Green Cove Springs looks to its future while embracing its past

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – In between bites of his lunch, former city councilman Van Royal was often distracted by the sights of children running through the fountains across the street at Spring Park.

"That is beautiful," he said with a smile. "I'm so proud we got that done."

The swimming pool at Spring Park opened five years ago and proved to be a big step for the little city. Families fill every poolside chair while children ran and splash during another perfect afternoon.

Royal knows there's a delicate balance between preserving Green Cove Springs' historic charm and managing growth. No matter how many bulldozers expand the boundaries of Small Town America into inevitable progress, Royal is one of many who's championed the city's easy-going lifestyle. He wants Green Cove Springs' pace to be measured by foot traffic, not bustling highways.

"You have to have foot traffic. That's the unique thing about Green Cove Springs," he said. "It's the only place in Clay County that has a walkable downtown. You can walk to restaurants. You can walk to the grocery store. You

can walk to CVS. You can walk to the food pantry and social services. Everything is here."

And he wants it to stay that way.

Clay County Sheriff's Office completes active shooter training

CLAY COUNTY – It can take place at a school, a church, a grocery store, a nightclub, or anywhere that people are gathered. When it occurs, a community is forever changed. It is called an active shooter event, and it can happen in an instant. After the initial shock wears off and the grief sets in, the event often becomes politicized. Families, already ravaged by loss, are seldom allowed to process their hurt because of the 24-hour news coverage and speculation. Even when the shooting takes place hundreds of miles away, waves of shock and fear spread across our country as we question our safety in places where we once felt secure.

At the Clay County Sheriff's Office, we strongly believe that the best response to an active shooter event is to end it quickly and decisively. While we cannot predict when or where a shooting will occur, we constantly train, plan, and prepare to meet an active shooter with swift and overwhelming force. As you read this, somewhere in Clay County our deputies



are probably holed up in a classroom with law enforcement officers from surrounding agencies and members of Fire Rescue to coordinate the response for this type of threat. Though we cannot share the specifics of a law enforcement response, we want the citizens of Clay County to know that our deputies are trained under a concept that has become our mantra: "Stop the killing, stop the dying." If an active shooter event occurs in our county, our deputies and

partner agencies will not stop, hesitate, or retreat until the shooter is killed, captured, or contained. Each of these brave men and women understand that they must race toward the source of the gunfire until the shooter is neutralized and the killing has stopped. Immediately during and after the threat has ended, law enforcement personnel and Fire Rescue have developed a strategy to ensure that the wounded are rapidly located, stabilized, and transported

from the horror of the scene to the well-notified and prepared medical personnel waiting for their arrival at area hospitals.

While these coordinated response teams train continually for the very worst situation, the skills instilled in them are designed to ensure the very best outcome. The interaction of law enforcement and Fire Rescue will bring unity and precision to a typically chaotic and confusing scene. Ultimately, this comprehensive training is intended to save lives and lessen the trauma of an otherwise traumatic experience. Although many might believe that the most difficult aspect of an active shooter event is dealing with the initial threat, our deputies and responding partners understand that Active Shooter Incident Management (or ASIM) doesn't end when the threat is neutralized or even when the victims are transported. A successful response also includes a full investigation of the event, reunification of families, and the timely and accurate distribution of information to the community through local media outlets



At the same time, Royal knows development is coming. He's been a real estate developer for decades. His thumbprint is on many of the city's projects. He insists, however, that progress can be done responsibly.

"We knew development moves south or toward the water, which is why Oakleaf did so well. Oakleaf had a jump start on us," Royal said. "When Fleming Island was pretty much built out, the next place was going to be Green Cove. This all happened in 2005, '06, '07. The market was blowing up.

"We're here, trying to think about how do you keep the small-town feel with this much development? You look at Saratoga Springs and Governors Park and D.R. Horton (Cross Creek Express). With those three, which are now underway – they certainly have plans for them – are 150% larger than Pace Island and Eagle Harbor combined. Can we save the small-town feel? Growth is inevitable. You can't stop it. You can plan for it and you can stick to your plans."

Governors Park is scheduled to be completed in five years – about the same time the First Coast Expressway is completed to connect Interstate 10 with St. August-



ine. That massive complex will bring as many as 4,000 new homes south of the city limits. It also will include a town center similar to commerce magnets at St. Johns and Nocatee.

