RiverFest pays homage to those who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of the country

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - There was purpose in U.S. Congress-

woman Kat Cammack's (R-Fla.) voice when she addressed hundreds of residents, veterans and families of fallen soldiers Monday during opening ceremonies at the annual RiverFest at Spring Park.

There was reverence in her words as she spoke of the sacrifices made by America's finest and their families. This wasn't a time to make political points. At the same time, she refused to let others be so flippant about the solemn importance of the day a country honors the men and women who died in service of the country.

"Thank you to every man and woman who gave their life to our nation in defense of our freedom so that we could have this so-called long weekend," she said, which Army vehicles and the St. Johns River serving as a backdrop. "Long are the fami-

lies who've been at the dinner table without their loved ones. Long is the memory that friends, neighbors, co-workers, fellow servicemen and women have in remembering those we have lost. I want to say thank you to the families who hugged their loved ones goodbye, knowing they may never make it home."

Cammack didn't mention names, but everyone at the park knew exactly who she was talking about. And to the person, they agreed

The Long Walk Home

Zaleski brings his message of hope, self-direction to troubled veterans

ORANGE PARK – Ron Zaleski was angry when he returned from Vietnam. Many looked at him with disdain. A country that asked him to carry a gun, fight the enemy and die if necessary, suddenly "didn't even trust me with a spatula on a job."

So Zaleski took off his shoes in defiance to memorialize the friends he lost in the Vietnam War.

It took 33 years for the former U.S. Marine to redirect his anger into action. He charted a course across the United States with stops at


every significant battlefield. It was his way to finally find peace.

More than 3,400 miles later, Zaleski now wants others to find an outlet to resolve their pent-up frustration and fears.

"The problem is, when I took my shoes off, I didn't tell anybody why I was doing it," he said. "I realized I wasn't solving anything."

Green Cove approves lowering metering rates for solar power users

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The city council approved an ordinance Tuesday night that could lead to a major impact on the future of clean energy in Florida.

Currently, homeowners who use solar power get a high net metering rate. Net metering is how much utility companies pay solar companies for excess energy cost generated. This excess energy typically goes back to the city to be used in other homes.

The change to the ordinance would lower the current net metering rate of eight cents per kWh to four cents per kWh. Since this rate is being lowered, advocates for clean energy are concerned the smaller net metering rate won't be as big of an incentive for more people to buy solar panels.

Grayson Jones, a homeowner who ad-

vocates for solar panels, is concerned about how the change will impact the future of clean energy.

"Solar is incentivized at the federal level, the state level, the state requires public utilities to net meter at that rate but the local level and municipalities like this; they have the power just to take it away," Jones said.

Bob Page, the spokesperson for FMPA, Florida Municipal Power Agency, disagreed with Jones' stance and believes solar incentives should be removed altogether. FMPA is responsible for providing electricity to roughly 2.6 million Floridians.

In a separate question, Page said the potentially damaging effects of solar power and renewable energy in general that people could often overlook.

"Solar and wind are not dense energy sources. They take up a lot of land to make that happen. People don't want to talk about the environmental impacts of all the mining that goes on for raw materials such as lithium and the fossil fuels that have to be used to produce those [renewable] products," Page said. "And no one is talking about what happens to those solar panels in 20 to 30 years of how those get recycled and how they're going to harm the environment. We choose to turn a blind eye to some of those things."

While the ordinance only affects Green Cove Springs, residents for clean energy are concerned it could have a domino effect across the state regarding whether residents choose to get solar panels. Although Green Cove Springs has simply lowered its net meter, other towns could start taking away incentives for purchasing renewable energy.

Meanwhile, the debate for fossil fuels

vs. renewable energy continues.

In other business, the city council reached an agreement to lease classroom buildings from the August Savage Arts and Community Center to AMIkids Clay County, Inc.

A bid for \$460,030 was approved to renovate ASACC classroom buildings 1, 2, 3, 4,11 and restrooms. AMIkids would pay back this amount over 10 years.

Council Member Connie Butler and the rest of the city council members are excited to see the renovation of the classrooms.

"This is going to make a big impact and the building is not just going to be sitting there, it's going to be utilized and occupied," Butler says.

Participants of AMIkids attended the meeting as well and were excited to get the city council on board with their plans for these classrooms.

Council search for solutions to enforce current ordinances

Orange Park wants to keep yard debris out of waterways, streets, gutters

ORANGE PARK – The Town wants to stop residents from placing and blowing yard waste into streets, sidewalks and waterways, but it's struggling to come up with a way to enforce it.

There's a good chance motorists will find a pile of leaves and branches sitting in a yard waiting to be picked up by a garbage truck, or on the side of the road, somewhat encroaching on the roadway. Orange Park is no different and the town council is looking for a way to stop that.

An ordinance amending the town code in relation to yard waste is attempting to stop this yard waste phenomenon, but the town council was not happy with its umbrella-like nature.

"We're telling people that yard waste does not need to be bagged, but we're also telling them they'll be penalized if they blow yard waste into a street or something," town manager Sarah Campbell said. "Perhaps we can change it for waterways...not roadways and sidewalks."

Campbell's point got to the heart of the issue: the town especially doesn't want yard waste ending up in waterways because the town is already busy cleaning up decades of built-up waste in its ditches. It also doesn't want piles of leaves and branches in its roads, but the culprit behind these piles is often contractors hired by homeowners. The town council doesn't want to punish homeowners for work done by others.

"It can be difficult to send a notice of violation to a company and it's difficult to lien a property if there is no property connected to what they're [company] doing," Campbell said. "Maybe...we do a simple citation. Our police can hand them a citation on the spot as opposed to going through the magistrate process."

Council member Alan Watt questioned how it would be enforceable. He said the town would have to hire a second police department just to keep up with everyone doing yard work and watching what they're doing. It's not enforceable as written, he said.

"Maybe it's an idea we want to put on paper and not put any teeth on it," Campbell said.

Campbell said the problem with that is that if someone calls in to complain about someone putting yard debris in the street, or blowing it into the gutter, the town would essentially have to say, "Sorry about that, but there's nothing we can do even though we have this ordinance."

"It's an admirable goal, but I think it's part of a bigger discussion," Campbell said. "It should be planned in advance and aligned with our Solid Waste contract." The town council voted 5-0 to table the

discussion.

sidewalks.

In other business, Campbell said all Environmental Level 1 and 2 reviews have occurred for the 14 homes that are a part of the town's ongoing voluntary buyout grant effort. She said the town has received authorization to release funds related to this so now it's time for home appraisals, which will take place during the next 45 days. Once those are in, the town will have a bet-

ter understanding of how many of those 14 homeowners will want to continue in this process.

The town's legal team also held its mediation with its Fire Chief Alvin Barker and his legal team over an ongoing dispute related to his release as an employee. Town attorney Sam Garrison said it was a productive mediation and that there are still "I's to dot and T's to cross," but that he believes they'll "have a mediated settlement at the next public meeting that's mutually satisfactory."

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The Orange Park Town Council is wrestling with how to enforce an ordinance that would

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'Free money' comes with an unhealthy emotional, mental price

merica is hiring, but it isn't back to work. There are 8.12 million open jobs nationwide, more than half a million more than before the pandemic started. The job openings rate—the number of open jobs as a centage of total jobs in the U.S.—increased to 5.3% in March, the highest on record.

Yet, workers are nowhere to be found. Jobs that used to get 100 applications are now getting only two or three. Interviews are plagued with no-shows, and hiring fairs are reporting zero attendees. A Tampa Mc-Donald's is offering people \$50 to show up for an interview.

My own nonprofit, Better Together, organizes hiring events that have helped more than 8,000 Floridians find local job openings. We've hosted job fairs in rural and urban areas, at public housing projects, and had people lined up down entire blocks waiting for opportunities. We typically expect an average of 400 job seekers to show up at each event. But this year, we only had 87 people show up across three different job fairs in Bonita Springs, St. Petersburg and Lehigh Acres.

