CLAY COUNTY – The district's schools are bursting at the seams and the stress will only continue to grow if the county doesn't soon address the thousands of people who move to the county every month.

That was the message Clay County School District coordinator of planning and intergovernmental relations, James Fossa, stressed during the first school board meeting of the year on Jan. 7. The district

will need to make moves this year in order to meet the incoming demand of growth.

Hospital purchases Vystar building for expansion

FLEMING ISLAND – The guttural sounds of heavy equipment bulldozers and dump trucks have become a welcomed consequence of rapid growth for Baptist Clay Medical Campus President Darin Roark.

The fast-moving construction will result in a new 100-bed hospital and the creation of Baptist HealthPlace at Fleming Island that's designed to enhance the quality of healthcare – and life – in the area.


Baptist Health last week completed its purchase of the VyStar Credit Union's North Florida call and operations center at 2310 Village Square Parkway. The hospital group will quickly move forward to convert the 85,000-square-foot building into one of its new healthy living centers.

Mary Jo McTammany: Dec. 31, 1942-Dec. 18, 2020 Historian, writer detailed Clay County's past for a decade for Clay Today

CLAY COUNTY - For more than a decade, Mary Jo McTammany provided readers with a magical portal to Clay County's past.

She told us stories of how Black Creek fueled the local economy with timber and turpentine, of the massive steamboats that used to dock in Green Cove Springs with another load of rich and powerful winter residents, of Camp Blanding's role in defeating Japan in World War II, of how the state carved an area from Duval in 1858 to create Clay County and of how the Middleburg United Methodist Church still is the oldest Protestant Church building in continuous use in Florida.

When she wasn't pouring through dusty and faded artifacts, McTammany was chronicling each discovery in the Clay Today. Her bi-weekly column ran from early 2009 until last year, but her passion for the county's past lasted until she died last month of natural causes. She was 77.

"Mary Jo was a real blessing to our community and readers of Clay Today," said the newspaper's publisher, Jon Cantrell. "The readers loved those stories, young and old."

McTammany spent hours at the Clay County Historical Archives doing research, according to Archives Specialist Vishi Garig

"She really loved the history of Clay County, especially Orange Park, where she grew up. She loved to write about the stories of our lives here in Clay County. She came over and did research for every story. She always did her research. She could back up her facts. If you had a historical question about Orange Park, she could answer it.'

McTammany's wrote about 275 columns for Clay Today. Her work, along with her research and notes, will be donated to the county's archives office.

"We were so very sad to hear about the passing of Mary Jo McTammany," said Mary Justino, the clerk's office's public information coordinator. "Not only was she a lovely person, but she was also an excellent researcher and historical writer. Her monthly articles featured in your newspaper were always a great read, and Vishi at Archives was proud to assist Mary Jo in locating the content and photos for those on a regular basis. We will miss Mary Jo and her writing.

Her first story appeared in 2009. It was about Washington G. Benedict, the founder of Orange Park. Other stories included how hardware merchant Ed Wiggins rode his horse and buggy from Green Cove Springs to Keystone Heights in 1925 to install a crude system of electrical lines that eventually became Clay Electric, how the old county jail was considered on the cutting edge in 1894 and the celebration that followed the opening of the Jennings Bridge at Black Creek.

She wrote:

"On June 16, 1917, Middleburg was crawling with state, local and national movers and shakers. The occasion was the opening of the Bryan Jennings Bridge across the north prong of Black Creek.

"Folks living in the area were almost giddy with enthusiasm because this bridge meant opening up the vast acreage east and west of Middleburg to industry and commerce. They were no longer exclusively dependent on ferries or a boat trip up the St. Johns River to reach markets in Jacksonville and points north."

She also wrote about the Green Cove Springs Village Improvement Association, the first women's club in Florida. Her story started, "In the early 1800s the town of Green Cove Springs struggled between being a rambunctious, rural, frontier settlement and, in the winter months, playing host to progressive, enlightened northern tourists." She detailed how visitors from the Northeast and around the world filled local resort hotels and boarding houses. They were escaping "heavy industrial gaging air pollution and appalling sanitary conditions." she said.

The women's group was determined the out-of-towners didn't bring their dirty problems to Green Cove Springs.

"It was a clash of cultures in the dusty, dirty streets and the women of Village Improvement Association waded right into the fray, cleaned up the town and organized women across the state into a force to be reckoned with," McTammany wrote.

McTammany's husband, Thomas, died in 2017. She is survived by a son and daughter.

"She was my friend," Garig said. "We were fellow historians. I'm going to miss her.'

So will Clay County.

Property tax exemption renewal cards to be mailed

CLAY COUNTY - County Property Appraiser Tracy S. Drake said the 2021 Property Tax Exemption Renewal Cards will be mailed on Tuesday, Jan. 19.

Florida law provides for a number of property tax exemptions, classifications and assessment reductions, which will reduce the taxable value of real property. One of the responsibilities of the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office is to ensure that all eligible property owners receive the full benefit of those exemptions of which they are eligible.

In Clay County, most property tax exemptions are renewed annually. Once an initial exemption application has been filed and granted, a subsequent application to maintain the exemption is not required. On or before Feb. 1, the CCPAO mails property tax exemption renewal cards to each property owner who qualified for specific exemptions in the prior year. If exemption eligibility has not changed, the renewal card serves as a receipt.

It is the responsibility of the property owner to notify the CCPAO if exemption eligibility has changed. Failure to promptly notify the property appraiser may result in significant penalties pursuant to Florida law. Detach the bottom portion of the card, indicate which exemptions should be removed, and return it.

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Clay High sophomore collects 50,000 cans to buy vests for service dogs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A few thousand cans weren't enough for one Clay High sophomore in his effort to help a charity. He was shooting for 50,000 by the end of 10th grade and he's already crushed that goal.

Noah Manning, 16, first heard about Cans For Canines during his first year of NJROTC. The group collected cans to be crushed and brought to Cans For Canines, where the money from the aluminum, which is eventually melted down, is used to purchase vests for the service dogs of veterans. When he heard about it, he asked what the record was and he was told it was about 2,000.

"I said, 'Challenge accepted,' and got to work," Manning said. "My family, friends, neighborhood...we have so many people involved."

Manning turned in 17,964 cans last year and another 18,040 during his first semester of his sophomore year. He turned in another 14,500 on Jan. 11, bringing his total to 50,504. He plans to slow down eventually, but it's not yet time for that, he said.

"There are days where I look at the cans and I'm so unmotivated, but then I remember what this is all about and I get back to it," Manning said. "It's for the betterment of others. What we're doing with these cans is directly benefiting the lives of others and that's what this is about. It's about helping others."

Manning's excited grandparents, Kim and Ray Lapointe, and his mother, Kandi Green, were with him in the back parking lot of Clay High on Monday to help him unload the cans, and they talked about how proud he makes them.

"I remember when he came home and told me that he wanted to break the record," Green said. "It was a challenge accepted moment and we all got to work getting as many people involved as we could."

"It's been a big family and neighborhood adventure. My husband is a teamster [International Brotherhood of Teamsters Lo-

cal Union 947] and they've been donating too so they drive to local breweries and local liquor stores, and then Island Dentistry [Green's workplace[...has seen a lot of people bringing cans in as well."

Green said the Lake Asbury NextDoor and SwipSwap pages online have been effective tools at acquiring more cans. She said there are eight families that donate to Manning now because of those pages. Green said once the news got out, her phone was constantly ringing with people asking to get involved and help.

Manning's grandparents drive around with bags to give to people so they can bag their cans and then they return at later dates to pick the cans up, which is part of their contribution to the larger Manning-Can effort.

