Clay County to get \$64,500 for military-related programs

Money part of Department of Economic Opportunity awards

CLAY COUNTY – The Clay County Economic Development Corporation will get \$64,500 to pay for a new five-year economic strategy that can address any possible setbacks created by military base downsizing.

Gov. Ron DeSantis and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity announced that the Department of Economic

Opportunity awarded more than \$2 million in funding for military-related programs through the Defense Reinvestment Grant Program and the Defense Infrastructure Grant Program. These grants provide funding

to defense-dependent communities to support economic diversification efforts and military community relations.

The grant is to strengthen the nondefense economy," said Laura J. Pavlus, Director of Business Development and Marketing for Clay Florida Economic Development Corporation. "Primarily, it came out of the BRAC [Base Realignment and Closure, so it is to diversify the existing

economy so that if there is another round of BRAC closures, your non-defense dependent community is resilient enough to overcome that."

CCEDC's five-year strategic plan will seek alignment with Clay County, Camp Blanding Joint Training Center, Clay County Development Authority, City of Keystone



Multiuse trail expected in Green Cove Springs by 2022

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – There should be a new addition of a two-and-a-half-mile concrete multiuse trail in the Green Cove Springs area by the fall of 2022.

"We're in our design now," said Mike Null, Assistant City Manager of Green Cove Springs. Design began in April 2019. We anticipate completing this design in July of next year, 2021. [We] expect to start construction in winter of 2021, and then we expect to complete it in the fall of 2022."

The trail will be eight-feet wide and will begin at Harbor Road just north of town and south on US-17 to Palmetto Avenue. It will continue on Palmetto Ave, south through Green Cove Springs down to Oak Street until it ties into a nature trail.

The project is funded by the Depart-

ment of Transportation and currently has a \$1.5 million budget.

A public hearing was held last Tuesday, Oct. 8. "Nothing negative," said Null of public feedback for the project. "Everything's been positive for the folks that have heard. We did have a public hearing this past Tuesday; unfortunately, no one from the public showed up. We did advertise it in the paper, Facebook, and all the other mobile outlets for us. We will have a second public hearing, which will be the day of our next council meeting. It will be Oct. 20 at 5.30." At this public hearing, the city will have an engineer on the project speak. There will also be large boards to display the planned route. Residents can see it and see how it may affect them, especially if they live along the route. They will have the opportunity to hear more details and

provide input.

Completion of the trail will be drawn out for several months.

"A lot its, obviously we're working near the roadway," said Null. "So, there's a lot of traffic control we have to do, so we can't shut down large segments at a time. We kind of have to work a piece at a time. There will be some utilities to adjust. We may have to move an electric pole here or there or a fire hydrant, and we'll try to do that ahead of time... primarily it's just because we're working right near the roadway, sometimes right up against it, so we have to be careful, you know, as far as traffic about not impeding the traffic anymore than we absolutely have to."

The trail will increase people's opportunity to get out and exercise, which has significantly increased during the COVID-19 pandemic. Eventually, the path will also tie into future trails, which will run south Putnam County and east into St. John's County.

SJRWMD adopts minimum flows, levels schedule for 2020

For Clay Today

CLAY COUNTY – The St. Johns River Water Management District Governing Board Tuesday adopted the 2020 Minimum Flows and Levels priority list, which lays out the agency's plan for completing and re-evaluating MFLs through 2024.

Establishing minimum flows and levels is an important goal in the District's work of planning for adequate water supplies for today and for future generations while also protecting the District's water resources. The District sets MFLs for lakes, streams, rivers, wetlands and springs, updating the list annually.

MFLs define the limits at which further water withdrawals would be significantly harmful to the water resources or ecol-

ogy of an area. Establishing MFLs is a requirement of the state Legislature and is required by the state Comprehensive Plan, the water resources implementation rule (formerly state water policy), and a 1996 governor's executive order for priority water bodies.

The District has established MFLs on 131 water bodies (104 lakes, 14 springs, six rivers and seven wetlands). A total of 30 MFLs have been re-evaluated.

Survey: Black, Hispanic Floridians believe college degree is key for success in the workforce

The vast majority of Hispanic and Black voters believe a bachelor's degree is key to success, according to a new survey released by the Helios Education Foundation and the Florida College Access Network.

