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# TikTok star using social media to advocate for social change

Orange Park High grad tries to break stigma that follows a felony conviction

CLAY COUNTY – Tayler Harber was a model student at Orange Park High.

Less than a year later after graduating in 2016, though, she committed a felony that would change the rest of her life. Unwilling to let an armed robbery charge take over her life – no matter how hard her past tried to affect her future – Harber turned her story into a platform for advocacy, support and change. Just months after creating it, her TikTok has more than one million followers, and it's there that she makes frequent posts about what she endured behind bars, the kind of change Florida prisons need for women and how one careless decision doesn't have to be the end-all-beall society can make it out to be.

"I can't complain about my childhood; it was decent," Harber said. "I did sports my entire life and I was a tri-state athlete. Sports are what kept me going and they're what motivated me to do good in schools. I made As and Bs and I graduated in 2016."

A model student and school athlete her entire life, things began to change her senior year. But when she was a senior, she couldn't play anymore. Because sports kept her motivated in the classroom, her scholastic performance began to wane, but she graduated in 2016 despite all of

that. She was in her own apartment two months later, working full-time, and "on top of the world," as any 18-year-old fresh out of high school feels.

Less than a couple of months into her

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### Keystone sets tentative budget for 2021-22; final approval set for Sept. 27

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The Keystone Heights City council approved a tentative budget of \$847,641 Monday night at its monthly meeting. If it passes on a final vote scheduled for Sept. 27, the new budget will go into effect on Oct. 1.

City set a millage rate of 4.2901 that will result in \$300,823 in property taxes, according to a report submitted by City Manager Lynn Rutkowski. Other revenue sources include \$87,000 in gas taxes, \$34,000 in Clay County Utilities taxes, \$89,000 in Clay Electric taxes, \$80,000 in local communication service taxes and \$6,000 in administrative fees for waste collection.

The city also will earn \$37,769.21 in net income from the Keystone Heights Airport.

In other business, the council unanimously approved a \$300 monthly fee and \$3,000 advertising budget with Brandon Ludwig to create social media advertising "to showcase the downtown area."

"People know about Keystone Heights. They know we are a small, quaint little town that has a lot of things that are going on," Rutkowski told the council. We've got a lot of improvements that are happening at our Beach, a lot of things happening downtown with our streets and with our businesses. We just want to make sure everybody understands that we're here. We're a nice family. Mayberry does exist."

The council also passes a proclamation honoring former State Sen. Rob Bradley. As the vice-chairman of the St. Johns Water Management District, Bradley was instrumental in getting \$40 million for the Black Creek Water Resource Project that will funnel filtered water from the creek into the replenished lakes around Keystone Heights.

The proclamation designates Sept. 13 as "Rob Bradley Day" in the city.

The final budget meeting on Sept. 27 will be at 5 p.m. at City Hall.

be away from the hospital.

For Sage Pridemore, life continues to be a day-by-day, if not step-by-step, process. But with each day, the pain and ache get a little more manageable; recovery becomes a little more plausible.

The deep scar down the middle of his chest will never disappear. It will be an ugly reminder of the anticipation and fear of waiting for a heart that may not come in time.

Life isn't supposed to be this difficult for anyone, but for a 14-year-old, the anguish was unspeakable.

Now, seven weeks after a surgeon replaced his degenerative heart with a healthy one, Sage is anxious to return to a simple life he once took for granted.

He longs to be back on the water, swimming and fishing, riding wakeboards and tubing. He misses baseball and football.

But he's alive. And for now, that's all that matters.

"I haven't done much. My chest is still sore," he said by telephone. "If something were to fall on it, it would hurt. Certain stuff like throwing a baseball, throwing a football, something that I would do normally, I just can't do yet. The scar's healed, but I'm still sore and achy with certain things that I do.

"I'm looking forward to going in the lakes and fishing, going to the [Keystone] Beach and going swimming. I just want to

get in the water. I'm ready to play sports and get outside. I'm ready to do stuff."

Doctors told the family all of that will come with time. To decrease the chances of infection, he's not allowed to have visitors for several more weeks. Last week, he was allowed to take another baby step – getting in the pool and slowly walking laps. No splashing, no swimming, no cannonballs.

"It's been six weeks, so he can go in the pool. He has to be kind of slow," said his mother, Candice Pridemore. "He can't go swimming and things like that. He's still taking it slow and gets out of breath. He's still getting adjusted to the medicine. Some of the anti-rejection meds make him shake. He's getting used to doing things with shaky hands. It makes him have stomach issues, but we're happy to have him home.

"He has a new puppy and we're still getting the kinks out. We're still trying to figure out everyday life. We haven't gone anywhere; we haven't done anything. We're just staying to the house."

Sage was born with half of a heart. The condition is called hypoplastic left heart syndrome. He's been through several surgeries to remove bronchial casts since he was 3. The bronchial casts – a formation of plugs that block the airways in his lung – came so often and was so threatening, it prompted surgeons to move him to the top of the transplant list.

Sage originally was supposed to get a new heart on June 21, but that surgery was called off when he developed a fever. Doctors told the family his need for a new heart had become desperate.

That all ended on July 29 when a rescue squad ambulance arrived at the emergency entrance of the UF Health Heart and Vascular Hospital in Gainesville. The heart was quickly transported into the hospital by three technicians – one who muttered: "It's a good heart" – shortly before he disappeared into one of the busy hallways. From there, Dr. Mark S. Bleiweis performed the operation that was deemed "successful."

Sage spent 129 days on the transplant list and 71 days in the hospital. The only numbers that matter now is the years

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### Governor wants to stick it to cities that won't mandate vaccinations

v. Ron DeSantis and other leaders spoke Monday in Alachua County, making a fervent case against mask and vaccine mandates, with the Governor pledging action against wayward local jurisdictions.

Specifically, DeSantis has imposed a \$5,000 fine for cities and counties requiring vaccines for public employees "for every single violation" in cases like the one currently being proposed in Gainesville.

DeSantis teased action last week. His comments Monday in Newberry both addressed local mandates in the state, and the larger national mandate advanced last week from President Joe Biden, conflating the two as targets.

Regarding local proposals, a fired-up DeSantis vowed he was "not going to let people be fired because of a vaccine mandate.'

"While a lot of these politicians were on Zoom, these folks were out there protecting us, day in and day out," DeSantis said about first responders, defending vaccine abstinence as a "personal choice" about one's health.

"It's really about using government power and control to mandate much more than it is the underlying medical issues that are involved," DeSantis said.

The Governor also contended natural immunity offers protections that make vaccines redundant.

"If you're following science, you acknowledge this natural immunity, but instead they ignore it and force somebody who already has protection to take a medical treatment they may not like," DeSantis said.

DeSantis also spotlighted the Biden federal mandates as "even more problematic" and showing the President's "arrogance."

"They go back and find some statute from decades ago, some obscure OSHA rule about toxic substances in the workplace, and act like that would be a pretext to throw people out of work," DeSantis said.

DeSantis also critiqued Biden's listening and empathy skills but vowed to stand up to the President.

"He is so dismissive of people who disagree with him," DeSantis complained, but said, "governors like me are designed to be on the front lines of pushing back when a President is overreaching."

DeSantis also bashed Biden on booster shots, saying the President's position was an unconstitutional slippery slope.

"Could be a situation where Fauci says

# Green Cove Springs is worthy of greater long-range growth, imaginative planning

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – This city is at a crossroads. And what leaders and longtime residents fear most is those crossroads are getting clogged with traffic and uncontrolled growth.

Green Cove Springs is a small town that wants to think big. Or is it a town with big plans that manages to keep its smallish identity?

Clay is growing at an alarming rate. For now, it's manageable, but the real challenge is to think beyond now. Any city or county that's not focused 10 years in ad-

Don Coble vance is already falling behind.

That's where Green Cove Springs currently finds itself.

New communities are sprouting west and south of the city. Thousands of homes are planned, as well as the First Coast Expressway and a shopping center that will make the more than 175 stores at St. Johns Town Center seem like a weekend flea market. That means more shopping, restaurants, jobs and, of course, money. It also means a lot more traffic and challenges to an infrastructure that's already struggling to keep pace.

The city council last week wrestled with the prospect of more traffic entering U.S. Highway 17 near the Cove Plaza when a developer asked for zoning for a 9.4-acre plot behind the shopping center to be changed to accommodate the possible construction of as many as 112

"high-end" condominiums. The request came weeks after D.R. Horton won tentative approval to continue with plans for as many as 1,200 new homes at its Ayrshire Development on the old Gustafson dairy farm.