Employers are begging us to help them find workers. Normally it's the other way around. We have spent months trying to help them recruit employees, but we can't compete with the unemployment bonus. In Florida, the average son can now collect up to \$3,652 a month in enhanced benefits, tax credits and food stamps. That amounts to more than \$20 an hour. But this "free money" comes at a price.

Getting paid to stay home is destroying mental health and families. Work gives people structure, dignity, confidence and a sense of purpose and pride. When parents get up in the morning, get dressed, and go to work, they are setting an example for their children to follow. According to Pew Research, 70% of unemployed adults feel more stressed than usual, and more than half have experienced emotional or mental health issues such as anxiety or depression. More than 40% have had more arguments than usual with family and friends.


The longer people are out of work, the more damage it can do to mental health. "Many people do go into depression, they have feelings of worthlessness," Dr. Alise Bartley of the Community Counseling Center at Florida Gulf Coast University stated recently in an interview "And if you're not in a good place it's really hard to put your best foot forward to be able to interview for a job."

After more than a million Floridians

I'm not in the market to panic and overpay for a house in Clay

hen I drove over the Shands Bridge last Tuesday, I thought it was for the final time. I was wrong.

After selling my condominium a couple of months ago and renting while I looked for a house here in Clay County, I decide to make the move, even if it meant renting for a few more months until people come to their senses with this current real

estate market.

My movers showed up late and left early because they had another job to complete. They promised to come back the next day to finish. That meant I also had to reschedule my final cleaning.

It was frustrating because I'm getting too old to turn moving day into moving week. The guys came back the next day, loaded my boxes and furniture into a container and left. I came home to find enough items not moved to fill a 10-foot by 5-foot storage unit. I know because I had to load it on Thursday morning.

When I asked why they didn't pack everything, they said they weren't sure what needed to go, which prompted my response: "What part about the word 'moving' do you not understand?"

It gets worse.

The family that bought my condo was scheduled to move in on May 27. They were driving from Georgia and were scheduled to arrive mid-afternoon. I was frantically trying to complete the move myself and do some last-minute cleaning. The family didn't get here on time because of the broken suspension part on the Buckman Bridge. It's the only time I didn't mind crumbling infrastructure since the three-hour delay gave me the cushion I needed to get everything moved. The three-day ordeal also forced me

to get a hotel room for three days.

What's worse, there's no real solution on this side of the Shands Bridge. Houses are being sold well above their market values because people are panic buying. These probably are the same people who still have 3,000 rolls of toilet paper from a year ago. Maybe they were sitting in a gas line for hours when the Colonial Pipeline shut down for a few days. Some panic-driven motorists even tried to store gas in zip-lock bags! Heck, I'm old enough to remember filling the backseat of my Ford Pinto with 12 packs of the original Coke when New Coke was introduced.

There certainly is a shortage, real and imagined, of available houses in our area. Many are holding onto their homes because if they sell them now, they may not have a place to go. But it's so tempting to cash in now because there are plenty of people who are willing to recklessly outbid your best offer. More frightening is there are plenty of buyers who are willing to skip inspections, appraisals and pay the closing costs. That's insane.

A big reason why there aren't a lot of reasonably priced houses is there aren't enough houses. Construction slowed dramatically after the last housing bubble burst in 2007-08. Now there isn't enough inventory, and new construction now is racing to keep up with demands. That's why there are plans to build thousands of

lost their jobs during the pandemic, crisis hotlines began ringing off the hook and increasing numbers of children were placed outside their homes. It's not a coincidence—these two events, unemployment and family breakdown, are directly related.

We have witnessed this firsthand in our Better Families program, which offers parents a dignified way to overcome hardship without losing children to foster care. We've served more than 3,100 children with a 98% success rate, meaning families no longer required further interaction with the Department of Children and Families up to two years after reunification.

When families fall into crisis – often due to homelessness, addiction, mental illness, jail, etc. – our host families care for children while their parents work toward a better life with our volunteer coaches and mentors. job.

Work was the critical piece that kept those parents strong, and families together. Not money – work.

Florida is finally separating itself from federal financial dependency. The state now requires unemployed workers to show proof they're looking for jobs. And on June 26, the state will refuse to accept – and pay – \$300 a week offered by the Federal Unemployment Insurance Programs.

Now I'm watching people we served who struggled with alcohol and depression, slowing starting to drink away their days and slide back into addiction. I'm seeing parents that have fought so hard to survive, only to unravel and fall apart on their couches.

One of these struggling parents is Sarah, a mother of three children. When we met Sarah, she was out of work and collecting government aid. She was struggling with alcohol and depression, and about to lose her children to foster care.

While her children were safely living with one of our host families, Sarah attended one of our job fairs and secured a job on the spot. It changed her life. A job gave her freedom, dignity, and a work community. She felt pride in her ability to provide for her children, and it showed.

When the pandemic hit and the daycares closed, she had nobody to watch her children. She got laid off, started collecting enhanced unemployment checks, and now makes more money staying at home. Her mental health has declined, and once again she is struggling with alcohol. Sarah moved mountains to save her family, but now she is about to lose her children.

Sarah represents thousands of Americans who are making more money than ever while at home – but they are deteriorating. This is the real unemployment crisis. If we don't help get people back to work, we will have a pandemic aftershock of mental health, child neglect and broken families. of new homes south of Fleming Island and along the First Coast Expressway.

In the meantime, there's still no reason to fall into this trap, MIT housing economist Bill Wheaton told National Public Radio.

"Don't buy into a frenzy," Wheaton said. If you factor out inflation, the past oneyear gain in home prices is about 10%, he said.

"It's never been that high – ever in the last 50 years, so there's really something going on," he said.

At some point, supply will kick in and prices will drop. Like a rock.

I know the real value of a house is what somebody's willing to pay, but there's no logical reason for a house that's listed at \$220,000 to go for \$260,000 or more. If houses on a street are generally valued at \$225,000 each, once a person cashes in on the frenzied atmosphere, the values of the houses on that street still are \$225,000 – including the house that sold.

What the seller will learn quickly is once they sell, they likely will realize how difficult it is to find a new place. Turnabout really is fair play. Russell met with members of the local N.A.A.C.P. at Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church to discuss a plan for a local curfew.

On top of that, everything associated with the housing and moving industries are raising prices to ridiculous levels. Why? Because they can.

For now.

That 10-by-5 storage unit I needed because my movers didn't understand they needed to take everything now costs me more than \$200 a month. Four months ago, it was less than \$100.

Short-term rentals until the market levels off – and it will level off – isn't a solution. I was offered a single bed and I would have had to share a bathroom with the homeowner for, get this, \$468 a week on airbnb. And while it was advertised as "Beautiful," I had to walk through piles of clothes and shoes that were stacked up in the living room.

All of this has made me even more determined not to be lured into this sucker market. I'm perfectly willing to pay fair market value – or even a little above. But I'm not going to be stupid. Frenzies come and go. Beanie Babies did. So did Pet Rocks.

Until then, however, I plan to impatiently wait for things to level off – even if it means driving over the Shands Bridge a few more times.



County working on putting more bite into ordinances for aggressive animals

CLAY COUNTY – Officials want to remove the legal muzzles which prohibit them from issuing penalties following animal attacks.

The county's animal control office has started working with Clay County Commissioners to expand a state policy that expands the definition of dog attacks to protect families, pets and livestock from vicious attacks.

Currently, Florida's Chapter 767 defines attacking dogs as dangerous that as aggressively bitten, attacked or endangered or has inflicted severe injury to a person on private property, or one that has severely injured or killed a domestic animal on private property or has, when unprovoked, chased or approached a person on a street, sidewalk or public ground menacingly ahead of an apparent attack.

To be considered a "dangerous" dog, the state said there must be evidence the dog was involved in at least two separate attacks of another animal or one severe attack against a human.

For a dog owner like Frank Byman, that did make sense after his 13-week-old beagle puppy was viciously attacked by a Dogo Argentine while he was walking his leashed dogs on Fleming Island.