The survey, conducted by Sachs Media Group, found two-thirds of Hispanic and 58% of Black Floridians say post-high school education is a requirement for economic prosperity. Half of White Floridians feel the same.

The polling belies the gap in educational attainment among the three groups. Whites, by double digits, are more likely earn a college degree than Blacks or Hispanics.

The poll also found that while a majority believe that anyone — regardless of race or socioeconomic status — is capable of earning a degree, Black and Hispanic voters were more likely to strongly disagree.

The most-cited barrier to a college education was cost, though many said they don't believe high schoolers are adequately prepared for college. Blacks and Hispanics were least likely to view a college education as affordable and most likely to cite cost as a barrier to attaining a credential beyond high school.

Hispanic and Black Floridians will make up a majority of the workforce by 2030, so it's critical for Florida that we close the attainment gap among these groups," said Paul J. Luna, president and CEO of Helios Education Foundation. "By helping more students overcome barriers to degree completion we strive to ensure educational equity for all students, ensuring Florida benefits from a richly diverse workforce."


Three in five Floridians said they believe any student who wants a post-high school education – which includes professional credential programs – should have access.

Also, half of respondents said equity is a top issue when it comes to ensuring that Florida has a strong workforce for the future. An overwhelming majority of parents (94%) across all races and ethnicities believe at least one of their children will go to college, with the percentage going up as parents have more education themselves.

More than half of Florida college students are from lower-income households and qualify for the Pell grant and other forms of need-based financial aid. But many, especially those who might come

We can choose how to respond to the noise ... or simply turn down the volume button

Never before have we been subjected to more emotional stress.

For more than eight months, CO-VID-19 has dominated our lives. We've gained weight, lost wages and hope. We take one step forward in the recovery plan, only to be knocked back two steps

by new outbreaks and daily updates that are becoming all too familiar.

Politics has only made us more despondent. Never has there been so hatred spewed by both sides. We don't debate legitimate issues. We yell. We cuss. We threaten violence.

Politics has affected our mental and physical health and it's cost us friendships.

You can't escape the noise. Hate-filled commercials are being played during episodes of children's cupcake baking contests. We can't watch professional sports without being reminded of everything that divides us, not what joins us.

It's become so divisive more people were interested in a fly that landed on Vice President Mike Pence's head during last week's debate with Kamala Harris than what was being said.

So, what are you supposed to do?

"Life throws a lot our way, including

presidential debates, political rifts within families, fender benders, difficult dynamics with your boss/employees, migraines, and more," said Katie Sandler, personal development and career coach. "We cannot control all of those things that may come our way, but we can do things to protect ourselves by paying more attention to how we react to them."

Sandler uses a technique called positive reframing to help turn negativity into a more plausible mindset.

Pastor Charles Swindoll said life is 10% of what happens and 90% how you react to a situation. If we are better able to change our reaction, it could relieve a lot of the stress in our lives.

There are other steps to reduce our stress created by a pandemic and politics, like:

Practice gratitude. Make it a point to do something every day to escape the fear and bickering. Go hit golf balls. Turn off the television and read a book. Take a walk. Take your grandchild to the park. Go fishing. Just slow down and enjoy the moment.

Express compassion. Make choices to be a better person. Don't follow old emotional routines. Take your mind off autopilot and re-examine your beliefs. Pick up the phone and call an old friend or relative. Never have we been so starved to reconnect personal connections of the people we care about.

Set an intention. Take the time to listen to an opposing idea. Even in this toxic political climate, it's possible to be civil

By the numbers: Despite downward trend, COVID-19 still impacting Clay County

CLAY COUNTY – The numbers of residents infected by COVID-19 have piled up in the county. So have the number of deaths.

As of Wednesday afternoon, 5,519 people have tested positive for the deadly coronavirus, according to the Florida Department of Health. The agency also reported 111 deaths.

Hidden in the numbers, however, is the continued suggestion the disease may be showing signs of slowing down.