Developments already are under construction in Lake Asbury and along County Road 315. New homes are destined for State Road 16 to Starke, along State Road 21 from Middleburg to Keystone Heights and south on U.S. 17 toward Palatka. It's coming whether the city likes it or not because it's the only land that's available.

So instead of fighting it, we should get ahead of it.

There are legitimate concerns. U.S. 17 from S.R. 16 to the Black Creek bridge isn't conducive for widening. For now, the roadway can manage the traffic because there is very little to attract cars to the downtown area, especially at night. Try to find something to eat after 9 p.m. that doesn't include the phrase: "Pull up to the next window, please." In short, there is no nightlife in the downtown area. There are no trendy clubs. bars or restaurants. It's like businesses roll up their sidewalks when the street lights come on. It's so bad, Waffle House stavs away.

Councilman Van Royal doesn't like to see so residents and visitors go through

six months from now, 'you have to get one," the Governor mused.

"This is all political, all about using government. And it's wrong," DeSantis warned.

DeSantis invoked 9/11 in his comments also, implying vaccine mandates proposed around 9/11 disrespected first responders.

It's "frustrating to see that not respected more," DeSantis said. "You're threatening to take someone's job away. You're not respecting the people that are working hard to keep us safe.'

"I will say that protecting people's jobs, standing up for first responders, that's like page three of the Governor's manual."

DeSantis' voice trailed off. But the point was made.

The Governor had copious support on hand

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "this is about very simply how much power our government officials have when we have never given them that power to do something like this.'

A fired-up Moody blasted "city officials who say they are going to fire city employees if they don't take the vaccine.'

"It is unlawful," Moody said. "It is unconscionable that we would trust these folks to throw themselves in front of a bullet for other people, but we don't trust them to make a decision for their own safety. It is unconscionable."

Moody vowed to back locals who are having their jobs threatened over not getting vaccines and speculated that vaccine mandates would only worsen workplace attrition for first responders.

CFO Jimmy Patronis was likewise peeved.

"I got my vaccine. But I ain't going to support no damned mandate," he said.



### Wicked Batter Café offers an eclectic menu of traditional, sugar-free, vegan foods

ORANGE PARK – Many locals and new residents alike have noticed a shift toward healthier foods and allergy substitutions in their diets. Organic and non-GMO foods have found their place in everyday grocery stores and there is a growing focus on fresh, diet-friendly, but still delicious options available in restaurants.

It's no wonder a bakery selling both traditional and keto-friendly sweets has risen in popularity. Wicked Batter Café, owned by Barbara and Timothy Tharp, opened in 2018 but didn't start out offering their keto menu. The change came after a keto customer ordered a custom cake, and more and more customers came in asking for keto and sugar-free options

"I always love a challenge," Barbara says, "And it was something that no one else was doing."

What started as a small section of scratch-made cupcakes has blossomed into its own menu, displayed in a case of its own. Wicked Batter uses almond flour instead of regular flour and xylitol for its sweetener. But beyond that, it's all ingredients that are usually found in cakes. "We do it the real food way," Barbara said. "We want it to taste real, not just look like it's supposed to."

The substitutions also came in handy for people with diabetes or other dietary restrictions and needs. Rather than feel excluded from family memories, people can eat something that tastes just as good as traditional recipes and celebrate with others that don't have their dietary needs.

Wicked Batter also does custom cakes such as vegan and gluten-friendly, and the local response has been far bigger than they ever expected.

It's not just locals either. People drive in from Georgia, and a few have even flown in from as far as Pennsylvania to pick up custom orders.

During the pandemic, Barbara says the community response saved them. She announced on Facebook her shop was going to close, but residents rallied to keep the café doors open.

"They just wouldn't let us close," she said.

Their desire to bring good food to the


community they grew up in is something that Wicked Batter hopes to continue. They plan to continue adapting to the growing and changing needs of the community.

"We just do the basics really," Barbara said with a giggle. "The basics done the right way."

# Research Study: The Silent Liver Disease



Everyone has heard of conditions like diabetes, high blood pressure or high cholesterol. They are all too common conditions in the USA. However, did you know these conditions can lead to non-alcoholic fatty liver disease, (NAFLD)? Having a liver disease is not always associated with heavy drinking. - are aged 18 to 75 years old
- have a Body Mass Index (BMI) between 25 and 45
- have NASH based on the results of study screening procedures

Volunteers will receive investigational medication (or placebo), study-related procedures and medical exams at no cost, as well as reimbursement for travel. No health insurance is required to participate.

### **Charles Lee 'Chris' Smith**

Charles Lee "Chris" Smith, passed away on September 3, 2021 at the age of 74 surrounded by loved ones at his home

in Fleming Island, Florida.

Chris served our country admirably from 1968 to 1971, completing two tours in Vietnam.

He completed advanced individual training at Company D, 1st Battalion, 1st Engineer AIT Bri-

gade (Pioneer) and thereafter served our country with both Companies D and N, 4th Engineer Battalion: 4th Infantry Divi-



sion, 173rd Engineer Group; 173rd Airborne Brigade. He earned his Paratrooper wings at Fort Benning, Georgia, completed advanced

training at Fort Leonard Wood (Missouri) and Combat Noncommissioned Officer Leadership School at Camp Radcliff, RVN (Republic of Vietnam).

As an Airborne Ranger (November Rangers) in the 173rd Airborne Brigade, he was with the first American Army combat unit deployed to South Vietnam. He served honorably throughout Vietnam and excelled in many roles, including Green Beret, Demolitions Specialist, Combat Engineer, Long Range Recognizance Patrol (LRRP), helicopter repelling and paratrooper, successfully completing 1,021 parachute jumps.

Highly decorated, he earned a Bronze Star Medal for Meritorious Achievement in Ground Operations Against Hostile Forces (Vietnam) and a Second Bronze Star Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) for Meritorious Achievement in Ground Operations Against Hostile Forces, the Cross of Gallantry, the Vietnam Service Medal (VSM), and the RVNCM W/DEV 60 (a South Vietnamese government award to members of the South Vietnamese military for wartime service and to members of the U.S. military for support of operations in Vietnam).

Chris was a proud lifetime member of Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW Post 6972) and the American Legion (Post 0205).

After his honorable discharge, Chris returned to the United States and applied his many diverse skills and talents throughout his professional lifetime. His occupations included Certified Accident Investigator, Karate Instructor, Manager of Safety and Maintenance at Oliver Trucking Company, Professional Driver and Driver Examiner.

In his private life, he pursued many interests, including race car driving, acquiring his private pilot's license, and achieving three black belts in various karate disciplines.

Chris was born in Indianapolis, Indiana to Cosby Lee Smith and Ruth Ellen (nee Bensheimer) and was a step-son of Jack Spurlin. Although he grew up in many locations as a "military brat", his primary residence was in Indiana prior to his retirement. # **Clay firms selected for JTA Bay Street Innovation Corridor project**

CLAY COUNTY – Two Clay County firms have been selected to design, build, operate and maintain the Jacksonville Transportation Authority Bay Street Innovation Corridor project.

Balfour Beatty Construction of Orange Park and WGI Engineering of Fleming Island are two Clay County firms collectively referred to as the Vision 2 Realty Team that was selected. The project will make Jacksonville a "smarter" city with a full conversion of the current Skyway monorail-like infrastructure to an autonomous system. It's currently 2.5 miles of Skyway, but when complete, the Ultimate Urban Circulator autonomous project will stretch to 10 miles. The Ultimate Urban Circulator, referred to as U2C by JTA, is just one of multiple projects Balfour Beatty and WGI are involved in within the greater North-east Florida area.

"This award represents a major milestone for the U2C, the JTA and downtown Jacksonville," JTA CEO Nathaniel P. Ford, Sr., said. "We are confident the Balfour Beatty team and its partners will deliver a world-class project on behalf of the taxpayers of Jacksonville, placing our community at the forefront of innovation."

WGI vice president Walter Kloss agreed, citing it is one of the largest transportation-based shuttle projects happening in America. He said it will be a gamechanger for JTA and Jacksonville, and he hopes to see it inspire Clay County to build some-

### thing similar.

WGI is currently assisting Clay County with its \$129 million bond project, providing the managerial and experience Clay County's staff might not have, but need a project like this. Kloss said they're assisting Clay County in management and acquisition, the development of criteria packages, and construction engineering and inspection. WGI has also been working on the \$150 million Interstate 10 design and build project, too.

Kloss said landing the U2C project

goes back years. When JTA announced the project and asked for project pitches and bids, WGI and Balfour Beatty teamed up to create a "super team" of companies that would bring this autonomous transportation line to life.

