'Business as usual'

Orange Park Mall shoppers won't notice any differences caused by bankruptcy

ORANGE PARK — The parent company that owns the Orange Park Mall filed for bankruptcy protection last weekend, but mall officials said it won't have any effect on business at the county's biggest shopping center.

"You won't feel a thing," said mall general manager Randy Bowman. "We are still focusing on doing cool things here in Clay County. We'll let corporate deal with their part. But for us, it will be business as usual."

Washington Prime Group Inc., which owns 102 shopping malls and plazas around the country, filed for Chapter 11 protection after it reported losses of \$55.4 million in the first quarter. Chapter 11 allows companies to reorganize their debts while it keeps its business operating while seeking relief.


Washington Prime released the following statement: "The COVID-19 pandemic has created significant challenges for many companies, including Washington Prime Group, making a Chapter 11 filing necessary to reduce the Company's outstanding indebtedness. Throughout

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School board given 2 options to ease overcrowding at Keystone Heights Elementary

FLEMING ISLAND – The school board is looking into ways to fix the population overload at Keystone Heights Elementary.

The board held its monthly workshop on June 15 and the Kasper Architect company presented a feasibility study of two different options to possibly fix the school's overcrowding problem. The school is old, and its age certainly shows. The overloaded capacity doesn't help either and Kasper's two possible options look to tackle the problem head on in different ways.

Evaluation A calls for the district build a new elementary school on a nine-acre site near the school district. Evaluation B calls for the district to refurbish the existing elementary school into something more accommodating. The board also said those aren't the only possible options.

Eric Kasper said the feasibility study is to act as a third-party evaluation to determine if the project is practical or even reasonable. It's not meant to give the school board a recommendation of what to do, nor is it a complete financial analysis or master plan on what should happen. It's simply the presentation of two options the school board could contemplate.

"There are some things to consider... with both options," Kasper said. "Storm-

water. We don't want the facilities to flood. Building code wants it to drain positively off the site and not over public walkways. For stormwater, we're looking at the first inch of water and where it goes. For the big 25-year flood with 24 hours of rain... that rain has to be kept on site."

The water requirements are non-starters since both evaluations must come into water code compliance. In Evaluation A, the estimated population is 862 kindergarten through sixth grade students. The parking code requires a minimum of 69 spaces and there would be a play area of 50,946 square feet. Kasper said the play area size is small compared to other new schools and he believes a sizeable play area space, or in other words a recess space, is important for children at this age.

A retention pond would be required as well because the parcel does not currently have one. If the school district goes with Evaluation A, the current junior high students would be relocated to the current existing elementary school, which would be vacated as those elementary students would go to the new elementary school.

Evaluation A carries an estimated price tag of \$23 million. Kasper said its pros are it would be less disruptive to students in school, it would have instant results and it would bring students and faculty new

facilities. The cons, however, are that it's significantly more expensive to build a new school than to retrofit an existing building. A pedestrian bridge would need to be built between the new elementary school and the junior high as well so that students can access the shared athletic field and other facilities.

Evaluation B would call for the district to rebuild an existing campus on the current property. It would come with three new buildings and additional green space, Kasper said. It would feature the same drop-off capacity, the same school population and the same parking spaces.

The main problem Kasper said comes with Evaluation B is that it would be very distracting to students and parents. It would be years of work on buildings on

campus and that could be disruptive to teaching and learning, he said. He believes the benefits outweigh the problems, though – especially the larger play space and the \$15 million price tag, which is \$7.7 million cheaper than Evaluation A.

"I think the feasibility study did a great job of narrowing things down," Superintendent David Broskie said.

The school board is anxious to get the ball rolling for Keystone Heights. Broskie pointed out that it all comes down to finances. Because the meeting was just a workshop, no official decision or vote was made in regard to the evaluation.

The school board's next meeting will be a regular school board meeting on June 24 at $6\ p.m.$ at the Teacher Inservice Center on the campus of Fleming Island High.



USA Cycling Amateur Road Nationals rolling into Clay on June 24-27

CLAY COUNTY — Local roadways will be filled next weekend for the USA Cycling Amateur Road National Championships.

The four-day event will start on Thursday, June 24, at Camp Blanding for individual time trials. Town Center Boulevard and Plantation Center Drive also will be

used on Sunday, June 27, for the criterium competition. The national championship originally was schedule for last year, but it was cancelled by the COVID-19 pandemic. This year's competition is expected to bring about \$2.3 million to local businesses.

"We're going to fill every hotel room; we're going to fill every restaurant," said Joel Lamp, Chief Revenue Officer for Airstream Ventures. "You don't get to host a national championship every day. It's going to take a lot of community support."

A field of 800 cyclists are expected, with 30 championships being awarded in a variety of age categories. All 30 will travel to Europe for the World Championships.

"USA Cycling is excited to bring the Amateur National Road Championships to Clay County," said Chuck Hodge, Chief of Racing and Events for USA Cycling. "This event is a showcase for our young and aspiring athletes as they seek out future success both in the US and abroad."

Thursday's portion will be held on Treat Road and State Road 21 around Camp Blanding. The two-day road race will be at Camp Blanding and Sunday's finale will be on Fleming Island. Course maps are posted at https://usacycling.org/events/national-championships/2021-amateur-road.

Economic success relies on workforce being prepared for jobs of tomorrow

t was true before the pandemic, and it's true today.

Florida's economy could become the 10th largest in the world over the next decade, but only if its workforce is prepared for the jobs of tomorrow.

"Everything in Florida depends on talent," Florida Chamber of Commerce president Mark Wilson said Tuesday.

