GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Florida residents will be able to pre-register for a randomly assigned 30-minute adoption time slot for the upcoming Clay County Adoption event to be scheduled soon at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

Anyone interested in adopting any of the 266 animals seized during a raid at an Orange Park home at this event must preregister at https://www.claycountygov.com/ community/emergency-management and submit an application at Alert.ClayCounty-Gov.com. The registration portal will have information on pricing and the adoption process, and a link to pre-register.

Pre-registration runs through Friday,

CAMP BLANDING – Residents, veterans and their families will have a variety of options to honor the people who've served in the military on Thursday, Nov. 11.

One of the largest celebrations will be at the Camp Blanding Museum. Starting with a short ceremony at 11 a.m., Family Day will last until 2 p.m. A limited number of free T-shirts will be given away to the first 100 veterans, and lunch will be sold at "World War II prices."

The museum has displays of uniforms, weapons, equipment, vehicles and aircraft going back to when the camp to the 1940s when it was home to more than 800,000 troops during World War II. Also included are displays from the Korean and Vietnam wars, Desert

Former Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels will face a jury of his peers on Dec. 13, a St. Johns County judge said Tuesday.

Daniels was arrested on Aug. 13, 2020, after deputies said he ordered the Clay County Sheriff's Office to arrest a woman three months earlier on May 6 for stalking him three months earlier. Daniels later admitted he had a longstanding extramarital affair with the woman, former Jacksonville Sheriff's Office jailer Cierra Smith.

A Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigation revealed Daniels asked the agency's information technology

County commissioners want feedback on redistricting

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Following the 2020 U.S. census where Clay County counted an additional 27,000 people from 2010, the Board of County Commission-

ers have to approve redrawn voting districts.

The county approved a map. dubbed "5b," which mirrors a Clay Countv School District map that is currently being considered. There was initially a Howard Wannamaker map, "3a," which followed the BCC's cur-

rent voting map. The BCC version was approved at the Oct. $\mathbf{26}$ meeting.

State law requires each district to be as equal in population as pos-Commission sible boundaries must be redrawn in an oddnumbered year.

"We feel that these are the best maps we can put forth," Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle said.

Nagle said county staff will take two weeks' worth of comments to the Nov. 9 regular meeting where commissioners can adopt it. The county can read the legal description of the map at the commissioners' Nov. 23 meeting and finalize it. The deadline is Dec. 31.

County Manager Howard Wanamaker said it would be worthwhile for the pub-

lic and the board to know how much work went into the maps by Nagle and county staff. Wanamaker said the county had discussions with the school district.

"This is very complicated and I think other entities in the county have weighed in." Wanamaker said.

Commissioner Jim Renninger said he'd welcome other ideas for redistricting, but the requirements are strict.

"It has to be in compliance with regulations," Renninger said.

Chairman Mike Cella added that the county has been eyeing having a similar voting district to the school district.

"That's the only map they're going to show," Cella said. "If we show the same map, that gets us one step closer to getting consolidated districts, which is what we started out to try to do."

Commissioner Betsy Condon wanted the BCC to form a consensus for "5b," which commissioners did. She said the school district may receive public comment this week and the organization wasn't slowing down its process.

"I think getting contiguous districts is important for not getting accused of gerrymandering and those kinds of things," Condon said. District 1 will now have the entirety of Fleming Island instead of District 3 having an eastern portion. The largest change from the current map is moving Green Cove Springs to District 5, away from District 1. District 5 is in the center of the county and contains Lake Asbury and its commissioner is Kristen Burke.

"I like Green Cove so I'm OK with it," Burke said.

Orange Park town council members and staff set a path to allocating \$4.4 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds at Tuesday night's council meeting.

Orange Park narrows targets for \$4.4 million in ARPA funds

ORANGE PARK – The town has decisions to make with its more than \$4 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds, but it developed a plan for allocating the money at Tuesday night's council meeting.

The town is set to receive \$4,419,533 in federal disaster relief funds for a variety of areas such as COVID-related pay, infrastructure or to offset town revenues impacted by the pandemic. The town has until Dec. 31, 2024, to obligate the funds and a Dec. 31, 2026 deadline to spend it.