Florida has posted infection rates of less than 10% for 61 consecutive days, according to the Joint Information Center of COVID-19 for the State of Florida. Wednesday's rate was 4.99% in Florida, compared to the national average of 5.1%, according to John Hopkins University and Medicine. Clay County's rate was 2.66%, continuing a downward trend that started with the coronavirus' peak of 9.01% on Sept. 6, including a brief spike to 6.8% on Sept. 20.

While the greatest fear for death re-

mains with elderly residents or those with underlying medical conditions, the median age of infections in Clay County is just 43

The most-affected age group is persons 45-54 years old, while the two least affected are newborns-to-4 years old (59 cases) and persons 85 or older (142)

Of the 111 deaths reported in the county, 51 have been residents of long-term care facilities. Currently, there are 98 reported infections at long-term facilities, with 24 being counted as residents and 74 as employees.

Around the county, there have been 1.246 reported cases in the 32068 zip code for Fleming Island, Lakeside, Middleburg and Oakleaf and another 1.245 cases in 32073 for Orange Park, Fleming Island, Lakeside and Oakleaf. In 32043 for Green Cove Springs, Penney Farms, Lake Asbury, Fleming Island and Middleburg, there have been 1.104 cases, while 32065 for Lakeside, Jacksonville and Oakleaf, there have been 989. There have been 707 positive cases reported in 32003 for portions of Green Cove Springs, Middleburg and Fleming Island, followed by 32656 for Keystone Heights with 261. Zip codes 32666 for Melrose and 32058 for Lawtey have no reported cases.

The only way the county will continue to reduce its numbers of infections and deaths is to follow CDC guidelines, Clay County Health Director Heather Huffman said. While most know of simple ways to combat the spread, including wearing face coverings and avoiding large gathers in public and using hand sanitizer, the mostoverlooked method of prevention is staying home if you don't feel well, Huffman said.

"If there's a fever, a cough or anything really, just stay home," Huffman said. "Do not come to work if you're sick.'

"Research has suggested time and again that paying for college is the biggest barrier keeping students from attaining a degree, yet every year Florida students leave millions of dollars in Pell Grants on the table," said Charleita M. Richardson, executive director of Florida College Access Network. "These survey results show that, now more than ever. Florida students and families need the supports to success-

fully move through the college application and financial aid processes."

The survey was conducted July 27-Aug. 3. It took responses from 1,688 Florida voters and has a margin of error of plus or minus 2.5 percentage points at a 95% confidence level.





Heights, Keystone Heights Airport Authority, City of Green Cove Springs, Town of Orange Park and utility partners to collaboratively grow the non-defense economy.

"Specifically for Clay County, the bulk of that money will go to a new five-year economic development strategic plan," Pavlus said. "Our last plan was completed in 2015. It was a five-year plan. So it's time for us to do another one. That funding will go to preparing that strategic plan for Clay County.

"We've been able to run some very successful projects with this funding."

DeSantis said the money will be divided among 11 organizations.

"During my time with the Navy, I was able to experience firsthand the tremendous impact a military installation has on its surrounding community," said Governor Ron DeSantis. "I'm proud to provide an opportunity for these organizations to continue to support and enhance the great partnerships Florida's communities have with our military."

"During these unprecedented times, it is imperative that we continue to support Florida's military installations and their surrounding communities," said Dane Eagle, Executive Director of the Department of Economic Opportunity. OPMC: How to trick-or-treat safely during COVID-19

For Clay Today

CLAY COUNTY – It's the question every parent is asking. "What are we going to do about Halloween?"

Parents and communities want to know if it is safe to go trick-or-treating. We all know we have to celebrate differently this year but how can we still have *some* of the fun?

The good news is experts do not think

that surface spread is the main mode of COVID-19 transmission. "I would say vou're OK to take the children outside for limited trick-ortreating, but recognize it's going to be very different from last year and prepare Dr. Jennifer Chapman the entire family with



the new safety rules," notes Dr. Jennifer Chapman, Emergency Room Physician.

"If you live in an area where there is still a high incidence of COVID-19 neither I nor the CDC recommends trick-or-treating door-to-door," said Dr. Chapman.

"If you live in an area where there is still a moderate incidence of COVID-19 you need to weigh if trick-or-treating is worth it to you and your family based on your specific situation. The easiest way to determine the COVID-19 risk level in your community go to www.Halloween2020. org where the Harvard Global Health Institute has an interactive map that details COVID risk level by county.