"We formed this super team with Balfour Beatty, another Clay County firm, Superior Construction, Miller Electric, and Beep...and together, we went through the procurement process and were ultimately selected by JTA to do this design," Kloss said. "It's called a progressive design-build which means we'll design it, build it, operate and maintain it."

Kloss said this first-of-its-kind project will further push Jacksonville to be a smart city that promotes technology and innovation and he's honored that WGI is the lead design firm on this project.

"I know our staff as well as myself is very excited to work on this project and we're very excited to be a part of this team," Kloss said. "I mean, Balfour Beatty is a best-in-class firm. It's awesome to work with them."

The teams involved will work for about a year on the design of the project in coordination with JTA based on their specifications and needs. He said "they want an iPhone, not a Blackberry," referring to how Blackberry cell phones went out of style while iPhones are seemingly timeless. Kloss said the design needs to be something that's attractive and appealing for years to come, but also something that allows for future change. And it can't go out of style, much like the Blackberry did.

"We are honored to be selected by Jacksonville Transportation Authority to construct another successful project for the Jacksonville community," Balfour Beatty's senior vice president, John Harris, said. "To be a part of the Ultimate Urban Circulator program is an opportunity of a lifetime, and we look forward to remaining a relentless ally to our client, our partners and the community as we work to provide an innovative and revolutionary transportation network for the future of Jacksonville."

he Normal School once took up an entire block of Orange Park. It stood where the town hall now stands and covered about 10 acres.

What made the Normal School special was its students. The school taught both white and Blacks together, in the same classroom, with the same teachers. This was unacceptable to the segregationist William Sheats, the Superintendent of Public Education for Florida. He was going to make sure he rid Florida of that "vile nest of fanatics" as he called the school and its supporters.

Reconstruction had ended and in Florida, Democrats ruled. This meant black Floridians had fewer rights and a series of Jim Crow laws were put on the books. In 1888, the American Missionary Association opened the Orange Park school. AMA was a Protestant-based abolitionist group founded on September 3, 1846, in Albany, New York. The main purpose of this organization was to abolish slavery, to educate African Americans and other minorities, to promote racial equality, and to promote Christian values.

Originally, the school was to teach only black children but the fine quality of the education received there brought white children to the school. Children there received lessons in both the trades and in classical studies of languages, grammar, biology, mathematics, Latin, bible, American literature, history, bookkeeping, physics, English, geography, government and pedagogy (recitation, review studies and practice teaching). Trades were taught in sewing, woodworking, bookkeeping, cooking and other practical lessons. In addition, there was music, piano being at the forefront.

The students were able to live on cam-

pus. There was family life for the children outside of school hours, and there was church every Sunday. It was just a good school and ahead of its time in race relations.

Despite the Florida constitution requiring universal education Sheats wanted to create a law forbidding the teaching of white and Black people together in any way, place or time. In May of 1895, Sheats goal was realized with the enactment of a law making it illegal for any "individual, body of individuals, corporation or association to conduct within this state any school of any grade, public, private or parochial wherein white persons and negroes shall be instructed or boarded within the same building, or taught in the same class, or at the same time by the same teachers. "

Sheats wrote to a friend, "I want the AMA to keep hands-off in Florida." Sheats got wind that the Orange Park Normal School has white teachers teaching Black students. He investigates further discovering that both races of students are taught together, live in the same dorms and even go to church together.

Indictments were handed down on April 6, 1896. Assigned the unpleasant task to going to arrest the teachers and headmaster, Sheriff James Elam Weeks was

reluctant but did, as he had to do. He was arrested, B.D. Rowlee, principal, Edith Robinson, Helen S. Loveland, A. Margaret Ball, T.S. Perry, and O.S. Dickson. All were

from either New York, Massachusetts, or Connecticut except Ms. Ball who was an Orange Park native. He carted them down

ahead of the teen.

"We've known about this since he was born. We knew one day it was coming," Candice said. "Now we know he has his second chance. Things are going good. It's also the most trying and the toughest time, watching him go through so much pain and so much physical aching. You know it's for a good cause, but you can't help but want to take the pain away.

There wasn't an alternative. We knew he had to have it, but we thought it would be when he was in his late teens or early 20s. We're a big Children's Miracle Network ambassador family and Sage has always shared his story. One thing he always

said was when he was in his late teens or early 20s, he would have to have a heart transplant. In the background, he knew it was in the future. That's still far away. It wasn't as far away as we thought. It still kind of took us by surprise."

Dr. Frederick J. Fricker, who specializes in pediatric cardiology at UF Health, promised to give Sage a puppy after surgery. He made good on that in mid-July with a golden retriever named Ruby.

The next milestone for Sage will come when he's allowed to leave his house and when visitors are allowed to see the miracle of his recovery for themselves.

And if the threat of COVID-19 subsides. he will be allowed to return to Keystone Heights Junior High in February.

"I want to go back to school," he said.

"If it was up to me, I think I'm good now to go back to school. I understand that I'm not. They tell me I'm not ready for that, but I'm ready. When it does happen, I'll be ready for it."

Sage also knows there is a community to thank. Hundreds watched his progress on his Facebook page, SageStrong. Many of those followers came to Melrose Heritage Park on July 31 to raise money and awareness. The event quickly turned into a celebration as everyone learned of the successful transplant hours earlier.

"It definitely made me fight harder, knowing there was a lot of people behind my back," Sage said. "It helped me through the hospital."

Sage also received some military patches as a lucky charm from a soldier who returned safely from deployment.

Now it's up to him to keep improving, even if it's one heartbeat at a time.

## **70 Doctors Lake residents to move** from septic tanks to sewage systems

ORANGE PARK – A septic-to-sewer project that will drastically increase the health of Doctors Lake by decreasing the number of algae blooms in the lake has officially begun.

About 70 homeowners will be removed from their current septic tank systems and brought onboard to Clay County Utility Authority's main sewage system. The project is due to be complete by the first half of 2022.

The kickoff took place on Thursday, Sept. 9, on the banks of Doctors Lake and it brought together politicians, engineers, project executives and residents to celebrate what will be happening at the Doctors Lake community.

"The genesis of all this goes back years," said former state senator Rob Bradley and current vice-chair of the St. Johns River Water Management District Board. "CCUA, Clay County, and the district decided that one of the last big algae blooms we had was a warning sign. This is a complicated issue and there are multifaceted reasons for why this occurs."

The septic tanks that fail to provide nutrients to the water of Doctors Lake and

the greater St. Johns River create intense algae blooms. Those blooms destroy precious ecosystems. County manager Howard Wanamaker said with water being the lifeblood of Clay County, it's critical that the water be returned to a healthier, nonbloom-filled state.

Bradley said the septic-to-sewer project is one of the big aspects in the fight against algae blooms. The new Fleming Island wastewater treatment facilities are another aspect of that, and there are plenty more projects happening to fight back against algae bloom.

Bradley, former state representative Travis Cummings, and Rep. Bobby Payne (R-Palatka) helped secure \$1.5 million in state funding for the county, and about \$1.2 million of it will essentially go directly to Doctors Lake residents. That's because 70 of 77 lots on six different streets in the community will receive the funding to take them off of a septic tank system and onto CCUA's central sewage system.

CCUA said it's still working to get the other lots on board with the project. CCUA communications Celeste Goldberg said it's not that the seven lots are necessarily not on board — some haven't responded, some are on military deployment or just away,

but there are some who simply don't want to switch to sewage. One person just replaced their septic tank last year, Goldberg said and that homeowner didn't want the replacement to be a wasted cost.

She said in some instances, the cost allotted to each lot for the septic-to-sewer project might not be enough and in those cases, the homeowner would need to cover the rest of the cost. Goldberg is confident that cost won't be extreme, though and manageable for those that truly want to get off of septic and onto a sewage system.

This Doctors Lake community is one of more than 100 projects around the state to protect water health. A lot of the funding stems from Senate Bill 712, otherwise known as the Clean Waterways Bill, signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis. That bill provided the funding that Bradley, Cummings and Payne fought for in delegation in Tallahassee. Bradlev said his wife. Sen. Jennifer Bradley (R-Fleming Island), and representative Sam Garrison (R-Fleming Island] are continuing the fight today.

'The competition for water quality money is fierce," Garrison said. "Everyone [in Congress], Republicans and Democrats, are fighting for funding for their water and for us to get...this funding is great. When the St. Johns River is sick, Clay County is sick and that's why this project is important.'

