Burton would not give him access.

Several area residents attended the court meeting to oppose closing the bridge.

"There is nothing wrong with that bridge," Hobby Richard said. "Last fall I came out with 20,000 pounds of tobacco on the back of my truck."

Richard questioned why tax dollars could be used on the bridge then it suddenly become off-limits.

"Our tax dollars have built it. Why can't we go in there and use it," he said.

Rowe said they could tear out the bridge and people could drive through the creek, which was what was

done before the ford was built. Road foreman Jobe Darnell said he believes the bridge is safe and is sitting on solid rock.

The court voted to table the subject until next month to give all magistrates a chance to view the bridge.

"The road is open the next 30 days," Melton said.

## FLEX FUND ALLOCATION QUESTIONED

When the meeting was open for comments from magistrates, tempers flared as Rowe questioned why state road dollars, called flex funds, are split eight ways, giving the judge an equal allocation with the seven magistrates.

"There's not a judge around us that takes black-top money for themselves," Rowe said.

Melton said she uses her portion to help finish roads where the magistrate does not have enough for the entire project.

"I'm over seven districts, 16 precincts, Billy Rowe. You are over one district with two precincts," Melton told Rowe.

She then asked Rowe

where he is spending his funds and he responded Keltner Road. She asked where he spent his funds last time and he said Keltner Road.

"You didn't lay a patch in front of your house out there?" she asked, to which Rowe replied, yes, but Melton cut him off as he tried to elaborate.

Green County Judge Missy Edwards, who was in the audience, spoke up and said in Green County she and the road foreman prioritize the needs and determine where flex money is spent. Some districts may not receive funds in a particular cycle if roads in a district do not make the list, she said.

Melton responded: "That may be the way we do our fall money. We may leave it up to the road foreman."

Melton then told magistrates she expects them to turn in their requests for the \$35,000 allocated in each district "and Jobe and I will make a decision on it."

## AIRPORT BOARD

Members of the airport board attended the fiscal court meeting and asked for funding.

John Rarey said the airport board did not receive the funds last year it usually receives from the county.

Rarey said the airport board provided the county with its required budget data but never received their funds.

The airport board operates on a \$15,400 annual budget, Rarey said.

Melton said the county could not go back and pay from last year's budget. After a brief period of confusion about how much the county allocates the airport board, it was determined that there is \$4,000 budgeted for the an annual contribution and an additional \$3,000 toward debt service.

The court then approved \$7,000 for the airport board.

Also during Tuesday night's court meeting, magistrates approved rates for the electrical inspector.

They rejected a boom mower bid of more than

\$55,500 and plan to rebid.

The court approved \$2,500 for the Knifley Area Volunteer Fire Department.

## GED testing cost now reduced

FRANKFORT – Kentucky Adult Education announced that eligible adults may take each module of the GED test at the reduced rate of \$10, as a result of vouchers being provided to eligible individuals.

With the use of these limited-time vouchers, the cost of a full GED test will be only \$40. This represents an \$80 savings to test takers.

"We encourage everyone to spread the word about this promotion. It will only last as long as vouchers are available from KYAE, so people need to come in as soon as possible," said LeAnna Bennett, assistant program director at the Adair County Adult Education.

The GED Testing Service launched the current version of the GED in January 2014. The computer-based test consists of four modules: Reasoning Through Language Arts, Mathematical Reasoning, Science and Social Studies. This test allows for individual content modules to be taken one at time.

According to Bennett, approximately 2506 adult residents of Adair County lack high school credentials.

The Adair County Adult Education offers free classes to help adults earn their GED diploma. The center is located at 108 Lindsey Wilson St. The program can be reached at 270-384-7475 or email leanna.bennett@kctcs.edu.

work together to preserve and improve the facility, and the addition of a tenant is indication of success, albeit limited for now.

"Structurally, it's always been a sound building," said Adair County Judge Executive Ann Melton.

So far, the common hallway in the courthouse has a new floor. Plumbing, heat and air have all been installed, with air units planned for individual offices as tenants are secured, Melton said.

Lots of paint has been spread and cleaning has

taken place, all the way up to the bell that towers over the downtown square.

"It's been more of a restoration, just giving it a facelift," said Lee Ann Jessee, a member of the Adair County Heritage Association.

The structure is one of the oldest courthouses in the area, surviving several attempts to burn it in the Civil War.

The large rooms and suites offer Baker much needed space. Until now, he has been operating his security system business from his home.

Baker was considering of-

fice space in Glasgow at the same time he talked with Melton about a new security system for the county. She recruited Baker to rent the courthouse space instead of moving his business out of town.

Melton liked the idea of keeping local business in town and helping the business expand.

"It's an entrepreneurial incubator for new small business; being able to provide a space for not much money," she said.

Baker is moving into the old clerk's office at the cost of \$800 for 1,148 sq. feet.

"We're not trying to make

money for the county, we're just wanting occupancy in the building," Melton said. "I think the attraction is that we're going to help you get started in your business by paying for the utilities for the first year."

Baker adds that he like the location.

"We want to be close by to service our customers," he said.

The courthouse is now looking great but there is still work to be done down-

town. Walking to and from the courthouse continues to be dangerous as speed limits are ignored, and drivers often disregard pedestrian right-of-way laws.

New markings are one of only two options that can be used to remedy the current situation; such markings are like those on the Green County Square, Melton said. In addition, the strict enforcement of the 25 mph speed limit is the only things that can be done.

"There's nothing that can be done except for patrolling it," Judge Melton said. "Our downtown area has to be safe for our pedestrians."