Even if you live in an area with a low prevalence of COVID-19 cases you still want to be sure and take a few extra precautions.

Some of the biggest risks for this Halloween are who you are trick-or-treating with. Close contact is defined as those within six feet of you for more than 10-15

"My advice would be to skip the Halloween parties this year and stick to outdoor trick-or-treating as your main family event, with proper social distancing."

It's recommended to limit your group to just your family or three or four children

Choose wisely, friends that you know have been practicing social distancing and limiting their own exposure as well.



Experts point out that trick-or-treat exchanges at houses need to be brief and socially distanced. And as an extra note of caution, put a lid on communal candy bowls. "This year it would be safer to not have little hands in big candy bowls and digging out the pieces they like the most. I would also encourage to use hand sanitizer throughout the route and wash hands often and especially children before eating," adds Dr. Chapman.

And finally, if you are giving out candy at your house and want to do it safely, consider giving out pre-portioned goodies that can be placed in containers on the porch so children can grab and go.

This limits the person-to-person interaction allows you to social distance, and children go home happy.

"Need better moderators...no scripted questions, but was better than presidential debate by far," Eric Newcom said.

Holly Jordan said the majority of the questions asked weren't what American people want to know, and the question pulled from the eighth grader at the end of the debate was the best question of the night. Jordan also said she wasn't a fan of the moderator.

"[Harris] did herself no favors," Chris Reeder, a Clay Today reader that watched afar from the United Kingdom said. "[Pence] held court very well. Watching it from the UK, one could see this debate had more decorum."

Reeder also pondered if audiences were watching a candidate that would someday be the 47th president, alluding to potential ambitions of Harris or Pence to run for the office in the future.





Excellence."


Approximately 12 schools will compete. Middleburg is hosting of the competition, so it won't compete. But they will have a special performance. Their performance will be the finale before the judging begins.

Pair suspected of running theft ring now in jail

MIDDLEBURG – Two members of an organized theft ring that operated in Clay and Duval counties were arrested last week, the Clay County Sheriff's Office reported.

Marvin Daniel Finch III, 26, and Carol Ann Hrindich, 51, both of Middleburg, face a litany of charges. Finch has been charged with four counts of trafficking in stolen property and six counts of grand theft, while Hrindich has been charged with initiating, planning, financing or supervising theft of property.

According to the arrest report, the burglary ring operated since May 2018. Surveillance footage from several stores, including The Home Depot in Middleburg, showed items being stolen, which correlated with dates similar items were sold to pawnshops. Items included chainsaws, leaf

blowers, generators, grinders, nail guns

Finch was in the Duval County jail on unrelated charges when CCSO interviewed him. According to the affidavit for arrest warrant, Finch admitted to stealing and pawing the items to "feed his drug habit."

Finch was arrested on Oct. 8, while Hrindich was jailed a day later.

CCSO said two other people are suspected of participating in the thefts.

Woman jailed for forcing girl into backseat of her car

ORANGE PARK – A local woman was arrested for falsely imprisonment of a child and contributing to the delinquency of a minor after she forced a girl into her car.

According to the arrest report, the victim and another girl rang Siplin-Riley's doorbell. That led to an argument and a fight with Siplin-Riley's roommate. The girl then was "forced" into the car and the roommate sat in the backseat to make sure the girl didn't try to escape.

Orange Park Medical Center to take back unused drugs

For Clay Today

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Medical Center will be partnering with local law enforcement agencies to host a Crush the Opioid Crisis Drug Take Back Day, sponsored by The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration on Saturday, Oct. 24. The drop off will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

OPMC at 2001 Kingsley Ave. will be accepting unused drugs at the Emergency Room entrance. The program also includes the Normandy Park ER at 2775 Normandy Blvd. in Jacksonville.

The goal is to educate the community on the risk of opioid misuse while providing a safe and anonymous way to dispose of left-over medications. "We know that a significant number of opioid addictions and overdose deaths come from individuals accessing unused opioids prescriptions of family and friends," said Dr. Steven Goodfriend, Emergency Room Physician and Medical Director at Orange Park Medical Center.