Governors Park will be south of the old Gustafson Farm and west of U.S. 17. And while it's outside the city limits, Green Cove Springs will reap the benefits without giving up its small-town attitude.

D.R. Horton's Cross Creek Express north of the city limits is planning for 421 new homes, and Saratoga Springs will bring another 4,300 homes in the next 15 years south of State Road 16 near County

Road 315.

There are developments planned for inside the city limits. The Rookery will bring as many as 2,100 new homes at Gustafson Farm. Apartments, townhomes and condominiums already are in the early planning stages. "When I moved here, in 1987 I'd drive down (U.S. Highway) 17," Royal said. "It was a two-lane road. No Eagle Harbor. On the other hand, Blanding Boulevard had already been developed. It wasn't that appealing. It still has traffic problems.

"Governors Park will have the largest town center in Clay County, five years from now, six years from now. It will look like

some of these other town centers in St. Johns County and Duval (County). We call it 'Nocatee-Lite.' It will still feel like Green Cove Springs. Instead of getting in our cars and driving somewhere else to spend our money, they can stay here and still enjoy the architecture from 100 years ago."

Term limits forced Royal from the city council dais, but he's often in the audience at regular meetings and he's always ready to address the council with comments and concerns. He's just as focused on development as he is on preserving the city's way of life.

"Twenty-five years from now, I see Green Cove as a small city where on Saturdays we can have birthday parties at the park; we can go shopping on Walnut Street," he said. "As big of an impact as the expressway is going to have, actually it's already affecting us, Reynolds Industrial Park needs to be ready to entertain offers. It can be anything. It could be a large industrial complex. It could be a waterfront with hotels, apartments, condominiums."

The expressway certainly will affect Green Cove Springs.

It will bring thousands of new visitors each day. And with four interchanges within three miles of the city limits, the possibilities are limitless.

So is the commitment to keeping the city's small-town feel.

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Gas prices dropping in Florida following rate hike

Gasoline prices nationally and in Florida eased back a few cents last week from the previous record highs, with Florida coming in Monday averaging \$4.81 per gallon of gas, an 8-cent drop.

The price reduction comes as international markets saw a decline in gasoline futures prices, and market indications suggest the drop could continue significantly, according to AAA – The Auto Club Group. Those markets dipped after the Federal Reserve announced a rate hike and President Joe Biden signaled the potential for oil export restrictions.

Nationally, the average price of a gallon of gasoline dropped below \$5, to \$4.98, by Monday, AAA reported.

Gas prices ranged from \$4.65 to \$4.89 in Clay County on Monday.

“Florida drivers are finally catching a break after several weeks of rising gas prices,” said AAA Spokesman Mark Jenkins.

“Gas prices are following oil and gasoline futures prices, which suffered significant losses last week. The losses are being tied to last week’s rate hike from the Federal Reserve bank, sparking fears of a possible recession – which could lower fuel demand. Prices also faced resistance on reports that the Biden administration is considering possible limits on petroleum exports, in (an) attempt to strengthen domestic supply.”

“Petroleum exports have accelerated in recent weeks, as countries compete for fuel in what has become an extremely tight fuel market,” Jenkins added. “The increased competition for fuel has contributed to rising prices.”


On Friday, a barrel of crude was averaging \$109.56, about \$11.11 less than the week before.

What’s more, the gasoline futures market posted a decline of 38 cents on the week. Combined with the week before, the futures market has declined 46 cents in two weeks.

“If this downward trend holds, gas price drops could accelerate, moving the state average back around \$4.50 per gallon,” Jenkins continued. “But this fuel market remains extremely unstable, and things can change very quickly. It’s looking less likely that the state average will surpass \$5 a gallon, but the driving season is young.”

I was fly on the wall when Shaquille O’Neal left the Magic

We’ve all wondered what it could be like to be a fly on the wall when something big breaks. I was that fly in July of 1996.

I saw the negotiations between the agent for Shaquille O’Neal, the Orlando Magic and Los Angeles Lakers. I saw the agent, Leonard Armato, hug Lakers General Manager Jerry West and they both walked away.

At that moment, it was clear Shaq was no longer going to play in Orlando. He was headed to Los Angeles.

And I was there when it happened. The story requires a setup. I was covering the Atlanta Summer Games. I reported on beach volleyball in Jonesboro and boxing at Georgia Tech. On a volleyball off-day, I learned the women’s teams from the United States and Brazil would be practicing at a private court built in the backyard of a man who lived on Lake Spivey. If you looked hard enough, you could see the volleyball complex – called Atlanta Beach – across the lake.