The cans have raised over \$240 to go toward purchasing vests for service dogs for veterans and despite spending the afternoon moving more than 14,000 cans to the NJROTC Clay High portable, after having spent months manually crushing all of the cans and breaking a few can crusher machines in the process, Manning is already excited about filling his grandfather's trailer up with more bags of cans.

"I might slow down one day, but I don't see that happening anytime soon," Manning said.



Criminal justice, police reform among forefront of new legislative session

While the COVID-19 pandemic will demand much of the spotlight when the Florida Legislature convenes in 2021, police reform issues are still positioned as a top agenda item for lawmakers on both sides of the aisle.

The calls for police reform began in May when George Floyd, a Black man, died in police custody. Floyd's death and the deaths of others sparked protests and riots nationwide. Their deaths also energized a countrywide push for large-scale changes to street-level policing.

Though the massive protests are now over and stopped short before taking a deep root in Florida, state lawmakers thus far have filed more than 18 bills dealing with criminal justice in 2021.

More are likely on the way.

Gov. Ron DeSantis in September unveiled legislation that would create and increase criminal offenses for those who "target law enforcement" and participate in a "disorderly" assembly.

Coined as the "Combatting Violence, Disorder and Looting and Law Enforce-ment Protection Act," the proposal would also block state grants and aid to local governments that slash law enforcement budgets – a provision that serves as a direct counter to the "Defund the Police" movement.

DeSantis trumpeted the legislation ahead of the 2020 presidential election as both parties looked to leverage "law and order" and "police reform" on voters.

The measure has yet to be filed.

On the other hand, Sen.-elect Shevrin Jones announced he would introduce a bill to gut qualified immunity doctrine for police officers.

Modern qualified immunity doctrine stems from a 1982 U.S. Supreme Court case and is criticized often by police reform activists.

The doctrine is interpreted by many courts to say that law enforcement officers cannot be sued for violating a person's rights unless a court has already ruled that behavior is unconstitutional.

Qualified immunity proponents argue it serves as a needed protection for police. They contend officers require guidance to distinguish improper behavior. Therefore, it is unfair to hold an officer liable without a prior precedent.

Opponents, alternatively, stress that the doctrine has served as a significant roadblock to holding officers accountable

Community's warm response leads to successful holiday for Salvation Army

MIDDLEBURG - We heard the bells, and we responded.

We knew the need, and we responded. We muted the noise of COVID-19 and political unrest, and we opened our hearts - and wallets - to our neighbors in need.

The tion Army of Clay County went into the season with a lot of concerns. It knew more people would be shopping

knew many residents were furloughed, laid off or had hours reduced during the shutdowns to combat the virus.

And vet, we responded.

The local post reported it collected \$140,000 during the holidays. That's up from \$117,000 in 2018 and \$125,000 in 2019 when the economy was booming.

"It was pretty amazing," said Maj. Lynn Irish, who coordinated the Red Kettle Drive. "The community came through. We were expecting [donations] to be down. Praise the Lord we got through it better than we thought."

Maj. Phil Irish said this year's Angel Tree and Kettle Drives got off to a slow start. Many businesses couldn't have volunteers ringing bells at their front doors

due to COVID-19. Volunteers also had to wear personal protective equipment and had to adhere to socially distancing.

"Our Kettle fundraising got off to a shaky and uncertain start with corporate commitments up in the air until just before the season started, along with the implementation of COVID protocols that were cumbersome, but necessary," he said. "Again, our staff, volunteers and advisory/auxiliary members came through with flying colors.'

Because of the virus, the Salvation Army also wasn't allowed to place their Angel Trees in businesses. The trees came with paper ornaments that spelled out the specific wishes for local children. And because of the coronavirus, Angel tree had to be expanded as a result of the economic stress in the community. Phil Irish said the Salvation Army accepted the challenge and met every need without hesitation.

Instead of relying of customers to provide Christmas presents, Walmart, Advent Lutheran Church, Orange Park Medical Center, Parallon Business Solutions, Fields Automotive Group, Clay County Public Safety, Moose Lodge, Soaring Eagle, Fleming Island United Methodist Church, Orange Park Presbyterian, Center State Bank and the Art Guild of Orange Park all came forward to fill every request.

Lynn Irish said the Salvation Army also fulfilled requests by as many as 90 children in the Guardian Ad Litem system.

"Because of the response, we were able to reach out assist more families this year." she said. "It was the first time we've assisted Guardian Ad Litem, and it was above what we normally do with the other 400



since the Supreme Court established the concept.

Jones' proposal would follow a law Colorado approved in June. That law asserts any violation of a person's rights under the state constitution could not be blocked outright by a qualified immunity defense.

It's unclear how Jones' bill might differ from the Colorado proposal.

That legislation has yet to be filed.

Rep. Ramon Alexander, meanwhile, said he would sponsor legislation that would create a compensation fund for police shooting victims.

In an August announcement, the Democratic lawmaker said his "Victim Compensation Crime and Trauma Fund" would also be accessible to the families of those shot by police.

"As lawmakers, it is imperative that we provide trauma-specific services and a greater awareness of the effects of exposure to traumatic events," Alexander said then in a news release. "Police officers can obtain help to cope with trauma; victims and families should have the same service available to them."

That legislation has yet to be filed.

Typically, police reform proposals would be unlikely to gain traction in Florida's GOP-controlled Legislature. Newly minted House Speaker Chris Sprowls, however, said "my door and my mind are open" to a dialogue on policing in Florida during his opening remarks as House Speaker. Still, he positioned himself as pro-police, signal-

families we helped."


ing anything he might view as less than that might not make it onto his agenda this year.

Despite GOP warnings against defunding law enforcement, House Minority Leader Evan Jenne claimed that taking money from law enforcement was never in the cards in Florida.

On the contrary, he said more money will be needed for the training and pilot

KultureCity materials make Clay libraries sensory inclusive

CLAY COUNTY – The county's library branches have partnered with KultureCity to certify all five locations as sensory inclusive.

That certification means not only are all employees at the branches certified to work with sensory-sensitive patrons like sensory overload or something else, but that each library has multiple sensory bags on site for anyone to use. It's part of the county's ongoing effort to make its libraries as inclusive as possible.

"With this certification. the Clay County Public Library System is now better prepared to assist guests with sensory sensitivities in having the most comfortable and accommodating experience possible when attending any class or program at the library," Board of County Commissioners chairman Mike Cella said.

Director of library services, Karen Walker, said this new effort comes by way of the assistant director, Jason Black. He enrolled in the Sunshine State Library Leadership Institute last year and having Clay County's libraries achieve KultureCity's sensory inclusion certification was part of his leadership project at the institute.

"To know that you will soon be able to see families attend a program, the true community building experience, with their loved ones who have a sensory challenge and who were not able to previously attend, is truly a heartwarming moment,' Black said.

Walker said one in six people have

some kind of sensory-related diagnosis and that it's the fastest-growing demographic of people in the world. She said she wants any and all library patrons to feel like they can enjoy everything the library offers without needing to worry about sensory triggers or sensory overloads.

That still might happen because different things can trigger issues, but that's where the sensory bags come in to play.

Each bag includes noise-reducing headphones, a Wacky Track fidget, a Monkey Tube fidget, a Marble fidget, a visual cue card and a KultureCity VIP lanyard to let staff know a patron may have sensoryrelated needs. They also have sunglasses available for those with light-related sensory needs and a weighted lap pad that can help someone ground themselves when their senses are overloaded.