His dog, Arlo, sustained \$15,000 worth of veterinary bills and went through five emergency life-saving procedures and sur-

OPMC to expand again with bigger ICU, 48 new beds

ORANGE PARK – Long before the \$126 million expansion at Orange Park Medical Center opened nearly three months ago, plans already were in place for a \$34 million expansion that will add 48 private patient rooms and a state of the art, 20-bed intensive care unit.

The expansion will make the facility on Kingsley Avenue the fifth largest hospital in the Jacksonville area.

As Clay County continues to grow, especially with the addition of the First Coast Expressway, CEO Lisa Valentine said it's important for health providers to work ahead of growth, not to respond to it.

"We're working really hard to keep up. You can tell, one of the things that's really important to us as a leading provider of health care in Clay County, is we want to make sure residents and families can stay close to home when they need care," she said. "This new \$34 million project was in the planning stages before the last project ended, because we saw the demand; we saw the county population growth. We're trying to stay ahead. We're doing a good job staying ahead of that growing demand."

OPMC opened a 101,435-square-foot, five-story tower that included 48 new beds that brought the hospital's bed count to 365. The lower floor featured a new registration area. The second and third floors will be home to additional beds in the future.

Construction on the new addition is expected to start no later than February 2022, Valentine said, and the project is expected to be completed by the fall of 2023. One opened, the number of total beds in ICU will be increased to 68.

"To do that, we doing three things: No. 1, we're creating high-qualified sub-specialty positions to add to the wonderful group of physicians who already serve Orange Park Medical Center and the community; secondly, we're expanding critical programs to make sure we're offering the services that our residents need; and third, of course we're growing our campus," Valentine said.



"All of those things are really intended to ensure that we can keep up with growth and we can take care of families and patients when they need us.

"We're looking out five, 10, 15 years from now on what we think the county will need, what we think our patients will need and how we continue to do drive this facility that helps meet those future demands. If you're not looking that far out, you're already behind."

The medical center reported it treated more than 1,700 patients last year.

"As we continue to care for an even greater complexity of patient needs here at Orange Park Medical Center, our ICU capacities and capabilities must adapt in parallel," says Dr. Justin Gisel, Board Certified Critical Care and Pulmonary Disease Physician at Orange Park Medical Center. "We look to continue providing the highest levels of care in our expanding Medical, Surgical, Trauma, Cardiothoracic, and Neurological ICUs and look forward to this new expansion."

The new project will bring the latest in advanced patient room design and clinical technology to enhance clinical communication, collaboration and patient outcomes, OPMC said. For example, each new inpatient room will feature an advanced integrated system connecting the patient's bed and the nurse call system. Rooms will feature a 50-inch TV allowing patients the ability to watch their choice of entertainment on an Apple TV and display their medical information and care updates simultaneously. The rooms will also include Centrak technology, displaying a pop-up on the TV announcing their care team member's names upon entering the space, and will have high-speed internet available for patients and visitors. The expansion also will include a 300-space parking lot.



centers not only around grief but also the complexities of it and how grief can affect people differently.


Seaton hopes the stories depicted in "Some Perfect Tomorrow" will help people to understand they are not alone in their grief.

Take Stock in Children pays benefits toward students' futures

CLAY COUNTY - Take Stock in Children is a nonprofit changing the lives of children - literally.

It's doing that by setting aside college scholarship money for students who complete the program. It's one part the carrot at the end of the stick for students who keep good grades with good behavior, and another part the work of local fundraising that sends students to college each year.

"People who want a better future, there's a place out there for you," Take Stock in Children senior graduate Jayla Fisher said. "Do your research and find what that something is for you. For me, it was Take Stock. I wouldn't be going to college if it wasn't for Take Stock.'

Fisher joined the program in seventh grade, which is the first year that a student can join, although a student can join the program any year beyond seventh as well. She had just transferred from the Duval school district to Orange Park Junior High and things weren't easy.

Her homelife was chaotic, she said, but despite that, she always knew she was great in school. She said she was always confident in her academic abilities. It was the stuff going on around her that acted as a barrier – never her intellect. She was on her way to the principal's office one day, set to be expelled, when she was told about the program.

"They told me I have an opportunity to write an essay and I knew I'd get it," Fisher said. "I always knew I'd be going to college. I just had to figure out how I'd get there."

The essay and the subsequent entrance into Take Stock was that "how." Fisher graduated last Friday, May 28, and she'll be going to Daytona State College later this year. She's going for architectural technology and next month, she'll take her electrician apprenticeship test. She said she'll be going to school and working her way through an electrician apprenticeship at the same time if everything goes according to plan. Take Stock is why all of this is a possibility, she said.

A student enrolled in Take Stock has to meet with a mentor on a monthly basis, maintain a 2.5 GPA, stay out of trouble and crime, and have good attendance, Take Stock senior program director and student service coordinator Leslie Cook said.

"Like I said, we make that investment in them once we accept them into the program...and we do everything as a team to give them all the tools necessary to be successful." Cook said.

Cook said they get hundreds of applications each year and she have to narrow it down to 30 to 50 applications. Those 30 to 50 people are interviewed and then Cook must narrow that group down to about 12 to 15 students who will be accepted into the program. Acceptance means they're

guaranteed a \$5,000 scholarship purchased by Take Stock that can be used to pay for tuition directly. The scholarships are funded by local fundraising efforts, Cook said.

From there, the Take Stock program routine takes life and a mentor meets with their student each week to ensure school, homelife and everything else is going well. Cook says the mentors are the lifeline of Take Stock, which has been in Clay County for more than a decade.

"I had been teaching high school and retired after 30 years," mentor Marie Galin said. "I felt like I needed to do some kind of volunteer work with students and Take Stock was the first thing that came to mind.'

Galin was the mentor of a senior student shortly after that and she said it was great working with a senior for her first year as a mentor because it gave her the chance to see what it looked like for someone at the end of the program. She began with a freshman the following year and she mentored that student up to the end of their senior year.

"It's very rewarding to see them through their challenging years in high school," Galin said. "To watch them grow from where they begin this program to the end, it's very special. You're building this relationship with them and you of course want the best for them, and you see that

somber holiday telling everyone to "enjoy the long weekend." There was no mention of Memorial Day. No mention of the millions who've fought and died in defense of the country. There didn't appear to be a sense of gratitude.

RiverFest has blossomed into one of the county's biggest events. A year removed from the pandemic, thousands descended onto the picturesque park to enjoy a day of sun, fun, food, games, music and, most important, a reflection of the sacrifices by so many to make such an event possible.

Cammack was one of many dignitaries who opened the day-long festival. Others included members of the Green Cove Springs City Council, members of the Clay County Board of Commissioners and administration and soldiers.

But the guest of honor were veterans from the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, Coast Guard, Space Force and Merchant Marines who were invited to tell the crowd about their service.

One man told a story of his father being gassed to death in World War I. He went on to fight in the Korean and Vietnam wars. Others tearfully talked of watching their buddies die in combat in the Middle East, while others implored the nation to be resolute in finding all those still listed as missing in action. One Army man simply yelled: "Go Army! Beat Navy!"



geries to survive.

Owners of the Dogo Argentine, which are outlawed in eight countries and the United Kingdom, weren't cited because the animal is only responsible for one attack.

Clay County Commissioners Wayne Bolla and Mike Cella want to change all that.

The BCC held a workshop a month ago to discuss animal control. They heard from residents, including Byman, about vicious attacks that go unpunished. The board agreed to review its policies and asked staff and the legal department to "tighten" up its current ordinances, BCC Chairman Mike Cella said.

"We thought by adapting state statute we'd be in pretty good shape," he said. "We essentially mirrored that statute. After hearing testimony and hearing recommendations from the staff, we made a determination we need to tighten those up. We asked the staff to come back with an ordinance, which instead of giving a dog owner two opportunities to attack another dog or a person, we trimmed that down to one. So after the first incident, it will be followed by things they will have to abide by. We're not quite there yet, but we're working on it." According to county records, there were 1,865 reported animal bites in Clay County in the first four months of this year. Of those, 1,535 were by dogs. The county doesn't track the number of dogs who were put down following multiple attacks."

