Women proudly play significant role in fighting crime, keeping community safe

CLAY COUNTY – For many, the perception of law enforcement was shaped by what they saw on television, which often fed stereotypes of policemen with guns strapped to their hops chasing after bad guys.

We thought to be a cop, you had to be tough and aggressive. And a man.

"Social and Entertainment Media really impacts people's perception of Law Enforcement," said Sheriff Michelle Cook.

Cook was elected in 2020. Before being elected as Sheriff, she served as Chief of the Atlantic Beach Police Department. She is Clay County's first woman sheriff and

is currently the only woman sheriff in the state. "Most people think the police spend all their time solving crimes and chasing the bad guys, but 99% of what we do is verbal communication."

As a leader in law enforcement. Cook believes in having genuine care for the community and a willingness to communicate, even when things get difficult. She said transparency leads to an agency's success.

"Leaders set the tone of the agency, she said. "When a leader deliberately communicates, that trickles down, and people

Orange Park Town Council review golf cart policy

ORANGE PARK – Town council members discussed action on a golf cart policy, ultimately asking town staff to review the matter.

Toward the end of Tuesday night's meeting, Town Council Member Doug Benefield outlined the item.

With golf carts, Benefield said, the town is full of families and using the vehicles without excessive regulation is preferred, though golf cart drivers should operate safely. Benefield added the town doesn't have substantive golf cart regulations.

"Currently the town's ordinances defer to the state involving golf carts," he said. "They are not specially authorized, there's a process to get them approved. My motion to direct staff is to draft and present to council a regulation related to the operation of golf carts in the town."

In the agenda packet, the city of Green Cove Springs' two-page ordinance was published as an example. The ordinance defines what a golf cart is, where it can be operated and the safety equipment the golf cart must have. The city must seek approval for golf cart use on state and federal highways, which would extend to U.S. Highway 17.

Orange Park Police Chief Gary Goble said there's a safety hazard and used St. Johns County as an example. Golf cart regulations are difficult to enforce, he said. "You can really see the younger people

don't care as much," Goble said. "We can make it happen, there needs to be a solid ordinance in place."

Mayor Randy Anderson said residents would have to be informed about a possible change. He asked about gold cart-related signs and the cost.

"How are we going to get the word out?" Anderson asked.

Vice Mayor Alan Watt wanted to see a driver's age established in an ordinance, especially if they operate a vehicle on one of the town's major arterial roads. He said the issue has been shot down in committees before.

"This has been kicked up and down the road for years," Watt said. "... To me, these are neighborhood vehicles. They shouldn't be out on state highways, they shouldn't be out across town. They should be a way to get around your neighborhood."

Resident Angela Wester said committees have asked the town council to do nothing on the item during a previous vote. She recalled that Moosehaven had a pleasant golf cart community, though she did have safety concerns and asked for the item to go before committees.

"This is definitely a first-world problem," Wester said.

After several meetings and hearings, the town council also passed its \$30 million budget on final reading early in the meeting. An amendment to remove a code enforcement officer position slated for \$66,000 failed with a 3-2 vote.

The meeting was extended by 15 minutes, then another extension was rejected 3-2 because it needed a super majority.

Tax Collector to open new Middleburg office

MIDDLEBURG – The Clay County Tax Collector's Office is targeting relocating to Blanding Boulevard to be more centrally located and serve more of the county.

Last week, the board approved an agreement with STG Contracting Group for the project. The project is estimated to cost \$699,000 for a full buildout of the 2710 Blanding Blvd. facility, which totals about 4,660 square feet.

The architect is Dasher Hearst. Plans call for demolition of the current building which is near the Winn-Dixie at the intersection of County Road 218 and Blanding Boulevard.

The Tax Collector's Office is currently based on Bear Run Boulevard. Tax Collector Diane Hutchings said the Bear Run office had outlived its lifespan by a few decades.

She said a new facility could improve spreading services. The current building didn't have the space to conduct things like driver testing.

"We're limited at what we can do at Bear Run (Boulevard)," Hutchings said. "We'll be able to do (driver's testing) now. We were able to add two additional stations for customer service, so we've got a little room to grow."