Keeping the unused pain medicine from past surgeries or procedures around the house is not safe. That's why Orange Park Medical Center is partnering with local law enforcement agencies in Clay and Duval County who will be onsite at each take back location to safely collect unused and expired prescription

medications. All medication collections will be made anonymously.

More than half of people who misuse opioid medications say they obtained them from someone they know. In the past year, two-thirds of teens who misused pain relievers reported that they got them from family, friends and the home medicine cabinet. And every minute of every day, a poison control center answers a call about a young child who has accidentally ingested medication.

"The safest and most responsible option to dispose of medication is to take unwanted medications to a drug take back site or event," said Dr. Goodfriend. "Unused opioids thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or sold illegally and flushing medications down the toilet pose a potential health and environmental hazard."

All Drug Take Back locations will be drive-thru style. Participants are asked to remain in their vehicles and wear a face-covering during their drop off.

The participating locations will be collecting tablets, capsules and patches of Hydrocodone (Norco, Lortab, Vicodin), Oxycodone (Oxycontin, Percocet), Tramadol (Ultram), Codeine, Fentanyl (Duragesic), Morphine, Hydromorphone (Dilaudid) and Oxymorphone (Opana). The drop off doesn't include needles, syringes, lancets or liquids.

Plants are needed to feed pollinators in the fall

ORANGE PARK - We, as gardeners, plan and plant flowers for the spring and summer months for our pollinators.

We often forget that in the fall our pollinators also need nectar and pollen to help them prepare for the upcoming cold months. Having fall blooming plants will help many birds and butterflies as they migrate which include hummingbirds and Monarch butterflies. Our honeybees and bumblebees need to store food in their hives for the winter.

Here are pictures of three plants that are in full bloom now:

Goldenrod: its yellow flowers provide nectar for butterflies and bees and many other insects.

Beautyberry: butterflies and bees are attracted to the pretty pink flower clusters and the unique lavender berries are relished by birds.

Joe-Pye weed: this plant offers pollinators food when other sources are scarce. The corolla of each floret is tubular making this plant popular with hummingbirds.

Coordinated by UF/IFAS Extension faculty and volunteers, the project was conceived as a way to feed hungry families ahead of the holidays in addition to promoting a Florida-grown crop. The peanut,



which is produced mainly throughout the northern regions of the state, contributed

\$154 million to the state economy in 2017, according to the Florida Agricultural Statistics Service.

The Challenge runs from Oct. 1 through the day before Thanksgiving – Nov. 25 this year – collecting unopened jars of peanut butter

During this period, drop off jars at UF/ IFAS Extension Clay County, 2463 State Road 16 West

Peanut butter is an ever-popular item in food pantries for its nutrient density and shelf stability.

The project took on new meaning this year as demand for food bank assistance had increased as an economic effect of the

COVID-19 pandemic

In addition to the community donations, the Florida Peanut Producers Association and Florida Peanut Federation also contribute to the collection effort.

At the end of the Challenge, the organizations' donated jars are distributed to participating counties' food pantries, proportional to the amount each county collects.

Our Extension office will also serve as a polling place during this time period, so we encourage those who come to vote to bring along a jar of peanut butter.

Pass-happy? Indians defy rain to beat Raiders

CRESCENT CITY - Keystone Heights High football has been a history of big guys up front, tough running backs and stingy defense.

So, what happened Saturday night at Crescent City High School might be considered surprising, but not to Indians coach Chuck Dickinson who unleased a flurry of "passing" touchdowns as his team flew to a 41-14 win.

"That first one was a four route selection for our quarterback, Gage Stevens, who has become very good at making the read to the open guy downfield," said Dickinson, who got a triple 70-plus yard rushing game from Colton Tibbetts, Dalton Hollingsworth and Tyler Jenkins to support his air game. "The second touchdown with the pass was a similar set up but with three receivers to read."

The win on Saturday leaves Keystone Heights at 3-1 with Jefferson County (0-4) next at Keystone Heights.

