From loathsome conditions to loving homes

Hundreds of rescued animals adopted during weekend event at Clay County Fairgounds

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Linda Lee didn't adopt a new pet Saturday morning at the Clay County Fairgrounds. She found a "new companion."

The woman from Orange Park was clearly emotional after she took one of

the abused animals rescued from a home last month from a home on Old Jennings Road. The dog spent most of its life stuffed with other helpless animals in crates on a property littered with fleas, feces, empty water, rats, and empty food and water bowls, along with the and skeletal remains of other animals who couldn't survive the horrific conditions.

"Now she will get the run of the house," Lee said

Clay County officials put all of the animals taken from the 1.29-acre lot -104

dogs, 72 chickens, 28 pigs, six goats, two turtles, six pigeons, two quail and a duck and a goose – up for adoption last weekend. Since then, some dogs delivered litters. Residents were required to apply for an appointment time in advance of the event and the order was set randomly after each applicant was vetted.

"[Counting puppies] we had about 310 animals and we adopted all but 17 out so far, so it was a very successful event,"

McRae Elementary receives state's excellence distinction

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — The Exceeding Excellence Award is tough to achieve, requiring Title I schools to surpass every state testing standard, but McRae Elementary is one of 26 state schools to earn the honor.

Seminole County-based East Coast Technical Assistance Center offers support to 47 school districts including Clay. The organization identifies high-performing Title 1 schools and visits to interview staff and observe classrooms.

Program Director Marjorie Murray said this is McRae elementary's eighth year in the Exceeding Expectations program. She said McRae elementary was compared to all 1,895 schools in the state and the award couldn't have happened without a strong district, administration, and teachers to ensure success.

"[The school has] standards-based data driven instruction, laser-focused intervention, visible, supportive and actively engaged school leadership who never forget adults and children need to have a little fun

in school," Murray said. McRae teachers and staff were honored by the district two weeks ago at a board meeting. Clay County School District Federal Programs Supervisor Ryan Widdowson said the East Coast Technical Assistance Center usually has an Orlando conference to spotlight award winners.

"Because of COVID they were unable to do that," Widdowson said. "It's been an ongoing question: when do we get to celebrate McRae? Any time we can put a spotlight on hard work that's being done, that's such a great experience for them."

Widdowson called the award rare and said McRae Principal Tammy Winkler and her team have created a student-centric environment with an emphasis on data.

"Every layer of a school steps up," Widdowson added. "It's an improved education for kids."

District board member Tina Bullock, whose district includes McRae, said the timing of the award is fitting because it's McRae's 25th anniversary. She said recognition coincides with the school's improvement from a 'C' to an 'A' grade from 2017 to 2019, according to state data.'

"They really work hard. Whenever you make a school a family atmosphere it's great," Bullock said. "That's what McRae has done."

Bullock said McRae involves volunteers and their families in the school's day-to-day operations. Now the school can be used as an example, she said. "To get this award when you're in an outlying rural area is a real feather in your cap," Bullock said. "You really have to work hard."

Florida legislators want to develop an OSHA plan to bypass vaccine mandates

egislation asking the Governor to develop a state workplace safety plan is nearing a vote in both the House and Senate.

The measure would give the Governor's Office until Jan. 17 to develop a plan for Florida to seek federal approval for a state counterpart to the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Leaders in Florida's Republican-led Legislature have framed the measure as a way to bypass vaccine mandates from a "weaponized" federal agency, although state occupational safety agencies must be at least as strict as OSHA.

Despite Democrats' attempts to amend the bill, sponsored by Land O'Lakes Republican Rep. Ardian Zika, with "guardrails" to satisfy their concerns that the bill is not just a political stunt, the House prepared the bill for a vote without making changes to the original language. The vote is expected Wednesday morning.

"We are being faced, as a state, with a federal overreach of mandating on Florida's families a looming deadline. They can lose their job," Zika said. "It's in [the] interest of our state that we explore the creation of state OSHA for the state."

Senators on the Appropriations Committee on Tuesday approved a companion bill along nearly party lines, preparing it for the full Senate's consideration. The measures include a \$1 million fund for the Governor's Office to develop the plan, including to hire consultants if necessary.