Council members gave a shortlist of priority items including the following: rental and utility assistance for residents, improvements at T.C. Miller Park & Community Center, stormwater fixes, food assistance and parking lot improvements for nonprofit Clothes Closet, COV-ID pay for employees and broadband and Orange Park Town Hall improvements.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell will present costs of the items at a future meeting, where council members can formally approve where the \$4.4 million goes

Council member Alan Watt referred to ARPA as a separate Capital Improvement Plan with strict requirements. Mayor

Randy Anderson focused on assistance to Clothes Closet and to residents. He said the town didn't have to spend the money all at once, but he didn't want it sitting around too long.

"I think we need to look at how we can help our residents," Anderson said.

The town recently conducted a survey that garnered 137 responses. Infrastructure improvements received the most favorable responses, but residents also approved of assistance for those in need, pay for essential workers, public health needs and funds to offset negative economic impacts.

Councilman John Hauber said the town has been playing catchup for years on stormwater infrastructure. He supported improvements to T.C. Miller Park & Community Center and allocated money toward the public safety fields.

"There are some things our fire and police [departments] definitely need," Hauber said. "It's more to reduce liability on the town."

Vice-mayor Eddie Henley said the area has poverty that must be addressed. He said some homes have significant decay and he didn't know if they had utilities

"We don't have to go very far to get to extreme poverty," Henley said.

Florida's COVID rate now the lowest in the country

VID-19 cases in the past week, according to the latest report from the Florida Department of Health.

By federal counts — which are slightly different from Florida's tabulations but still in the same ballpark — the Sunshine State's most recent tally of newly-confirmed cases now gives Florida the lowest per capita rate of new cases in the country.

Florida's 12,115 seven-day case tally in the federal report works out to a rate of 56 new COVID-19 cases per 100,000 residents, better than all the other 49 states.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data, as reported in the COVID-19 Community Profile Report, covers a week that is one day behind the week that the Florida Department of Health says in its Friday announcements. However, the federal data, which covers the week through Wednesday, can compare states, as the CDC compiles similar data from all states.

With a rate of 64 new cases per 100,000 people, Hawaii posted the nation's second-lowest per capita rate of new cases for the week ending Wednesday. Connecticut was next-best, with 66 new cases per 100,000, according to the CDC data.

Nonetheless, Florida's summer surge, which ran from late July through early September, remains deadly, as Florida continues to tabulate COVID-19 deaths at a rate higher than other states. Many of those deaths are for reports that occurred weeks earlier but are only now clearing the bureaucracy. Others are for Florida's sickest patients, who lingered in hospitals from Florida's worst days until recently dying.

At its worst, the delta variant-driven summer surge was infecting more than 150,000 Floridians a week in early- and mid-August. More than 2,000 Floridians were added to the state's death count each week in early- and mid-September. Those were the worst periods Florida has experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic, and during those times, Florida had the worst case and death rates in the nation.

Florida's case numbers have plummeted more than 90% since then. Florida's death toll has fallen too, but not nearly as much.

Florida added 867 COVID-19 deaths to its count in the week through Thursday, Oct. 28, according to the latest COVID-19

Snooze button and sinkerballs: World Series needs to wake up

or most of my working career, I believed it was far better to be coming in at 4 a.m. than going out. Age changed all that.

I can't remember the last time I was

still awake for the 11 o'clock news. Judging by the declining ratings for

clining ratings for the World Series, I'm not the only one. Despite be-

ing a tomahawkchopping Atlanta Braves fan, I've been forced to

been forced to Don Coble wait until the

next morning to find out how they fared against the Houston Trashstros.

The games start too late, they're too slow and they last too long. And too many fans just like me have chosen sleep over the prospect of watching a Freddie Freeman home run.

Game 1 was mind-numbing. Root canal mind-numbing. The first pitch came at 8:09 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 26. Although there weren't any extra innings, it ended with a Braves 6-2 victory at 12:17 a.m. on Wednesday. That's 4 hours, 6 minutes – or half a night's sleep.