He and Kyle Baltuch, the Florida Chamber Foundation's senior vice president, stressed the importance of workforce development during their opening remarks at the Learners to Earners Workforce Solution Summit in Orlando.

Building a workforce with the skills businesses are looking for requires more than college or trade school. Those are important, but many future workers may not reach that step if they aren't hitting important checkpoints early on in their school careers.

"If we want a talented workforce in 10 years 20 years. There's no more important investment than early learning, and every college and university president would agree with me on that comment," Wilson said

One of the most telling benchmarks for future success is third grade reading scores. Currently, about 58% of Florida third graders are reading at grade level. The Florida Chamber Foundation wants to raise it to 100% over the next decade.

Baltuch is leading the effort as the head of the Florida Chamber Foundation's Equality of Opportunity Initiative. Launched in April, the initiative is focused on ending generational poverty, boosting diversity and inclusion at the workplace, and boosting third grade reading scores.

Baltuch said he ran into skepticism about whether the initiative could hit 100% in third grade reading scores or slash childhood poverty by half. One reporter asked him what the "real number" was that he thought the foundation could reach.

"It hit me at that moment that as a society, we become conditioned and numb to numbers that should terrify us. Numbers like 829,342 children in poverty just roll off our back at times. Numbers like 58% of children are reading at a third grade level in third grade don't terrify us sometimes. The reality I understood at that moment was we've been conditioned to believe that not everybody will have success. The Florida Chamber Foundation is drawing a line in the sand, and we believe that no child

The non-emergency number isn't just about reporting a cat stuck in the tree or a noisy neighbor playing the trombone in the middle of the

night. It's a chance for ordinary people to do extraordinary things by helping law enforcement stop crimes before they happen.

If you see something, you can say something by calling (904) 264-6512.

"It's very discouraging because I've seen so many people say they didn't want to bother us with something," said Sheriff Michelle Cook. "That's what we're here for. Call us. We're here to serve, and we can't do that after the fact."

Florida has been rocked by two senseless crimes in the past month that may have been thwarted before they happened. All somebody had to do was make a call to their county's non-emergency number.

For Tristyn Bailey, a 69-year-old woman and her 1-year-old grandson, it's already too late. There were signs of their imminent demise and nobody did anything about it. We should be better than this.

Bailey was a 13-year-old girl who was

stabbed 114 times in the middle of the night on May 9 by a 14-year-old classmate, Aiden Fucci. Her body was found near a St. Johns County retention pond.

Other classmates said Fucci talked of taking someone into the woods and stabbing them to death. They didn't report it. Now a 13-year-old girl is dead.

In West Palm Beach, 55-year-old Timothy J. Wall, bragged on social media he wanted to "kill people and children." He followed through by stalking the grandmother and boy in the produce section of a Publix Supermarket. He killed the boy with a single shot. The grandmother tried to wrestle with the assailant, but she eventually was shot to death. Wall then turned the gun on himself.

Palm Beach Sheriff Ric Bradshaw was outraged by the complacency of Wall's friends. Somebody had to see the posts, he said. Now a woman and a child are dead because nobody acted on them.

"The real sad part of this, other than the fact that two people are dead, is that there was a chance that this could be stopped," Bradshaw angrily said.

If someone had called authorities may have been able to take Wall's firearms

away, citing Florida's red flag law.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office has a new project called "Do you have the number." Cook hopes every resident puts the non-emergency number in their cellphone so they can report something suspicious.

'Sometimes you may have to call a couple of times," she said. "That's all right. It doesn't do anybody any good when you get a call after the fact."

Alerting authorities works. Although many calls turn out to be false alarms, a few have led to solid police work that likely saved lives.

Last year, a student at Lake Asbury Junior High saw a post on the social media app Houseparty that a classmate said he was going to "shoot people" at the school. The girl reported it to a teacher, who told the Clay County School District Police Department. The school then notified the sheriff's office. Together they deemed the threat to be credible.

The boy was caught with a Colt rifle and ammunition he took from a locked cabinet at his grandparents' house, CCSO said.

"This is a good went right with the cooperative atmosphere between Clay County Sheriff's Office and all of our local agencies and our own police department," Superintendent David Broskie said.

"Here's where when things went right. One, a student came forward bravely to announce to an adult what had happened. The teacher then did the right thing to report it to the deputy on campus, and then contacted the Clay County Sheriff's Office."

Thankfully, nobody wound up dead or injured at Lake Asbury Junior High - all because one girl did the right thing.

We should take her lead and do the same. Remember, it's (904) 264-6512.

Write it down. Store it in your cellphone. And don't be afraid to use it when something seems out of order.

should ever be denied the opportunity to earn their success," he said.

"Now I understand that that's a bold statement, and it takes a lot of work to live by that statement. But fortunately, we didn't roll out of bed this morning and think, 'hey, cutting childhood poverty in half and 100% third graders reading at grade level would be pretty cool.' We've had a lot of work to ensure that we can implement a program across the state of Florida and work with partners to collectively and holistically address these challenges.'

Future "earners" need the education to set themselves up for success but so do the current earners. Especially as the state recovers from the COVID-19 pandemic,

"There are 512,900 jobs in Florida right now looking for people to fill them, but there's 487,000 people looking for work in Florida right now. That is not a misprint.

We have more open jobs than people looking for work at the moment. Now this will change. It has happened in the past, but it underscores the point that we can't have economic development: we can't have diversity if we don't have a talented workforce," he said.

"If you only hear me say one thing, it would be ... we don't have an unemployment problem; we have a skills gap problem.'