Each library can be found on the KultureCity app, too, and this app allows the user to see what the library looks like and what kind of sensory-related assistance it offers. Each of Clay County's five libraries will appear in the app with a picture and a notice that tells the user the libraries have sensory bags and sensory certification.

"The library is not a private business," Walker said. "It's a place for everyone and we have materials, we have items, and we have programming for people of all ages and in my opinion, one of the things about the library that make it so critical is that we are truly a level playing field.

"Truly, everyone is welcome and this is another step in making sure that's the case.'

Clay County's creative responses to COVID-19 helped get tourism industry through pandemic

CLAY COUNTY – All things considered, the county's tourism and local businesses handled the year 2020 quite well, and the tourism development council is working to make 2021 even brighter.

When the COVID-19 pandemic struck last year, Clay County quickly foresaw how its effects would change things, but the TDC and the county's tourism director, Kimberly Morgan, quickly shifted to meet that challenge head-on. It's why the county kept higher occupancy compared to other destinations like it, according to Morgan.

"This has been my outlook through all of this: it's hard and tourism has been hit hard, but we're not down and we're not dying," Morgan said. "Clay County has been very fortunate in that we've been able to keep occupancy more than most destinations."

She said the market has shifted dramatically in the county in light of the coronavirus, specifically in hotel and bed and breakfast occupation. The county traditionally reported higher numbers during the week and fall during the weekend, but COVID-19 resulted in a total 180-degree flip. Morgan said proves the county is capable of being a leisure destination and that's something the tourism department worked hard last year to target.

It did that in a number of ways: it created safety event kits, continued its mar-

keting, created a new website and targeted communities that would see Clay County as a tourism destination based on numbers the county sees.

Both the event kits and the new website have been in service since October, and as the new year ramps up, Morgan said they'll play an even larger role. Targeted marketing is used to bring people to the county and the website serves as their directory. The event kits and other local safety efforts like Commit 2 Clay give visitors the peace of mind they desire when on vacation.

The event kits are simple, but they're effective. They consist of hand sanitizer stations, hand sanitizer, masks, banners and large signs that show anyone on sight that this county and the event planner question prioritize safety in every decision. Morgan said the event kits serve both the locals that attend events in the county like the Orange Park Fall Festival and the Florida Ballet performances at the Thrasher-Horne Center, of which both utilized the event kits, and the tourists, but that it mostly works to give tourists peace of mind because locals are likely already aware of how the county handles COVID-19 safety.

"It's really an extension of the help we want to offer to event planners and places holding events," Morgan said. "It's a kit worth a couple of hundred bucks and it makes an event planner's job, for example, that much easier."

Morgan said the tourism department has been extending its helping hand to help event planners tackle the virus safety problem. "We're here to do that part of it for them and just brainstorm with them," Morgan said. "You can't just do things the same. You have to do it differently. You have to think about entrances to make sure there aren't any bottlenecks, you have to think about space to ensure social distancing can happen...those are types of things we sit down with event planners to talk about."

The website goes hand in hand with the tourism department's approach to tourism in these times, too. It's a one-stop shop for all things related to tourism in the county. It features local mom-and-pop shops and restaurants for tourists to visit, a questionnaire to help the viewer discover what might appeal to them most in Clay County.

"We have all these treasures here in our backyard and the new website is designed around highlighting those treasures," Morgan said.

The website is also a first for the county in that it's the first time Clay County has had a stand-alone website that is dedicated to tourism, according to commissioner and TDC chairman Mike Cella.

"It's all about trying to be flexible and helpful in this time because we are all in this together," Morgan said. "We're going to keep marketing because we know it's the lifeline for our businesses...and we are going to keep uplifting the beauty and the business we have here in Clay County.

"We have the assets — it's just about making sure people know about them."



Island Dentistry expands its services with hiring of two new doctors

FLEMING ISLAND – Island Dentistry is a one-stop shop for all your dentistry needs and it just bolstered its ranks with two new doctors.

Island Dentistry is aware of the stigma and fear associated with dentists: people are often scared to go to dentists be it a childhood trauma associated with them, a fear of the tools used or even a sense of embarrassment they might feel about the state of their teeth and mouth. The dental office works to remove that fear and being a one-stop shop is a part of that effort.

"Island Dentistry recognizes fear is a huge issue for a lot of patients whether it be childhood trauma or embarrassment so we make a point, no matter who they're seeing, to build a relationship with that patient so that they're comfortable," Island Dentistry operations director Kandi Green said. "They're already fearful of their regular visits so we don't want to send them off from us to specialists, which is why we offer as much as we do here in this office."

The office is located at 4589 U.S. Highway 17, Unit 6 on Fleming Island, and with the addition of two new doctors, Xiaodan Zhang and Victor Erminy, it can offer even more.

Zhang has a long history in dentistry that stretches back to her life in China, where she went to dental school and held a residency for oral surgery. She came to the United States to further her education by attending dental school at the University of Minnesota. She practiced dentistry privately in Minnesota following college, and she moved to Florida last August with her wife and two daughters after her wife landed a residency at the Mayo Clinic here.

"I love it here," Zhang said. "I have two daughters and they love the beach here and the weather. It's nice that on any given day, we can go outside, which we couldn't do in Minnesota."

Zhang said she did a little waiting after moving here before starting the job hunt to help her family settle into their new, sunny home. She saw many openings and positions around town, but none appealed to her more than working as a dentist at Island Dentistry.

"I think they were the best fit because of the way they serve their patients and because of their philosophy to put their patients' best interests first," Zhang said. "That's in line with my principles in dentistry as well. I want to serve them the best I can and give them the brightest smile and that's what we're about here."

Island offers run-of-the-mill services like cleanings and cavity work, but they offer so much more. Zhang said they do regular restorations, crowns, cleanings, implants, bone grafts, bridges, full mouth rehabilitation, wisdom teeth, teeth extractions and all kinds of surgeries.

"I just started this year," Erminy said. "Tuesday (Jan. 5) actually, so this week I've been focused on training and getting to know how the office operates. We want to make sure all of the associate dentists [Erminy is an associate dentist] do things in the same way so that patients don't feel like they're being treated in different ways between this person and that person. That's very important to us here."

Erminy is originally from Venezuela, where he attended dental school. He moved to the states to hold a residency at a Cleveland hospital. He was offered a job at that hospital after his residency and there, he worked as a dentist that did "basically everything you can think of" like implants, surgeries and more.

He worked in Cleveland for seven years before deciding to move to Florida last year with his family that includes two daughters. Much like Zhang, moving to Florida from a northern state that experienced harsher winters brought with it a welcome change, he said.

"When I was looking for somewhere to work, I actually went to their website and saw that they had great reviews," Erminy said. "That was very appealing to me and then during the interviews I had here, I realized this was the place I wanted to be. They were very comfortable and friendly and I fell in love with everything about the clinic, what they were doing, how they treated patients...it was perfect."

Erminy is just days into his Island career and Zhang is just a few weeks into it, but both new doctors are excited to serve Fleming Island and Clay County.

Increase your NEAT score and burn more calories

We've all heard the term calories in, calories out. It essentially means, if you expend more calories than you take in, you will lose weight. Likewise, if you take in more calories than you expend, you will gain weight. However, understanding how calories are burned throughout your day can make a huge impact on how you can tip the scales in your battle for fat loss.

A calorie is a unit of measuring energy, it's the energy required to heat one liter of water by one degree centigrade. So, if calories are energy, seeing where they are expended is important. From the time you wake, to the time you are asleep in recovery, these metabolic and movement activities make up your total daily energy expenditure. So, what are all these calories doing?