Games 2, which Houston won 7-2, ended at 11:20 p.m. Game 3, a 2-0 Atlanta win, ended at 11:36. The final pitch for Game 4 was at 11:57 p.m. with the Braves winning 3-2. And Game 5 Sunday night, won 9-5 by the Astros, 12:15 a.m. on Monday.

Tuesday's game ended at 11:36 p.m., 90 minutes after I turned out the lights. Postseason games this year have averaged more than a half-hour longer than regular-season games. In the Eastern Time Zone, where 47.6% of the country lives, night games during the season generally started at 7:08 p.m. Starting times for World Series games were set at 8:08 p.m.

That's why television ratings are dropping like a Max Fried sinkerball. There are too many of us who simply can't stay up that long, especially if we have to go to work the next morning.

I get the fact my age plays a role in my crankiness. But what Major League Baseball doesn't understand is latestarting games – and extended commercial breaks – also eliminate younger fans because they have to go to school the next morning. Twice this Series, that means the same morning. Those children are the game's future customers.

Fox Sports paid \$5.1 billion for the broadcasting rights to the All-Star game and World Series for five years. That contract expires after the final out this year, but Fox was given 2 minutes, 55 seconds between half-innings and during pitching changes to sell ads. That's an hour of non-baseball – and a lot of Shaquille O'Neal commercials.

One way to speed up a game is to put pitchers on the clock. MLB tried out a 15-second clock in one of its Class A leagues last season and the average game times by more than 20 minutes. A single pitch shouldn't last as long as an oil change.

Change is inevitable. I can remember sitting in the classroom with a transistor radio and an earphone listening to day-

Weekly Situation Report released late Friday by the Florida Department of Health.

That's down from the previous week's total of 944 newly-recorded deaths. The new report documents the sixth consecutive week that Florida's tally of additional COVID-19 deaths was lower than the last week. Yet the latest 8% decline in new cases was something of a leveling off, compared with 20% declines seen in many previous weeks.

Florida's case numbers have plummeted more than 90% since then. Florida's death toll has fallen too, but not nearly as much.

Florida's most recent weekly death toll was the second-highest in the country for the week.

Texas had 1,172 COVID-19 deaths newly recorded, according to the CDC's report. California was third, with 702 newly-recorded deaths; Georgia, fourth, with 616; and Ohio, fifth, with 548.







Shield/Desert Storm and the Global War on Terror.

All Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and Space Force veterans are encouraged to attend, especially those from the National Guard who've trained at Camp Blanding.

The 73,000-acre base is an iconic fixture in Northeast Florida, and particularly for Clay County. According to the camp, in 1940, as the threat of war increased and the U.S. Army was built up, Camp Blanding became a federal facility housing two infantry divisions plus auxiliary units.

Between 1940 and 1943, nine U.S. Army infantry divisions trained at Camp Blanding. In 1943, it became an Infantry Replacement Center, training soldiers to be sent to existing infantry divisions as replacements, providing a high percentage of the replacements sent to Army combat units. The base was a holding center for 343 Japanese, German and Italian immigrant residents of the United States.

At one point during World War 11, the camp contained the population of the fourth-largest city in Florida. It had 10,000 buildings, 125 miles of paved roads and the largest hospital in the state. It was one of the largest training bases in the country.

Originally known as Armistice Day, Veteran's Day is a federal holiday in the United States for honoring military veterans, who are people who have served in the United States Armed Forces who were honorably discharged. It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I.

There are other Veterans' Day programs planned around the county.

The Keystone Heights Memorial Gardens will host a ceremony at 11 a.m., while Orange Park will host a program at Magnolia Cemetery at 11 a.m.

VFW Post 1988 in Green Cove Springs will honor its veterans at 2 p.m.