That was true before COVID-19, and the pandemic only "amplified" it.

"It's not only the No. 1 issue; it's the issue that I hear about when my phone rings."

OPMC breaks ground on new medical office building

ORANGE PARK — The Orange Park Medical Center broke ground on a new 60,000-square-foot facility set to open next year that continues the hospital's commitment to providing better healthcare to the surrounding community.

OPMC has been a part of continuous growth in its 47 years in Clay County. What began as a community hospital has grown into a megacomplex that can handle virtually anything and everything when it comes to medical procedure and care. The hospital is set to grow with a new medical office building.

"We're here today because [HCA Health-care] and Orange Park Medical Center are

once again investing in our community," CEO Lisa Valentine said. "It's about providing more resources to our community healthcare providers here in Clay County and our surrounding areas. We're proud to expand our facilities, but we've also been expanding our clinical services. This is another step in that."

The new building will feature physician offices for general surgery, women's care, imaging services, neurology care, ear and nose and throat care and primary care. OPMC's anesthesiology medical director and Board of Trustees Director Deevid Miller said the new building will make providing the care even easier.

Miller has been with OPMC for more 30 years and he said the growth he's seen

it incur over the years is astounding. He remembers when it was just a small community hospital when if someone needed a complex medical procedure such as openheart surgery, they would be transferred to a different hospital.

That's not the case anymore as the hospital can handle all kinds of complex medical procedures like open heart surgery, brain surgery and much more. He said the hospital is once again a stroke center, "which means if someone has a stroke, this is the place to be."

"Not only will this new option keep patients close to home but it will keep them close to any other care they need, such as MRIs or X-rays or a trip to the emergency room," OPMC general surgeon Scott Lind said. Miller spoke of parent company HCA's commitment to OPMC's growth. He said it's never been a better time to work for the medical center or be a patient there. When discussing how important this new building which is set to open in early 2022 will be, Valentine mentioned how critical it was to have the support of business leaders and government leaders. She said without them, the building and the celebratory groundbreaking ceremony wouldn't have been possible. Nearly three dozen from the county's business and government community attended the event.

Valentine also teased an announcement OPMC is set to make next month about another new building at the medical complex.

"We know that building and equipment are terribly important to providing excellent healthcare, but it really is about the people," Valentine said. Valentine asked the audience to think about the 47 years the OPMC has served the community as the business and government leaders present at the ceremony turned over dirt with honorary shovels.

"It wouldn't have been possible without your support, your predecessors' support, and we really celebrate what's to come and there are certainly a lot of wonderful things to come," she said.

Colemans steak their claim with second-place finishes

ORANGE PARK — Finding Saturday's Fly into Summer Steak Cookoff was easy. All you had to do was look for the wisps of smoke and follow the intoxicating aroma of steaks on the grill.

The third annual event at St. Catherine's Catholic Church was an official stop for the Steak Cookoff Association. But for Brian and Dana Coleman's Belly Up team, it gave the couple from Argyle Forest and home-grill advantage.

"It was nice to only have to drive 20 minutes to be here," Brian said. "Normally we have to go three hours. It's good to be home."

And firing up his grill.

Nearly 30 teams competed for a \$1,000 first-place prize for the best ribeye steak. While Jim Bowe of Oviedo won the best overall, the Colemans finished second and pocketed \$500.

The local electrical supplies salesman also finished second to Tona Pendray of Williston in ancillaries with his baconwrapped chicken wings.

Don't be fooled. These competitors do a lot more than throw a piece of meat on the grill. It takes hours to prepare, trimming a Choice 1.25-inch steak to a round disk of unmistakable flavor. Steaks are tied to keep their round shape, and most are liberally seasoned.

That's the easy part.

Most cooks use competition-level charcoal (yes, there is such a thing). Each cook is given two steaks for each of the two double-blind rounds. One is for "practice" each round, the other is to be turned in to the judges.

And each steak is cooked on a separate grill.

Coleman said his method is precious. The grill grate must be exactly 575 degrees. Brian and Dana put their steaks on separate grills at the same moment, with Dana counting down from five.

The steak will only cook for 1 minute, 43 seconds before being flipped, Brian said. That's when the couple continued their long-standing tradition of taking a swig of hard seltzer. They call their routine, "flip and sip."

The Colemans flip their steaks three times, including one stop in a cast-iron skillet. For the competition, steaks are to be cooked to a medium temperature. That means 134-135 degrees. No more, no less, Brian said.

"One of the most important things is to make sure you get a good thermometer to get it to the proper temperature," he said.

"There's no guessing here."

The cookoff benefited programs at the church. After the competition, cooks were given another six steaks which were sold to the public. Even before the Colemans lit their grills, more than 150 steaks had been purchased in advance.

Brian currently is ranked among the top 15 in the world in the SCA, and he came into Saturday's competition ranked seventh in ancillaries. A pair of second-place finishes solidified his place in the standings – and among other cooks.

"We go all over the country to do this," Brian said. "We cook in Alabama, North Carolina, Georgia, South Carolina, Mississippi and Tennessee. This is very competitive and we enjoy it."

The Colemans said they will compete in as many as 45 events this year.

But not any closer to home than St.

Through Strider's work, more than 700 people were added to the large data-

base managed by billiongraves.com. The public now have access to that information. This is a benefit to family and genealogists researching and looking for their relatives.

John's Cemetery is a small cemetery with less than 100 graves, and it is tucked away on a path through Jennings State Forest.

Few people seem to visit, and the documentation serves to preserve the records of the dead buried there.