Basal Metabolic Rate. This is the minimum level of energy used to maintain vital functions of the body. BMR accounts

for more than 70% of the energy we consume each day. That's a big percentage, but then again keeping us alive is hard work. Thermal Ef-

fect of Food. Basically it's the process used to turn your food into energy; digestion, absorp-

tion, and distribution of food and nutrients taken in. This makes up about 10% of total calorie burn, the simple act of eating increases the metabolism. How much metabolic activity goes up, depends on the macronutrient you are consuming. Protein has the highest thermic response and takes more energy to process. This is the reason high protein diets tend to burn fat, it's also

why you get the "meat sweats" at the Brazilian Steak House.

Exercise Activity. This is energy used for exercise like going on a run, having a workout in the gym, or working out at home. This can make up between 10-15% for sedentary people and up to 30% for physically active individuals. The higher intensity the workout, the higher the demand for energy, not only in the workout, but after the workout. This is called EPOC, or excess post-exercise consumption, which is basically the energy needed to bring you back to baseline.

Non-Exercise Activity Thermogenesis. This is all the other movement that is not exercise. These can include; moving around at home or work, fidgeting and pacing, housework and yardwork, playing with children and pets, etc. So, if you can increase your "NEAT score" you can burn more calories. One pound of fat can provide approximately 3,500 Calories of energy. Increasing your NEAT by 200 calories (walking two miles) and making smarter food choices by decreasing your daily caloric intake by 300 calories (one soda), will put you at a 500-calorie deficit. Do this seven days a week, and you are on your way to loosening that belt.

Other ways of raising your NEAT score can be standing more at work, taking walks or adding weight to your daily walks, playing outside with your kids, taking the stairs versus the elevator or biking as transportation.

If losing weight and trimming up is one of your objectives, NEAT is going to be a big part of your success.

Fix Them All provides low-cost spay and neuter services

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – One of the fallouts of the COVID-19 pandemic has been the reduced ability of some residents to take proper care of their pets.

There is a large pet population in the county and they pose an additional expense to their owners and caretakers. Some people, especially senior citizens on fixed incomes, find themselves wondering they will be able to feed and meet the medical needs of the animals.

There is help on both fronts. Fix Them All, a nonprofit formerly known as Pay to Spay, provides affordable options to control the population of cats and dogs, while Twisted Oaks rescue has been a great help on the feeding front, literally donating tons of food to those in need.

Veterinary care for animals can be an expensive proposition, one that is often unaffordable. Animals often breed and multiply, making the situation worse if they

belong to a family or person facing tough times.

Fix Them All states their mission as: to incentivize the spaying and neutering of dogs and cats in order to reduce the number of unwanted animals.

Lucille Reese is Operations Manager for Fix Them All and has been with the organization since its inception in 2015.

"We wanted to do something for the lower-income, underserved residents in lower areas on spaying and neutering their animals," she said. "It's [low-cost spay and neuter services] quite relevant. There are shelters, but they are completely overwhelmed with stray animals and people who surrender their animals, either because they have too many animals or they can't afford to feed them."

Fix Them All works to provide access to surgery as well as education on caring for pets and the benefits and importance of sterilization.

The original idea for Pay To Spay was many pet owners would be less than excited about sterilizing their animals if they got a gift card as a monetary incentive to outweigh the cost. They eventually discovered a more prevalent reason for reluctance of sterilization was more due to the cost and a lack of transportation.

The name Fix Them All, it was a better way to reflect the mission of the organization.

Fix The All has a mobile unit that travels to assist with better meeting the needs of its patrons.

The cost is also heavily subsidized, with a price tag of \$30 for cats and \$50 for dogs to undergo the process.

"Our low-cost spay/neuter program is made possible through our success in negotiating discounted procedure fees of our local veterinarians who wish to participate in our program," said Reese. "We subsidize the difference with our own funds. We promote the availability of these services at farm stores, grocery stores, donut shops and other places where people gather as well as online."

In 2020, Fix Them All has coordinated the sterilization of more than 1,000 pets to reduce the number of unwanted animals in the area.

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Voss steers Seamark Ranch through unprecedented times, need for expanded growth

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Greg is the new CEO of Seamark Ranch and his focus are the children that call the ranch their home.

Seamark Ranch is a place where at-risk children can live when other living conditions aren't an option. If a child or teenager can't live in their current environment, the ranch west of Penney Farms can become a transformational option. The goal for all residents, however, is form them to return home once their conditions improve.

That's Voss' sales pitch for the not-forprofit organization, and he's ready to lead the ranch further into the future.

"Our goal is to give them something they didn't have, be it a strong-parent household, a new set of positive circumstances, a chance at something resembling vacation or a sense of work that feels fulfilling," Voss said. "Our No. 1 goal above all else is to give them a loving home."

Seamark Ranch is more than just a home for sleeping and eating. It's a ranch complete with its own classical Christian education-based school. This means the ranch can be an all-around experience. The children can sleep, shower, eat and live at the ranch, wake up each morning and learn in the school, and then work on the ranch tending to livestock and crops.

That all-encompassing on-site experience is why Voss uses the word "transformational" to describe the ranch in one word.

Voss has lived in Florida for 15 years after originally hailing from the New Jersey-Maryland-District of Columbia area of the east coast. He worked in sports and entertainment media and marketing, including jobs with the Washington Redskins and Washington Capitals before moving to Florida where he eventually became the vice president of operations for the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce, where he further cut his business-oriented teeth.

He went through a recruiter first, then an interview with a search committee and an interview with the ranch's executive committee before he was brought on to replace Fred Meiner. Voss has been with the ranch since last June and he's learned something new every day.

"You know, starting a new job like this, it's like drinking from a fire hydrant because there's just so much to learn," Voss said. "We have a great board of directors so obviously very early on, what I prioritized was getting to know the board members and the staff really well. Getting to know the major stakeholders of this organization was important too and building relationships with every single person at the ranch or involved with us.

"But I'm in my own now and we're making great strides for the future of this ranch."

Voss came into the nonprofit at a very interesting time with the COVID-19 pandemic. He not only had to learn to steer this organization, but steer it through the storm.

"There were so many different things to think about and apply between masks, safety protocols, social distancing, sanitization and everything else, but we did it and we honestly haven't had much of a problem at all with the virus," Voss said. "I'm very thankful for the staff in that regard."

Voss foresees a new sports complex and new school-related buildings in the ranch's future, he said. Ground already has been broken on a new sports complex dedicated to a child and friend of the ranch that recently passed away. It will be known as Cole's Courts, and Voss said naming the complex in Cole's honor is a great way to memorialize him forever.

"We want to build more homes on the ranch as well, but in order to do that, we need to expand our school because it's at capacity," Voss said. "We're going to launch a more aggressive campaign to raise funds soon and get an add-on to the school builds and we hope to start construction on that project by the end of 2021."

Voss said the ranch also wants to be more aggressive about vocational training too due to the number of those staying at

29, with initial doses provided to highrisk front-line health care workers such as Paramedics and Department of Health staff who will be providing direct care at the COVID-19 vaccination POD. Through Jan. 3, DOH Clay and Clay County Emergency Management distributed 233 initial doses of the two-dose vaccine. On Jan. 4, the POD opened for Phase 1a priority population, via appointment at Alert.Clay-CountyGov.com. DOH Clay recommends individuals take the following precautions to reduce the likelihood of contracting and spreading the virus:

1. Stay 6 feet away from others. Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.

Clay launches paramedicine program to reduce rate of opioid overdoses

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Florida Department of Health in Clay County said beginning Jan. 11, the Overdose Data to Action Community Paramedicine Program will begin offering services to residents.