Property Appraiser to conduct exemptions audit

CLAY COUNTY – Property Appraiser, Tracy S. Drake, has partnered with TrueRoll, an independent research firm, to conduct an audit of the county's 55,000 existing ad valorem property tax exemptions

Although the property appraiser's office has the ability and capacity to investigate cases of exemptions fraud or ineligibility, a systemic review is not plausible. TrueRoll, who performed a

similar audit in St. Johns County, has the analytic expertise to provide a complete review of all existing exemptions. Florida law pro-

vides for a number of property tax exemptions, assessment reductions. and classifications that will reduce the taxable value (and taxes) of property. Homestead exemption is the most common. To be eligible.

property owners must have legal or equitable title to the property and establish proof of permanent residency (annually as of Jan. 1). Clay County's property tax base is predominately residential, with approximately 70% of the total taxable value consisting of improved residential properties, and more than 73% of those parcels are encumbered with an existing homestead exemption.

Town passes design funds for failing Clarke Park drainage

ORANGE PARK – Officials re looking for potential drainage fixes for Clarke Park, where a nearby pond suffered a stormwater failure during heavy rain this summer.

On Tuesday night, Orange Park town officials unanimously approved \$26,710 for firm Jones Edmonds & Associates to conduct a study of the area and a preliminary design for short-term and long-term fixes to Clarke Park's drainage creek near Kingsley Avenue. According to town staff, stormwater from northwest Orange Park is collected and held in a Clarke Park pond.

Town staff has made temporary adjustments to the area. However, portions of a concrete wall have deteriorated, leading to erosion and exposing a concrete storm pipe that connects to the pond.

Public Works Director Kyle Croce said if anything in the pond was deemed an imminent failure it would be addressed before a long-term fix was found. Funds for the design are available in the town's 2021-2022 budget. "During the rain events this summer, we had a lot of failure in that creek along with that control structure," Croce said. "Ideally, we would have some armoring along the ditch and then a way for the overflow to come into the pond ... and have it exit at another area, not right where it comes in and out."

Town documents state Jones Edmonds will conduct a study of the creek and develop an alternative way to route stormwater. Town Manager Sarah Campbell said an award for a larger project could be on the table in the future, though the council's decision on Tuesday only pertained to the study and design from Jones Edmonds.

"If there's work after the fact that exceeds my authority, then we would bid that out and bring it back for an award," Campbell said. Councilman John Hauber asked if American Rescue Plan Act funds can be used for the project if it occurs. This is an emergency repair, Councilman Alan Watt added

"This is a bad situation and I don't think we have any choice," Watt said.

department to erase any information from his cellphone.

To avoid conflicts of interest, the case is being prosecuted by the Fifth Judicial Circuit that serves Lake, Marion and Sumter counties and it's being adjudicated by Smith, who represents the Seventh Circuit in St. Augustine.

The jury will be selected from Clay County residents, and Daniels will be tried at the Clay County Courthouse.

The state's discovery exhibit was filed on Jan. 6 with the Clay County Clerk of Courts, and it contained details of the affair, Daniels attempts to cover up some of his exchanges with the girlfriend and other agency officials and his demands for campaign contributions from fellow officers.

The report detailed what it believes was a desperate attempt to hide personal information relating to the affair.

The affair became public on May 6 when Daniels called CCSO and demanded Smith be arrested for stalking him. FDLE and Smith contend Smith had a prearranged meeting set up by another deputy at 370 Oakleaf Plantation Parkway with Daniels to return some CDs.

The FDLE then was called in to investigate the charges, as well as an anonymous letter to the FDLE Daniels threatened his deputies about working against him.

The state agency said Daniels met with Undersheriff Ricardo Wright, Community Affairs Chief Patrick Golemme and Patrol and Community Affairs Director David Barnes before the arrest and told them charges were going to filed against him and "that he may be going to jail."

The FDLE contends Daniels asked the sheriff's office to reset his personal phone because there was information on the phone he didn't want "to see the light of day."

Daniels was suspended by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis on Aug. 14, 2020, and he was defeated four days later by Michelle Cook in the 8 Republican Primary.

Daniels continues to insist the timing of his arrest was to keep him from winning re-election.

A final pre-trial hearing is scheduled for Nov. 22 and a status hearing will be heard on Dec. 1.