I was standing next to the net when I noticed West walking down the fence line to a boathouse. A man who could afford to build a beach volleyball court in his backyard could afford a boathouse with a full bar, television and ceiling fans.

West got to the boathouse where he was met by Armato. I knew him since I covered every game Shaquille played in Orlando. It made sense Armato would be at the practice since his girlfriend, Holly McPeak, was on the U.S. roster.

What I didn’t expect was to watch them talk for 10 minutes. They shook hands and West walked back along the fence line.

A few minutes later, John Gabriel, the general manager for the Orlando Magic, walked down the same fence line. They talked for about 10 minutes and Gabriel left.

Gabriel and I became good friends while I covered the Magic. I was both quiet and honest. But I could see on his face, that he appeared concerned after his brief meeting with Armato.

Almost immediately, West re-appeared. He didn’t have time to go anywhere. He must have been waiting down the street in his car, waiting for Gabriel to make his final sales pitch and leave.

West returned and walked down to the boathouse. The meeting was short. The men hugged and they left together.

Neither Armato, West nor Gabriel noticed me standing beside the volleyball court. Maybe there’s truth in hiding in plain sight.

I was tempted to break the story, but in fairness, I don’t know exactly what was said. But it was clear, that Shaquille was going Hollywood. And I saw it happen.

There have been many stories reported about how O’Neal wound up go-

ing to the Lakers. He officially signed on July 18. ESPN said Shaq wanted to stay in Orlando. Since the Magic drafted him, they were in a position to offer him more money than Los Angeles.

However, Orlando lowballed him. The offer was \$54 million for either three or four years. Many speculated the Magic were trying to save money so they could re-sign future Hall of Famer Penny Hardaway.

The Lakers offered \$126 million for seven years.

The decision was a slam dunk for O'Neal and Armato. Not only did Shaq get paid, he

also was moving to Southern California where Armato lived.

Atlanta Beach is now known as Clayton County International Park. I'm not sure what happened to the court built in Richard Anderson's backyard.

But I know Shaq went on to have a dominating career. And except for a brief spark of prominence led by Dwight Howard, Orlando has never really recovered. Like Shaquille O'Neal, Like Shaq, Howard also traded one Disney for another when he signed with the Lakers.

The downfall, however, started in a backyard with women playing volleyball as a backdrop. For once, I was the fly on the wall to see it all unfold.

In Florida, the best gas prices were found in Pensacola, Orange Park and Middleburg, where it averaged \$4.65 a gallon Monday morning. That was followed by Panama City at \$4.67, Crestview-Fort Walton Beach at \$4.69; Tallahassee at \$4.75; Melbourne-Titusville at \$4.76; Orlando at \$4.78; and Jacksonville at \$4.80.

The most expensive Florida gas was found in the West Palm Beach-Boca Raton market at \$4.96. That was followed by Gainesville and Fort Lauderdale at \$4.88; Fort Myers at \$4.87; Miami at \$4.86; Sarasota at \$4.84; and Tampa and St. Petersburg at \$4.81.

If you spend time on the front-end taking precautions, talking to your children


and working with their caregivers you can save yourself money, time and worry.

Community rallies to honor Juneteenth celebration


OAKLEAF – About 100 hundred people met at a pavilion on June 17 on Eagle Landing Parkway, with Black-owned businesses and food trucks, religious organizations and attendees gathered to honor Juneteenth.

Juneteenth, officially recognized in 2021 as a federal holiday, is slowly growing in the cultural consciousness. It commemorates the final group of slaves to hear of the Emancipation Proclamation in Galveston, Texas, about two years after Abraham Lincoln’s famous executive order. Juneteenth is on June 19, though the federal day off was Monday.

Even in the harsh heat, Trenita White sang along with “Lift Every Voice and Sing.” The song is commonly referred to as the Black national anthem and it was written by Jacksonville’s James Weldon Johnson and J. Rosamund Johnson.

John and Trenita White drove roughly two hours to and from Gainesville to Eagle Landing and said they attend multiple celebrations each year. Trenita White said the song is about realizing where freedom came from, but also recognizing how far they have to go.

“The song says it’s time for our voices to be heard,” Trenita White said.

John White said Juneteenth represents freedom. He showed a picture on his phone in Selma, Alabama, with former Rep. John Lewis, who died two years ago.