The project is expected to be completed by next spring. The Tax Collector will relocate from the Bear Run Office to a new space located in Middleburg. The county's involvement with the project involves financial oversight and project management, according to county documents.

Referring to the stark contrasts of the

facilities, Hutchings said people would no longer have to wait on the building's porch, as the new building will have a seating area. Hutchings added that the office is adding more electronic programs to serve more people with its current staff.

"Let me say we've worked really hard the last 18 months to plan smarter and not continue to hire a lot of people as the county grows," she said.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - More than 100 years ago, a little girl named Augusta Savage played in the mud. Just imagine the state of her dress: arms plastered with red clay up to her elbows. Picture her scooping the sticky, fine-grained earth into her hand, molding and forming it until the miraculous moment when it transforms into a human figure. She manipulated the clay with precision and care, fashioning the beginnings of a woman's face.

Her work was honored on Monday when the Augusta Savage Museum and Mentoring Center was dedicated with a historical marker and a grand re-opening following more than two years of remodeling and construction.

'She had an undeniable persistence and a refusal to be denied," said Henrietta Francis of the Friends of Augusta Savage Arts Community Center

Francis spoke to Savage's strength of character.

"Augusta knew that she had an innate talent at the age of four or five. Her father did not understand it. So it became, at an early age, a parent to discourage her love of art, but that didn't stop her," Francis said.

Augusta's father, the minister of the Black Episcopal Church, chastised his daughter's "graven images." According to the Smithsonian Arts Museum, Savage's claimed, "he licked me four or five times a week, and almost whipped all the art out of me," but Savage was determined and undaunted, cultivating her imagination and talent into a force that would later shape the face of sculpting in the 1920s.

Savage molded more than just clay. She molded a future for generations of artists. More than just a sculptor, Savage was one of the major players in the New Negro movement just before the Harlem Renaissance. After moving to New York at the height of the Harlem Renaissance. Augusta found her voice in portrait busts of prominent Black figures such as W. E. B. Du Bois and Marcus Garvey. In 1937, she worked

with the Federal Art Project to establish the Harlem Community Art Center and became its first director, dedicating her life to expanding educational and professional opportunities for African American artists.

Even now, nearly 50 years after her death, she remains an important part of Clay County History. Now her legacy will

be commemorated for all to see.

Through a partnership with the Historical Preservation Board, the State Division of Historical Resources, the City of Green Cove Springs and the Board of County Commissioners, there is now a permanent tribute to both the art of Augusta Savage SEE SAVAGE, 6

Dan Marino Follow these tips to keep health goals on track during football season

he kickoff to football season is here again, and with it comes pizza, beer, wings and more.

In a poll of 2,000 American men conducted by OnePoll and commissioned by Nutrisystem, 37% said they usually gain weight during football season from September to January, with 53% claiming they gain 10 pounds or more.

But football season doesn't need to wreak havoc on your overall health, wellness and weight loss goals. Just ask pro football Hall-of-Fame quarterback, Dan Marino.

"After playing pro football for 17 years, my knees took a beating and I had to have both of them replaced. Marino was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003 and inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005 in his first year of eligibility. His No. 13 currently is one of only three former Miami Dolphins to have his jersey number retired, joining Bob Grise (No. 12) and Larry Csonka (39).

Florida second only to Texas in in number of books banned by schools districts

Only Texas has banned books more frequently than Florida's public schools, according to a national free speech organization that attributed two new pieces of the state's legislation with an uptick in verboten books.

PEN America counted 566 Florida book bans spread over 21 of the state's 67 school districts from July 2021 to June 2022. That compares to the 801 bans in effect in 22 Texas school districts. Pennsylvania clocked in at third place with 457 bans in 11 school districts.

The report, issued Monday in recognition of Banned Books Week, raises the alarm from critics that this new momentum for banning books could impair the free exchange of ideas that makes American democracy work.

In the vast majority of cases, the new wave is much more than a parent objecting to a book found in their child's backpack, officials from PEN America said. It's coming from organized and coordinated groups such as the national Moms for Liberty and Florida Citizens Alliance.