On the misty, rain-soaked night that saw both teams warm up in a downpour that soaked the turf and created puddle hazards around the sidelines for sliding tackles, Dickinson's vaunted run-strong scheme seemed inevitable, except that Stevens, on third and two at midfield, found end John David Schenck wide open in the middle of the field just 30 yards from him. Stevens floated a perfect spiral that Schenck gathered in and carried 20 yards to paydirt to put the Indians up 6-0; 7-0 with kicker Ian Schofield's PAT with 10:21 left in the first quarter.

"Our quarterbacks coach, Ken Mudge, a great quarterback out of Orange Park High known for his long passes, has

passed on to Gage some of his readings skills to find receivers downfield in a progression of reads," said Dickinson. "Gage has learned to take the strong running game we have and add some passing potential to it. He likes to throw and wants to throw, but his patience makes plays like this happen at the right time."

From there, the Indians crunched the run game up front to a 21-0 lead with a scoring run from Tibbetts from four yards out and a second, yes, second scoring strike from Stevens from midfield; this time a sideline route pass and run to Schofield. Up 21-0 at the half, the Indians stayed in run game to move the clock, but Crescent City got some elastic plays to score first and knock the lead to 21-6.

Twelve plays later, with Hollingsworth and company pounding the teeth of the

Crescent City defense ended with Hollingsworth pounding in from eight yards out.

"We tell all three running backs to run downhill, square their shoulders and get the first three or four yards and then they can look for daylight," said Dickinson. "The slop of the field made the game a good conditioning game as the guys had to work hard just to get five yards.

Up 28-6, Tibbetts snared an errant Crescent City pass near the Indians' 40 and sprinted in ankle deep water to the Raider one yard line to set up his own scoring plunge a play later for a 34-6 lead into the fourth quarter.

Hollingsworth would score the final six to close the game.

On defense, Ryan Jones and Logan Williams both tallied 12 tackles to lead the Indian defense.





JACKSONVILLE - Fleming Island High freshman cross country runner John Keester IV was on his back after finishing the New World Fall Cross Country Classic Saturday morning barely able to breathe.

"There's a kid who has worked who hard only to get close to that 17 minute mark," said Fleming Island High coach Dave Allen. "He finally got it today and he crushed it; 16 minutes, 53 seconds."

Keester and 21 other runners at the high-powered gathering of harriers at the New World Golf Course that will host district and region meets in a week, all broke the 17 minute mark that is a key indicator of the speed expected in post season races. The top two runners; Riley Novack of Mount Dora Christian Academy and Lucas Bouquot of Ponte Vedra both finished under 16 minutes; 15:56 and 15:59, respectively.

"It's a mental boost for him and the team," said Allen. "We have Kam (senior Kameron Wallizada) running strong and Jayden (senior Jayden Scherer) led the team today. John and our other freshman Danny Sakowski will be key factors in the region and state meets coming up."

Sakoski, who finished in 17:44 for 44th, was recovering from his personal best finish a week ago at the FSU Pre State invitational on the FHSAA state championship course. Sakowski finished in Tallahassee at 17:02.30 to finish as second Fleming Island finisher just ahead of Scherer.

"He just broke his best time by 50 seconds on the state meet course," said Allen, about Sakowski. "His body is probably still recovering, but he knows he is capable of running that fast again."

Allen's quest for five under 17 minutes to attack the state meet is closer to fruition with Michael Lyon also breaking 17 minutes with a 16:53 just a tad in front of Keester.

"We get another low 17 out of Sakowski and we are sitting pretty with five guys," said Allen. "We get a 15 plus from Kam or Jayden and that will put us in good position for a possible podium finish."

Fleming Island finished second behind Bartram Trail, 43-103 with the Bears top five average 16:27 with finishers at 3,4,5,15,16. Fleming Island had no top 10 finishers with Scherer and Wallizada at 13th and 14th in 16:46 and 16:47. Bartram Trail averaged 16:27 while Fleming Island averaged right at 17:00.

For the Fleming Island girls, Emma Millson ran with teammates Marisa Kortright and Grace Adams just a step behind her for most of the race with junior Mei Chiang about 10 yards in arears.