In his mid-60s, John White cautioned that younger generations may lose the hunger for social justice because they didn’t have the same struggle for freedom as his generation.

“There was a time when if a white man or woman walked down the street, I would

have to get to the side,” he said. “That’s no more.”

Leila Elise is a member of the younger generation. She said it was nice to support Black businesses and welcomed Juneteenth as a federal holiday, emphasizing that the fight for full equality in some areas isn’t over.

“It’s cool to see people are listening in



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

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


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Local historian explores Hispanic heritage

A local historian is looking to detail the stories and memories of the Hispanic community in Northeast Florida, including Clay County.

Rebecca Karimi-Dominguez was tasked by the Jacksonville Historical Society to create a presentation for Hispanic Heritage Month, which is Sept. 15 through Oct. 15. Her line of work requires archives and she noticed Jacksonville didn't have the most extensive collection of Hispanic-related articles, documents and pictures.

The size of her task changed, as well as her coverage area.

"I reached out to different organizations," Karimi-Dominguez said. "My contact list grew."

Karimi-Dominguez has numerous projects, including the "The Tortilla Diaries" podcast. She has presented to the Florida Humanities Council and is a sought-after speaker. The state's Hispanic community is predominantly thought of as being located

in Miami or Orlando, she said, but that's not the entire picture. Many Hispanic organizations started in this region.

"The state Hispanic chamber of commerce started here," Karimi-Dominguez said. "Things like that need to be recognized. I usually mention that when I reach out to historical societies and host presentations."

The area, however, is missing a large part of its Hispanic history, Karimi-Dominguez said. She described her work as solving a puzzle. For example, one lead begets another lead or another interview, she said.

"I'm so passionate because there's not very much," she explained. "It's a little bit harder. It's under the radar."

Karimi-Dominguez can be reached via email at rbkarimi@gmail.com. She welcomes engagement and collaboration, meeting new people and documenting their pasts, struggles and anecdotes.

"The importance of this is that it documents the history of a group of people so it won't be lost," she said. "They're precious, they are more valuable than gold to me. Once those memories are gone, they are lost."

That extends to discrimination of the Hispanic community also. One interviewee told her of a police officer harassing him in Flagler County. Hispanics, similar to other communities, wouldn't get served at lunch



counters. Growing up in Texas, Karimi-Dominguez herself recalled getting sent to the principal's office for speaking Spanish.

A dense story in itself, she mentions the 1947 Supreme Court decision Mendez v. Westminster. It challenged the separation of students based on ethnicity, one of the cases paving the way for Brown v. Board of Education seven years later.

"Hispanics did feel the brunt of some of that Jim Crow era," she said.

Preserving the past is not just for the present, but the future, she said. Her deadline is tentatively mid-August, but by no means is that the end. She wants at least 100 voices. That's a lot of phone calls, questions and listening. "It will be ongoing," she said.

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
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Health officials warn of blue-green algal toxins in Swimming Pen Creek

For Clay Today

FLEMING ISLAND – The Florida Department of Health in Clay has issued a Health Alert for the presence of harmful blue-green algal toxins in Swimming Pen Creek at Whitey's Fish Camp.

This is in response to a water sample taken on June 9. The public should exercise caution in and around Swimming Pen Creek at Whitey's Fish Camp. Residents and visitors are advised to take the following precautions:

- Do not drink, swim, wade, use personal watercraft, water ski, or boat in waters where there is a visible bloom.

- Wash your skin and clothing with soap and water if you have contact with algae or discolored or smelly water.

- Keep pets away from the area. Waters, where there are algae blooms, are not safe for animals. Pets and livestock should have a different source of water when algae blooms are present.

- Do not cook or clean dishes with water contaminated by algae blooms. Boiling the water will not eliminate the toxins.

- Eating fillets from healthy fish caught in freshwater lakes experiencing blooms is safe. Rinse fish fillets with tap or bottled water, throw out the guts and cook fish well.

- Do not eat shellfish in waters with algae blooms.

What is blue-green algae?

Blue-green algae are a type of bacteria that is common in Florida's freshwater environments.

A bloom occurs when rapid growth of algae leads to an accumulation of individual cells that discolor water and often produce floating mats that emit unpleasant odors.

Some environmental factors that contribute to blue-green algae blooms are sunny days, warm water temperatures, still water conditions, and excess nutrients. Blooms can appear year-round but are more frequent in summer and fall. Many types of blue-green algae can produce toxins.