St. Augustine Republican Sen. Travis Hutson, the bill's sponsor, told the panel Florida's OSHA requirements could be as strict as federal workplace requirements. However, it would allow the state to expand rules for industries such as tourism and construction


"We've got a lot more flexibility, local control, in the regulatory side of things, should we take over that," Hutson said.

Democrats were unified in their opposition to the bill. West Palm Beach Democratic Sen. Bobby Powell said the measure "looks like big government" and does what the federal government already does.

And one Republican, St. Petersburg Sen. Jeff Brandes, broke with his party, telling the committee the \$1 million appropriation was unnecessary given the existing research funds. Additionally, he said the business community has been largely silent as lawmakers discuss the proposal.

However, the federal vaccine requirements remained a sticking point for him.



"There's not really a need for the bill other than to kind of make a point," Brandes said. "But I think the highlight here is that even if we did this, the state would be exempt from the vaccine mandates, which is exactly the reason that we're here."

While the vaccine mandate, which was set to begin in January but is currently paused in federal court, was the impetus for the bill, lawmakers acknowledge it would likely take years to implement a state plan. The shortest it has taken a state is about two years, noted Florida AFL-CIO lobbyist Rich Templin. However, the average is more like three years.

House Speaker Chris Sprowls earlier Monday called the measure a "plan for the future." However, he noted he believes the OSHA vaccine rules, which also include an opt-out if employees undergo weekly testing, won't stand up in federal court.

Senate President Wilton Simpson on Monday told reporters the OSHA approval process depends on who gets elected in 2024, noting the plan must go through the federal government. But as far as the federal government's decision to impose what he called an unconstitutional mandate, the Senate President asked what comes next.

'What we do not want to do is set up an opportunity for future presidents to weaponize cabinets that will come in and do unconstitutional things, even if it's only for a short period of time," Simpson said.

The House Pandemics & Public Emergencies Committee on Monday approved the bill nearly along party lines, with one Democrat joining Republicans on the 13-5 vote, signaling there is limited bipartisan support for it.

While it was Gov. Ron DeSantis who began the call for a Special Session addressing vaccines and pandemics. Simpson and Sprowls were the first to raise the concept of removing Florida from OSHA. DeSantis gave a tepid endorsement of the OSHA measure when a reporter in Naples asked about it Tuesday.

He noted Florida's decision to leave OSHA, should it happen, would not be unprecedented. However, he stressed that leaving OSHA is corollary to what he sees as the larger point of the Special Session, which is making sure people don't lose their jobs because of failure to comply with both federal and corporate vaccine man-

"I think it's an appropriate response, given how heavy handed OSHA is being," DeSantis said.

Twenty-two states have an OSHA approved state program while five states have programs that apply only to publicsector employees.

Getting a state plan approved is not something that would happen overnight. There is a process that requires federal authorities to examine state efforts and ensure standards for worker protections are as effective as federal regulations.

To gain initial approval, states must assure OSHA they will have enough staff and regulations in place within three years. Once a state gains approval, it is eligible for federal funding to help pay for the program. Once OSHA gives its final approval, it relinquishes authority.

Season-finale attracts the world's best rallycross drivers to Keystone Heights Airport

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Nitro Rallycross, the brainchild of action sports star Travis Pastrana, will bring its high-flying, high-speed thrill ride to the Florida International Rally and Motorsports Park at the Keystone Heights Airport on Dec. 4-5.

The popular racing series is a mixture of cars, motocross and adrenaline. Portions of The FIRM's road course, skidpad and the off-road course will be transformed into a trail that features dirt, pavement and jumps for the season-finale.

Although races will be televised live on the Peacock network, local and racing officials said nothing compares to the smells, sights and sounds of 600-horsepower supercars running side-by-side.

"It is so awesome to see the momentum building for Nitro Rallycross," said Pastrana, global motorsports icon and the driving force behind this racing revolution. "The reaction from teams has been fantastic. We've already confirmed more supercar entrants than ever before in an NRX event. Oakleaf grad wins national competition with fishing line, bait recycling project

OAKLEAF - An Oakleaf High graduate received national recognition for designing a machine that would recycle fishing lines and bait.