"Today's wave of bans represents a coordinated campaign to banish books being waged by sophisticated, ideological and well-resourced advocacy organizations," said Suzanne Nossel, chief executive officer of PEN America.

"This censorious movement is turning our public schools into political battlegrounds, driving wedges within communities, forcing teachers and librarians from their jobs, and casting a chill over the spirit of open inquiry and intellectual freedom that underpin a flourishing democracy."

The state Department of Education did not immediately return an inquiry seeking comment on the findings, which specifically cited the passage of the Parental Rights in Education Law (HB 1557) and another on K-12 Education (HB 1467), which calls for an open review of all educational materials.

According to PEN's study, the banned material most often concerns LGBTQ issues and/or features a protagonist or secondary character who is not White. Out of the 1,648 titles banned, 674, or 41%, addressed LGBTQ themes. And 659, or 41%, had main characters or secondary characters who were not White.

Groups such as the Florida Citizens Alliance (FCA) and even Gov. Ron De-Santis, who had members of FCA on his transition team, say they aim to keep obscene material out of schools and stop "indoctrination." But Ashley Hope Perez, author of "Out of Darkness," a young adult novel, said the increasing number of book bans is part of a reaction against featuring characters more diverse than Dick and Jane.

Her novel, about a Mexican American teen who falls in love with a Black teen in the 1930s, was published seven years ago and hadn't even been challenged until very recently.

"Using concerns about sexual or graphic content is a pretext for this coordinated effort to block young people's access to books that represent diverse identities and experiences," she said. "It's a political strategy."

The group also noted that the new atmosphere has meant that school districts preemptively purge their collections to avoid challenges. Among them:

• The Broward County School District donated 11 boxes of LGBTQ-themed books to the Stonewall National Museum & Archives.

• Palm Beach County schools also reviewed and removed two books about transgender youth, including one about a Broward teenager who shared her story about gender transition surgeries and therapy.

• Brevard County schools canceled their use of a math learning game and paused all individual classroom libraries because of concerns it might fall on the wrong side of the new laws.

Even more, Jonathan Friedman, director of free expression at PEN America, said "best practices" are not being followed in

96% of the book challenges his organization considered. He noted that many schools pull books as soon as they are challenged. And that poses a serious problem for the continued operation of school libraries.

"If you can file 500 library book challenges, and all those books are immediately pulled from the shelves, how can you possibly run a school library?" he asked rhetorically. "A modicum of due process is a fundamental necessity ... to protect school libraries and student rights."


We were able to secure \$225,000 in this year's State budget for Clay County seniors via Clay County Senior Services of Aging True (HB 2981). This money will help with necessary life, health, and safety improvements to the County's senior centers so that our elderly citizens can remain independent, in their homes, and the community

In addition, there's \$500,000 for the Crisis Prevention Teams of Clay Behavioral Health (HB 2983). This project provides increased care for individuals with serious mental illnesses in our county. Crisis Prevention Teams give evidence-based, trauma-informed care and do it in an efficient and cost-effective manner. Prompt care and attention reduce the need for more costly and restrictive services down the road and provide immediate help to families in crisis.

Another community highlight is the Jewish Family and Community Services (JFCS) receiving \$250,00 for their Holocaust Survivor Services (HB 3981). JFCS provides culturally relevant support, including financial and medication assistance, and care management to one hundred aged Florida Holocaust Survivors living in poverty. These services meet basic needs, improve physical and mental health, and help these survivors maintain independence and avoid premature institutionalization. It is the very least we can do to support those who have endured so much.

GCS plans to spend now on infrastructure to avoid higher costs in future

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A utility planning manager told Green Cove Springs it has two options to address its antiquated electrical distribution system – pay a little every year or face a huge bill in the future.

J.D. Bush with Patterson and Dewar Engineers presented to the city council his company's long-range plan to address the electrical needs of the city during Tuesday night's meeting.

He said a 20-year plan would accommodate the city's current and future needs by making necessary fixes now and spreading the costs to maintain equipment for the next two decades.

"When you spend \$1 today, you're not setting yourself up to have to spend additional money next year that you could have prevented or doing something a little different now," he said.