Is it harmful?

Blue-green algae blooms can impact human health and ecosystems, including fish, and other aquatic animals.

To report fish kills, contact the Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute at (800) 636-0511.

Report symptoms from exposure to a harmful algal bloom or any toxin to the Florida Poison Information Center. Call (800) 222-1222 to speak to a specialist.

Contact your veterinarian if you believe your pet has become ill after consuming or having contact with blue-green algae-contaminated water.

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Penney Farms Navy Chaplain recalls journey and service in two branches

PENNEY FARMS — Dean Veltman, who served in the U.S. Army briefly during World War II and later as a 20-year chaplain in the Navy during conflicts in Korea and Vietnam, has been around the world and back with the stories and experiences to prove it.

Veltman is now a member of the Penney Farms Retirement Community. USS Yorktown memorabilia, a painting of a woman in a straw hat and pictures of his family feature prominently in his room.

During the embers of World War II, Veltman was an engineer with the Army, serving from 1944 to 1947, he said. Veltman was later based out of Ft. Campbell in Kentucky. He recalled a mentor, Sgt. York, who helped him get back in school.

"It might not be exciting to anyone, but it was tremendously exciting to me because it was there, I met a master sergeant who turned my life around," Veltman said. "That's something."

A generous company commander let him hitchhike to Michigan for school. Veltman was able to get more leave than normal, he recalled with a laugh.

"(The commander said), 'Just make sure you get back because my neck is on the line here if I ever get caught doing something like this.' ... You've worked very hard. I want to let you know that hard work pays," Veltman smiled. "That's the Army way."

During his stay in the Army, he turned to Jesus. After being discharged, Veltman got married to Mary Frances Coffey, who passed away in 2015. They were married for more than 60 years.

Veltman graduated from seminary school and wanted to return to the service as a chaplain. He imitated a phone conversation where a soldier asked him why he wanted to get back in. The Army didn't

work out.

However, Veltman had to decide what to do because his family had to eat. Mary was fine with Veltman reentering the service. Now in Chicago, a Navy recruiting office caught his eye.

"It was a pretty warm welcome. They said, 'Sign right here,'" Veltman said. "I didn't know I was even going to join the Navy. I thought the Navy was a place where you went in, got seasick and stayed seasick until they put you out."


Praying ship

"The USS Yorktown was a praying ship," begins the religious section of the carrier's cruise book from Oct. 16, 1968, to Feb. 28, 1969. Much of the booklet is about tasks and ceremonies related to the Apollo 8 mission, where astronauts Frank Borman, James Lovell and William Anders circled

the moon and photographed the other side of it. Lovell took the photo, "Earthrise," the first photo of the Earth from the perspective of the moon.

It was Veltman who wrote a Christmas prayer toward the end of the cruise book. He prayed for the safety of the astronauts, their families and the crew recovering them. His writings convey the joy and isolation of celebrating the holiday on the ship. The sailors made adjustments to make Christmas function, he wrote.

"And so it was with the Yorktown in this very holy time. Gifts from home, received and held for weeks, were opened beneath makeshift Christmas trees, praise in the form of Christmas carols was sung in Chapel Services and played on the phonographs and sound systems throughout the ship, and love was experienced over the distance, often in terms of loneliness



and the heartfelt desire to be with those were separated," Veltman wrote more than 50 years ago.

Veltman was based out of Okinawa after about a year of service. He served in the Navy from 1954 until 1976. Reflecting on his work as a chaplain, Veltman said it was important to understand what soldiers or sailors were going through.

"I was completely captivated by what I was doing. Somehow God had put me there," Veltman said. "I didn't know much about God, but I knew that I knew more than the men who were serving."

An officer would ask him if a sailor was worth saving. The answer was always yes, Veltman recalled. The chaplain's first responsibility was to Jesus first, and Veltman used the phrase, "in the Navy, but not of," to describe a chaplain's role.

group of individuals working to make it the best we can be," Helbling said. "We're really happy to be a part of it."

Looking toward the future, Helbling said there are possibilities of partnering with their new neighbor, St. Johns River State College. "Think about what we'll be able to do when we're right down the road from St. Johns River State," Helbling said.

Helbling, who spent most of her career in higher education, has been the director of Pace Center for Girls since January. The center and its mission fit nicely with what she wanted to do, she said.

"The idea that we're supporting girls, so they can make positive changes and affect their communities, felt very rewarding and good to me," Helbling said.