Abigail Askew won the BoatUS Foun-

dation and Berkley Recast and Recvcle Contest, which aimed to find a way to recycle fishing lines and soft bait. Her "Berkley Recycling Machine" took home first place and \$15,000. She's also a 2021 graduate of the Savannah College

of Art and Design industrial design program.

"As a passionate angler, it was an honor to receive this reward and to be recognized within the fishing industry," Askew said. "I was also excited to learn that this contest was judged by two major bass fishing icons, Hank Parker and Mark Zona."

She first created a survey for 84 anglers and conducted a series of interviews to help her understand how the bait molding processes worked. Askew found most anglers didn't have easy access to recycle products, but they wanted to. She interviewed Dennis Montgomery, president and founder of D & J Plastics, an expert when it comes to the injection molding of soft plastic baits.

"The information I received from the survey and interviews provided the complete direction for my project," Askew said.

Early in the process, Askew had her design model in mind: a service counter that customers could use to remold bait and collect their line for credit with the help of an associate. However, a classmate shared a childhood memory of the classic Mold-A-Rama, a vending machine that molded items into figurines.

"I came to the realization that this service could be provided by a machine instead of a paid associate," Askew said.

Askew's machine prompts anglers to

throw away reusable items at retailers and or launch sites. She felt the idea could catch on as a novelty. The contest entry was also her SCAD senior year capstone project and she said her coursework went a long way to designing the Berkley Recycling Machine.

"My firsthand experience using these products allowed me to tailor my survey questions and interviews to the target audience." Askew said. "Without my industrial design education at SCAD, I would not have known where to begin with visualizing this concept. I used the combination of Solidworks, Keyshot, and Photoshop Rendering to create my visuals.'

Askew added that many of her industrial design projects at SCAD have environmental-friendly aspects and she wants to continue supporting sustainability through

"Anytime there is the opportunity to incorporate a product that is reusable, I will include it in my projects," Askew said. "My education and experience have prepared me to continue to be an advocate and push for sustainability and conservation, especially in the fishing industry."



Phillip Irish said the organization is down 20 workers of what it needs for bell ringers. He said staff was calling people on Salvation Army lists, though for some people, it's difficult to come back.

"We are helping people who need a little extra," he said. "We are asking ourselves, are we going to be able to field fundraising and activities the way we usually do?"

He said the Salvation Army had challenges in 2020, but pulled through.

There was an abundance of compassion and generosity in the community last year," Phillip Irish said. "We were worried

we weren't going to meet our goals, but we did. It's an interesting creature this year."

The Salvation Army's first day out this year is Nov. 19 at a few locations. Black Friday is when the organization does a fullcourt press, he said, and called the reality of the staffing shortages stark. He likened missing a worker in front of a busy store during the holidays to a thunderstorm preventing any money from being collected.

"We have basically four weeks to raise money for the whole year or not. We don't get a chance to do it later." Phillip Irish said. "If we only have half the people we need, it's likely we'll get half the funds we need."

Maj. Lynn Irish, also a Clay County Corp Officer, said there are 371 children set to receive presents from the organization's Angel Tree program.

A sponsor that adopts an "Angel" receives an Angel Tree tag that includes a child's age and gift wish. The toys purchased are returned to the Salvation Army and later given to the parents prior to Christmas. The deadline to send the Salvation Army is gifts is Dec. 6, a week before the Dec. 13 distribution day for presents.

"For many of the kids here in Clay County, if it wasn't for Angel Tree, they wouldn't get anything for Christmas," she said. "There's excitement because of Angel Tree from the kids. We have generous people in the community."

Black Creek Project projected to start this summer for Lake Brooklyn



Help is coming soon for the residents who've wanted to see Lakes Brooklyn and Geneva water levels increased to their previous levels.

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The Black Creek Water Resource Development Project is expected to dramatically change Keystone Heights in the coming years and local leaders now have an updated timeline of the process.

The project spearheaded by the St. Johns River Water Management District would divert about 10 million gallons of water from Black Creek to Lake Brooklyn. It is estimated to cost \$60-80 million and \$1.2 million a year for upkeep, though more than \$40 million has been secured through state appropriations. The district has also added \$5 million to the funds.