Garden Club: A Cooper's Hawk is a beautiful raptor

ORANGE PARK - This photo of a Cooper's Hawk was taken in a friend's backvard. It had been watching a squirrel eating under a bird feeder. The hawk had been moving from perch to perch in a tree nearby when it suddenly came swooping down at a high speed in pursuit of the squirrel. Fortunately, the squirrel got away. The hawk then landed on the fence, turned its head around and the look in its eyes suggested to me. "Yes. I missed!"

Known as a predator of birds, the Cooper's Hawk also feeds on mammals, particularly squirrels and chipmunks. One of the threatened bird species hunted by this hawk is the Florida Scrub Jav.

Although it may be disconcerting to us, this raptor does help keep populations of wild birds and rodents in check. The oncecommon Cooper's Hawk has suffered decline due to pesticides and habitat destruction.





Oakleaf 'All-star' gets Assistant Principal of the Year award

OAKLEAF – There's an element of surprise in naming an Assistant Principal of the Year and 2022 recipient, Oakleaf High's Tyler Wood, didn't suspect receiving the honor when his training day was cut short to come to the cafeteria last week.

Wood, who has been an assistant principal at Oakleaf High for three years, said coming to the cafeteria wasn't an unusual request for his job.

"I see the superintendent just standing there. I didn't have any idea," Wood said. "I was shocked. It's still kind of surreal."

He describes his career as a journey. The Flagler College graduate taught math at Wilkinson Elementary for four years. He also taught at Ridgeview High for five years, where he coached basketball, baseball and swimming. His last job prior to Oakleaf was four years as an assistant principal at Orange Park Junior High.

"My experience at every school I've ever been is, that there's going to be things that tie me back," Wood said.

The transition from teacher to administrator takes time, Wood added, and the decision to pivot away from teaching is scary for anyone.

"Now, I can make an impact on such a broader scale. That's the MO. It's all about [teachers and students]," Wood said. "We have an amazing group of teachers. It's easy when they're good as they are." Superintendent David Broskie said Wood has a servant's heart to perform the functions of an assistant principal. He called Wood an "up and comer" in the district.

"It takes a lot for a school that size. The role of an [assistant principal] is critical to the running of a high school. They're the jack of all trades that handle all situations," Broskie said. "He's so valuable. You always look for an all-star and a cleanup hitter that principals rely on."

Wood's philosophy is that no job is more important than any other. At a school like Oakleaf High with 2,700 students, Wood said the administration and teachers give students examples of how to treat people and display the importance of seemingly minor tasks.


"I can't teach them math because I'm not in a classroom, but I can teach them you can't be above tasks like taking out trash or helping a student who's fallen down," Wood said. "The little stuff matters as much as the big stuff."

A principal for 12 total years, Collins said it was a natural transition to come to Clay County. Five years does not feel like five years, she said with a laugh.

"I love this school. I love this community," Collins said. "The people, the staff, they're the ones that make the principal I am."

CLAY COUNTY – It's yet another hot and humid Saturday morning in Northeast Florida. While most folks are sleeping in, enjoying a break from the busy work week, the day is just beginning for those involved in the Clay Police Athletic League organization.

Commonly referred to as Clay PAL, the league brings together law enforcement and residents of the community through recreational programs coached, managed, and maintained by CCSO deputies and volunteers. Operating out of Walter Odum Park in Orange Park, practices are held throughout the week, with games taking place each weekend against other local athletic leagues.

property appraiser to determine eligibility and to ensure that all property owners receive the full benefits of tax exemptions to which they are entitled. However, property owners improperly or fraudulently receiving exemptions (and associated benefits) is problematic and creates inequity within the assessment roll and tax base.

Ultimately, honest taxpayers are left with making up the difference that homestead fraud creates. This audit is intended to certify that all property owners pay their fair share – no more, no less.

Once a homestead exemption has been granted by the property appraiser, Florida law allows for the exemption's automatic renewal - thereby eliminating the requirement of annual re-applications.