The OD2A Community Paramedicine Program, a collaborative partnership between the Department of Health in Clay County, the Clay County Board of County Commissioners, Clay County Fire Rescue and Clay Behavioral Health Care, was created to reduce opioid related drug overdoses in the county.

As part of this partnership, CCFR Community Paramedicine Program staff will offer Clay County residents who have experienced an opioid overdose the opportunity to receive Medication Assisted Therapy with follow up services through CBHC. MAT combines the use of medication with education and psychosocial and/ or behavioral therapy to reduce mortality rates and improve outcomes in opioid addicted patients.

Once a prospective client consents to the program, CCFR Community Paramedicine Program staff will make daily contact (up to seven days) with the client to provide a dose of Buprenorphine, a medication approved by the Food and Drug Administration to treat opioid use disorder. Daily contact will end once CCFR staff confirm that a client has started services through CBHC. Clients accepted into the Paramedicine Program are eligible to receive periodic checks from the CCFR Paramedicine staff for up to one year.

Referrals to the program can occur through CCFR dispatch, field crews responding to overdose calls, or through walk in requests for assistance at CCFR stations. Local area hospitals, law enforcement officers and jail personnel can also refer to the OD2A Community Paramedicine Program via referral form. Residents interested in more information can contact DOH – Clay at (904) 529-2800 and those interested in receiving services can contact the Community Paramedicine Program team at (904) 284-7703. Residents can obtain education and supportive services, even if they decline MAT.

"This partnership is a vital step toward decreasing the rates of fatal and non-fatal opioid overdoses," stated Heather Huffman, Administrator for DOH-Clay. "According to Florida Health Charts, Clay County's rate of Drug Poisoning deaths and Unintentional Injury Deaths by Drug Poisoning for 100,000 people exceed the State of Florida rate. In 2019 alone, there were 124 non-fatal opioid involved overdoses and 248 opioid-involved non-fatal overdose emergency department visits. By October of 2020, there were 429 incidents where Narcan was administered by CCFR to 449 patients. We are confident that through community education, the efforts of the Opioid Task Force and the Commu-

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Clay County Archives provides unique window into the past

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Archives offers a unique look into the past. Authors, historians, realtors, school children, tourists and even ghosthunters, visit the old jail looking for everything from information to the paranormal.

Vishi Garig is the archive specialist for the Clerk of the Circuit Court Tara Green. She runs and monitors the Historical Archives. According to the Clerk's website, the mission of the archives is to "effectively identify, organize and preserve records and artifacts of enduring value in various formats related to Clay County."

"I go to schools and lecture about Clay County History," Garig said. "We put on a history festival here in May. In October, we put on a Halloween special called 'Tales from the Clink,' where high school kids, the drama kids, reenact true crimes. So, it's all kinds of stuff. I work on the fair booth for the Clerk's office, for the big fair that we have in April. And it's always a historical, educational theme booth."

The Clerk's office's display at the 2019 fair paid homage to the musical connections of Ronnie, Donnie and Johnny Van Zant made to the county. The site was so popular, Garig expanded the display and moved it to the Thrasher-Horne Center for a six-week run in Orange Park. Johnny Van Zant, the current front man for Lynyrd Skynyrd, and bassist Larry Junstrom, a founding member of Skynyrd, attended the grand opening.

The Historical Triangle also includes the Old Courthouse, which was opened in 1972, the Green Cove Springs train station and the TAPS Monument that identifies county residents who've died in combat – from the Civil War to current wars in the Middle East.

Among other Garig's other tasks are to archive the county's oldest records, which are made available to the public. The records are from the period between Clay County's founding in 1858 until the 1970s. Records from before 1958 are unavailable online, which makes the historical archives a necessity.

Garig she used to provide tours regularly.

"COCID-19 put the squash on that," she said. "But before, yea. We would get Girl Scout Troops, Boy Scout Troops, school tours. Last year we had a day where we ran a couple hundred kids through this building, the 1890 courthouse and the main courthouse. We just did like a shuttle bus thing, and we moved the kids through. That was a really fun day."

Being the old jail, there are some historical artifacts present, such as the bullets from the pistol which killed Sheriff Joseph Peeler in 1894.

"We were like the Disney of our day," Garig said of the county around the turn of the 20th Century. "Lots and lots of tourists. The first snowbirds to Florida, they came here. Because of the spring. They would come in the winter and take the medicinal cures."

One of the most famous sights is the old jail cell block built in 1894 and was used until 1972. Prisoners up to maximum security were housed there. The jail had no heat, no air conditioning and no lights. It had men, women, juveniles and the mentally ill as there was no institution to house

them at the time of construction.

Many ghost hunters come to the jail on weekends. They come in groups of five or more people, with each donating \$20. They then investigate the old building between the hours of 7 p.m. and midnight. Some claimed to have found evidence of the paranormal. The television show "Ghost Hunters" toured and explored the jail in 2014 to discover whether it was haunted by inmates' ghosts and a murdered sheriff.

"Talking to people, telling them about

the history of the buildings, the history of the people who worked in here, or were locked up in here," Garig said when asked what she loved about her job. "The jailors actually lived in my portion [her office]. Just interacting with the public; that's like my favorite part. I love it when they come in here."

The modern archives can be found at the current Clay County courthouse, and many records can be requested or found online.

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The giant mural on the corner of North Orange Avenue and Palmer Street in Green Cove Springs honors a fallen soldier and two fallen first responders from Clay County.

New Green Cove mural honors memories of three fallen heroes

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The corner of North Orange Avenue and Palmer Street in Green Cove Springs bears a beautiful tribute to the military and first responders of the city that everyone can see as they drive southward.

The mural features a huge American flag, which covers about one half of the building's side. On the flag is a cloud with wings spreading from the top of it, out to either side – into the Stars on the left and the stripes on the right. Standing on top of the clouds are the three people forever memorialized by the city.

On the left is Clay Fire Rescue Engineer and Paramedic Jeremy J. McKay, who died in 2019 after battling cancer. In the middle is U.S. Army Ranger Sgt. Bradley Crose, who died while fighting the Taliban and Al-Qaeda during Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan. And the third person is Clay County Sheriff's Office Dep. Benjamin Zirbel, who was killed on duty in a 2019 motorcycle accident. Sophie "Dare" Dentiste was the leading artist on the project. She has been doing wall mural art since the 1990s. In conjunction with local charity St. Michael's Soldiers and the Art Guild of Orange Park, she worked during an approximately fiveweek period from November to December of 2019 to complete the mural. Others involved were Lynette Woodman, Lori Butler, Kim Hinkle, Alison McCauley, Andrea Sibilla, Kathy Plante and Beth Hazlip.

"I wanted to do a wall with wings," Dentiste said of the design's origins. "I had some ideas in my head, so we came up with that together. They loved the wings too... so I created a design for them; several different options, and that's just the one that they chose."

For a smaller city such as Green Cove Springs, projects like this mean a lot.

"Very significant and meaningful," Dentiste said. "Because of the impact on the community and other artists participating. As well, once we got into it, we thought it was going to be a memorial to first responders, but then we found out it was a

memorial to three specific fallen officers in Clay County and their families."

"I think it's a great addition to the city of Green Cove Springs," said Tiffanie Kelly, Communications Coordinator for the City of Green Cove Springs. "Through this mural program, we are trying to find ways to liven up downtown. We think that this is a great collaboration between artists and the city of Green Cove Springs. It's a great way for artists to show their passion for the city and in the case of this particular mural of the men and women who work to keep our country and this city safe."

The mural is the second Dentiste has done in Green Cove Springs, the first being the Flora and Fauna, located just across the street.