The county is considering adding a new category following an attack that defines an animal as "aggressive" after one attack. Currently, animals are deemed to be "dangerous" after two attacks.

"A dog can attack somebody pretty viciously one time and nothing happens," Bolla said. "After that, we know the dog should be watched. The second time is what it takes to be called a dangerous animal. I don't know what the answer is, but I think we need to do something about it. There needs to be some liability in there, somehow."

Both commissioners said the legal department is working on plans to make dog owners more responsible for their animals.

"We already have ordinances you're not supposed to let your animal run loose," Cella said. "Legal has to make a determination what we can do, what we can't do based under statutes. We hope to have that in the next month or so. I think the board, unanimously, was interested in tightening those things up, especially as we grow bigger, we're going to have more animals in the county."

happen in real-time each week."

The mentors meet regularly and while Galin was previously a teacher, it's not a requirement at all to have an academic or educational background. That's because mentoring is not tutoring. It's more of a holistic approach to keeping tabs on a student to help them with anything they need. If they need to talk about what they want to do in college, that can be a topic for one week's roughly 45-minute meeting.

They might discuss homelife during the next meeting. It's all about being there for the student, Galin said.

"I would encourage anyone who is even thinking about it to at least look into it," Galin said. "It's very rewarding and I think I get as much or more out of it as the student. You're a part of their journey and it's nice to know you're helping guide someone down a path of success."

Cook says the program's success lies in every piece of the puzzle.

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Tax appraiser: Property values increase in Clay County

CLAY COUNTY –The 2021 taxable value of all properties in the county is estimated at approximately \$12.926 billion – an annual increase of more than \$731 million, Tracy S. Drake, CFA, CAE, ASA, RES, CCF, Clay County Property Appraiser, told the Clay County taxing authorities on Friday, May 28.

The statutory assessment date for the 2021 assessment roll is Jan. 1, 2021. Therefore, the overall increase in value reflects the upward direction the real estate market has taken during 2020.

Although market values have increased,

the assessed values of properties with a homestead exemption will be limited or 'capped' at a 1.40% increase (excluding any additions or improvements) and nonhomestead residential and commercial properties will be limited or 'capped' at a 10% increase due to constitutional amendments passed by voters in 1992 and 2008, respectively. Taxable value is based on the market value minus differentials and exemptions.

A certification of taxable value will be submitted to the Florida Department of Revenue and local taxing authorities on July 1.

St. Johns River Water Management: Year-round resiliency necessary to minimize storm damage

CLAY COUNTY – Now that hurricane season is officially here, the St. Johns River Water Management District works yearround to address resiliency through its core missions – water supply, water quality, flood protection and enhancement of natural systems – and through cost-share project funding with local partners.

"The District has been focused on flood protection and adaptive water management for decades – we just recently started using the term resiliency to describe those functions within our mission," said St. Johns River Water Management District Executive Director Dr. Ann Shortelle. "Resiliency efforts for our communities, our state and our nation are becoming ever more visible. Florida's residents and economy must have resilient communities, which is why it is a part of our day-to-day District work."

Resilience is the ability to recover quickly from disasters and to adapt to future conditions such as sea-level rise. Resilience relies on planning for future scenarios, analyzing data and risks, and then

adapting accordingly. While hurricane season officially begins June 1, water is a year-round focus for the District, so the agency's flood protection mission is a natural fit. With resilience in mind, the District partners on shovel-ready stormwater/flood protection projects designed to reduce flooding risks and improve water quality through its cost-share programs with local governments. The District's Real Estate and Land Management programs protect and strengthen natural infrastructure to help mitigate events such as wildfire, flooding and sea-level rise. This work includes restoration of historic wetlands for floodwater storage in the Upper St. Johns River, wetlands and floodplains restoration in Nassau County, and aiding local governments working to convert septic systems to central sewer systems.

District permitting staff also play an important part in flood protection through their work to ensure storm water is managed on developed sites and that new drainage ditches or significant changes to existing ditches are coordinated regionally. The District and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection issue permits to install stormwater systems, which typically then become the legal responsibility of a homeowners' association or property management company.

Property owners also have a vital role in preparing for hurricane season, which officially runs through Nov. 30. You can protect yourself and your property by:

 \bullet Keeping debris out of storm drains and ditches

• Reporting clogged ditches and culverts to local governments

• Retrofitting buildings to make them watertight

• Cleaning out gutters and extending downspouts at least four feet from structures

• Determining who has responsibility for stormwater pond maintenance in your neighborhood – it may be the homeowners' association

To assist homeowners, the District's web pages (www.sjrwmd.com/storm) include links to flood statements and warnings, river stage and flooding data, and local government emergency contacts. Links to the National Weather Service, Florida Division of Emergency Management and the U.S. Geological Survey's interactive map of current conditions in the state are also available via the website at www.sjrwmd.com/data.

Bee careful! Swarm season is here!

CLAY COUNTY – The warm Florida spring is well upon us and honey bee colonies have certainly taken notice. The UF/IFAS Clay County Extension Office has received numerous calls concerning honey bees forming dense masses of bees, a very intimidating sight, especially when spotted on the wall of your house or even your windshield!

Why do honey bees swarm?

Honey bees live in large colonies, which can contain anywhere from 10,000 to 150,000 bees. When flowers are blooming in spring, honey bee colonies are full of resources including pollen, nectar and honey. The bees have plenty of supplies to support a growing colony, but there is only so much space in the hive, which can become crowded with bees. When the colony gets too big, the queen will take 50 to 60% of the worker bees in the hive with her to start another colony in a new hive, leaving the remaining workers plenty of space to grow and develop the original colony. The bees and their queen set off in a swarm, usually landing together on a branch, fence, wall, or other surfaces in a large mass of bees. The new colony waits here while "scout" bees search the area for a suitable new home. Once they find the perfect spot, they'll return to the swarm and lead them to their new home to start hive construction.

Are honey bee swarms dangerous? It's no secret that bees can sting, and it is always wise to use caution around them and leave them alone when possible. However, it is unfortunate that the fact that bees sting has made many fearful of this very interesting insect. When swarming, honey bees are relatively docile. A swarm of bees does not have a hive, resources or brood (honey bee eggs and larvae) to protect, and therefore is not very aggressive. Always respect the colony's space to avoid stings and take bee allergies very seriously, but there's no rush to call pest control when you see a swarm of honey bees.

What should I do when I find a swarm?

Luckily, a honey bee swarm is a shortterm incident. The swarm of honey bees will move into their new hive within 24 hours, so leaving the swarm alone and waiting for them to move on is an option. However, a honey bee swarm also has the opportunity to be a valuable addition to a beekeeper's apiary. If possible, contact a local beekeeper or beekeeper's association to see if they may be able to come to collect the swarm, especially if it rests in a very inconvenient place. A simple online search will bring you right to local beekeeper's associations who can get in touch with nearby beekeepers. It's even possible that the swarm in your yard came from a neighbor beekeeper who might want to get his bees back! The local UF/IFAS Extension office is also available to assist.

UF/IFAS Extension Clay County is available to help and work with residents, farmers, and any other interested parties with agriculture and natural resources topics, including beekeeping and small farm management.





So he started walking. Barefoot. Across the country

"What I discovered when I walked across the country is we haven't healed from any of our wars," he said. "When I stopped at Civil War sites, it's clear some people from the South are still mad at some people from the North, and some people from the North are mad at some people from the South. I was offended to see this still going on today when I'm standing next to a cemetery with thousands of dead soldiers."

Zaleski wants others to know his story – and learn from it. He will be a guest of the Rotary Club of Northeast Florida Thursday night at 6, June 3, at the Orange Park Presbyterian Church, 1905 Park Ave., where he will tell the story of his nonprofit organization, The Long Walk Home.

vides mentoring to soldiers with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and other negative emotions.

"My message is simple: do something," he said. "This is my call to arms. We all have a gift. I'm not special, but I found walking made me feel happy. When you share your time and your joy with another person, you're going to help heal that person."