Construction for the project will begin on Oct. 1 and completion is tentatively set for April 2022, although with COVID-19 and other external factors, it could take longer. Project engineers say "first half of 2022" is a safe bet.

specializes in schools, has seen the growth firsthand. More students attending schools lead to more necessary renovations and expansions. As the county grows, more schools will have to be built.



In Middleburg, as more companies and restaurants thrive – which is a benchmark for growth – other potential businesses consider where to open first or second locations.



The Clay County School Board approved its final 2021-22 budget with a 5-0 vote last week with a millage rate of 6.775 that's expected to bring in roughly \$97.5 million to the district's \$526.8 million budget.

# Final budget includes a slight tax decrease

New communities, increased property values will bring in an additional \$97.5 million to District

FLEMING ISLAND - As the school year begins to ramp up, the school board has officially adopted its 2021-22 budget.

The board officially passed its budget during a meeting held on Thursday, Sept. 9, and it adopted the 2021-22 resolution and all rates with a 5-0 vote. The millage rate approved was lower than last year's rate of 6.889. But as residents move to the county and new homes are built, property values increased. The lower rate means taxes will decrease by about \$11.

"At 6.775, the taxpayer [would] experience a reduction of \$11.40," Asst. Superintendent for Business Affairs Susan Legutko said. "Because property value went up, though, there's a tax increase. The rollback rate is 6.6096...which is a difference of .6154."

The roll-back rate is the rate the millage would need to be rolled back to in order to keep taxes paid by taxpayers exactly the same as the previous year. Because

property values went up, keeping the same millage of last year would still result in a tax increase. In order to negate that tax increase, a millage of 6.6096 would need to be adopted. The Clay County school board didn't drop the millage rate to the rolledback rate but it did decide on a slightly reduced rate.

The new rate will break down like this: the Required Local Effort millage rate is 3.527 and it will bring in \$50,766,730; the Basic Discretionary millage rate is .748 and it will bring in \$10,766,519; the Capital Outlay millage rate is 1.5 and it will bring in \$21,590,614; and, the Additional Voted Millage, which was the additional one-mill increase voted in by voters, is set at a millage rate of one and it will bring in \$14,393,742.

Elsewhere in the budget, Legutko said there was about a \$6.4 million change from the tentative budget to the final budget approved last week. The tentative budget was \$520,446,656 after all the taxes brought in from millage, but the final bud-

get approved was \$526,803,319. The difference comes from small increases to the general fund budget, the special revenue fund budget, the debt service budget and the capital projects budget.

The half-cent sales tax recently voted in by citizens is on track to bring in the expected \$14 million, as it was advertised, and so far, the school district has received \$7.2 million. The money is being used for

the millions needed to fix various maintenance projects like air conditioning in schools, roofs and facility repairs.

"I just want to give a shoutout to Dr. Legutko and her team, who did an excellent job," Superintendent David Broskie said. "I feel really confident that we're good stewards of the taxpayers' funds...and that's really important."

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
### **Check it out: September is National Library Card sign-up month**

CLAY COUNTY – The public library system is so much more than a collection of buildings full of books and librarians hushing you. They are vibrant community spaces and offer a wealth of resources that are all accessible with a library card.

The Department of Education and the American Library Association have selected September National Library Card Sign-Up month in honor of schools reopening. Clay County Headquarters Library Director Karen Walker wants to shed some light on what exactly the library system offers, and why you should take part in a service you already pay for.

The library system comprises six different libraries across the county, which are accessible with only one card. That means, if you request a book from one library, you can pick it up at the library closest to you. In the pandemic, the library shifted many of its services to be contactless or self-service. All county libraries continue to offer that option with the kiosk locker system. With a library card, you can request material such as books, DVDs, CDs and magazines. They then placed these in



a locker for you to pick up at your leisure, even when the library itself is closed. If you prefer to go inside and browse the library's collection inside, feel free. The library system also offers self-checkout kiosks where you check out without having to speak to a librarian at the reference desk.

These traditional forms of media are not the only things you can access with the library. The Clay library system also offers free Wi-Fi throughout the library and its parking lots 24 hours a day. Mobile Wi-Fi smart spots are also available to check out for two weeks for those that need a reliable internet connection. The libraries also have Chromebooks available for anyone needing to complete work for school or business. If you're looking for a quiet place to get some work done or meet with your club, meeting and study rooms are always available for reservation.

Students looking for help to research school projects or better understanding their classes can access the library collection of databases. ScienceFlix offers STEM education and project ideas. SalemPress provides hundreds of articles on health, psychology, and diseases. There are more than 60 databases alone in the Florida Electronic Library on many subjects where articles include citations that easily fit into a bibliography.

The county library system deliberately stocks multiple copies of summer reading list books. You can often find most of the books used in the classroom.

For those looking for entertainment amid the ongoing pandemic, the library has you covered. They have expanded many of their programs for children and adults. To name a few, they offer arts and crafts sessions, take-home projects, and story times. There's even a pre-made book club meeting in a bag that includes reading questions and ten copies of the book.

There have been large a shift in popularity towards the internet. Many people of all ages prefer eBooks, audiobooks, and online magazines and newspapers. The library offers these through the Libby app, which is available on smartphones, laptops and tablets alike.

Beyond the physical services themselves, libraries represent the communities they serve. The Clay County libraries don't just offer books, though books are an important and cherished resource they provide. They offer tech support, help in school, and adult resources for the community. They provide safe, quiet places to work without the requirement of purchase. Though some assets at the library are available without a card, it's easy to sign up and access everything. Library cards are free for all Clay County residents. To get a card, you only need a valid Florida ID or Florida driver's license. ### the jail.

They quickly made a bond. The AMA hired top-notch Jacksonville lawyers, Horatio Bisbee and Clement Rinehart. The attorney's legal strategy was a fourpronged defense: Asserting their 6th Amendment rights to know the charges and evidence against them they filed a motion to quash the indictments as being void for vagueness and asserted that their 1st Amendments rights of freedom of religion and freedom of association was being violated. And, as the 14th Amendment applied federal rights to the states' they asserted that too.

Judge Rhydon Call heard the case. All of the charging documents and the motion to quash are available for public viewing at the Clay County Archives. Judge Call was progressive when it came to issues like the Sheats Law. He agreed with the Defense and by signing his name on the back of the motion and writing "Granted" he dashed William Sheats's dream of dismantling the Normal School. The AMA and their supporters were ecstatic. The Northern papers carried the story far and wide, just as they had when Sheats first passed his law (they were appalled.) The teachers went back to teaching.

In 1913, the Governor approved an "Act Prohibiting White Persons from Teaching Negroes in Negro Schools." This just put in place more laws against desegregated schools.

Rather than fight the law this time, the AMA chose to close its Orange Park school, which in the interim had suffered a fire (possibly arson) and reduced attendance by whites who had been scared away by all the trouble. When it closed in December of 1917 a noble experiment ended.

May 14, 1954, Chief Justice Earl Warren delivered the opinion of the Court in Brown Vs Board of Education, stating, "We conclude that in the field of public education the doctrine of 'separate but equal" has no place. Separate educational facilities are inherently unequal ..."

There is a historical marker for the school right next to Kingsley Avenue at the Orange Park Town Hall Park.

stick with her for the rest of her life.

"One of the co-defendants was the main person who took over my life, alongside drugs and alcohol," Harber said. "I let them [co-defendants Jake Harley Davison and Alexia Rae Eure] move in with me so now this is my everyday life now as far as bad habits and bad people go."

Harber soon lost her job. her car became basically unusable and she was about to lose her apartment. Everything was falling apart around her and in her lowest moment, she and the co-defendants decided to commit an armed robbery. Harber never touched the gun involved in the robbery, but she and the co-defendants beat and robbed a drug dealer of \$200 at gunpoint in her apartment. Harber turned herself in

two hours later and she was charged with a felony charge.

"I never touched the firearm but I was present...and it was in my apartment," Harber said. "All of us got the same charge. I had just turned 19 in January and by May, I had committed a felony. Within a year of graduating high school where I was a tristate athlete with As and Bs. my entire life had changed in the blink of an eye. I knew nothing about the criminal justice system and now I was guilty of a crime."

At first, Harber was told she'd likely get 12 years. What she had done truly sunk in at that point. Her bond was set at \$250,003, which means she'd have to forfeit \$25,000 to get out of the Clay County Jail.

Harber remained in jail and her mugshot was public, printed in Clay Today, too. Her teachers, fellow students, neighbors and more would know exactly what Harber had done. She received the Clay Today newspaper every week in jail and it's how

she stayed connected to Clay County, the place she called home her entire life.

Harber did not accept the 12-year charge for obvious reasons. Instead, she asked to be charged as part of Florida's Youthful Offender Program.