With University Christian's Laci Watford and Nease's Naila Etique separating early from the field; Watford winning in 18:50 with Etique, seventh in Fleming Island's region 1-4A, at 18:59, the Fleming Island four runner pack kept a pace just 40 or so seconds off the front to stage a dramatic second place team finish to Bolles off the

Junior running back Al'Querious Ray spearheaded the full frontal assaut with 250 yards on the ground with three scores most of them with an ending of blatant velocity on West Nassau tackler wanna-bes.

"When Q (Ray) is on, it opens up a lot of things for us on offense and it also cranks up the defense because he runs tough," said Kennard. "Guys trying to tackle him in the fourth quarter are going to get hit hard."

In the first half, it was quarterback Tre Griner going coast to coast via foot and via air with a 50 yard midfield scamper in the first quarter to answer a defensive shutdown of West Nassau's first offensive series; led by a smothering sack by linebacker Ramsey McCloud on a quarterback scamper. Griner called his own number on a quarterback draw on first down at the 50, hurdled one tackler in a gaping hole and sprinted to paydirt.

It is unfortunate that the Covid-19 virus limited the seating capacity for this game, because it was a classic that will be long remembered at Oakleaf— and hard to forget at Fleming Island. It had a bit of everything. A safety. Two fake punts. An onside kick. Three turnovers. An inspirational halftime speech from a legendary alumnus. Penalties that nullified big plays. Fourth down stands. A do-or-die two point conversion. And finally, a tense overtime.

Fleming Island dominated the first two and a half quarters behind their one-two running back punch of Tim Thomas and Sam Singleton, each of whom ran for over 100 yards. The Golden Eagles ran the same play dozens of times, often repeating it for an entire drive. Lined up with one receiver split wide, wingbacks on each side of the interior line, and a running back next to quarterback Grant Travis in a shotgun formation, Travis would simply hand the ball off to either the 6-foot, 220-pound Thomas or the 6-1, 190-pound Singleton, who would follow a wingback into the middle behind center Evan Sheets and guards Michael Gloster and Cameron Longmire. T.K. Kocak, a 6-4, 230 pound wingback who lines up at quarterback in short yardage situations, and Thomas each scored on two vard runs to give the Eagles a 16-7 advantage at halftime. Fleming Island took the second half kickoff and marched 80 yards on 15 running plays. Kocak capped that drive, which took 8:20 off of the clock, with another two yard score. Aaron Montoya's point after attempt hit the left upright, however, leaving the score at 22-7.

Though the Golden Eagles had outgained Oakleaf 301-113 to that point, fumble recoveries by the Knights' Marcus Anthony

and Darrell Livingston and a 61 yard scoring burst by Adrian Grey kept the Knights within striking distance.

Needing a change in scheme, Oakleaf started to have their defensive linemen submarine or cut the Golden Eagles' offensive linemen. Basically, the Oakleaf front four dove forward and sideways, forcing the Fleming Island lineman to fall over them and create a mass of humanity at the line of scrimmage.

"Our defensive line played at a lower pad level in the second half, allowing our linebackers to run free," explained Garis.

With no holes up the middle, Thomas and Singleton were forced to turn outside, where they were often met by Knights safety Chrystian Sellers, who had three tackles for loss, or a blitzing Marcus Anthony, who had moved back to his natural outside linebacker position from middle linebacker. The Golden Eagles did not score again, as Thomas and Singleton gained only 18 yards on their final 10 carries.

On offense, the Knights turned to wideout Cobie Bates. The senior had a gamehigh nine receptions for 116 yards, scored twice, and completed a game-tying twopoint conversion pass. Going against a Fleming Island secondary with a reputation for athleticism, Bates repeatedly got open on short slant routes and turned them into bigger plays by breaking tackles and outrunning the Golden Eagles. Bates started the comeback late in the third quarter by taking a swing pass, faking out cornerback Darius Harris at the line, and then sprinting to the end zone from 27 yards out. Drew Ammon's 's extra point trimmed the deficit to 22-14.

"He is explosive," Garis said of Bates. "No matter where he is on the field, if we can get him the ball, he is going to make a play."