Downtown continues to be a work in progress, and Jessee said she hopes the courthouse will become a showplace for the town as businesses come in and restoration work continues.

## A business's right to believe

A debate has raged since the Supreme Court ruled against a mandate in the Affordable Care Act requiring businesses to provide insurance that covers various types of birth control.

Hobby Lobby, a company owned by a single family that has been open about their Christian faith to the point of keeping stores closed on Sunday, won the battle, along with a small company owned by Mennonites.

They argue that four types of birth control actually cause abortions. They did not oppose all birth control, just ones that prevent a fertilized egg from implanting in the uterus, such as the Plan B pill, taken after a woman has had sex.

The Supreme Court ruled that requiring businesses to pay for insurance coverage they oppose for religious reasons is a violation of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993.

The Court ruled that owners of "closely held" businesses have these rights.

This case was a battle between religious rights and reproductive rights. The reproductive rights supporters believe it is a violation if an employer determines what insurance they will or will not

provide based on their beliefs.

As a business owner, I do not leave my faith at home. I respect the rights of my employees and my customers to believe as they see fit. I do not push my beliefs on them nor do I expect them to push theirs on me.

When it comes to where I spend my company's money, however, it is my right to make that choice. Or at least it should be.

Yes, we need government regulations, but we need to weigh the need for regulations against the freedoms we relinquish; that is what government regulations are about. They are an agreement between the people and the government to give the government control for the good of the people.

When the rights of two people

collide, as they did in this case, then it must be properly weighed. In this case, the Supreme Court understood the need to allow people like myself to take their beliefs to work.

Various reports say the ruling does not give a broad sweep of religious freedoms for all corporations. It strictly rules that the Affordable Care Act violates the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, which says federal laws cannot infringe on religious beliefs.

I don't see how anyone can believe that forcing a company to do something its owners do not believe is morally right is a violation of their rights. This is not a war on women; it's not taking the women's movement back four decades.

Just because a woman has a right to buy birth control in the country, how does that translate into an obligation on an employer to pay for it?

As with all important issues, there will be an ongoing debate about this ruling and how far "religious freedom" can go. I for one am thankful that, at least for now, the federal government must respect the rights of people of faith.

# BRAC team makes history

The Blue Raiders Aquatic Club team at Lindsey Wilson College picked up their first win a few weeks ago against the SPY Sharks.

The BRAC is a program for youth ages four to 18 that can swim the length of the pool without assistance or stopping. For the program's first two years they just participated in fun meets before joining the Lake Cumberland Swimming Association and only had about 10 youth that joined.

340 in favor of the SPY.

The grand totals left the BRAC team on top 631 to 561 to beat their opponents by a margin of 70 points.

"I think this win was a hard fought battle with friendly competition between the kids," Coach Marshall said. "It really helped that our numbers and skill levels matched with the Somerset swimmers."

The coach said the under nine-year-old medley relay at the end of the meet was a great race. Taking first place by out-touching the SPY team by .16 seconds were Jetson Grant, Luke Rich, Mercy Peterson and Faith Warren.

"The kids have been working incredibly hard this summer, moving up in groups, improving their techniques, and beating their personal best times," Coach Marshall said.

The team had another meet last week that resulted in a loss to the Russell Rays, but a lot of the difference was due to them having more members. The BRAC

program is up to 32 youth at the moment but is looking to grow.

## Human rights group clears first hurdle

The Columbia City Council gave first reading to an ordinance establishing a human rights commission, but it appears there may be more work to be done before final approval is given.

The council heard first reading of the ordinance with little discussion Monday night, with council member June Parson asking for small changes in the wording to identify the city properly.

When the Community Voice contacted council member Charles Grimsley and Mayor Mark Harris the following day about details in the ordinance, however, it brought to light questions about whether the ordinance presented follows the intent of a committee proposing the commission.

The ordinance comes from a draft developed by the state Human Rights Commission, which provides different drafts providing varying degrees of authority to the commission. A local committee, of which Grimsley is a member, met last month and discussed how the local commission should be structured. In a telephone interview Tuesday, Grimsley said the committee needs to meet again to determine if the proposed ordinance does in fact structure the commission

in the way it was intended.

The ordinance establishes a joint commission for the city and the county. It gives the commission authority to administer ordinances forbidding discrimination enacted by the city or county government.

The ordinance outlines a number of powers and duties given to the commission, including the ability to adopt, promulgate, amend and rescind rules and regulations to effectuate the policies and provisions of the ordinance.

The commission will be made up of seven members, five appointed by the county and two from the city. The committee recommended this structure based on population. The fiscal court also approved first reading of the ordinance Tuesday night.

### TRAIL TOWN GETS GRANT

Ellen Zornes told council members that the local Trail Town group has received a grant for eight benches to be put on the square. She said they only had a small window to apply for the grant and were not able to come before the council before filing the application. Mayor Harris was contacted and wrote a letter in

support of the project.

Zornes said the group received \$5,200 and Fabco is making the benches. There was some discussion about placement of the benches and caution to make sure pedestrian traffic is not hampered as well as the city's liability for the benches. Mayor Harris asked council member Grimsley to meet with Trail Town members to help determine bench locations.

The council also voted for an ordinance in support of the Trail Town project.

### CITIZEN COMMENTS

Citizen Roy Radenmacher complimented the city for the flags that were on display for Independence Day and asked that they be flown next year on Flag Day.

Scott Tarter asked the council to consider an ordinance restricting the use of fireworks to particular days so they are not exploding for a week prior and a week after July 4th.

Tarter said he is a veteran and suffers from PTSD. He said he and others find the ongoing fireworks difficult to deal with. Mayor Mark Harris said he would see what options are available.