"In the State of Florida, it states that you are not allowed to be sentenced to over six years if you're aged 18 through 21 at the time of sentencing and if it's your first offense," Harber said. "I accepted my charge as a Youthful Offender charge ... but part of that agreement was that my felony would remain on my record for the rest of my life. I received two years of prison time and four years on probation."

Harber said she knew that felony would affect her, but just how much wouldn't be realized until she was released. She believes she got her charge down to two years of prison time and four years of probation due to her plea.

"I spent weeks working on my plea, I was actually the last one to be sentenced," Harber said. "I had teachers from Orange Park High School writing recommendation letters for me and I think that and my actual plea helped. I wrote a letter and read it to the judge in court. When you plea out, you're guilty, and I told the judge that I was guilty and that I deserved to be punished. I emphasized that I was around the wrong crowd but that despite that. I was still my own person and I still had the power to do something different that day and didn't. I told him, "I just hope you hear me out and don't punish me for as long as I can be punished.'

The judge sentenced her to two years in prison and four years of probation. She got out of prison almost a year early, though, and all thanks to Lowell Correctional In-

### Orange Park man gets 15 years for selling child porn online

JACKSONVILLE – U.S. District Judge Marcia Morales Howard has sentenced Antony Eugene Woody, 33, of Orange Park, to 15 years in federal prison for advertising images depicting the sexual abuse and

torture of children for sale using the internet. Woody was also ordered to serve a six-year term of supervised release, to register as a sex offender and to pay a fine of \$995. Woody has been in custody since his arrest on March 22, 2019.

Woody had pleaded guilty on May 14, 2021.

According to court documents, in February 2019, the FBI discovered that an online user named "imsoofreakyy" was using a particular social media application to offer child sex abuse images for sale on the internet. Meanwhile, the Clay County Sheriff's Office received a Cybertip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that the same user ("imsoofreakyy") was using a particular email address to advertise images of children being sexually assaulted. CCSO detectives were able to identify this individual as Antony Eugene Woody who resided in Orange Park.

On March 22, 2019, CCSO officers and FBI agents executed a search warrant at Woody's residence and later made contact with Woody at a local supermarket. During an interview, Woody admitted that he downloaded child sex abuse images from the internet, labeled these images with titles, prices, and his online contact information, and then re-posted them for sale using a social media app. Woody also admitted that online customers responded to his advertisements, that he received money for these sales using the Venmo app, and that he had defrauded some of these customers by taking their money but refusing to send them the contraband images that they had purchased. Woody received at least \$995 in profits from these sales.

A search of Woody's cellphone revealed

33 videos and 40 images depicting the sexual abuse of young children. Two of these images bore advertising language that was created and placed on them by Woody.

The case was investigated by the Clay County Sheriff's Office, the Westbrook, Maine, Police Department, the Broward County Sheriff's Office, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Boston and Jacksonville, with assistance from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. It was prosecuted by Asst. U.S. Attorney D. Rodney Brown.

This is another case brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse. Led by the United States Attorneys' Offices and the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who sexually exploit children, and to identify and rescue victims. ### Fleming Island teen arrested for hosting ruckus house party

FLEMING ISLAND – An 18-year-old man was arrested after Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies broke up a party on Brighton Bluff Court and found underaged

children drinking alcohol and smoking marijuana.

Warren Robert Chase, of Fleming Island, was charged on Sept. 11 with allowing minors to consume alcohol and drugs in an open house party and re-

nouse party and resisting arrest. CCSO Warren Chase

was called to the house for a noise complaint where between 25 and 30 were at a party. They asked Chase to break up the gathering and told the revelers to go home. According to the arrest report, deputies were called back after the party continued. They found open containers of alcohol and "burnt marijuana joints" on a coffee table. They also observed a 19-year-old man passed out in a neighbor's yard.

When deputies tried to talk to Chase, he attempted to run, but he was quickly captured.

Chase was released from the Clay County Jail after posting a \$1,502 bond.

### Will people get back to work now that **CARES Act benefits have expired?**

CLAY COUNTY - Three pandemic-era unemployment benefits established by a 2020 CARES Act have expired and it could affect the state's current labor shortage, according to some experts.

The benefits which have expired are Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, which covers people not usually eligible for financial aid; Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, which provides aid to

those who have already used up all of their aid from the state; and, and Federal Unemployment Compensation, which was additional aid tacked onto other funding aid to help people recover money lost due to CO-VID-19. Some feel these benefits have kept workers out of the workforce. Many now feel those workers will feel more motivated to return to the workforce, thus putting an end, or at least provide some relief, to the state's current labor shortage.

Others, though, argue that the labor shortage is less a result of unemployment benefits and more the result of workers wanting better wages and not accepting jobs with traditionally low wages. We asked Clay Today readers what they thought of all this and here's what they had to say:

"Pay a living wage of at least \$15 an hour and there will be no labor shortage,"

Susan Trumble said, suggesting wages are creating the labor shortage. Trumble said \$15 which will soon be the minimum wage in Florida in a couple of years after residents voted for the increase. With so many aware a higher minimum wage is coming. perhaps they feel that \$15 is what they should be earning now. On the other side of the conversation, Bev Biroschik said that "if you have to pay \$15 an hour for a \$7 an hour job, there will be a labor shortage," and they believe once benefits end, more people will return to work.

"I see plenty of places hiring [so] I wouldn't call it a labor shortage," Christopher Marra said. "I'd call it a willingness to work shortage.'

Penny Ruller said essential workers and have been working throughout the CO-VID-19 pandemic. She said people simply September 16, 2021 • CLAY TODAY 21

need to get up and get back to their old jobs. She said some believe the pandemic is over. Vishi Garaig and Kali Carnes responded and said they would "hope" the labor shortage comes to an end now that unemployment benefits are coming to an end. Doug Deters responded and said he knows that the school district desperately needs bus drivers and support staff and they encourage anyone who now needs a job to apply for one of those jobs.

# BASCA 5K to be back on track with fund-raising run on Sept. 25

ORANGE PARK - The BASCA Cape Abilities 5K run is back this year after going virtual in 2020. BASCA's 5K fundraiser has been around for nearly a decade but due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it had to be held virtually last year. While a virtual option is still available, an in-person 5K and onemile run is scheduled for Sept. 25 at 8:30 a.m. to raise money for the organization.

"It funds our many programs," said BASCA representative Pam Mylrea. "What we're looking at right now is supportive employment for individuals who want a job ... so we're raising funds for that. That program is already in place here. We're just enhancing what we offer.

BASCA is a Clay County 501(c)3 charity organization located in the heart of Orange Park whose mission is to provide better living, working, educational, social

and recreational opportunities for children and adults with special needs. The BASCA 5K was started nine years ago to help fund all that BASCA does for the Clay County community, according to Mylrea. It was a small and simple fundraiser when it was first started, more aimed at getting people outside and exercising than a full-blown fundraiser. Thanks to the local community's support, however, the fundraiser has grown to be much larger.

This year's 5K will be a smaller version compared to 2019. There will be food, games and more for both participants and those on the sidelines cheering on the runners as they pass by. Food has been donated by Dairy Queen and the Urban Bean Coffeehouse Café in Orange Park.

The Jacksonville Jaguar Foundation is this year's title sponsor and Mylrea said BASCA is expecting Jaxson 'de Ville and cheerleaders from the team's ROAR squad to be at the event. While not required,

BASCA encourages runners to register online before the event at www.bascainc.org Registration will be opening up for in-person runners at 8 a.m. the day of the races.

BASCA encourages everyone to wear a cape or even a full-on superhero costume in support of the 5K's "Cape Abilities" theme.

We started in 2018 with capes and it took off," Mylrea said. "It's called 'Cape Abilities' and it's about how everyone has different capabilities. People of all unique abilities can do things and they can be members of the Orange Park and Clay County community. That's what this is about.

The race will begin in front of the BAS-CA office in Orange Park and this year's races will feature something new: BASCA buddies. BASCA has rounded up Orange Park Police Department officers, Orange Park Fire Department responders, VyStar employees and more to act as BASCA buddies. If someone would like a BASCA buddy, that buddy will run or walk the entire race with them. Mylrea said this is another way to highlight that everyone is a part of this community and that everyone wants to support each other.

The cost for the 5K is \$35 and \$10 for the one-mile run. If someone registers for the 5K, they get a unique finisher medal and a t-shirt. A different medal and t-shirt come with the one-mile run as well and anyone who places in the 5K will get a "special and unique medal made by those who attend BASCA's day program.'