The Golden Eagles moved the ball to the Knights' 32 yard line on the ensuing possession, where Oakleaf made its first fourth down stand. Kocak took a direct snap and pounded into the line, but was met by linebackers Marcus Anthony and C.J. Kemp. He appeared to fall over the line to gain for a first down, but the referees' spot of the ball left him three inches short with 8:01 remaining. Oakleaf drew within two when Walter "Tre" Simmons, III, who threw for 175 yards and three touchdowns, found Terrance Anthony on a 10 yard in route. Anthony turned upfield and slipped tackle attempts by Devin Grind and Hunter Williams to complete a 23 catch and run with 2:55 remaining. On the crucial two-point conversion attempt, Bates lined up at quarterback, drifted to his right on a run/pass option, and threw over the middle to Marcus Anthony, whose sliding catch tied the game at 22 and sent the home crowd into a frenzy. On the first series of overtime, Bates gathered in a slant pass from Simmons for the gamewinning 15 yard score.

Fleming Island called four consecutive pass plays on their overtime possession. Travis tried to connect with receiver Darion Domineck in the end zone, then missed on a slant route to Will Stephens. On third down, Travis ended up running out of the pocket for a four yard gain. On the game's final play, Travis found Kocak on a shallow crossing route, but Oakleaf cornerback Trey Thomas blasted Kocak two yards short of the goal line, touching off a raucous celebration on the home sideline.

The game got off to an odd start when the first snap of the game sailed over the

head of Oakleaf's Simmons and bounced all the way to the Knights' end zone. Simmons was able to get to the ball first, but was covered up by the Golden Eagles' Darryl Nesmith for a safety. The Knights took a 7-2 lead later in the first quarter on Grey's run. Grey finished with for 108 yards on 14 carries. Garis coached aggressively all game, calling for an onside kick after Grey's touchdown and for a fake punt in the second quarter. The onside kick was unsuccessful, but the fake punt worked when Ammon passed down the middle to upback Marcus Anthony for a 22 yard gain. A fake punt attempt by Fleming Island failed when upback Abram Wright was swallowed up at the line of scrimmage for no gain.

Garis stepped aside at halftime to let Shaquille Quarterman, a former Oakleaf linebacker who currently plays for the Jacksonville Jaguars, deliver a halftime speech. The gist of Quarterman's message was never to let the scoreboard dictate how you play.

Head coach Damenyum Springs said that the Eagles, who had not lost a regular season game since October 12, 2018, must correct their mistakes and focus on First Coast, which visits the Golden Eagles on October 16.

"This game is done, it's over with," Springs said. "If you focus on the one [loss], it becomes two."

Oakleaf improves to 3-2 and travels to Mandarin on October 16.







stuff done, found out his grades were good enough to play, and now he's making plays out on the football field. The only reason I even played him is because he came as a manager, wouldn't leave, and then came back the next day with his physical and all his paperwork and refused me telling him 'no.' That's an unbelievable story.'

The game was far from perfect for the Raiders despite their success on the ground. A penalty erased what would have been a 43-yard touchdown run by Restall with 2:26 left in the second quarter. The Raiders continued the drive, but Wilkerson threw his only interception (in the red zone) with 1:14 left in the first half. In the third quarter, the Raiders failed to convert on a fake punt attempt at their own three-yard-line. That led to a Crusader touchdown.

Bishop Kenney led from the beginning of the game, scoring on their opening drive, until the final Orange Park touchdown of the game near the end of the fourth quarter. The Crusaders also showed a strong ground game, rushing for 265 yards. They were led by junior running back Baylor Newsome, who had 81 yards on ten carries.

The Raider passing game didn't match up to the standards of the ground attack.

"We're going to be fine in the passing game," said MacPherson. "We got a backup quarterback that got hurt against Raines that shouldn't even have dressed tonight. Taylen [Wilkerson] is still hurt; he's not ready to go yet. Our receivers are special. There's four; three 10th-graders at receiver and a junior at tight end. Our receivers are special; the passing game'll be fine, just give it time."

Defensively, Orange Park had problems stopping the Crusaders all night, but came up with the most significant stop of the night and forcing a punt from the Bishop Kenny 40-yard-line with 5.28 remaining. Even then, it took a bit of luck, with Bishop Kenney missing a potentially game-tying field goal with 14 seconds left in the game.

Orange Park gets time to get healthy with a bye week before taking a road trip to face the Eastside Rams (0-4) in Gainesville on October 23.