Zaleski completed his walk in 2010, four years after he started his organization.

"I blamed everybody else for 33 years before I finally took responsibility for myself," he said. "When I did that, my life changed. I took the power of myself. I realized it's up to me, but it took a long time to figure out."

Doctors told him earlier this year he must start wearing shoes. His feet often were cramped and writhed in pain.

"They said it was from years of walking on unnatural surfaces," Zaleski said. "After all this time, it's something I have to slowly work on. Right now, it's just flip-flops and sandals. I don't know when I will be able to wear a pair of shoes."

Zaleski said his appearances aren't about money. It's about finding peace and happiness.

"It's about helping people," he said.



County Jailer Moses Jones faced an angry crowd

MIDDLEBURG – Moses Jones was worried. It was a hot June night in 1871. He was the county jailer working in the wooden jailhouse at Middleburg – also known then as Webster, the county seat at that time. The jail was in poor shape. It was old and rickety, the site of several escapes usually done successfully by inmates digging a tunnel in the earthen floor under and out of the cells.

As he sat there that night, jingling the jail keys in his hand, escapees were not Moses Jones' worry that night. He was worried about who would break into the jail and take his prisoner, Frank Perry.

Perry stood accused of the sexual battery of a young pregnant woman named Caroline Green McLelland. According to her, she had been home alone at her house near Doctors Inlet, while her husband, Hiram McLelland, was voting at Webster. Perry snuck up and ambushed her, she said. He and his dog tore at her clothes. Once it was over, Perry allegedly took off and left her to walk in a "terrible state" the two miles to her mother's home.

Upon learning of the alleged crime, Sheriff Henry Bradford and a posse of

men – JQ Adams, Doyle, Jamison, John Green, McLelland (the husband) and Joe Jenkins – began the search for Perry. He was found holed up at his own house – not the smartest move to avoid capture. Perry was promptly arrested and taken to the county jail, where Jones, the first Black jailer in Clay County, had the dangerous duty of keeping Perry, a young Black man, safe and in jail.

Jones was originally from Virginia. He and his wife Caroline moved to Clay County around 1870. At the time of the Perry incident, Moses was 39 years old and the proud father of five children. He and Caroline would go on to have three more. Moses made a living cutting wood. The jailer job was just another way to put food on the table. From the start of Moses' life in Clay County he was active in his community. The records at the Clay County Archives show he voted in each election, paid taxes and owned land. He was sued once over a business contract, a suit he lost. In 1884 he and dozens of other citizens signed a petition to allow T.T. Edgerton a liquor license. This was way before Clay County voted to be "dry" county in 1904. Jones was a respected and trusted member of the community, hence his job as a jailer. He owned a homestead out near Peter's Creek Road.

It was long after dark when Moses' ears tuned in on the sound of dogs baying and the murmur of men's voices approaching in the distance. As the ruckus got closer, he could see lit torches. What looked like little fireflies in the distance soon turned into a large crowd of angry men. They were armed to the teeth, too. They had come for Frank Perry. The smell of vigilante justice filled Jones' nostrils. As the ruckus got closer, he could see lit torches. The leader of the mob confronted Jones and said, "Give me the keys or it's your life!"

Moses, thinking of his wife, his children, and his own neck, dropped the keys into the outstretched hand of the mob leader. Shortly thereafter, shots rang out. Morning came and revealed that alleged rapist had been shot dead. No one complained and some were even grateful that Perry had been shot "relieving the already bankrupt state of the burden of prosecution."

It is unknown whether Moses Jones kept his job after that fateful night. One may even speculate that he was deliberately left to guard Perry. Jones kept on cutting wood though. His first wife died and then he married Nancy Hogans in 1908. He had no more children. By 1920, he was 88 vears old, but it is unknown when he died. There is no tombstone for him, but one can surmise that he is surely buried in the Moses Jones Family Cemetery located near his former homestead on Peter's Creek. The exact spot where crime suspect Perry was laid to rest also is anyone's guess, and we'll never know if he was guilty of the crime for which the mob abruptly killed him.

Enraged man burns down his house in dispute with wife

MIDDLEBURG – A man who suspected his wife of cheating on him was arrested on May 30 for setting his Mallard Road house on fire.

Joseph DeWayne Parker, 54, of Middleburg, was charged with second-degree arson after Clay County Sheriff's Office and Fire and Rescue responded to a house fire at 6:30 p.m. When they arrived, they found the home "fully engulfed in flames." Firefighters soon found a second burning structure at the back of the property.

A detective with the Department of Financial Service's Division of Investigative and Forensic Services determined the fires were "incendiary."

According to the arrest report, the wife left the home to buy groceries. When she returned, her house was on fire. Deputies conducted a search of the surrounding area and found her husband, Joseph Parker, laving in the back of a pickup truck near the second burning structure. After he was detained, he told deputies "I burnt it all down" to make sure his wife didn't get anything, CCSO said.

CCSO K-9 Shay-ley sniffed Parker and alerted deputies to the likely presence of an accelerant.

Parker was released from the Clay County Jail after posting a \$35,003 bond. He also was ordered to not have any contact with his wife or to be within 2,500 feet of her residence.

Man headed to prison for stealing identities, ripping off Navy Federal Credit Union

JACKSONVILLE - U.S. District Judge Brian J. Davis has sentenced Charles Cornelius Smith, 35, of Jacksonville, to five years in federal prison for aggravated identity theft and conspiracy to commit bank fraud. The court also ordered Smith to pay restitution to the victims he had defrauded.

Smith had pleaded guilty on Feb. 2.

According to court documents, Smith obtained the personal identification information, including the name, date of birth, and Social Security number of a victim. Using this information, Smith provided his co-defendant, Zipporan Carmel Peters, with a counterfeit South Carolina driver license using the name and identity of the victim, but with Peters' photo on it. Smith then drove Peters to different branches of the Navy Federal Credit Union in Clay and Duval Counties. Using the victim's identity. Peters made various fraudulent transactions involving the withdrawal of large amounts of cash and the purchase of multiple \$500 gift cards, utilizing the victim's account. Smith and Peters also visited multiple cellphone stores in Clay and Duval counties and used the victim's identity to obtain several thousand dollars' worth of cellphones and accompanying merchandise

Zipporan Carmel Peters is scheduled for trial on July 6.

This case should serve as a strong deterrent to those considering exploiting the identities of others to enrich themselves through fraud," said Special Agent in Charge, Glen M. Kessler of the U.S. Secret Service - Jacksonville Field Office.

The case was investigated by U.S. Secret Service's Jacksonville Field Office, the Clay County Sheriff's Office and the Orange Park Police Department. It was prosecuted by Asst. U.S. Attorney Kevin C. Frein.

ORANGE PARK - Two stories that are slowly emerging from the U.S. Olympic Swim Trials upcoming events in Omaha (June 13-20) are one coach and one swimmer from Clay County making a first trip and another guy who could win just about all the gold medals he wants at the Tokyo Olympics.

"I've just been kind of lucky," said Fleming Island High graduate and third in state butterfly specialist Kyle Casias, who now coaches up for Planet Swim Aquatics out of the Argyle Pool, and is readying Clay High graduate state champion Sara Stotler for her first U.S. Olympic Swim Trials in a week. "I have a great support team and owe a lot to Shawn Delifus and the Stroke Doctor program from a few years ago and then the coaches and athletes that have believed in me since then. I'm always doing research to be smarter and use the latest ideas to make my

swimmers excel."

Ironically, Casias and Fleming Island High baseball coach Grant Bigilin, who recently guided the Golden Eagles to a Class 6A runnerup finish, were classmates.

"I think we both reach out to other coaches for advice," said Casias. "He has

a great assistant coach group as I do and we make it work."

The obvious second swim story is another Clay High graduate and state swim champion, multiple world champion and world record holder, Olympic gold medalist and a host of other accolades, Caeleb Dressel, who goes in as clear favorite in a handful of events. But, Dressel is another story to be continued. He is in.