Anyone who registers will also be entered into a raffle for two tickets to the upcoming football game that will see the Jacksonville Jaguars face off against the Tennessee Titans.

"It's going to be a great time and we expect everything to wrap up around 11:30 a.m.," Mylrea said. "Come out and support your community however you can.'

### School board has until Dec. 31 to redraw its district boundaries

Goal is to make populations in all five districts within 10% of each other


CLAY COUNTY – The school board will be deliberating its district boundaries for the next few months before the Dec. 31 dead-line.

The board is given the opportunity to redraw its district lines every 10 years. The preliminary discussions began last Thursday, Sept. 9, during a special workshop held after the board's budget meeting held that same day. The board was presented with two options and each would change the boundaries of each district but neither would actually affect board seats.

"There's roughly 218,000 people here in Clay County," Director of safety and security James Fossa said. "This is an exciting time. This is something we get to do in our tenure every 10 years and we're just lucky to be here to see this happen. I want to show you guys the work that's been done to see how we can put the entire county... to where it's equitable for all citizens. I realize everyone's at-large for elections, but everyone here still cares about their district."

Fossa said all five districts need to be as equal – or at least within 10% of each other – in population as possible. The main goal is to divvy up the districts to 43,649 residents each.

Two options were presented to the board last week. Option 1 calls for four main changes: District 4 expands south to State Road 21, south of Old Jennings to

the Blanding Boulevard "triangle." District 1 will expand to Blanding Boulevard and Henley Road. District 2 will expand west beyond Cheswick Oaks Avenue and District 5 will expand west to State Road 21. None of the five board seats are affected by the changes.

If the first option is used, the new district populations would be: 44,751 residents in District 1; 47,273 in District 2; 41,150 in District 3; 41,717 in District 4 and 43.354 in District 5.

Option 2 included District 3 expanding northeast to include south of Old Jennings to the Blanding "triangle" with a new population of 39,811; District 1 expanding to Blanding and Henley Road and south of "There's roughly 218,000 people here in Clay County. County Road 220 to Black Creek with a new population of 46,980; District 2 expanding west beyond Cheswick Oaks Avenue with a population of 42,273; and District 5 expanding west to State Road 21 with 44,522 residents.

The school board seemed to be more in favor of Option 1, but it's taking its time until Dec. 31, which is when an official decision must be finalized.

### The Board of County Commissioners will also soon go through its own redistricting process and Fossa and board member Ashley Gilhousen suggested the school board and the BCC meet to work through redistricting together. She said there could be some confusion among residents so she'd like the new district lines to be as similar as possible.

She said she's aware it's basically impossible to make the districts match up perfectly, but she said it wouldn't hurt to meet with them to discuss possibilities. Board member Janice Kerekes pushed back against that idea and said the county board should determine its own districts and the school board should determine its own lines. Gilhousen said she recognized that, but she said it wouldn't hurt to communicate with the BCC.

Board member Tina Bullock said the school board can draw their lines and come up with new numbers. Then, if the BCC is interested in lining the districts up as best as possible it could use the school board's new districts.

"We all know the landscape is going to change so much over the next 10 years, but the question is how and when," Gilhousen said. "None of that is set in stone and I don't think we should consider that [it is]. If we can keep things as status quo as possible and keep within the law of the 10% rule...then Option 1 is probably the most palpable."

# Local man pedals happiness by refurbishing free bikes for children

Lake Area Bike created to turn junk into usable rides

MELROSE – There are bikes hanging from the ceiling, cluttered on the floor and on top of a workbench in Pete Slaymaker's tiny shop. With the exception of a radio faintly playing country music, Slaymaker works in absolute solitude. The retired engineer isn't trying to make the best of a difficult situation. He's making a difference.

Slaymaker is filling the void of losing his 35-year-old son to heart disease and knowing he and his wife Anne will never hear the playful laughter of a grandchild by turning junked bicycles into a treasured ride for a child.

There is a pile of donated bikes in front of his shop. They are in different stages of decay and neglect. Slaymaker tries to turn one a day into a shiny new ride.

"We lost our son [Zachary] in May of 2020. We were a wreck as a result. We knew we had no chance for grandkids. We were wallowing in our own pity," Slaymaker said.

The couple read a story about a man in Charlotte, North Carolina, who refurbished junked bikes to give away to local children. "That's how we decided to be connected



with kids," Slaymaker said. "Then one guy said he had a bike I could have. I fixed it up and gave it away. The next thing I knew, people were dropping off their bikes, too. I had one guy deliver a truckload of them. Another had a trailer with eight or nine of them."

Every bike is broken down to the bare frame. Most moving parts are either cleaned and inspected or replaced. Parts are pulled from several broken bikes to create a workable two-wheeler any child would be proud to ride.



Once completed, bikes are stored in a separate room adjacent to the workshop. When the room is filled, he posts a giveaway on his Facebook page. His next scheduled giveaway will be part of the Knights of Columbus' Christmas program.

"We expect to have 14 or 15 ready for Christmas," Slaymaker said. "The response has been tremendous. The best thing is, these are good-looking bikes when we're done."

The most-needed parts are wheels, seats and tires, he said. Since many of those parts have to be purchased, he fixes other bikes for the community and uses that money to keep the wheels turning on providing bikes to local children.

Slaymaker doesn't sell bikes. Repair and refurbishing keep him so busy he doesn't have time for the distractions, both in time and legal requirements. His only reward is the smile of a youngster riding away.

"I just want to help kids," he said. "This keeps me busy. It makes me happy."

Slaymaker said he soon will start converting discarded bikes into e-bikes. He said there's a growing need to install small electric motors that, along with pedaling, can help power a bike. It's the next step for a couple who still are finding ways to deal with their grief.

"I'm just a retired engineer. I needed things to tinker with," Slaymaker said.

All while pedaling happiness for area children.

got out of prison almost a year early, though, and all thanks to Lowell Correctional Institute's boot camp program. There are hundreds of boot camps in prisons for men around the United States, but very few for women. LCI was one of the few boot camps for women. Rules don't allow anyone with a felony charge to join the boot camp and initially, she was denied entrance into the program.

She worked with her attorney to ask a judge to reconsider ... and it worked. She was one of three women accepted into the boot camp out of thousands of applicants. Harber was thrilled – she desperately wanted to get into the camp because participants are not put into the prison general population. Nine percent of boot camp graduates re-offend. Thirty-three percent of the general population prisoners re-offend. Harber wanted this prison sentence to be her last, and boot camp would help make that happen.


The camp was run by one sergeant who worked full-time in the military and a few other officers who worked at the actual prison. Harber said her sergeant was a godsend and a true blessing. The other officers in charge of Harber and the two other boot camp women were not. Boot camp was from 4:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. It consisted of physical training, discipline training, and more. It's supposed to be exactly what you think of when you hear "boot camp," along with a lot of charity work with Habitat for Humanity and other nonprofits.

The night shift -7 p.m. to 7 a.m. - officers did their best to ruin the entire premise and experience of boot camp. They woke Harber and the other two women in the middle of the night and force them to do things that would later get them fired. She said they were basically forced to drink entire canteens of water, lunge up hills and roll down them until they threw that water up. Then they'd have to do it again. They were being worked late into the night and sent to bed around 3 a.m., and then back up again at 4 a.m. for the boot camp routine.

Harber and the other women knew that what was happening wasn't OK, but they didn't know what to do about it. There weren't cameras outside where the officers treated them inhumanely, so they couldn't document their proof. They felt prison is designed to make prisoners feel less than human.

"Maybe we deserved this?" Harber said. "But deep down, we knew we didn't. We were prisoners but we were still humans. This was not OK but we didn't know what to do."

The women stuck with it for two months but a torturous game of charades was the straw that broke the camel's back. Three corrupt guards made them act like walruses, or horses struck by lightning, and more. At one point, they were told to act like dogs and forced to tie one belt around another woman's neck. Then, one woman would use the belt as a leash to walk the

of life that can easily be taken for granted. She was lucky, though, because thanks to some family members that recognized Harber for who she truly was and not just as a felon, she had a job almost immediately after prison.

One day during her lunch break back in January of this year, she randomly posted a video to TikTok, one of the most popular social media services in the world. She didn't think anything of it. The reason she was going to make a quick video about her time in prison was: "just because." She posted the video and finished her day. The next day, that TikTok video had 50,000 views and 10,000 likes. She joked she felt famous at that moment. Little did she know, five months later, she'd amass a following on TikTok of more than one million followers.

"I just wanted to share my story and how it happened and then I was posting videos every day and by July, I hit one million followers," she said. "Despite what I talk about and despite being a felon, I had a massive following of people that believed in me."