CLAY COUNTY — A Northeast Florida retired military officer and Vietnam veteran never pictured himself an easy target for scammers. But when the phone rang last year, and a garbled voice claimed to be his grandson in trouble, needing money after a serious accident, all he thought about was trying to help.

The sophisticated scammers convinced him and his wife to transfer thousands of dollars before the couple figured out something was not right. It was an expensive lesson that millions of American seniors learn each year at a cost of billions of dollars.

"Older adults are targeted because they tend to be trusting and polite," said Linda Levin, CEO of ElderSource. "They usually have financial savings, own a home and have good credit — all of which make them attractive to scammers. We recognized World Elder Abuse Awareness Day this year with a free event designed to help them avoid these kinds of scams and other forms of abuse."

According to the National Council on Aging, an estimated five million seniors experience abuse each year. However, only one of every 14 cases are reported. "Older adults are targeted because they tend to be trusting and polite. They usually have financial savings, own a home and have good credit – all of which make them attractive to scammers. We recognized World Elder Abuse Awareness Day this year with a free event designed to help them avoid these kinds of scams and other forms of abuse."

Foster and adoptive Dads are among the most special people because their gifts are the most timely in the life of a child. Opening our doors and hearts to children whose needs are great and emotions fragile takes a certain blend of kindness and leadership. How many of us have the courage and commitment to accept another's child as our own?

I consider myself a Dad because from day one...actually minute one....our sons' presence has been something special and even sacred to me. I don't mean to boast, but I believe that I've acquired that essential trait of positive parenting...to become someone who learns how to love from our children and who loves them back unconditionally

I have learned so much from our sons.... and to this day feel I'm being positively influenced by their positive attitudes, excel-

lent work ethic, and special regard for the environment.

As an advocate, I often ask questions which bring attention to a cause and spark conversation to seek solutions. Advocates give voice to critical issues and attract partners for progress.

I've come to believe that the absence of Dads in the lives of children, either physically or emotionally, is one of the most obvious factors in contributing to childhood stress...and distress.

While it's obvious that most Moms are heroic and provide a phenomenal level of care, loving support, and family leadership, I have learned that children need more than one primary caregiver.

Call me a traditionalist, but I think children live what they learn, and who among us has not benefited from the generous gift of male guidance?

UNF professor shares her sunscreen advice

Dr. Julie Merten also conducting homemade sunscreen study

JACKSONVILLE – Dr. Julie Merten, University of North Florida associate professor of public health, studies a hot topic especially during the summer – wearing sunscreen. Merten is the chair of the Skin Cancer Prevention Task Force in Northeast Florida, working to reduce skin cancer through advocacy, policy and education efforts. She has done extensive research on sunscreen and minimizing skin cancer risks.

Here are some important tips for correct sunscreen usage:

- Say yes to sunscreen and say no to cancer. According to the Skin Cancer Foundation, more people are diagnosed with skin cancer each year in the U.S. than all other cancers combined. And the sun is usually the primary culprit. About 90% of nonmelanoma skin cancers are associated with exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun or tanning beds.
- Use an FDA-approved sunscreen. The American Academy of Dermatology recommends that everyone six months and older wear sunscreen. Make sure the sunscreen has these characteristics: broad spectrum, which protects against UVA and UVB sun-

rays; water-resistant (effective for up to 40 minutes in water) or very water resistant (effective for up to 80 minutes in water); and, Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 30 or more

- Find a sunscreen formula that works for you. Sunscreens all have different ingredients beyond the ingredients meant to ward off the sun. Just because one sunscreen doesn't feel good on your skin, doesn't mean all will feel bad. Try different brands and formulations.
- Apply early and often. Sunscreen should be applied in a thick layer 30 minutes before heading outside and reapplied every two hours.
- Throw out expired or old sunscreen. Look for an expiration date on the bottle and throw out expired sunscreen. If there is no expiration date, throw out sunscreen three years after opening. If your sunscreen looks or feels different being much thicker or thinner or the color has changed toss it.

Commercial sunscreens have recently come under fire due to concerns about some of the chemicals in the sunscreens. Concerns including coral reef destruction, endocrine disruption, and Vitamin D deficiency have increased consumer interest in natural, organic and non-toxic sunscreen products. This demand has led more people to make their own homemade reci-




pes, often found online. In 2019, Merten and UNF researchers randomly sampled 189 homemade sunscreen pins on Pinterest and found that nearly all pins positively portrayed the effectiveness of the product, although most of these recommended recipes offered insufficient UV radiation protection. When it comes to sun protection, homemade is not always the best. Most homemade sunscreens have not been tested for their true UV protection, water resistance or photostability. However, most commercially available sunscreens are highly regulated and tested for safety and efficacy.

There are two types of sunscreens: chemical absorbers and mineral blockers. Chemical sunscreens, which absorb into the skin, have received the most criticism for absorbing into the bloodstream as

well as potentially damaging coral reefs. By contrast, mineral blockers, such as zinc oxide or titanium dioxide-based sunscreens, sit on the surface of the skin to create a physical barrier to reflect the dangerous rays from the sun. With the mineral blockers, there is no absorption into the skin or body and no association with environmental damage.

It's one part a memorial for three people — a firefighter, a soldier and a police officer — who made the ultimate sacrifice and one part a beautiful memorial that's impossible to miss when in the city.

"We knew [Sheila Russell, the mother of Sgt. Bradley Crose who is pictured in the center of the mural] was coming to town and we wanted to do something special for her and everyone involved," St. Michael's Soldiers co-founder and vice president Jim Signorile said.