Casias' top swimmer, Stotler, will have the opportunity to compete at the Trials with Olympic Trials cuts in the 100 butterfly (59.58), the 200 Individual Medley (2:15.68), the 200 butterfly and the 200 free (2:01.60). Stotler dropped nearly two seconds off her 2001M best time to get under the 2:17.39 Olympic qualifying time.

Stotler, twice a butterfly state champion and multiple medalist for the Blue Devils, who has slowly crept up on the U.S. Olympic Trials swim cuts (qualify-

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Dad and son tandem climb 46 of 50 mountains

FLEMING ISLAND - When he gets some free time from his multitude of school and home activities, 12 year old Mills "The Kid" Weinstein is tying knot with gloves and stuffing a sleeping bag into a tiny carrying sack because the next few months will see, hopefully, the completion of a daunting mountain climbing challenge.

"I get my school work done pretty fast and I daydream a little like, this is the summit of the mountain and I have to get there and I structure my workout or practice stuff thinking about how it helps on the mountain." said Weinstein as he trained on endurance at the Barco Newton YMCA; cycling and treadmill work. "I have to be able to climb uphill with a 40 pound pack on for hours at a time. The only thing we can't replicate in training is 11 degrees below zeroes.

For Weinstein, the ultimate goal with his dad, Scott, is to complete a mission started five years ago of ascending the 50 United States' highest peaks.

"Only one other 12 year has accomplished the challenge," said Scott Weinstein, 41, Mills' dad and climbing partner. "We had to stop last year for the COVID stuff because everything was closed all over the country."

On Thurs, June 3, the Weinstein duo, plus a third climber, Andrew Bunn, of Jacksonville, will head to Alaska to attempt Mt. McKinley (Denali) which at 20,000 plus feet above sea level is the highest point in North America as well as the United State as the first of the final four ascents for the project. From there, the summer will bring attempts in Montana (Granite Peak 12,779 ft), Wyoming (Gannett Peak 13,804 ft) and the final ascent in West Virginia (Spruce Knob 4.863 ft).

"West Virginia is the last one because my family can drive to the top and meet us there when we finish," said Mills. "My mom, Megan, has been our support leader throughout and it will be special."

With the impressiveness of some of the altitudes the pair has reached. Scott Weinstein jokingly recalled that one of the

lowest: Black Mesa (4.973 ft) in Oklahoma. was one of the shortest yet toughest ascents mainly because of oppressive heat and humidity.

"Each peak has its own unique challenges when it comes to the peak, the terrain, the animal interaction possibilities and the ease to travel to the site, find a jeep, get maps an such, but the weather is the biggest variable," said Scott Weinstein. "Oklahoma was a like five mile hike, but it took us six hours. It was super hot. Mount Hood (Oregon 11,239 ft) was very technical with glaciers and crevasses and Driskill Mountain (Louisiana 535 ft) was in the middle of nowhere, a nothing climb, but was mosquito infested to the max. That was a terrible day."

Scott Weinstein, an area rescue trainer for law enforcement and first responders, has been on the journey since the first day with Mills and sees Mills as his official climbing partner. "I have the unique relationship of father/son and climbing partner and I know that I have to train him down here to absolutely listen and do what I need him to do for us to be successful," said Scott Weinstein, who was a state level high school wrestler for Bolles. "If we are clamped on to the side of a glacier and tell

him to not move. I have to know that he will absolutely freeze until I am able to move to a position of safety. We are equals up there; proud father and son down here."

The assimilation of preparing for an ascent and completing normal 12 year old tasks of school and home chores has come smoothly for Mills because both. in his opinion, benefit from each other.

To be able to train and prepare then go on these trips comes from being focused and disciplined at doing the normal stuff; classes, tests, home stuff, because being responsible in all life challenges comes to a real fruition up on a mountain at 30 below," said Mills. "There is a lot of focused problem solving in terrible conditions to survive. It's all amplified by the extreme weather and cold."

Mills Weinstein detailed some of the nutrition requirements for a successful ascent in relation to the fast-food thoughts of most teenagers.

"It's a balance of eating as many calories a I can to, first stay warm, and, second, have the strength to keep moving," said Mills. "Potato chips with salt is good and caffeine. Remember, we have to carry everything we might need for a day's worth of climbing."



"Doing what we do; me and Mills, is a 50/50 success ratio," said Scott Weinstein. "The bad 50 can be very bad and that is where preparation comes in. Fear is the great motivator."

JACKSONVILLE - The Professional Bull Riders came back to Jacksonville for the 2021 series, Unleash the Beast and the name was perfect for this sport. Before tonight's event, the best I saw for Bull Riding was the High School Rodeo at the Clay County Fairgrounds in the Cattleman's Arena. Comparing the two is, well, like comparing a high school football game to the Jaguars. They are the same sport, but on two completely different levels. So yes, this, as the phrase goes, was indeed my first rodeo.

The first 10 minutes of the event were eye-popping if not daunting as my media location, thanks to Clay Today Sports Editor Randy Lefko, who was two seats away, was a mere 10-15 feet away from one of the six gates that opened to release the high-velocity animals.

The opening ceremony started with a firework blast not 20 feet from us so shock-wave one occurred.

The first bull that competed; from the aforementioned first gate, whirled around after disposing of his ride and hind-foot kicked the "protective" fence in front of me that was maybe an inch in diameter with a foot between each rung of the fence. Six inches up or down from the bull kick and my face would be concave. Shock two over. Let's rodeo. Rodeo, in America, is simple. Amp up a 1500 pound, strap on a guy or gal with one hand only on the saddle, lock in spurs as tight as the thighs can go and let 'er rip. The animals are just as much the athletes on the dirt. Last eight seconds, you win.

Much like being on the sideline of an NFL game; Lefko has bestowed that honor on me as well, you never appreciated the intensity, the physical skill and the tenacity of professional athletes until it is in your face. The first time the Jaguars ran past me during introductions at the game

that I got to stand at the 30 on the field and photograph Mercedes Lewis go by me have I ever been that close to massive athleticism. The bulls were massive, but the riders were equally athletic to their task.

The riders were not these muscle bound, huge athletes. Most were 5-6" or so, 150-160 pounds, and must be made out of rubber, chock full of "cowboy" muscle. The way the bulls could jump, shake, buck, and spin, with these men trying to stay on, was amazing. On Sunday, only nine out of 30 made a full ride, with the top 10 in points moving them on to the ride off for their share of \$93,000. It is a two day show that used points from both days to get the riders into the ride-off event where they had the chance to win more purse money, but more important, get an automatic entry to the season finale in Las Vegas.

Cooper Davis, a 27 year old from Jasper, Texas, ranked number three in the world, walked away with championship buckle for the Jacksonville event, earning \$26,009.34. Not bad for a weekend's work,






"When I was asked to coach the team, I had to wrap my mind around that," said Cline, a 2017 graduate and a athlete for volleyball, softball and basketball for the


Siebert best beats Bobcats





Wolfe Bronco debut gets goose egg on Indians

MIDDLEBURG - Touchdowns from three different runners and a hard-hitting defense made Rvan Wolfe's head coaching debut a smashing success as Middleburg High shut out visiting Keystone Heights 21-0 in their 2021 spring game.

"It is very special," said Wolfe, who had been an assistant coach at Orange Park and Nease and an offensive coordinator at Clay, Creekside and Fleming Island. "I have put in a lot of time and effort to get where I am today."

Never has a spring game victory been so celebrated. After a string of losing seasons reached its low point with an 0-10 record in 2020, Middleburg and its players were looking for someone to lead the program back to respectability. The red-clad home crowd roared in approval as the final seconds wound down. After the postgame handshakes, the Broncos swarmed each other in jubilation and then ran to the end of the field to take pictures under the scoreboard that still showed the score. And for Wolfe, who toiled as an assistant coach for 19 years before getting an opportunity to be the man in charge, it was a milestone.