Harber's TikTok growth would land her brand sponsorships. The money she makes from TikTok covers her monthly rent now. She shares videos about being a felon and a single mom. She shares videos about what goes on in prison and what happened to her during her sentence. She talks about what Florida's prison system gets wrong and how it can be changed for the better. She advocates for more women boot camps because of how "life-changing" the program was for her.

Harber talks about how hard life can be as a felon, how hard obtaining a job can be, how difficult housing can be and more. She doesn't hold back, either. All aspects of her life as both a prisoner and a felon on the outside are on the table.

"I just want to help others," Harber

said, touching on how something so negative in her life is now fueling positivity in her life. "I want more girls to be aware of the boot camp program and ... I want more girls to know that prison doesn't have to be the end of their life. There is still a life to live and I want to be proof of that."

Harber plans to get a communications degree and learn more about marketing so that she can promote herself better on TikTok and as a public speaker. Public speaking is her ultimate goal, after all. She wants to speak in schools and especially in prisons. She wants to share her story.

"There are so many obstacles to cross as a felon on the outside," Harber said. "My thinking is if you've served the time, is that not enough? If a judge says that I need to serve this much time for the crime I committed, then isn't that time enough? If more time was deserved, the judge would have sentenced it...and yet, when you get out of prison, you're still dealing with that charge...even though you served your time."

Harber said she understands how tricky that can be, especially in the realm of murders and sex-related charges. But she's unsatisfied with the blanket statement-like way criminal charges are applied to human beings.

When people pull up her record, they just see an armed robbery felony charge. They don't see that she's served the time and bettered her life. They don't see she wasn't the one with the gun. The same goes for felons around the country. She wishes there was more nuance in the conversation and tracing of criminal records. Why does a crime she served the mandated time for still need to follow her around for the rest of her life?

She's not sure of the answer, but she's using her story and her massive TikTok platform to spread awareness, support other women in positions similar to hers, and ultimately, change the landscape of criminal charges and how they follow people.

"I am more than my record," Harber said. "My issues are someone else's issues too and if sharing my story makes people feel a little bit better, or if they help people in their own situations even just a bit, then I have succeeded."

# **BCC tentatively vote to increase millage rate**

Higher taxes to give sheriff's office, fire and rescue departments much-needed revenue

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners approved a tentative budget during its Sept. 14 meeting with a millage rate higher than last year.

If approved, the county's new total millage will be 8.3406, which is higher than last year's 8.101 and 10.8% higher than the roll-back rate of 7.5232. The rollback rate is the millage rate the BCC would need to set to bring in the exact amount of taxes brought in last year. Property taxes went up so even if the BCC kept the rate at last year's 8.101, taxes would still increase. In order to prevent an increase, they would have to drop the millage rate down to 7.5232.

The BCC approved its 8.3406 tentative rate after nearly two hours of discussion. However, the rate still must win final approval at the last public hearing on Sept. 28.

Many public speakers attended Tuesday's public hearing to voice their support of the higher millage rate so that CCSO can receive the additional funding it needs to increase salaries and help attract new generations of officers.

"I am pro-first responder and I believe that their budget request is more than fair," Erik Soles said. "We need this property tax increase because these people need these resources. If you've ever needed an EMT or if someone has ever stuck a gun in your face, 10 minutes [the county's current average response time] is a long time and it feels like forever. We talk about the hardships [of a tax increase] ... but I do believe that waiting on that floor, waiting for an ambulance to get to you, is a greater hardship than any bill you might receive [as a result of a possible property tax increase]."

Sheriff Michelle Cook asked for a 12.03% increase in CCSO's budget, which equates to a total budget of \$70,098,070. This would help her raise salaries since current salaries aren't currently competitive with surrounding agencies.

"I'm currently a sergeant with CCSO," Mark Mercts said. "I've been employed in law enforcement since I was 19 and my family relocated here in 2003 to get out of Duval. Clay County is our home and there's no other place in the world where we'd rather raise our kids and reside. I'm here today as a longtime law enforcement officer, but as a longtime resident and taxpayer as well. Over the years, I've seen countless people come and go. We train them here and they leave for higher pay elsewhere. It's unfortunate."

He said that officers and first responders work so hard and so much for so little and compared to other counties, CCSO officers are grossly underpaid.

Many others spoke out during the public hearing in favor of the tax increase. Nobody spoke out against the tax increase, but commissioner Betsy Condon said she knows people in her district who are against this tax increase who are scared to say so. She said it's not because they don't support law enforcement – she said they'd support this tax increase if every bit of it went to public safety, which it's not – but they have things in District 4 that could use some government funding, including roads and internet.

Condon voted against approving the tentative budget Tuesday evening. The other four commissioners voted in favor of it. Condon reiterated a stance she's held since the beginning of 2021-22 budget discussions: she absolutely supports law enforcement and fire and rescue and she believes they need more funding. She said if the funds created by the millage increase went exclusively to those departments, she'd change her vote.

"All of the millage increase doesn't go to public safety and ... that's where my concern comes up," Condon said. "I have heard from a number of people in my district...not in support of this. I resent the insinuation that if I don't support a tax increase that I support defunding the police and nothing could be further from the truth. I don't really know how to vote on this. The entire half-mill increase is not for public safety. It's just not."


District 4 resident Jack O'Hara said he applauded Condon for speaking on the millage increase.

"I applaud Commissioner Condon for being the only one on the board striving to keep to the campaign promise that was made by all commissioners to not raise county property taxes," O'Hara said. "The board failed to adequately research alternative strategies to obtain revenue that could be used toward increasing wages within [CCSO] instead of the usual knee jerk reaction of significantly raising everyone's taxes."

The other commissioners said they support the millage increase because CCSO and Clay County Fire and Rescue would receive some much-needed funding.

"I don't support taxes in general, but I think in this case, the county needs it and I think our first responders need it and I'm going to vote for it," BCC chair Mike Cella said.

The BCC approved all budget proceedings Tuesday night with 4-1 votes, with Condon dissenting each time. The final public hearing for the adoption of the 2021-22 fiscal year budget will take place in the BCC chambers on Sept. 28.


"I don't think it would have made much of a difference against Ponte Vedra," said Prewitt. "We played tough in that one, but they were just that good."

MIDDLEBURG - In area high school volleyball action, Middleburg High's Lady Broncos had the double-edged sword of playing the top-ranked Clas 4A team in Florida, the fourth ranked team in the nation and the stress of winning the 600th game for Broncos' coach Carrie Prewitt.

Against Ponte Vedra on Thursday, the Lady Broncos got whacked 3-0 against the top-ranked Lady Sharks (10-0, 1st in the state, first in Class 6A), less than a week after taking a hike to Santa Fe High (10-2, 5th ranked in Florida, First-ranked in Class 4A)) and getting zipped there 3-0. "It's the last win that is the special one," said Prewitt, now 4-2. "I'm just honored to be a part of a program that gets kids willing to work hard to chase their dreams."

The hill stays uphill with Bishop Kenny on the docket on Thurs., Sept. 16.

At Ridgeview, in the same district as Middleburg, the Lady Panthers (4-3) got dissed by Santa Fe also; 3-0 on September 9, and will have a trip to Ponte Vedra on Tues., Sept 14 to look forward to. Ridgeview had a road win against Oakleaf early in the week after 3-0 wins over Fletcher and Clay.

Ponte Vedra offers the first of five straight massive games for coach Stephen Henry with Fleming Island, Middleburg, Leon and Bartram Trail all on the docket.

The Middleburg vs. Ridgeview showdown is a biggie for district 3-5A with the three of the top scorers in the districts; Elaina Reynolds (RHS, 67 kills), Haley Robinson (RHS, 59), Teeya Desgoutte (RHS, 55) and Connor Rahn (MHS, 43) on both sides of the net.

"It's always going to be a battle, it always is," said Henry, an assistance under Destiny Brightman for the Panthers six year district title run. "This year, we have more fire power and bigger blockers then we have in the past. We will be hard to beat. Middleburg hasn't been able to take a win from us since I've become part of the Panther program."

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# **Blue Devils flounder to Tornadoes**

STARKE - The Clay Blue Devils, coming off a 21-14 season opening win over rival Fleming Island High last week, were feeling pretty good coming into tonight's matchup against the winless Braford Tornados. Bradford opened at home against traditional powerhouse Baker County, taking a 28-18 loss. Bradford then traveled to Union County to get trounced 50-21 to start their season in a two-game hole.

Having a second week bye was not an ideal situation and may have bitten Clay.