However, it is the responsibility of any property owner who is receiving an exemption to notify the property appraiser if eligibility has changed. Failure to promptly do so, may result in severe penalties.

Pursuant to section 196.161(1)(b), Florida Statutes, the property appraiser may review the exemption status for any current or prior year (up to 10 years) and shall file a tax lien subject to the taxes owed as a result of the ineligible exemption, plus a 50 percent penalty of the unpaid taxes for each year, and 15 percent interest a year.

The next day she confessed to her sister about shooting and killing her husband. Deputies performed a wellness check of their home and found him dead.

According to the arrest report, Melissa Gholson told deputies she "was not in fear of her life" and was not defending herself. She said told them she was tired of arguing and wanted it "to stop."

Gholson will remain in the Clay County Jail without bond. Her next court appearance is Nov. 30.

Brian and Jennifer Knight started the process to transform a 1.23acre wooded lot into what city council members believe will become a vibrant hub of entertainment and living.

"You wowed us," Councilwoman Connie Butler said. "I hope this is not where it stops. I hope this is where it begins."

The Knights own the lot on the southeast corner of U.S. Highway 17 and Bay Street. They have a vision to build retail stores and a restaurant and bar with 42 apartment-like units on the second and third floors. They started the long process by asking the city council to change the zoning from Commercial High Intensity and Institutional Future Land Use Designation to Central Business District.

The council voted 3-0 to approve the first reading. Mayor Edward Gaw was absent Tuesday night, and councilman Van Royal recused himself since he's had a working relationship with the developers.

The council will have a second and final reading of the zoning change request at a future meeting.

In other business, the council formally approved a zoning request that will pave the way for an emergency shelter to be built at 518 N. Pine St. The shelter will offer temporary housing for as many as eight men, as well as counseling and other benefits.

The shelter is expected to be completed by next fall.

Also, Haley Flynn, Jerimiah Mares, Cora Milliken, Tim Reichenbach and Joe Shiller were sworn in Tuesday night by acting chief John Guzman as new officers with the police department, and the council voted 4-0 on the first reading that will lead to a 3% increase - about 43 cents a customer – in monthly water bills to offset increasing costs.









eight seconds into the game with Payton Dykas fumbling away the opening kickoff near the Clay 20 yard line.



Fish Tales

Possible biggest bass caught in Clay County

MIDDLEBURG - Matt Rotoli, an Orange Park High 1992 graduate, took an old rubber worm from his garage tackle box, a Penn rod and some 10-lb. test line to a "yet to be disclosed pond near Middleburg" for a little after-work fishing time.

"I have fished my whole life to relax and this was just one of those days," said Rotoli, 47. "I actually cut the long brown ugly rubber worm in half to give it a little more play and as soon as it hit the water, it moved and I knew I had something."

Rotoli noted that he thought the quick strike was a catfish until he battled to a 20 minute stand still close to shore and he saw the underbelly.

"When I saw that white belly and the flash of how big it looked, I thought, this is going to be a big one," said Rotoli, who placed second at the Jacksonville Kingfish Tournament a few years back. "When I got it close enough, I reached in, grabbed it and nearly passed out from the adrenaline."

With no measuring tape or weight scale, Rotoli took a photo alongside his fishing pole for some length perspective and a friend (who suggested the county record) said it looked way bigger than the 15 pounds that the record was.


"It was estimated to be about 30 inches long," said Rotoli. "I released him and didn't get a weight. I wished I would have kept him."

According to a Jacksonville.com story of March 2015, Seth Chapman of Middleburg caught a 15-pound, 11-ounce largemouth Bass out of Kingsley Lake and that is still considered the record.

In East Palatka, a 22-lb, 4-oz replica of a Georgia Largemouth Bass is reportedly in Corky Bell's Seafood restaurant.

One story has a Buddy Wright of Jacksonville with an 18 pound, 13 ouncer caught in Green Cove Springs in the St. Johns River.

Hugh Paul, in 1966, caught a reported 18 pound, 2 ouncer in Lake Brooklyn as documented in Field and Stream magazine.