Save Our Lakes Organization President Vivian Katz-James told the Clay County Board of County Commissioners last week the district expected permits for the project by the end of the year or January. She said the district should start to approve contracts in the spring of 2022 with shovels hitting the ground by the summer. Construction could take 18 months.

"Within the next year, we're going to have shovels in the ground and Black Creek is going to be moving," Katz-James said. "Water will start flowing and Brooklyn will start reacting very quickly."

The county and the City of Keystone Heights have set aside money for lake projects, about \$250,000 combined.

"That is a drop in the bucket, but what it says to the water district is, you got skin in the game," Katz-James said.

The next step is cleaning out Alligator Creek, which is where the water will be di-

verted to before reaching Lake Brooklyn, to improve the flow from Black Creek.

Keystone Heights Mayor Karen Lake said residents are eager for the project and it's easy for people to start asking, "Are we there yet?" She said it's hard to overstate what the impact on raising water levels will do for ecotourism, property values and improving quality of life.

"I really feel we're getting there," Lake said. "I think it's going to do a tremendous amount for the Keystone community."

Calling the project ambitious and collaborative, Lake said many residents remember water skiing through the city's many lakes.


"Those are memories and experiences
I hope future residents will experience,"
Lake added.

The county, city and the district will have future meetings about the potential for cost-share projects. County Commissioner Betsy Condon said Keystone can mimic Indian Lagoon's One Lagoon project, which outlined controlled growth following the restoration of the lagoon.

"You have to reinvent yourself or they will reinvent you," Condon said. "We'd like to have community input on where Keystone Heights goes."

The project will feel closer to reality when shovels hit the ground, Condon said, and cleanup is the next important step. Condon recalled Keystone Heights as a destination spot from Jacksonville and Gainesville residents because of its lakes. That day may come again, she said.

"I think it will completely change Keystone," Condon said.





is compressed, stress grows. Immediate response raises expectations, reduces careful consideration, and makes us more prone to error. Our children need to know that our eye contact and voices are focused on their needs, too. Cell phones and e-mail should not keep our loved ones on hold.

8. Advocate with assertion, not aggression. Free speech is not an invitation to be offensive. Responsible advocacy requires thoughtful strategy, practical solutions, and effective conversation. Advocacy is the heart-felt expression of a wrong to be righted, with composure and grace. An advocate's power is in persuasive and persistent articulation, and the recruitment of others to the cause.

9. Health is a form of wealth. Making sure we eat right, exercise, and taking time to rest and relax are the keys to clear thinking and long-term effectiveness. Our bodies cannot support us unless our minds resolve to take care and be careful. During the CO-VID-19 pandemic, preventive health measures are especially essential.

10. Take optimism pills every morning... the time-release kind. Positive attitudes and negativity are both contagious. Those who believe they will make a difference can achieve their goals. Pessimism is the mind's way of giving up before the first step is taken. We who strive to make change for the better in our lives, neighborhoods, and the world around us should stop whining and start winning. The power of one, multiplied and magnified, is the only correct formula for progress. Holidays remind us that bridges across the generations are built upon the stanchions of memory. We who recall the glow of candlelight reflecting the faces at our grandparents' table understand how vital heritage is for appreciating who came before us and who we are. Tasty tips

The perfect recipe for holiday meals includes simplicity, fun, planning

CLAY COUNTY – As the resident chef in my family, it's often my responsibility to cook for holidays. Beyond that, I often cater for small-scale events for family, friends and members of our church.

With a bachelor's degree in Culinary Arts, "What do you do for the holidays? is one of the first questions I get from new acquaintances. As the holidays draw closer, here are four tips and tricks that I have for surviving the dinner party season with as little stress as possible.

No. 1, keep it simple. This isn't the time to try brand new recipes or a six-course meal if you haven't done it before. Thanksgiving especially can be a lot of stress on smaller families who are trying to accomplish a Hallmark level feast.