"I told the kids; I take the loss. It's on me" said Clay Head Coach Kyle Kennard as he displayed extreme ownership. "I didn't have us ready to play. I knew it was going to be a tough game and I was thinking about it all week. I told the kids all week I was worried about it."

The concern played out as Clay could never get any momentum after a Tornado opening drive that put them up 7-0. The regularly strong Clay running game was shut down early, and untimely Clay interceptions would derail drives that could have turned the game.

"I hope they realize they cannot just put on that Clay High School Football jersey and come out and win games," said Kennard. "We have to prepare and we have to work to get ourselves back to what we know makes us successful. We will."

In the end, the Blue Devils took one on the chin as they absorbed their first loss of the season, 24-13.

After a less than stellar kickoff and a Clay penalty, Bradford started business with only half the field to cover. Bradford quarterback Amari Jones was a lightning bolt when he would tuck and run. Clay had good up-front work, but if they didn't stop Jones at the line, he and running back Manny Covey would juke and bob their way into the secondary for good yardage. At 7:20, Bradford punched in the first score to go ahead 7-0.

After the kick, the Blue Devils went to work on their own 40. Clay came out running Chris Goldstein who started having good production up the middle until Bradford adjusted. After one first down, incomplete passes and shut down runs forced a punt. Bradford was working a drive when they attempted a flea-flicker that Clay was ready for.

Clay defensive back D'maurion Frazier came down with the pass interception and Clay was back in action. The enthusiasm was tempered with a Clay holding call after the pick off, pushing Clay into their own end of the field. Clay tried runs and a pass to move the ball and were faced with third down and almost 20. A screen pass to Al'querious "Q" Ray got back half the needed yards. Facing fourth and long, too close to punt, too far for a field goal, quarterback Billy Mobley threw his first interception to kill the drive.

With the ball back just as the quarter ended, Bradford took over at their own 20, a few short runs, then a big pass out to Jeremiah Crum moved the ball into Clay territory. With a stop and a false start against Bradford, things were looking good for Clay as Bradford faced third down and 10. Jones, scrambling around to avoid a sack, found wide out Jontez Williams open, and took it to the house for a 14-0 lead.

"I give them a lot of credit," said Kennard. "They came back, made adjustments, and played their tails off. They are at home and got fired up by the crowd. They really wanted it."

Clay got on the board in the second with an aerial assault after Bradford shut down Q Ray. Mobley connected on a screen pass to get Clay first and goal, followed by a Goldstein run to put Clay on the board 14-6 at 5:48.

The point after try went wide. Bradford drove and had to settle for three points, 17-6. Clay had another attempt at



a field goal with 25 seconds left in the second, and that kick also went wide.

Turnabout is fair play

OAKLEAF- A week after Oakleaf overcame a 16 point deficit to stun Miami Carol City, Lake City Columbia rallied from 11 points down in the fourth quarter to defeat host Oakleaf 27-23 in a non-district game on September 10.

The Tigers comeback knocked Oakleaf, now 2-1, from the ranks of the unbeaten.

"There are a million woulda, coulda, shouldas," said Oakleaf head coach Frank Garis after the game. "We are going to watch the film and kick ourselves."

The Knights made their share of mistakes, but ultimately it was the failure to stop Columbia's passing game that led to defeat. Oakleaf's young secondary, which starts two freshman and a sophomore, was no match for the Columbia quarterback duo of Kade Jackson, who passed for 390 yards and two touchdowns, and backup Evan Umstead, who added 47 passing yards and one touchdown.

"Our eyes were not where they were supposed to be," said Garis. "Knowing whether you are in zone or man-to-man and whether you should be watching the quarterback or the receiver."

Columbia's Marcus Peterson, committed to the University of Cincinnati, caught 10 passes for 145 yards and two scores, while Tray Tolliver, Jace Hoskey, Keeven Young and Tony Fulton all had four receptions.

The Oakleaf secondary might have benefitted from a potent pash rush, but Oakleaf had just one sack on 48 Tigers pass attempts.

The Knights got off to a hot start, marching 67 yards in 10 plays on the game's opening possession, a drive capped by Drew Ammon's fade route to Taylor Bradshaw from 18 yards out. Ammon was four for four on the drive, which took less than three minutes.

Columbia responded with a crisp 80 yard drive culminating in a 27 yard scoring toss from Jackson to Peterson, who caught the ball despite being interfered with on the play. Rolando Dominguez was wide left on his point after attempt, leaving Oakleaf in front 7-6.

The Tigers took the lead on a nine yard run by Jaelin Brown that punctuated an 82 yard drive midway through the second quarter, but the Knights took advantage of a Columbia miscue to regain the lead at halftime. Bradshaw, who has established himself as the Knights' top receiver, finished with nine catches for 107 yards.

"He is playing really well," Garis said of his junior wideout. "He does a great job of decision-making on choice routes, and he can run by people."

A two-point conversion attempt failed when Ammon's pass intended for Rae Murray was broken up. The Knights led 13-12 at the break despite being outgained 267-152 in total offense.


Didn't happen.

Oakleaf in a 2021 12-Under team contest under the lights at the high school. "They checked him out and found the tumor at about 2:30 a.m."

The tumor, a DIPG brain tumor, is on Conner's brainstem and both the tumor and the swelling around it affect his balance, his coordination and his vision. Conner started radiation treatments in April with a six week blast of daily treatments minus the weekends that ended on May 26.

"I fall a lot and my energy is kind of day

by day," said Conner, as his former teammates gathered for hugs at the Fleming Island festival in his honor. "It doesn't hurt, but they say they can't go in and get it out."

Brittany McKay, and husband Sean, a U.S. Naval officer, noted Conner's treatments; chemotherapy and a ton of antiimmune therapy drug trial, have kept him sustaining life, but it is his affection toward his football family that is keeping his smile in tact.

For Dreadnaughts coach Michael Kenny, Conner's impact on the field and now off the field is immeasurable.

"His team was undefeated in regular season, won the conference title and made

it to round four of the national playoffs," said Kenny. "Conner was a ripped, fast and athletic defensive end that had a big motor. I play my best athletes at the defensive end position all the time and he was it. His situation made all of us recalibrate what was most important in life."

For Kenny, the impact of the diagnosis was palpable and fueled a state championship run by his 14Under team that eventually only accepted the trophy with McKay with them.

"He really inspired those guys to play to win that title for him," said Kenny. "When he went to the hospital, with COVID, we couldn't visit, but we were able to see him

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from a parking lot where he could see us and our signs. He eventually went home for two days and all the 11 unders, 12 unders and 14 unders went to the house."

Conner recalled that support.

"I love these guys," said McKay. "I really wish I could run out there, but I can't run anymore."  $\!\!\!$ 

Kenny jokingly says whenever McKay visits the practice fields, the players stop and humbly accept his presence, but that McKay is still sharp as a tack on his defensive end assignments.

"He is the guy out there asking why the defensive ends are not crashing or hustling," said Kenny. "He makes me look soft on the team because he wants his position to dominate."

Conner's stage of his 15 minutes of fame came in the playoffs last year with a gamechanging fumble recovery he had against the Titletown Valdosta team that had not given up a point for their entire season, but had to hold off a second half charge by the Dreadnaughts to win 20-6 in Lowndes County Stadium. One guy that has taken a small interest in Conner's plight is a Super Bowl quarterback who recently sent an autographed poster.

"Tom Brady heard about me and sent a poster with his autograph on it," said Conner. "He's my favorite football player. The defensive end at the Jaguars, Adam Gotsis, also sent his cleats signed and that was cool."

For now, Conner is enjoying his energy with visits to the Dreadnaughts football games for as long as he has energy.

"This is my other family," said Conner. "I will keep coming to watch as long as I can."

Conner is also enjoying a Santa Cruz 5010 bicycle he got in April.

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

strength of schedule rating at 12.5 with Mosley second at 12.0. Ridgeview is at 6.8.



player of her time and played college and international ball. She was an All American at the University of Florida. That 1996 team was ranked first in state, but we lost in regions."

Prewitt recalled some past players including Becca Alford, sprawling all out across the court to set Mann up for scoring kills; Courtney Veasey, an All American libero at Florida Southern, who had so much explosive energy that infused the team; Jessica Burkhart who, at times, was carried off the court for expending so much energy and Jenna Erwin knocking over chairs and making the dig then getting back on the court.

Though Middleburg has had their deep playoff runs in the past with two state title runnerup finishes and four Final Fours, Prewitt is unphased about the elusive state title.

"It's more about the journey then the wins and losses," said Prewitt, 60. "It's






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#### Swartz scorches Warren Golf Tourney