Signorile is one of the people behind the mural. He and his wife, Kathy, helped put together the event and they helped gather everyone involved with the mural. Signorile handed out commemorative plaques and shared a few words about how incredible it was that so many people could come together to create such a significant piece of art.

"We are so thankful to everyone here," Kim Signorile said. "We are so thankful to our first responders and our soldiers. They've got the biggest hearts and the three pictured here made the ultimate sacrifice."

Sophie Dare Dentiste is one of the lead artists, which utilized nearly a dozen local artists. She said the event meant a lot to her. Russell had seen the mural before, but she has since moved to North Carolina and doesn't get to see it as often.

Dentiste said it's amazing to hear about the impact her art has had on the community and the people like Russell who serves as inspiration for the project. Dentiste also is the artist behind the colorful flora and fauna mural painted on a building on the other side of U.S. Highway 17 in Green Cove Springs.

Russell was at the presentation to accept a plaque on behalf of her son, Crose, who made the ultimate sacrifice on March 4, 2002, as a U.S. Army soldier. She was joined by Tonya McKay, the widow of Clay County firefighter Jeremy McKay, whose last alarm was on Nov. 27, 2019. McKay died of cancer. The two of them were honored by Monday's ceremony.

"Me and our kids still drive by often and blow him a kiss," McKay said. "It means the world that he's forever memorialized here."

The Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy depicted in the mural is Ben Zirbel, who died from injuries sustained during a 2018 crash while he was riding his motorcycle on patrol on Blanding Boulevard.

Russell said when she lived in town, she'd park across from the mural and just sit with it, taking it in. The two of them spoke to the character of the loved one they lost. They both laughed at how they learned of Crose's and McKay's many commendations and awards after they died.

"That's the kind of people they were,"

Russell said. "They were incredibly humbled. Bradley would've said 'no' to a mural like this because of how humble he was, but he's so deserving."

McKay said her husband kept all kinds

of awards and badges in his nightstand drawer, but he never spoke of them.

"That's not what it was about for him," she said. "It was about saving lives."

you adopt one kitten for \$100, you'll get the second for free. There are roughly more than 400 kittens in foster care who will soon be available for adoption.

Sherry Mansfield, the director of Safe Animal Shelter, believes the biggest reason animal shelters are experiencing an influx of animals needing homes is the lack of spaying and neutering.

"I feel the number one reason we have this problem is because no one is spaying or neutering their pets...part of the reason we have so many is, people can't afford veterinary services," Mansfield said.

Mansfield recalls one potential adopter telling her when she took her cat to get spayed, the vet said it would cost \$440. While there are vets who will spay and neuter for a cheaper price, often those vets



will be completely booked.

Jessica Tholen, the veterinary technician at the shelter, said Clay County needs more affordable veterinary services.

"There's definitely a need for lower cost veterinary services," Tholen said.

The \$100 adoption fee Safe Animal Shelter charges not only covers spay/neuter but also the microchip and vaccinations. Potential adopters end up saving money by adopting.

In addition to reaching max capacity, the vet techs at the shelter believe adopting two kittens is healthier for cats. Stephanie Klides, another tech at Safe, advocates for adopting two kittens instead of just one.

"Cats are social animals. It's better for them to have that bond and friendship with another kitten. Having two helps them to not get lonely. They comfort each other and keep each other company," Klides said.

Along with needing adoptions, Safe Animal Shelter is also in need of foster families for the kittens too young to be adopted, volunteers and donations. Fostering animals is an important puzzle piece to the shelter, but unfortunately there currently aren't enough fosters to go around. Usually what happens is the staff will end up tak-



ing kittens home if there weren't any foster families available.

While fostering is needed, Tholen wants families to make sure they understand fostering animals can have just as many responsibilities, if not more than adopting an

animal.

"The purpose of fostering is to find a family who doesn't want to commit to adoption, but they want to make a difference. And the goal would be to have them completely trained so that every single time their pet is adopted, another one can come into their life," Tholen said.

Volunteering is also another way to help Safe Animal Shelter. Although it will gladly accept any help, they mostly prefer responsible and mature volunteers. High school students can earn volunteer hours for Bright Futures during the summertime, but it's important to remember the purpose of volunteers is to help take care of the animals, not scroll on your phone while vou're on duty. Donations are also gravely needed. Safe Animal Shelter is always in need of Purina puppy and Purina chicken and turkey wet kitten food, IAMS kitten food, cat carriers, heating pads, cat litter, kitten nursing bottles and KMR-kitten milk replacement. Anyone interested in donating these items can go to the Safe Animal Shelters Amazon wish list. The list can be found on Safe Animal Shelters website under the "other ways to give" tab. Donations can also be brought directly to the animal shelter as well at 2913 County Road 220 in Middleburg.

n 1943 an American ship was torpedoed just off the coast of Greenland. This attack resulted in the loss of many lives. It was a time for fear, and uncertainty but also a time for courage, bravery

The parent company said it needs help following a year of shutdowns and slowdowns from the COVID-19 pandemic. While many of the mall tenants were eligible to receive Paycheck Protection Program payouts to keep their doors open, malls weren't eligible for the government money.

Bowman said rents were recalculated during the pandemic to allow tenants to keep their shops open.

"We worried about our tenants first," he said. "Now we will worry about ourselves."

The company secured \$100 million in new debtor-in-possession financing from creditors led by SVPGlobal to "ensure that all business operations continue in the ordinary course without interruption." If approved, Chapter 11 would oversee an agreement between SVP Global and Washington Prime to restructure the debt. SVP-Global holds approximately 73% of the company's secured debt and nearly 67% of its unsecured obligations.