The Broncos' offense was not dynamic, but moved the ball and mounted scoring drives in each of the first three quarters. They took the lead on their second offensive possession. New quarterback Luke Padgett gained 30 yards on a keeper, making a first down at the Keystone Heights 15 yard line. On fourth and three from the 8 yard line, backup quarterback Aiden Postemski entered the game, took a direct snap, ran wide left, broke the tackle of Indians safety Dalton Hollingsworth at the four yard line and ploughed into the end zone. Kaleb Robison's point after gave Middleburg a 7-0 lead with 5:10 remaining in the first quarter.

That score was all that the Broncos would need, thanks to a suffocating defensive effort led by defensive tackles Donovan Wimberly and Gage Humphrey and linebackers Austin Curce and Jayden Levy. Wolfe thought all four played well, and emphasized the importance of Wimberly.

"Keystone runs a lot of traps, a lot of inside runs," he explained. "Donovan was there all night, blowing it up."

Middleburg held the Indians to 19 yards of offense in the first half when both teams played their starters, and ended the game with a 206-74 edge in total offense. Humphrev had two of the Broncos' six tackles for loss and added a sack.

"For us to be successful we have to control the lines of scrimmage," said Keystone Heights head coach Chuck Dickinson, who operates a run-heavy scheme featuring single wing and wishbone formations. "We did not do that tonight."

first possession of the second quarter. Padgett found freshman Jacob Lohse for a 27 yard catch-and-run to convert a second and 23, bringing the ball to the Keystone 26. The junior then converted two consecutive third downs with his feet, setting up a first and goal at the five yard line. Two plays later, Padgett handed the ball to his twin, Logan Padgett, who carried the Indians' Logan Williams across the goal line. The Broncos carried a 14-0 lead into halftime. Each Padgett had 27 yards rushing.

Middleburg's Caleb Freytag provided the excitement in the second half. On the Broncos' first offensive play of the third quarter, the junior wideout took a jet sweep around right end, cut inside Keystone cornerback Brvar Schenck, stiff-armed safety Logan Williams' and outran the rest of the Indians to the pylon for a 69 yard score.

'Caleb can fly," said Wolfe. "He is going to be a deep threat and also a horizontal guy on bubble screens and sweeps."

Both teams were breaking in new quarterbacks. Middleburg's Padgett finished with three completions in five attempts for 52 yards, with no touchdowns and no interceptions. Wolfe is excited about him.

"Luke can run, he can throw, and he can throw on the run," said Wolfe. "Our offense [at other schools] has been good

when we have had a mobile guy."

Junior Tyler Jenkins is the new signal caller at Keystone Heights. He finished with six rushing yards on nine carries and threw two incomplete passes, all in the first half.

"I thought that what [plays] we put in, he did well," said Livingston. "He is a tough, downhill runner."

Sophomore Landon Hovsepien led the Indians with 26 rushing yards.

Despite the lack of production against a Class 6A school, Livingston was not discouraged. He estimated that in fifteen years at Class 3A Keystone Heights, the Indians had only won one spring game.

'We have to get better on both sides of the line, but we will be okay," he said. "For us, the spring game is just a chance to get some things on film and see what we need to get better at."

The game meant much more than that for Middleburg.

"It's everything," Wolfe said of the win. "Now, what we are preaching has some substance to it. It is like we proved ourselves to the team."

Riding a wave of momentum into the offseason, Wolfe and his staff have given a football-crazy community something it has not had in some time.

ing times) will be competing in Omaha amongst the world's best swimmers trying to make the U.S. Olympic team.

Her first dip under the Olympic standards was in February with her 100 butterfly split at the Southern Sectional Championships in Sarasota just a day before winning her 100 fly high school state title.

In Sarasota, Stotler split at 1:00.63 to get under the Wave I cut, then improved to her 59.58 in May in Orlando to get the Wave II cut.

"She has taken little pieces off as we go," said Casias. "If we hit it right in Omaha; she swims strong, someone else has a bad day, we get lucky and maybe get close."

For Casias, Stotler's ascension into the top 40 ranks of national swimming with her recent 59.58 100 butterfly split that is an Olympic Trials Wave II cut, the upcoming Trials is a chance to see the big lights, see the big names and maybe get her own shot at a team spot. Stotler also has a Wave I cut in the 200 butterfly. "She's in the top 40 and that's an accomplishment," said Casias. "The Wave I cut are simply qualifiers (top 600 swimmers after top 40) to become Wave II qualifiers. They will have their own Trials a week prior with an opportunity to improve enough to get a bid into the Wave II meet which follows."

Stotler, with her Wave II cut, will not have to swim in the Wave I meet, but advances into the Wave II meet in three events; 100, 200 butterfly and 200 free, because of having at least one Wave II cut.


Stotler has a Wave I cut in the 200 free with her 2:01.60 at the 2020 U.S. Open (cut is 2:01.69) and also the 200 butterfly. Wave I swimmers will compete June 4-7 with Wave II scheduled for June 13-20 with the eventual top 60 swimmers per event. There will be two groups swimming this final weekend chasing cuts: those without cuts seeking just to swim at Olympic Trials and those with fast Wave I times who want a Wave II cut to bypass the Wave I meet. Wave I swimmers must finish in the top two to get invited to Wave II.

"The final qualifying times must be in by May 30," said Casias. "We will be doing double workouts the next week or so to ready for the tournament schedule."

his column today is about one of the greatest hymns ever written. The song, "There is a Fountain," speaks of the power of the Cross of Calvary. The first verse says:

"There is a fountain filled with blood drawn from Immanuel's veins

And sinners plunged beneath that flood lose all their guilty stains."

The hymn was written by William Cowper and first published in 1772. It has been sung by millions in these ensuing years. After 250 years, Its message is still fresh today.

Many things about Cowper's life were sad. His mother died in childbirth when William was five years old. Always sickly, his frailties became even more evident as the years passed.

He was emotionally tormented and was committed to mental institutions twice in his life. He made several suicide attempts. But through all these trials he continued to write the blessed poetry of his Savior.

The wonderful thing is that his poems and hymns still live today to bless multitudes of people. He was a friend and colleague of John Newton, the former slave ship captain, who wrote the beautiful hymn "Amazing Grace." Newton and Cowper collaborated on many hymns and jointly published them. Even so, Cowper's emotional struggles and fears continued to plague him. No matter how strong the emotional, spiritual, mental attacks against him were, He continued to contribute great poetry to the annals of faith by his talented – even inspired – writing.

God used the life of this man, in spite of his mental depression and spiritual doubts, to pen words that have been an inspiration to the church for two hundred years. The Holy Spirit has used these words to encourage many saints and to call sinners to find their peace with God. This is peace that can only be found in that "fountain filled with blood, drawn from Immanuel's veins" flowing from the Cross. Dear dying Lamb, Thy precious blood Shall never lose its pow'r, Till all the ransomed church of God Are safe, to sin no more.

The Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District ("District") intends to levy special assessments (i) to secure repayment of bonds issued by the District to refinance its \$19,410,000 Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District Special Assessment Refunding Bonds, Series 2017 ("Existing Bonds") and (ii) to fund certain infrastructure improvements, including but not limited to, additional recreation improvements.

The District will hold a public hearing and regular board meeting on Tuesday, June 22, 2021, at 6:00 p.m., at 1510 Calming Water Drive, Fleming Island, Florida 32003, to consider the adoption of an assessment roll, the imposition of non-ad valorem special assessments on benefited lands within the District, a depiction which is shown below, and to provide for the levy, collection and enforcement of the assessments. The public hearing is being conducted pursuant to Chapters 170, 190, and 197, Florida Statutes. The purpose of the public hearing is to receive opinions from the general public and answer questions on the proposed special assessments at the public hearing. At the conclusion of the public hearing, the Board will, by resolution, levy assessments as finally approved by the Board. The Board will also hold a public meeting to consider any other business that may lawfully be considered by the District.

A description of the property to be assessed and the amount to be assessed to each piece or parcel of property may be obtained at the District Manager's Office c/o Inframark, 12574 Flagler Center Boulevard, Suite 101, Jacksonville, Florida 32258, Ph: (904) 436-4102 ("District Manager's Office"), during normal business hours.