Sticking with tried-and-true recipes you know your family enjoys will make the day easier in the long run. Mashed potatoes, your family's preferred vegetables, pre-made rolls, and a home-roasted turkey breast can be much easier to accomplish than a whole turkey and the rest of the usual sides. Bonus: if you're trying to avoid the dreaded leftover rut, a pot pie is fantastic for your Thanksgiving turkey and vegetables.

No. 2, keep in mind the timing of your foods. Usually, roasted proteins take longer than sides. Turkey is the kind of entrée you can set and forget the morning of and,

depending on what you're making as sides. you only need about two hours. The longer vou keep vegetables in the heat, the more nutrients they lose, and to keep everything hot, it's best to cook green vegetables just before serving to avoid having to keep hot pots on the stove the whole morning.

Third, don't stress too much about perfection. As a recipe developer, perfect is unachievable without Photoshop. It's easy to lose yourself trying to match the picture on your recipe. It's unlikely you're going to get that glistening skin on your turkey and perfectly green vegetables after cooking and keeping your foods in a hot kitchen. Instead, focus on the flavors and the technique you're using. A baked turkey and roasted potatoes are going to look beautifully golden no matter what, but seasoning will always be more important than presentation in the end.

Finally, food is made with love, so don't stress too much. You want to have fun with it as best as you can before you sit down to enjoy the meal with loved ones and friends.

Put on your favorite music in the kitchen. It's a favorite trick of mine to keep up my energy during long hours in the kitchen. Bring in a friend to act as your sous chef. Take a sip of the wine you're using to make your sauces. Taste everything as you go!

There's no better way to get excited about a meal than to enjoy making every



John Ward. "We've got one rooster and two rabbits, and we have people coming in who said they want them. That just leaves us with just 14 pigs."

Ward still is working with residents and other rescue services to find new homes for the pigs. He believes they will be placed in the next few days.

Little dogs clearly were the favorite finds in the two-day event. Larger dogs, goats and 71 chickens and other birds were gone by Sunday night.

Six-year-old Wren Fitzgerald liked the Continental Toy Spaniel because "she's soft and has cute fur." She said volunteers named the dog Gilly, but she wants to change it to Cocoa Belle.

"I registered as soon as I saw the story about the animals in the news," said Awren Fitzgerald, Wren's mother. "This was the best way to get a new family member. It really hits you when you go in [to the livestock stalls] and see all of the animals. It's unbelievable."

One couple left with a Shih Tzu. They tried to use a leash to lead the dog to the parking lot, but the dog was so unaccustomed to being out of a cage, it took one step and sat. The man eventually picked the dog up and carried it to the car.

"You have to have patience," said one volunteer. "This is all new to these dogs."

Lee said one of her first stops will be at a groomer, where the dog will get her nails painted pink.

"They didn't give me a name, but I'm calling her Baby Doll," she said. "She's small and she's calm. She and I will match."

Lee's daughter, Donna Gushanas, also was overwhelmed by the magnitude of the rescue.

"When you get halfway through and all the way to the end, it really hits you," she said. "There are so many. It feels good knowing we can take one home. That's going to be one lucky dog."

Hammer drops on 7 in Clay Hill as neighbors find Hope following pre-dawn drug raid

For Clay Today

CLAY HILL – An early morning drug raid on Nov. 10 at a house on Nolan Road

resulted in the arrest of seven people and the confiscation of fentanyl, methamphetamine, cocaine, heroin, marijuana and drug paraphernalia.



1556 Nolan Road as part of its Operation Hammer and Hope initiative after getting numerous complaints from area residents about the number of people going in and out of the home, Sherrif Michelle Cook said.



for trafficking controlled substances and

possession of heroin, methamphetamine and fentanyl with intent to sell or distribute.

According to the arrest report, she admitted she allowed one visitor to live at the house for \$75 a week so she can buy crack cocaine and she allowed drug sales from the residence. Her bond was set at \$36,007.

Jeffrey Parsons, 35, was charged with trafficking in heroin, trafficking in methamphetamine. possession of marijuana, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of heroin with intent to sell, two counts of possession of methamphetamine with intent to sell, possession of heroin and possession of fentanvl with intent to distribute. His bond was set at

tion. She also was arrested in 2019 and charged with hiding methamphetamine in her bra in the Clay County Jail. Her bond was set at \$21,008.