Clay County Emergency Management Di-

rector John Ward is on the Pace board. He spoke highly of Helbling and her stewardship of the school. "Since joining the team in January, Cristina has already brought innovative change to Pace Clay," Ward said in a statement. "Her leadership will meet the needs of the next generation of girls in Clay." Pace is more than academics, Helbling said. The center has 51 at-risk girls between the ages of 11 and 18 with wrap-around services like counseling. The non-academic teaching can range from coping skills, anger management, financial literacy or nutrition. Helbling uses words like "holistic" when describing the center's efforts, something most schools don't have the resources to do.

"I think we need to meet them where they are and everyone is in a different space," she said. "The size of our program allows us to do that ... we're very fortunate because we can really help them make great progress and great gains."

He had a decision to make: to leave the Navy or continue working his way up the chain of command. Veltman presses three fingers on his shoulder.

"Of all the crazy things, I had three stripes on my sleeve!" he said. "I just did what I loved to do."

Some things stay with you

The wall is still a bulkhead, Veltman jokes back in Penney Farms. Some things the Navy teaches stay with you.

Next to the window on the wall is a painting, Mary Veltman's recreation of French impressionist painter Pierre-Auguste Renoir's, "Young Girl in a Straw Hat." Her art teacher asked for a perfect copy, and Mary Veltman delivered, her husband said. "When she brought it in, (the teacher) took it home," Veltman said. "He came back the next day and he said, 'I don't know

which one is the original.'"

Veltman has four children and he describes their career paths with ease and in great detail. He has more than a dozen grandchildren or great-grandchildren. He remembered his wife teaching Sunday school.

"Children were just drawn to her," Veltman said.

Being a chaplain was a lonely life at sea. After the service, Veltman later became a United Presbyterian pastor for several churches in West Virginia. He sought

to eliminate prejudices through his teachings. "We're all going together and as a church, we're together," he said.

In the middle of the conversation, Veltman stops and says he looks forward to meeting Jesus. There will be a day, Veltman adds, he can kiss Jesus on the cheek.

"I can't understand anything so beautiful in all my life as to kiss Jesus Christ on the cheek after being kissed by him," Veltman said, his voice rising. "I don't know how anyone could ask for anything more in all of creation."

JTA provides commissioners outlay of its plans

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – With public transit, the planning never stops. The Jacksonville Transportation Authority is continuing its push into Clay County.

Charles Frazier, JTA's new CEO, addressed the board of county commissioners last week. He told commissioners he wanted to talk about the next few years so commissioners could make strategic decisions.

Frazier and his team gave an overview of the Clay County Transit Study, short-term improvements and the next couple interlocal agreements between both agencies.

JTA Project Manager Jeremy Norsworthy said the agency is building on previous work done by the Transportation Planning Organization.

JTA successfully bid to run public transportation in the county after taking over it temporarily when the Clay County Council on Aging ran the program at a huge deficit.

Consultants at Reynolds, Smith & Hills; England-Thims & Miller and public involvement Quest will coordinate with JTA on its Clay endeavors.

Beverly Davis, a certified planner with RS&H, said a thorough transit plan is a combination of the users, the area's layout, the demand, and fixed routes and the capi-

tal backing the project, she said.

Davis wanted a plan that commissioners could work with, rather than something that would sit on the shelf.

"All of that will be tied together with public and stakeholder involvement at those very important milestones to come up with the overall transit development plan," Davis said. "Our approach is really going to build on the technical findings to

craft a plan for the future that really provides a blueprint for the future of the transit system."

A transit plan could take eight-to-nine months between data collection, community involvement and analyzing the county's transit systems and possible improvements.

Frazier laid out a roadmap for the county and JTA's future collaboration. The

current interlocal agreement expires on Sept. 30.

"We are in the process of finalizing edits to that agreement," Frazier said. "... What that does is, it gives us another renewal until September of next year."

Commissioners asked JTA officials how to handle growth and get more people to use public transit. In terms of high gas prices, Chairman Wayne Bolla said you can't warm your car up for how little JTA fares cost.

Frazier replied public meetings, relying on county staff and tasking government officials with using the system and providing feedback are worthy ideas.

Frazier said he favored a local approach and said consultants and JTA brass have visited senior centers and bus riders in Clay County. He said there could be short-term fixes to flex and bus routes, safety changes and switching up marketing materials.

"There's some parking issues we're going to address as well," Frazier said. "You're going to see some of those in the near term. They're small but important."