Washington Prime, which is headquartered in Columbus, Ohio filed in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of Texas.

"The company's financial restructur-

ing will enable WPG to right-size its balance sheet and position the company for success going forward," CEO Lou Conforti said in a release. "During the financial restructuring, we will continue to work toward maximizing the value of our assets and our operating infrastructure. The company expects operations to continue in the ordinary course for the benefit of our guests, tenants, vendors, stakeholders and colleagues."

Washington Prime also owns the Westland Park Plaza at 6000 Lake Grav Blvd. in Argyle Forest. Westland Park's primary tenants are the Burlington Coat Factory, Bealls Outlet, LA Fitness, Plato's Closet, Once Upon a Child and Guitar Center.

The Orange Park Mall, located at the corners of Blanding Boulevard and Wells Road, opened in 1975. Its largest retailer is JC Penney, but the mall also features anchor stores like Dillard's, Belk, Dick's Sporting Goods, Old Navy, Books-A-Million and the 24-screen AMC theater. The mall also has a bustling 400-seat food court

While many other malls have been allowed to deteriorate and abandoned or have been torn down, the Orange Park Mall has remained a vibrant hub to Clay County's commerce. Of the 145 retail spaces at the 952,725-square-foot mall, only one space is unoccupied, Bowman said.

A new amphitheater soon will be opened in a grassy area at the edge of the property to bring a variety of entertainment acts, movies and festivals to the area, including

He finally told CCOS deputies about his girlfriend





DeSantis: Critical race theory teaches children to attack police

For Florida Politics

Gov. Ron DeSantis added fuel to the continuing controversy of critical race theory.

The Governor, appearing on Fox News Tuesday night, doubled down on claims that the recently banned principles of CRT teach students to attack police officers.

"If you look at how some of this stuff manifests itself in classrooms, that we have seen examples of, it's not a conspiracy theory," DeSantis said. "Dividing kids on race, attacking law enforcement and saying law enforcement attacks people on race. Those things are poison, and that's not what we should be doing."

The Governor offered the national audience a gentler version of a hot quote he made a few days earlier.

DeSantis told in-state media that critical race theory taught kids to attack cops and left seven out of eight illiterates in some schools. He made no unsubstantiated claims about connections between critical race theory and a lack of interest in teaching reading,

"Some of the nonsense that you see in some of these places around the country. I mean, they will attack cops with this type of ideology in schools, and meanwhile, they have like 87% of the kids that aren't



even literate in some of these schools. So, it shows you they're not trying to educate; they're trying to indoctrinate," DeSantis said in Sarasota Friday.

The Governor's political committee sent out an email fundraising on the ban of critical race theory as an attack on "cultural Marxism," meanwhile.

The decision ratified by DeSantis' handpicked Board of Education roiled Democrats. Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried said it was proof the Governor wanted a "race war and cultural war."

"He did it intentionally, not because

there's a worry about something like this, but to create a culture war in our state. I know people in our state are smarter than this and aren't going to fall for this political rhetoric spewed by Ron DeSantis and the Republican Party," Fried said.

Penney Farms, SJRWMD join forces to fix aging infrastructure

PENNEY FARMS – Even utopias have their flaws.

After Hurricane Irma in 2019 barreled through the historic community of Penney Farms in Clay County and flooded its streets, local leaders knew they needed to seek financial help to improve their aging and undersized drainage infrastructure.

"When Irma struck, we had so much water that it had reached the bottom of the stop sign," says Cathie Parrott, the community's grants coordinator and proud 17-year resident of this tight-knit retirement community. "The water was like a river running down the street, flooding the center of our town."

Town Manager David Cooper encouraged Parrott to turn to the St. Johns River Water Management District's Cost-Share Program for assistance. The District awarded Penney Farms a \$5,000 cost-share grant to replace old hand-held water meter readers with newer, more accurate models with improved capabilities.

In 2021, the District is once again assisting the town, providing \$273,500 toward an \$828,000 project that will not only upgrade the community's stormwater system, but also will reduce the amount nitrogen and phosphorus flowing into the south prong of Black Creek and ultimately, the lower St. Johns River.

"Our cost-share funding programs help

million gallons per day of alterative water supplied, 8.7 mgd of water conserved, a reduction of 1.6 million pounds per year of total nitrogen, a reduction of 282,452 pounds per year of total phosphorus, and 4,624 acres protected from flooding.

What did you think of the rainbow lighting being turned off briefly on the Acosta Bridge?

CLAY COUNTY — The Acosta Bridge in Jacksonville is famous for its beautiful lighting that displays support through unique colors for the military, football teams, and more. But when it was lit with PRIDE month rainbow colors last week, the lights were temporarily ordered to be removed by the Florida Department of Transportation.

The controversy surrounding this scenario was the lack of details around it: there was no word, at least officially and publicly, as to why the PRIDE colors were removed. It seemed odd, too, because the bridge has displayed color schemes quite similar to rainbows in the past so why was the rainbow removed? Was it a reason due to PRIDE month or was it something else?

The Jacksonville Transportation Authority controls the bridge and its lighting and it said "the FDOT informed the JTA that our scheduled color scheme for the Acosta Bridge is out of compliance with our existing permit" and that "the JTA will comply accordingly." There's been no wording as to how it was not in compliance, which is especially odd in light of the fact that very similar color schemes have gone up before.