Donald L. Messer, 34, was charged with possession of methamphetamine. His bond was set at \$30,005.

Seth M. Herring, 40, was charged with possession of methamphetamine with intent to sell, manufacture or deliver and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$77,505.

Michael J. Cole, 18, was charged with possession of fentanyl and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$6,005.

William F. McHale, 56, was charged with resisting, obstructing or opposing law enforcement. As the SWAT team entered the residence, McHale tried to escape by climbing through a window at the back of the house, according to the arrest report. He attempted to flee into a wooded area while ignoring the commands to stop. He eventually was arrested while walking along Brangus Road. His bond was set at \$2,502.

Enforcement is only part of the crack-down of drug abuse in the Clay Hill and Middleburg areas, Cook said.

"A big part of Hammer and Hope is the treatment side," she said. "If you want help getting off drugs, we're here to help, too."

There have been more than 500 drugrelated arrests and as many as 25 overdose deaths in Clay County this year. The majority of problems are in the Clay Hill and Middleburg areas.

The county's paramedicine program will help addicts and their families with counseling, peer specialists and other treatments to address opioid addictions.

Man's bond set at \$280K after he's caught with drugs during traffic stop in Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – A quick-thinking Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy stopped a man for an outstanding warrant on Wells

Road and wound up making a significant drug arrest.

Christopher Anthony Rhein, 35, of Orange Park, was found with trafficking in cocaine, possession methamphetamine and marijuana with intent to sell, manu-

facture or deliver, distributing amphetamines or methamphetamines, possession of LSD and Subutex after he was stopped on Nov. 15. A sheriff's deputy saw his car and learned the license tag was registered to Rhein, who was wanted on other drug charges.

The deputy found a glass pipe during the pat-down. He also saw plastic bags with marijuana between the center console and the driver's seat, along with other bags containing cocaine, Subutex and 3.4 grams of methamphetamine.

There also were baggies containing marijuana and 32.8 grams of cocaine in the back seat.

The original warrant was issued on Nov. 2 for violation of probation for possessing 1.5 grams of cocaine and 29.9 grams of marijuana.

Rhein was taken to the Clay County Jail, where he's being held on a \$280,017 bond.

Substitute teachers required to play a critical role in local education

Subs use lesson plans, curriculum to dispel babysitting connotation

CLAY COUNTY – Schools are facing a massive shortage, and this time it's their most important asset – their teachers.

Teachers call out. They have doctors' appointments, illnesses or things happening in their own personal lives. With the pandemic, there's another level of stress added on top of everything else that teachers must face. When a teacher is exposed to COVID-19, or suspects they might be sick, it's common protocol to stay out of class for a week. This gives them enough time to make sure that a covid test comes back negative.

That's where substitute teachers come in

Substitute teachers are the liaison between teachers and the classroom when teachers cannot attend. There is a stereotype that substitutes don't care, and just put a movie on or let the students run wild.

Thankfully, this is completely outdated. Because of the changes in curriculum, there's no time for a free day.

Teachers, especially in lower grades like elementary and middle schools, often leave full lesson plans. When a substitute comes into class, they come in with no knowledge of the class. Substitutes have to adapt to a lesson plan before the students come into the class.

The school district uses a third-party resource to hire subs. But even with what seems like an endless supply of postings through the substitute program, there often are days when schools are scrambling to fill spots. The Clay County School Board has even had to rely on its own teachers to fill vacancies.

Teachers with an open planning period are often called into substitute in another teacher's class. Though they get paid for filling in for their co-worker, that means that they give up a valuable planning period which is often used to plan their own lessons or grade assignments. A pay bonus has incentivized substitutes who take on



jobs at schools most in need of subs. However; even with all of that, many schools such as Bannerman, several elementary schools, and a few junior high schools, are desperate for substitute teachers to fill in.

The requirements to become a substitute teacher are thorough, but not unattainable

. An applicant needs to pass a background check into their criminal background and must complete an intensive course on classroom management, child safety, and teaching resources. The county requires all substitutes to have completed at least 60 credit hours from an accredited university, and pay increases based on the level of education held by the applicant.