High's capacity currently is at 106%.

Oakleaf is the only high school with a capacity more than 100%, but other schools like Middleburg High, which sits at 98%, are getting close. In the case of

Oakleaf, however, the growth shows no signs of slowing down as nine new developments are under construction or in the planning stages.

The capacity of the high school is 2,450 students. There are 2,607 attending today and Fossa projects that another 230 students soon will be added to the school as a result of the incoming development.

"If we do nothing, Oakleaf High [will rise to] 115% and...it will continue to grow," Fossa said. "That's something we need to look at."

Another area of the district Fossa believes the district needs to focus on is the Lake Asbury area. Lake Asbury Junior High currently sits at 83% capacity, but Fossa said there's a secret factor hiding within that number.

"You might say, 'Oh, 83%'s not too bad,' but there's an [Exceptional Student Edu-

cation] factor we're not including," Fossa said. "Each classroom can be 23 or 25 or what have you and they may or may not [have] that many students in there and because there's a large ESE population at Lake Asbury, we know [many seats in classrooms aren't being used].

"You might have a room with 25 seats, but there might only be five used...so you have an artificial number there.'

Fossa said the capacity taking into account the school's ESE numbers sit closer to 88% and that with all the new neighborhood development planned for the area, he projects the non-ESE number to rise to 113%, or 117% with the ESE factor taken into account.

"There's a way forward though: a board workshop," Fossa said. "We can present, examine and develop options to remedy the currency problem with boundary alignment.'

Boundary realignment would allow the district to redraw school boundary lines and redirect students to different schools in an effort to reduce the capacity of highcapacity schools like Oakleaf High and Lake Asbury Junior High.

In other news, Superintendent David Broskie announced the graduation rate for

the last school year was 93.4%, which is the highest in district history. It marks an 8.7-point increase from 2015 to now, and puts Clay County's graduation rate at No. 6

Bright lights warning leads to arrest for weapon, drugs

MIDDLEBURG – A man was seconds away from driving away from a traffic stop with a warning wound up the Clay County Jail on an assortment of drug and weapon charges.

Gino Nick Rocca II, 30, of Hampton, was

charged with possession of a stolen firearm and ammo by a convicted felon, as well as possession of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia and possession of cocaine and mari-

juana with the intent Gino Rocca to sell, manufacture

or deliver after the Clay County Sheriff's Office stopped him on Jan. 8 on Southlake Drive at County Road 220 for not dimming his bright lights for oncoming traffic.

As the deputy came back to the car with the warning, he found a plastic bag with later tested positive for methamphetamine on the ground by Rocca's door. The arrest report said the baggie was dry although it had just rained.

A search uncovered cocaine and marijuana packaged for sale and a handgun on Rocca or in his backpack, according to CCSO.

Orange Park man indicted by U.S. Attorney for wire fraud

JACKSONVILLE – U.S. Attorney Maria Chapa Lopez announced the return of an indictment charging Brian Roy Lozito, 51, with conspiracy to commit wire fraud and 12 counts of wire fraud. If convicted, Lozito faces a maximum penalty of 20 years in federal prison on each count and payment of restitution to the victims he defrauded. Lozito was arraigned on the charges on Jan. 11. His trial is set for March 1.

According to the indictment, Lozito owned and managed American Investigative Services. AIS purported to offer consumers mortgage auditing services in exchange for a fee. Lozito and his conspirators solicited customers nationwide through mailings and telephone calls. In these solicitations, Lozito and AIS employees under his direction made false and fraudulent representations to consumers, including that AIS would perform "forensic audits" of mortgage documents in order to uncover evidence of deficiencies in the mortgage documents. Lozito claimed AIS would obtain quitclaim deeds and other remedies, so the mortgage holders would be relieved of their mortgage debt and own their properties free and clear. If AIS could not help the consumer, Lozito promised to refund their money. In reality, AIS did not perform the services paid for by consumers and did not refund money to consumers. Money collected from consumers went to bank accounts controlled by Lozito, and he spent the money.

An indictment is merely a formal charge that a defendant has committed one or more violations of federal criminal law, and every defendant is presumed innocent unless, and until, proven guilty.

This case was investigated by the U.S. Secret Service's Jacksonville Field Office and the Office of the Florida Attorney General – Consumer Protection Division, with assistance from the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

It will be prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Kevin C. Frein.

Residents line up early for Middleburg American Legion food giveaway

MIDDLEBURG – About 20 volunteers with the American Legion Post 250 in Middleburg gathered last Tuesday, as they do on the second Tuesday of every month, to give out food to underprivileged members of the community.

The giveaway, usually scheduled to begin at 8 a.m., started early when several vehicles were already in line to receive the needed foodstuffs.

"It's Farm Share free food giveaway," said Richard Rowe, U.S. Air Force veteran and Commander of post 250. "We do it on the second Tuesday of every month. Farm Share is an organization who has the food. They bring it in there. They bring a truckload on Tuesday morning. We unload it; bag it up."

Farm Share is a non-profit organization established in 1991, dedicated to the elimination of food waste and to fighting against hunger. It distributes food throughout Florida and provides food to the Legion offers to the public. In 2020 alone, Farm Share distributed more than 101 million pounds of food throughout the state.

Rowe estimates that Farm Share and his American Legion post helps between 180 and 250 families with groceries every month

Sheldon Phillips is a retired Army helicopter pilot who has been with the American Legion for 19 years. He is also a volunteer at the monthly food giveaways. "It gives me a chance to help people that are less fortunate than me," Phillips said. "I'm retired and have a pretty good life, and there's a lot of people that ain't doing so well right now. We start about an hour early, packing [bags]."

Rowe says sometimes they also start early if the lines are long and begin to block traffic.

The operation has been taking place for one year now.

As the vehicles arrived, they were checked in by a volunteer who got information from them about their family's size. That information was then relayed to the volunteer team, who loaded the vehicles with the necessary donations.


prize, a \$100 savings bond.

Huffman, Ward update commission on county's slow, frustrating Moderna rollout

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The is working hard to get Moderna COVID-19 vaccines out as fast as possible, but it will be a while before supply meets the demand.

Florida Health Department Clay County administrator Heather Huffman and Emergency Management director John Ward spoke of the struggles and success of the vaccine rollout during the Jan. 12 Board of County Commissioners meeting. BCC members told Huffman and Ward constituents are upset about the rollout, but there's nothing the county can do about it.

"We have received 3,800 doses at the department and that is it," Huffman said. "It's a trickle effect and I want people to be realistic about what this means."

She said there's more than 220,000 residents in the county and doses are designated for frontline healthcare workers and people 65 and older, a population that accounts for roughly 35,000 residents. The state mandated those doses go to that population, which shows 3,800 doses for 35,000 people doesn't add up.

Ward said the county is going to continue to use the internet as its method for making vaccine appointments. There has been some frustration surrounding the online signups because the demand is so high. The appointments disappear in minutes, but Ward said the county is going to be more open about when other appointments are available.

"Just to set expectations...on a weekly basis on Wednesday, late morning to hit that noon news hour, we're going to do an announcement," he said. "[Jan. 13], we're going to do an announcement that we didn't get any this week and there won't be any appointments opening up."

He if the county learns at noon it will receive additional doses, it won't open the application process until 3 p.m. to give residents a chance to get the information.

The county is currently administering 224 doses a day and is about to double its capacity to 448 - 224 initial doses and 224 second doses. Huffman said hospitals and their smaller-scale partner offices will soon be administering doses to people 65 or older, and CVS, Publix and Walgreens soon will follow suit.