A spokeswoman for Gov. Ron DeSantis' office, which is the office that leads all state functions including FDOT, assured the rainbow lighting would be back on June 9. "I just don't understand why it's a very big deal just to have rainbow colored lights on the bridge at night," Eric Newcom said.





"I'm a Clay County resident. My wife and I's kids go to school here. It's our home and we'd love to have as many Grumpy's restaurants as possible here."

DeLeon said they've been looking hard in the Green Cove Springs and Fleming Island areas of the county. Orange Park and Middleburg already have Grumpy's loca-

Michael said. "Tracy has the experience running the front end of the house and I have the knowledge for the more paper side of things like profits and analytics. This is about us marrying those two sets of experience together."

The Yarbroughs and DeLeon were friends before becoming business partners, but don't let that fool you. The Yarbroughs went through the same processes as anyone else wanting a franchise. DeLeon said he and Michael coached their children in tackle football and grew to be friends.

He said Michael had picked his ear about Grumpy's and owning a restaurant in general and while the two discussed the possibility of working together, Michael never outright asked for a franchise. That's because behind the scenes, the Yarbroughs

were applying through Grumpy's standard franchisee application process.

"I had no idea he went online and filled out the franchise application," DeLeon said. "We briefly spoke about their interest, but I didn't know they were that interested. I saw their names and was like, 'Wait, is this the Tracy and Michael I know?'

DeLeon said they made a great fit for the Grumpy's family and now the three are working together to find the home of the fifth location.

"Anyone in our team has to fit in with our core values," DeLeon said. "They have to stay true to the passion we have for southern hospitality and homestyle cooking...you know, everything you experience when you come to Grumpy's."

DeLeon said the company avoids blind investors more interested in making money because they prefer to find quality partners who care about the community they're serving. The Yarbroughs said they want their location to be like the others: a place where someone can come in multiple times a week and get the same service and delicious food they always get.

The Yarbroughs knew they wanted to open a restaurant, but how exactly did they land at Grumpy's? Why not open a different restaurant as a franchisee duo or why not open their own restaurant? For them, it was that Grumpy's was doing everything that appealed to them about the business.

They love that it's early morning breakfast hours and lunch hours which allow them to be out by 2 p.m. so they can pick up their children from school, help them with homework and be active in their extracurricular activities. Then there's the food side of it.

"Grumpy's is incredible," Tracy said. "From the food to the people and the service...it's what we love so much about it.

Being a part of this great company and its growth in North Florida, which is also growing, was really exciting for us."

They said they also love that Grumpy's average price for a meal is \$10.

"Once we looked at our checklist of what we were looking for, we realized Grumpy's checked every box...so here we are," Michael said.

The couple and DeLeon are still determining where they want the new Grumpy's, but they're doing all they can to keep it in Clay County.

For now, DeLeon will stay busy opening up the next three restaurants, including that of the Yarbroughs, while Tracy and Michael make their way through this process enjoying their favorite Grumpy's meals: a Philly cheesesteak with onion rings and a waffle for Tracy, and a classic waffle breakfast or rodeo burger for Michael.





ANCHORAGE, AK - Megan Weinstein, of Fleming Island, has been providing updates on the Mills Weinstein, her 12 year old son, as he and his dad, Scott, and climbing expert Andrew Bunn of Jacksonville, ascend up Mt. McKinley in Alaska; a 20,320 foot

Weinstein is in communication with the trio along the way and has provided these periodic updates. The trio is presently near the 14,200 foot mark (Note graphic).


Denali - Day 9:

The guvs are still based at Camp 2 (11,200 ft) and doing a lot of caching as they prepare to move up the mountain. On Day 7...they rested ??.

It's daylight 24/7 so at the end of Day 7 and into Day 8, they backtracked to retrieve the gear they cached a couple of days before. Today, Day 9, they left to cache their gear at 13,500 ft. I just got word they reached 13,500 and are headed back to Camp 2 to rest. It took them about six hours to go from 11,200 to 13,500 ft. Going back to Camp 2 will be quicker but they can expect at least a 10 hour climbing day.

Once they are rested, they will tear down Camp 2 and will start the climb to Camp 3 at 14,200.

The weather will be a big factor the next couple of days. We are watching it closely. Please pray for the weather to clear and for the guys to remain safe, healthy and



mentally strong. Thanks everyone, I will give more updates as I have them.

Denali - Day 6:

The guys just checked in and are safe at Camp 2 (11,200 ft). They had a long day. Andrew Bunn worked incredibly hard for the team today and broke the trail all the way up to Camp 2. Andrew is strong and this is hard work that was essential to today's success and progress. We are grateful he's a part of Mills' team. We literally couldn't do it without him.

They are all safe and feeling good but very tired. Even though it's freezing (15-20 degrees) they work so hard that when the

sun comes out they get overheated. Then when the clouds come, their sweat freezes and they get too cold.

Right now, as I type this, they are at Camp 2, lying in the snow to cool off, eating sandwiches, solar charging their communication devices and relaxing.

In my mind, it's a mountain climber's version of a spa day - although I'm sure the guys would say differently ??.

They will rest most of tomorrow and toward the end of the day will go down the mountain a bit to retrieve the "cache" they carried up the mountain a few days ago. They will bring it back up to Camp 2 and will rest a bit more while they acclimate.

Don't know about you guys, but I'm tired just typing about it. Thanks for following their adventure! More to come soon...