Substitutes must be fingerprinted and must complete an orientation process with the branch office of the network, but after completing everything and submitting all paperwork, substitutes can start teaching as soon as their supervisor emails them their access codes to the scheduling site.

The benefits of substitute teaching are immeasurable. You allow students to continue learning when their teacher is away. You have a flexible schedule where you only have to work the days that you schedule for yourself. With the incentives and bonuses right now, it's a great time to help the school district, and ease the stress of some of the community's most important members

If you are interested in becoming a substitute teacher, visit the Clay County School District website and look for instructional opportunities. The substitute teacher tab will provide you with all the requirements needed, and access to the third-party scheduling office to apply and schedule an interview.



Belen Jesuit Prep won the team title with 42 points with Fort Myers second at 132 and Sunlake third at 151. Locally, Ocala Vanguard and Ponte Vedra, whom Fleming Island beat last week for the region 1-3A title, were ahead of Fleming Island at sixth for Vanguard with 244, seventh with Ponte Vedra at 308 and Fleming Island eighth with 312 in a race of attrition for the pack positions at the finish. In the 100 free, McDade, Ekk and Layton opened the first 50 with splits of 24.74, 24.36 and 24.88 giving Ekk a .38 second edge on McDade; .52 on Layton, at the wall of the second turn; at 50 meters.

In the second 50, Layton ripped a 26.59. McDade went 26.73 and Ekk went

26.99 with both Layton and McDade gaining on Ekk, but not closing the gap. McDade and Layton would eventually be ruled a tie with Ekk winning the event by Bright's .12 calculation.

Earlier in the meet's finals rounds, Mc-Dade blasted the field with a 23.58 gold medal finish over Leigha Oconnor of East Ridge High in a distant 23.92 who held off Gisella Wright's 23.94 for third. Ekk was eliminated via a false start in the 50.

GAINESVILLE - Starting with a first quarter punt muff on their own one yard line, the Fleming Island High football team could only get downfield twice in 48 minutes as the Buchholz Bobcats stuck a 35-7 region 1-7A loss on the Golden Eagles Thursday night at Citizens Field.

"Young guys making young mistakes and us as coaches not preparing them to make decisions," said Fleming Island coach Damenyum Springs. "That one yard punt fumble hit us hard and we went downhill from there."

Buchholz, now 10-1 and moving into the region semifinals against University High, a winner over Fletcher, had its way with the Eagles secondary with quarter Creed Whittemore slicing up the field with quick slants and skinny posts that created scoring time and time again.

For Fleming Island, with two key offensive linemen out for illness and a shuffled deck in the front five that included freshman Braden Cunningham stepping up to play center, freshman quarterback Cibastian Broughton kept rising from the turf after bone-chilling sacks and tackles for loss to keep the Golden Eagles upright. Broughton's best play was a 37 yard scamper in the first half that saw him get missiled after falling out of bounds, but with no flag for obvious late hit.

"We saw some good things from our young guys tonight, especially Cibastian who got beat up all night," said Springs."

The snowball effect amped up for the Eagles with a 40 yard punt return and a 27 yard scoring pass for the Bobcats to put the score at 14-0.

The Bobcats got a second passing score on a fourth and seven pass play from 37 yards out that landed in the Eagle end zone. Fleming Island did have outstanding defensive play from secondary corner Kaylib Singleton on a bomb from Whittemore to 6'-2" wide out Adrian Sermons that Singleton got his hands on at the apex of his defensive leap that Sermons swiped to put the Bobcats in the Eagle red zone. Singleton earlier in the first quarter knocked down a bomb attempt to force the Bobcat punt that led to the punt muff and score at just 9:50 of the first quarter.

Linebacker Jhace Edwards had his hands on a Bobcat quick slant play that could have been returned for a score, but could not capture the pass. Up front on defense, sophomore defensive end Joey Couch and freshman defensive tackle Khalil Matthews kept the pressure on Whittemore, but the quick-thinking quarterback was able to sneak away and continue to make plays.

Sophomore kick returner Cartavion Valentine did excite the Eagle fans with a 45 yard kickoff return to midfield in the