After the transit study is completed, Frazier said it would be to bring commissioners transit recommendations.

"By next February, we really want to be here and present you with options," Frazier said.

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Green Cove Springs to get \$1.4 million for economic growth

Money comes from Community Development Block Grant

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The state announced Tuesday that Green Cove Springs would receive nearly \$1.4 million in Community Development Block Grant money, and it's been earmarked to address a variety of services for the city.

While the money will be used to refurbish the stage and cafetorium at the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center. But the benefits will be far-reaching, city manager Steve Kennedy said.

"The idea is it can become a multi-use facility to support not only the low- to the moderate-income community but also an alternate location for a subsequent pandemic and we needed a place to do testing or vaccination or distribution of supplies if we needed to feed people part.

"Part of the restoration includes replacing the stage that was in there. I guess it's like all cafetoriums where they had a stage for performances or band concerts or that sort of thing."

The state made the block grants available as part of the COVID-19 rescue. In addition to upgrading the facilities, Kennedy said the kitchen will be remodeled so it can be used to provide other services to low-income families or during an emergency.

"At some point in the future we will have it like a community center," he said. "The people in the neighborhood can rent it and use it for family reunions. Or businesses can use it for a location to have business meetings. The food pantry is right there. So that function would be close by if we need to use them.

"Right now we have Headstart, like the early AMI Kids program is right there. They both get food prepared and

Chief Asdot, Hiles to join GCSPD's Wall of Honor

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Chief John Guzman said Thelma Hiles and Chief Derek Asdot will be the first inductees to the police department's Wall of Honor. Guzman made the announcement during the City Council meeting on Tuesday, June 21.

"This wall will serve to honor our agency's history and the contributions made by past members. It is important to preserve the past; ensuring that members who played vital roles in our department are never forgotten," Guzman said.

Hiles became the first female law enforcement officer in the Green Cove Springs Police Department—and possibly Clay County—in June 1975 after

obtaining her Law Enforcement Officer Certificate at the police academy in St. Johns County. During her time with the Department Hiles served in several areas, including Dispatcher, Uniform Crime Report Specialist, Law Enforcement Officer, and Secretary before retiring in 1989.

Asdot began his work with GCSPD as a law enforcement officer in 2002 and became Chief of Police in 2017. Chief Asdot is widely regarded as a progressive leader who spearheaded dynamic transformational changes at the Green Cove Springs Police Department in a short period of time. During his law enforcement career, he served as a DEA Task Force Officer out of the Jacksonville Regional Office and as a Detective on the Clay County Drug Task Force, as well as served as a member of the Florida Narcotics Officers' Association. Chief Asdot died of complications from contracting the COVID-19 virus on Sept. 28, to become the first Line of Duty death in the history of the department.

The Wall of Honor cannot be accessed by the public, but rather serves as a reminder and inspiration to GCSPD officers and staff of how the contributions of officers and staff in the past have shaped the way the Police Department runs today.

"Many years and many moves later, I found myself living around the corner from St. Johns River State College," Wilson said. "Still, it took some time for me to work up the nerve to try again. Eventually, I did, and the enrollment process led me to the counselor's office where I met Dr. Patrick Arnwine, and I'm very excited for the opportunity to shine a light on this very special educator." Wilson's essay includes her experience with panic attacks that she developed while grieving the death of her mother. Noting her counselor's compassionate nature she said, "Dr. Arnwine would let me stand in his office behind the door and just cry or catch my breath, just long enough so that I could carry on."

According to Arnwine, it did not take long to notice Wilson's courage and potential as a student and a student worker in the advising office.

"She immediately stood out as a key person of the team. It was and is a joy to watch her accomplish her goals and to be a part of her journey," he said. "She is a good spirit... I cannot wait to see what she does next."

Wilson will graduate this summer with her Associate's of Arts degree. She plans to enroll in SJR State's bachelor's degree in

organizational management this fall.

some sort of way,” she said. “It’s progress, slowly but surely.”

Sharon Flowers and Chante Brumell attended the event with Middleburg’s Love Alive Church. Juneteenth is a reminder of when the slaves were freed, Flowers said. Events like last Friday’s get the ball rolling, Flowers said, and she wanted it to be a day of unity rather than division.

“It’s about beginning the awareness of Juneteenth and what it means,” she added.

“You have a federal holiday and some people might not know what it means.”