By way of background, the District previously issued the Existing Bonds to fund a portion of the infrastructure improvements ("Improvements") identified in the District's *Improvement Plan*, dated March 6, 2000, as amended June 22, 2000 ("Improvement Plans"). The streets and areas that are subject to the Improvements are depicted below and in the Improvement plan. The Existing Bonds are secured by non-ad valorem assessments levied on certain property within the District ("Existing Assessments").

In general, the District intends to refinance the outstanding Existing Bonds to take advantage of interest rate savings and to raise additional proceeds through the issuance of new bonds, in one or more series ("Refinanced Bonds"). The proceeds of the Refinanced Bonds will fund certain infrastructure improvements as described more fully in the preliminary *First Addendum to the Improvement Plan – Series 2021 Project*, dated May 12, 2021. The District reserves the right to modify improvements described therein at the hearing.

As part of the refinancing, the District plans to levy special assessments to secure the Refinanced Bonds ("Refinanced Assessments"). Annual assessment payments will not increase and the term of the bonds will not be extended. However, the Refinanced Assessments will be made up of a higher principal amount and a lower interest amount. The assessments may be prepaid in whole at any time, or in some instances in part. The proposed schedule of assessments includes no more than thirty annual installments from the initial collection date of the respective Existing Assessments which the Refinanced Assessments are replacing.

The manner in which the District proposes to consider the levy of the Refinanced Assessments is more fully described in the District's preliminary *Special Assessment Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2021 Supplemental Assessment Allocation Report*, dated May 12, 2021 ("Series 2021 Assessment Report"), a copy of which is on file in the District Manager's Office. The total assessment amount to be levied against each parcel and the unit of measurement to be applied against each parcel to determine the assessment is set forth in the Series 2021 Assessment Report.

All assessments described herein may be collected directly by the District in accordance with Florida law, or may be collected by the Clay County Tax Collector, as applicable, on the property tax notice. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method – e.g., by direct bill or on the tax roll – does not mean that such a method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

WHEREAS, the Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District ("District") is a local unit of special-purpose government duly organized and existing pursuant to the Uniform Community Development District Act of 1980, Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*, as amended ("Act") and was established by Rule 42BB-1 of the Florida Land and Water Adjudicatory Commission, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the District previously issued its \$19,410,000 Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District Special Assessment Refunding Bonds, Series 2017 ("Series 2017 Bonds") for the purpose of financing certain of the improvements described in the *Improvement Plan*, dated March 6, 2000, as amended June 22, 2000 ("Original Improvement Plan"); and

WHEREAS, due to current interest rate market conditions, the District has determined it is in the best interest of the District, its residents, and landowners, to refinance the outstanding Series 2017 Bonds ("Prior Bonds") to achieve debt service savings and raise additional proceeds through the issuance of the "Series 2021 Refunding Bonds" in an amount not to exceed \$15,600,000 to finance a portion of the Improvements, as defined below; and

WHEREAS, the District has adopted its preliminary *First Addendum to the Improvement Plan – Series 2021 Project dated May 12, 2021*, attached hereto as **Exhibit A** ("Series 2021 Improvement Plan"), which further amends the District's capital improvement plan and identifies certain improvements, including additional recreation improvements ("Improvements"), a portion of which are to be provided by the District; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the District to pay the cost of the Improvements through the levy of special assessments pursuant to Chapters 170 and 190, Florida Statutes ("Series 2021 Assessments"); and

WHEREAS, the District hereby determines that the benefits have accrued and will continue to accrue to the property improved, the amount of those benefits, and that the special assessments will be made in proportion to the benefits received as set forth in the prior methodologies and in accordance with the preliminary Special Assessment Revenue and *Refunding Bonds, Series* 2021 Supplemental Assessment Allocation Report dated May 12, 2021 ("Series 2021 Methodology"), which is attached hereto as Exhibit B incorporated herein by reference and on file at c/o Inframark, 12574 Flagler Center Boulevard, Suite 101, Jacksonville, Florida 32258 ("District Records Office"); WHEREAS, the District hereby determines that the Series 2021 Assessnents to be levied will not exceed the benefits to the property improved; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the District's adoption of this resolution to begin the process of levying the Series 2021 Assessments, all prior assessments related to the Prior Bonds, shall remain valid and binding until such time as the District levies the Series 2021 Assessments and issues its Series 2021 Refunding Bonds, which may be issued in multiple series, to be secured by the Series 2021 Assessments; and

WHEREAS, this Resolution shall serve as the "resolution required to declare special assessments" contemplated by Section 170.03, Florida Statutes, for the assessment lien(s) levied against certain property as described in **Exhibit B** that comprise the Series 2021 Assessments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE FLEMING ISLAND PLANTATION COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

SECTION 1. The Series 2021 Assessments shall be levied to defray the cost of the Improvements described the Original Improvement Plan and the Series 2021 Improvement Plan.

SECTION 2. The nature and general location of, and plans and specifications for, the Improvements are described in **Exhibit A**, and are on file at the District Records Office and available for inspection.

SECTION 3. The total amount of refunding the Series 2017 Bonds will be \$13,600,000, and the Improvements as described in the Series 2021 Improvement Plan are estimated to cost \$3,275,250 ("Estimated Cost").

SECTION 4. The Series 2021 Assessments will collectively defray approximately \$15,600,000 which includes a portion of the Estimated Cost plus financing related costs, as applicable.

SECTION 5. The manner in which the Series 2021 Assessments shall be apportioned and paid is set forth in **Exhibit B.** The Series 2021 Assessments shall be levied, within the District, on certain lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvements or specially benefitted thereby and further designated by the assessment plat hereinafter provided for; provided, however, that the lots for which debt assessments securing the Prior Bonds have been prepaid in full shall not be subject to the Series 2021 Assessments.

SECTION 6. There is on file, at the Districts Record Office, an assessment plat showing the areas to be assessed, with certain plans and specification describing the Improvements and the Estimated Cost of the Improvements, all of which shall be open to inspection by the public.

SECTION 7. Commencing with the year in which the Series 2021 Assessments are certified for collection, the Series 2021 Assessments shall be paid in not more than the maximum period of time permitted by law then in effect. The Series 2021 Assessments may be payable at the same time and in the same manner as are ad valorem taxes and collected pursuant to Chapter 197, *Florida Statutes* ("Uniform Method"); provided, however, that in the event the Uniform Method is not available to the District in any year, or if determined by the District to be in its best interest, the Series 2021 Assessments, or any portion thereof, may be collected as is otherwise permitted by law. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method – e.g., by direct bill or on the tax roll – does not mean that such a method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

SECTION 8. The District Manager has caused to be made a preliminary assessment roll, in accordance with the Series 2021 Methodology, attached as **Exhibit B** hereto, which shows the lands assessed, the amount of benefit to and the assessment against each parcel of land and the number of annual installments into which the assessment may be divided, which is hereby adopted and approved as the District's preliminary assessment roll.

SECTION 9. The Board shall adopt a subsequent resolution to fix a time and place at which the owners of property to be assessed or any other persons interested therein may appear before the Board and be heard as to the propriety and advisability of the assessments or the making of the Improvements, the cost thereof, the manner of payment therefor, or the amount thereof to be assessed against each property as improved.

SECTION 10. The District Manager is hereby directed to cause this Resolution to be published twice (once a week for two (2) weeks) in a newspaper of general circulation within Clay County and to provide such other notice as may be required by law or desired in the best interests of the District.

SECTION 11. This Resolution is intended to amend and supplement the District's prior resolutions relating to the debt service assessments on lands securing the Prior Bonds ("Prior Assessment Resolutions"). As such, all Prior Assessment Resolutions remain in full force and effect, except to the extent provided for herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall reallocate or otherwise modify the existing assessments and related assessment lien except as described herein. As such, the previously-adopted assessment methodologies, assessments and assessment liens remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 12. The invalidity or unenforceability of any one or more provisions of this Resolution shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Resolution, or any part thereof.

SECTION 13. This Resolution shall become effective upon its passage.