Denali - Day 4:

The guys rested most of yesterday and today at Camp 1. Today they start something called "caching". They carry some of their gear about 3 miles and will leave it (they bury it) and will return to Camp 1 for the night. Tomorrow they will most likely pack up Camp 1 and will head up to their buried gear to camp. This helps lighten the load and also helps them

Most days I do a weather check for them so they can plan according to what's ahead. Right now, where they are (7,800 ft), the weather is light snow, 5-10 mph winds and around 21-25 degrees. For comparison, today on the summit (20,300 ft), it is -15 degrees with a windchill of

Denali - Day 2:

This is a map of what the next 28 days will look like. The guys left Base Camp this morning with today's goal being to make it to at least 1/2 Camp (which is midway between Base Camp and Camp 1). Once they reached 1/2 Camp, they felt strong enough to keep going for a few more hours.

They've stopped for the night and set up camp a couple of hours short of Camp 1. Today was only 5 miles and about 500 feet in elevation but their gear is heavy and it took almost 12 hours. Tomorrow they will climb a couple of hours to Camp 1 and will rest for the day. Besides being tired, they are feeling pretty good. They are hunkering down for a night of rough weather but tomorrow should be an easy

"I hope I can bring my own collegiate experiences into the dugout to give the girls a bit of what to expect at that level," said Han. "After our first week of practices and the weight room, I think they bought into that I was bringing a collegelevel game plan to them."

Han noted that her first two weeks of summer conditioning and practices have been heavily filled with roster players.

"I've been told that the numbers we are getting out here so far are higher than ever and that's a good sign," said Han. "The team seems to be wanting to work hard. They are ready to win."



in both the 100 and 200 backstroke events.

Note: On Monday, Dressel swam a lifetime best for the 200 free to finish as the second fastest semifinalist with a 1:46.63, but scratched from the scheduled semifinal presumably to prepare for his upcoming events; 50 and 100 freestyle, 100 butterfly. Dressel also scratched out of Mondayh's 200 butterfly preliminary.

On day one, with a seed time of 59.58 seconds, Stotler was among eight swimmers all just under one minute for heat. Heats one and two had 16 swimmers; eight per heat with all but four under one minute.

From heat five on, swimmers inched to a best time of 56.20 by Claire Curzan of North Carolina, a 16 year old phenom. Ironically, Curzan, just a high school junior, is the same age as legendary Olympian Michael Phelps was at his first Olympic Trials.

The world record for the event is 5.48 with the American record at 55.98 by Dana Vollmer. Curzan currently held the best national time with her 56.20.

After the prelims, Stotler finished 47th with a 1:00.74 split with American Olympian Kelsi Dahlia, the 2016 Trials champion, posting a 56.56 time as top seed for the semifinals; two heats of eight swimmers. Curzan finished fourth fastest at 57.61.

The top 16 were under 59.17. The 100 butterfly final for women is scheduled for Mon., June 14.

Stotler next swims the 200 freestyle with a 2:01.60 seed time. Top time is U.S. Olympian Katie Ledecky at 1:54.40)

Monday features heats for the mens 200 free, mens 100 backstroke, womens 400 free, womens 100 backstroke, womens 100 breaststroke, the womens 100 fly final, womens 100 breaststroke semifinal, mens 100 breaststroke final, womens 400 free final, mens 100 backstroke semifinal and the womens 100 backstroke semifinal.


In a Trials press conference three days prior to the start of the meet, Dressel was joined in a press conference with Ryan Lochte and Olympic coach Gregg Troy, who coached Dressel at the University of Florida and throughout his Olympics experiences; two relay gold medals. Lochte is preparing to potentially being one of the oldest Olympians to compete at age 36 with a possible fifth Olympic berth.

"For me, personally, just making the team is a success and going to Tokyo and winning a medal would be another success," said Lochte. "Me being 36 and just being here is a success."

Dressel was asked about not having Michael Phelps at the Trials.

"I was here in 2012 in the nosebleed seats as a 15 year old watching Michael Phelps and Ryan Lochte swimming," said Dressel. "My favorite part of the Olympic experience is the training together with the best swimmers in the world after the Trials in preparing for the Olympics. I don't think I'm a seasoned enough swimmer to answer that question."

pian Anthony Ervin, the RIO 50 free champion at age 35, as a swimming technique model for him. Ervin, now 40, also tied for the gold in the 50 free in the 2000 Olympics.

"He was my first mentor guy because he has such a beautiful stroke," said Dressel. "He was the first swimmer I attached to technically especially for the 50. He was my first role model regarding technique."

Dressel answered about the delay of the COVID experience and the waiting to get an Olympic Trials meet.

"Coach and I have always had a plan and a backup plan and we trained as if Trials was happening," said Dressel. "The Trials are not quite here (two days). Last year was really tough, but training with guys like Ryan made me focus on keeping my routine to be ready. I think we (team) are in a better situation than at the same time last year."

Troy noted that the COVID experience allowed the swimmers and coaches to evaluate swims and technique more often.

"We did a lot of driving to pools that were available and meets and that time in the car was valuable to giving us time to talk," said Troy, who noted talk of a possible cancellation of the Tokyo Games. "We train as if everything is happening. I can only control what's in the pool; not what's going on outside."














Stretch and Flex open for new fitness ideas

Humphrey was a notable wide receiver for the Panthers football team and a stateranked hurdler on the track before a knee injury his junior year stifled his athletics.






what Michael Nesmith does. Plus my suits are better looking."




Orange Park runner David Bonnette, left, overcame bout with cancer to run 41 minute best time for 50Km trail run.



At the 2020 FHSAA Class 2A championship meet, Stotler said her gold medal performance was a little more about remembering the final state meet for herself. Stotler had won the 100 butterfly in 2018 with two silver medals last year; 200 IM and 100 butterfly.