Brumell said there should be a goal for the holiday to grow each year in awareness and recognition. She also spoke in support of Black-owned businesses.

“You see it everywhere, where you didn’t see it before. You’re seeing retailers selling certain things,” Brumell said. “It makes people Google it like, ‘What does that mean?’ I think over the next few years, it’s going to get bigger and bigger with people celebrating and we’ll start seeing more people celebrating with us.”



healthcare providers at the poison center are here to help, toll-free, seven days a week at (800) 222-1222.”

Here are 12 tips to keeping your family safe:

- Program the poison hotline on your cellphone. Fast, free, confidential help is available 24 hours a day at (800) 222-1222.

- Snake bites. Florida is home to 44 species of snakes, but only six are venomous. Snakes are active all year, but most active from April to September. If you are bitten, call poison control immediately. Do not ice the bite or try to suck the venom out.

- Food poisoning. Cookouts, picnics and beach days call for extra precautions. Don't allow refrigerated foods to get warmer than 40 degrees and do not let food sit at room temperature for more



than two hours.

- Lawn and garden chemicals. Follow all instructions. Leave products in their original containers. Keep all containers locked up and out of sight and reach of children.

- Plants. Know the names of all the plants in your yard. If you come in contact with poison ivy, oak or sumac, rinse with running water for at least five minutes.

- Insect bites. While most insect bites

and stings are painful, they can be treated at home.

Some can be lethal so all bites and stings need your attention. If you have extreme swelling, puss or other abnormal reactions, call poison control immediately.

- Medication. With children spending more time at home, the chance of them getting into things increases. Make sure all medicine (prescription and nonprescription), supplements and vitamins are

locked up and away.

- Carbon monoxide. Camping stoves, grills and generators all pose a potential danger. Make sure all are in well-ventilated areas at least 20 feet from your home.


- Swimming pool chemicals. Inhaling chlorine products can irritate the respiratory system.

Store all pool chemicals in a secure place out of the reach of children.

- Alcohol. Alcohol can be a deadly poison for children due to their size. Do not leave alcoholic beverages, facial cleaners and mouthwash where children can reach them.

- Mushrooms. Eating even a few bites of a poisonous mushroom can cause liver damage that can kill you. Do not eat mushrooms growing in the wild.

- Marine stings. Marine stings can cause life-threatening allergic reactions. Call 911 if you have trouble breathing, feel faint or have chest pain. All other marine stings can be treated at home after calling (800) 222-1222.

brought in from other locations. In some cases, struggling individuals, students and in some cases, kids. That could be a location that we could use a kitchen to prepare meals for not only events but for those folks that need our meals during the day. And is just on and on and on.”

Gov. Ron DeSantis awarded more than \$28.4 million in funding for economic growth and community resiliency to 23 Florida communities through the Community Development Block Grant – CV program. Of that, \$1,397,600 will be headed

to Green Cove Springs.

In all, 23 Florida communities will receive money through block grants or the Rebuild Florida Hazard Mitigation Grant Match Program.

“Supporting the growth and resilience of Florida communities is the best way to ensure Florida’s strong future,” DeSantis said. “Investments made today will provide 23 communities with access to the resources they need to diversify their economies, increase public safety, and mitigate future risks.”

“Governor DeSantis has championed the economic growth of Florida’s communities by making continued investments in their success,” said Department of Eco-

nomic Opportunity Secretary Dane Eagle. “DEO is proud to support his efforts by connecting communities to opportunities that suit their unique needs and foster generational growth for their residents.”

The block grant money will allow the city to finish its long, arduous work on renewing the Augusta Savage Center.

“Really, it was the last function that we were looking to complete over the biggest complex,” he said. “Everything else because we’ve done a lot of work on the gym, we did an AMI Kids expanded food pantry. It starts there. The mentoring centers right next door and fixing this building up will kind of complete the vision for having that as a support community or a place to get

social services support.”

The CDBG-CV program, administered by DEO, primarily benefits low- and moderate-income residents. Activities include workforce housing, training and sustainability, as well as broadband infrastructure and planning.

Only Alachua County (\$4,000,782) and the City of Coleman (\$1,772,500) were awarded larger amounts.





Against Lake Minneola and Ocoee, Wimberly liked what he saw.


So did Kearney.

"We are now getting them in shape for July now because July is going to get pretty intense," said Wimberly. "I think they are getting their minds right for that."




Clay offensive coach Brian Flaherty watches blocking technique.



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