Commissioner Betsy Condon said her constituents make up a large portion of the 65 years or older population and her phone has been ringing constantly with upset residents.

"Clay has done a phenomenal job through the entire COVID-19 crisis and I know you two are trying to get more vac-

cines for us, and we see that, but it's frustrating [for the people calling]," Condon said. "Where are the doses?"

Huffman said reports the state is holding back doses is inaccurate. The delays are the federal government's way of ensuring there are enough doses so that those who already received the first are guaranteed to receive their necessary second inoculation. She said Moderna is catching up quickly which means that the government soon won't need to hold back doses for the second round.

"The vaccines are coming from the federal government so they can't be bound to residency, a state, or even the country," Huffman said. "The State of Florida is getting about 250,000 doses a week. Off that, they have to feed [doses] to CVS and Walgreens [which are handing long-term senior care facilities amongst other things]."

She also said Publix has 22 stores in the state taking doses from that 250,000 and that number is about to rise to 70 stores. So far, no Publix locations in Clay County have been selected. The doses designated to pharmacies won't draw from the number of vaccines allotted to the county, Huffman said. The state wants as many avenues as possible administering the vaccine to reduce the demands at health departments.

All of the stores will eventually will be administering vaccines to anyone one day. When, however, isn't clear.

Clay County gets a share of the \$1.2 million granted from Respond/Adapt/Recover Fund

JACKSONVILLE – Christmas came early to 117 local nonprofit organizations who received a total of nearly \$1.2 million to help offset the costs they incurred trying to reopen and continue serving clients during the COVID-19 pandemic. The grants, which ranged from \$500 to \$50,000, helped cover agencies' purchases of personal protective equipment, Plexiglas and similar materials, COVID-19 training and health testing of staff, and necessary items for social distancing and sanitation. Program transition support costs – such as those necessary to deliver services online – also were eligible for reimbursement.

Ten Clay County organizations – Clay Behavioral Health Center, Clay County Education Foundation, Clay County Habitat for Humanity, Clay County Humane Society, BASCA. (Building Abilities of Special Children and Adults), Girl Scouts of Gateway Council, Orange Park Community Theatre, Quigley House, Shepherd's Center of Orange Park, and The Way Free Medical Clinic – received grant money.

Funding for the grants came from The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida's Respond/Adapt/Recover Fund. This special fund, established this fall, was made possible with a significant gift from the Lucy Gooding Charitable Foundation Trust, additional gifts from individual donors and The Community Foundation's discretionary funds.

"These nonprofit organizations, many with limited budgets before the pandemic, suddenly were faced with overwhelming, unplanned costs that were essential to continuing to serve their clients," said Kathleen Shaw, vice president of programs at The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, who led the vetting of nearly 150 applications. "We saw them make the anguishing decisions to ensure a safe envi-

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
ronment for staff and clients, and we know these grants will help ease some of the financial burden that the pandemic created."

The 117 agencies who received the grants operate across a wide spectrum of focus areas, and throughout The Community Foundation's six county (Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns) service area. Nearly a third of the recipient agencies have annual budgets of less than \$200,000.

For instance, agencies providing mental health services, which became even more crucial to our community during the



pandemic, received grants to reimburse them for costs associated with making in person mental health services possible (Plexiglas, HEPA air filtration, deep cleaning) as well as other costs incurred to deliver some services virtually. Clay Behavioral Health, Epic Community Services, Gateway Community Services and Stronger than Stigma are just a few of the mental health agency recipients.

It also provides health education and opportunities to just make sure that they go through their resources to help patients determine what they have and how to go about using them.

"Different physicians will have educational sessions in the healthy living center. We do a lot of that stuff now, obviously, virtually, but when we get to a point where we can have folks in a room together again, we would love to continue that. Those have been very popular at our other campuses where we offer them."

The services will be offered for free. It will include personalized health coaching. There are classes and programs to help with exercise and fitness goals. A health coach also can help patients learn how to use certain fitness apps.

And, it's open to everyone, including those who aren't Baptist Health patients.

Baptist HealthPlace at Nocatee opened last November. The health hub is designed around the fitness, wellness, medical and therapeutic needs of those living and working in the growing community and surrounding areas.

"Baptist HealthPlace at Nocatee was created with the input of people living in this community, and what services they told us would be of value," Baptist Health President and CEO Brett McClung told our sister newspaper, The Ponte Vedra Recorder. "Our on-site wellness coach in the Baptist Center for healthy living will offer a concierge approach to assisting people with their health-related questions, directing them to the right resources and linking together services to help save time."

Fleming Island's facility is located about 200 yards west from the current construction of a planned six-story hospital being built at the Baptist Health Medical Campus. The two facilities eventually will be joined by jogging paths and a bridge. Baptist Health recently bought the 33-acre plot between the Clay Campus and the old VyStar building, creating a massive complex that will address emergency, children's and preventative healthcare issues.

"Truly, our goal is to help support healthy living. We don't want you to have to come to the hospital, to be honest with you," Roark said. "We want to do everything we can to give you the tools you need to live a healthy lifestyle. That's a big piece of what we do."

HealthPlace at Fleming Island will be operational by the fall, Roark said. The hospital is scheduled to be opened in mid-2022.

"They're moving fast," Roark said. "They're bringing in a lot of fill dirt to finish the building pad where the six-story building will sit. Foundation work is expected to start in the next couple weeks. The fill dirt process is supposed to be completed by Friday [Jan. 15]. We'll have steel by the end of April.

"I can't wait to provide additional healthcare services to the residents of Clay County. At this present time, the other two hospitals in [Jacksonville area] are packed. They're really, really busy. There's an increase need for healthcare across the board in our county, across Northeast Florida. We hope to get things up and running and continue to serve the folks that live here in the best way we know how."

Ronnie's Wings, Oysters and More Longtime eatery still a staple of Green Cove Springs community

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Ronnie's Wings, Oysters and More, just across from Spring Park in Green Cove, is a staple of the city and an example of how a longtime eatery can become a binding agent for communities in small-town America.

"It's [Ronnie's] is very family-oriented," said Amanda Berry, a server and bartender who has worked at Ronnie's for the past eight years. "Very easy-going, big part of the community. It's a majority of regulars here. It was a lot of different restaurants, a lot of different Ronnie's at one point in time, in different areas. So now that this is the only location, they all kind of migrate."

'Ronnie,' is Ronald Munsey, the owner.

"We've been in business for 32 years," said the 79-year-old. "We've been in this location [232 Walnut St.] for 21 years," he said. "I used to be in the trucking business before that. I used to go to a restaurant in Ft. Lauderdale that had the same recipes and everything. I liked the concept, and I asked those folks if they'd be interested in selling me a franchise up in Jacksonville."

Those folks, it turns out, weren't interested in selling him a franchise, but they charged him a one-time fee to get started as a restaurateur.

COVID-19 was a crippling blow financially to Ronnie's, as it did to many restaurants last year.

"It affected us quite severely," he said. "Sales dropped close to 50%. Hey, you know, in this business you got to step up to the plate and do whatever it takes to keep your head above water. And that means, cooking, washing dishes, whatever I had to do."

Munsey couldn't afford to keep the entire staff on payroll with such a depleted revenue stream. Ronnie's, though, unlike many restaurants, survived.

He still believes Ronnie's is a special

place. Munsey says he puts the best product he can buy on the table for the type of food he sells. He specializes in seafood and chicken wings.

Another thing Munsey embraced was the annual Ham Jam.

Ham Jam was one of Florida's popular barbecue cookoffs. The event began in the late 1980s. Munsey eventually purchased and took over the event, and it became huge, hosting some of the biggest names in country music along with the barbecue cookoff. The event started at Spencer Farms in Clay Hill. Some of the artists who have played the Ham Jam include Blake Shelton, Loretta Lynn, Tim McGraw and Toby Keith.

Ham Jam, which moved to the Clay County Fairgrounds, no longer takes place. But it was an incredible event during its heyday.

Munsey doesn't plan on working fulltime for very much longer. sale right now," he said. "I'm getting too old to do this. It's very well established, and certainly, I would be interested in any offer that would come to the table."



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Power of Prayers' puts Kubisiak back on hardwood

Keystone Junior High player survies epidural cyst on his spine

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS - When Bryant Kubisiak (Ka-Bish-Ik) woke up on October 23, he felt a little sore.

"Almost three months of doing nothing, but hospital visits," said Kubisiak, a freshman, 6'-8" (hence nickname Bryant the Giant) freshman center for the Keystone Heights High School junior varsity basketball team. "I remember when I woke that morning, my hip hurt."


Kubisiak noted that the pain started in the back side of his hip.

"It was a tiny bit stiff the day before, nothing more than a sore day and not stretching after practice," said Kubisiak.

From that day, until Tuesday (January 5) return to the hardwood against rival Bradford County High, mom Shannon got worried.

"He was walking around like an old man and he is not a complainer," said Shannon Kubisiak. "He doesn't exaggerate things and doesn't show much. He's very quiet."

For Shannon Kubisiak, the next three months would be a test of her faith in prayer and some luck, according to doctors.

"He woke with a fever and bad back pain and it just got worse that day," said Shannon Kubisiak. "I knew this was serious when he couldn't help around the house and at our Christian camp."

Kubisiak was taken to the emergency room and diagnosed with an epidural cyst pressing on his spine. The had done a bunch of tests but found the cyst with an MRI. Kubisiak first went to St. Vincent's but later was taken by ambulance to Wolfson.

"They asked him every question in the

book about bug bites, ticks, any injuries in school, getting bumped in the hallways, nothing," said Kubisiak. "The intensity of the search was because they had said a sack of bacteria had formed and had we not moved quickly to get him to the doctors within 24 hours, he may have been paralyzed."

Doctors started an aggressive, nonsurgical regimen of attack on Bryant to see if the cyst could be eliminated without the very dangerous surgery on his spine.

"From what they said, the sack was inflamed with bacteria and pressing on is spinal column so the surgery would be very delicate," said Shannon Kubisiak. "It was affecting three of his spinal discs."

Ridgeview and Clay nip rivals in FHSAA Cheer Regional Oakleaf wins Solo Contest

OAKLEAF - Ridgeview, Clay and Oakleaf high school cheerleaders won their divisions at the FHSAA Cheer Regional at Oakleaf High School on January 9, punching tickets to the FHSAA State Cheerleading Championships at the RP Funding Center in Lakeland, Florida on January 22-23. The Panthers, Blue Devils and Knights will be joined by Fleming Island, Middleburg and Bishop Snyder, who earned bids to the state competition with qualifying scores.

Ridgeview won the Small Non-Tumbling Division for the second time in school history with an area-high score of 85.1. The Panthers nailed their difficult routine, which featured flyers that did roundoffs into their stunts, cupies (stunts where the bases executed one-handed lifts of their flyers), and hand-in-hands (stunts where flyers are flipped from handstands in the hands of their bases to upright positions).

"It was amazing," said Ridgeview coach Aimee Stutz, who was a base on the 2012 squad that won the Panthers' first regional championship. "Since we work so hard every day, it just feels great to finally hit it, especially with what [difficulty] we've got in it."

Defending FHSAA State Class 1A champion Bishop Snyder took third place behind Ridgeview and runner-up Trinity Christian with a clean routine that included flyers who were in handstands on the floor when lifted into their stunts and who did full twists on their way up into stunts. Snyder Coach Angi Brannan held some of the most difficult stunts out of Saturday's routine because Cardinals were not executing them in warm-ups.

"They are hungry and they wanted to do it all, but I did what I had to do," said Brannan, who made clear that the main goal was to secure the bid to Lakeland. "The same thing happened last year," a reference to the Cardinals' fourth place finish at the regional in 2020 before winning the state title two weeks later.

Clay bested rival Fleming Island for the second consecutive competition in the Large Co-Ed Division, defeating the Golden Eagles for the title by a 1.55 point margin. Clay's routine included Co-Ed rewinds, stunts where the flyers do back flips as they are lifted on top of the bases. The Blue Devils have only four seniors on their 23-person squad, and all six of their boys are new to cheerleading this season. Coach Lori Davis was pleased with her young charges, who executed the challenging routine with two falls and one early stunt release. "We started out strong and looked really good, but then had a problem with the pyramid at the end," said Davis. Davis hopes to clean up the routine and nail it in Lakeland.

The Golden Eagles are taking a somewhat unorthodox tack this year, packing the cheer portion of their routine with a lot of difficulty and making every stunt a two-

man stunt. Their runners-up performance Saturday was hampered by the absence of a base due to a family emergency, but coach Ryan Andrews was encouraged by the improvement shown by the Green and Gold from their performance at the UCA Regional in Tampa on December 5, 2020.

"We were pretty good, but we left some doors open," said Andrews. "We will be fighting for a clean hit in Lakeland."

Host Oakleaf, competing alone in the Extra Large Varsity Division, qualified for the state semifinals with a score of 62.7. The routine featured two-man hand-in-hands.


"It was pretty clean," said Knights coach Daniel Richardson. "We had a minor mistake on the side of the pyramid."

Middleburg earned its bid to the state semifinals in the Small Varsity Division with a score of 61.1. Eleven different






Broncos executed back flips, while freshman Kyla Sawdo landed a layout with a full twist. Head coach Rhiannon Weiskopf was happy.





Fletcher finished third at 163.0 with Oakleaf battling to a fourth place finish at 129.0. Middleburg was 10th at 69.0.




Clay High, who won their fourth district duals title last week, will host Episcopal also on January 14 with Yulee and Bolles in the opposite semifinal.

The state Duals Championships is scheduled for January 22-23 at Osceola High School.





Kubisiak was at Wolfson with a battery of doctors testing, probing and offering a prognosises.

In a 24 hour period, Kubisiak was given a regimen of four antibiotics and four antiinflammatories to arrest the cyst.

"I posted on my social media about this 24 hours because that would determine the surgery aspect afterward," said Shannon Kubisiak. "I had thousands of prayer wishes. The best case scenario was in the hospital for two weeks then a pick line (intravenous drugs) for six weeks and six months of recovery. I just said,"Okay and prepared myself mentally and emotionally to take care of him."

Kubisiak recovered so fast, according to Shannon Kubisiak, that his initial doctors were sending data to other doctor in consultation as to how fast the treatment was producing a positive result.


"They were calling him a miracle patient," said Shannon Kubisiak. "Instead of two weeks in the hospital, he went home in five days and with just oral antibiotics without the intravenous drugs. He had way more faith than I did and kept saying he knew a lot of people were praying for him."

Kubisiak's next concern was returning to his basketball team.

"I was so out of shape and had to start to get back in playing shape," said Bryant Kubisiak. "They told me to ease back into getting into shape."

Shannon Kubisiak was advised that her quick response to getting him to the hospital was critical, but she firmly believed there was another factor.

"They said the speed of our reaction got him looked at in time to address it, but I also believe that our all powerful God had something to do with it," said Shannon Kubisiak. "They released him early November and said absolutely no physical con-

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
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

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