He said two of three Chapman Transformers are excessive aged and needed repair. He said the city needs an additional transmission line, although he's not sure where.

"One location that we looked at is on the north end of town," Bush said. "The other was on Idlewild just east of Governors Creek. Those are two different alternatives. The challenge there is that Florida Power and Light and FMPA (Florida Municipal Power Agency) would have to be involved. There's a lot of multi-utility planning and involved in that conversation. And transmission line will have to be built one way or the other. And so it's very well possible that none of those options may be physically possible because of the transmission constraints."

That new substation will need to be built by 2030, Bush said, and the cost is

estimated to be \$6,349,840.

Bush said the transformer at the Chapman Substation needs to be replaced in the next year – at a cost of \$2,200,438.

The city is facing future demands with 2,100 homes and 260 apartment units on the planning board to be built around Reynolds Industrial Pak at the southern end of the city. Patterson and Dewar estimated the cost to run an underground main line to the new housing development next year to be \$2.8 million.

By 2025, the city would need to spend another \$1.8 million to replace one circuit on aged power pole coming from Chapman and two circuits on a new set of poles.

Within the next 20 years, it should cost \$368,000 to strengthen the feed to the apartment complex and run ties around the sound end of Reynolds Airpark, and it will cost \$320,000 to complete the airpark tie 10-to-12 years from now.

Also, the city should expect to pay \$4.512 million to convert voltage systems on Harbor Road and the North and South-ends of the city.

By spreading the work over many years, the city won't get one overwhelming bill down the road. In all, Bush said the city faces \$18,765,278 of costs to replace, build and maintain its electrical distribution in the next 20 years.

In other business, the city agreed to increase the millage rate for fiscal year 2023 by 32.12% to raise an additional \$2,845,534 in revenues. The new millage rate will be 4.5. Next year's budget was set at \$55,159,694, which is \$667,991 less than the current budget.

The city council meets on the first and third Tuesday at 7 p.m. of each month at City Hall.

and her legacy of activism in the form of the Florida Historical Marker titled: Augusta Savage: Sculptor, Teacher, Civil Rights Activist. The historical maker can be found at the childhood home of Augusta Savage at 1107 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. Her family home was the site of Dunbar High, the only Back high school in Clay County. The marker is not only a reminder of Savage's dedication, perseverance, and fortitude but the ambition and undeniable persistence of Clay County's Black student leaders.

"Having a mentor center and having the historical marker and all the pieces coming together is bringing life back to that center which brings more notoriety to the community," said Green Cove Springs City Vice Mayor Connie Buter. "It's been a long time coming. Another piece of the puzzle is to complete the auditorium. You know, we got \$1.3 (million in funding). We're looking to complete that, and once that's completed, it will be improving lives."

Now, what used to be Dunbar now is a mentoring center and museum. It will pave the way for the next generation of student leaders as a mentorship center.

"The Augusta Savage Museum and Mentoring Center, the newest addition to the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center complex will keep Savage's spirit alive," Francis said.

Constructed in 2021, the mentoring center opened its doors to the community this fall with free classes in visual arts, dance, and tutoring in math and reading for youth from first-through-12th grades. It is Clay County and the City of Green Cove Springs' goal that the volunteer-run programming at the mentoring center will blossom to inspire future generations in the same way that Augusta Savage's classes inspired generations of artists.

"It was Augusta Savages' dream – her ambition in life – to inspire others to develop their talent," says District 5 Commissioner Kristen Burke. "And, the City of Green Cove Springs has so beautifully recognized her dream and made it a remarkable reality for young people in our community to be inspired to achieve greatness in their lifetimes, and for many generations to come." The Augusta Savage dedication is one of many historical markers in Clay County dedicated to uncovering new voices and looking more closely at our complex past to shine a light on the extraordinary visionaries of our past and present.



see that. When they see their leaders being invested, forthcoming, and honest, our officers reflect that in their community."

Det. Katherine Padgett, who has been with the sheriff's office for more than 20 years, said the culture of the workplace has changed a lot since Cook's election.

"She has been very transparent, which is refreshing to everyone. She means what she said. I look up to her and highly respect her because she is a leader and because she is a female. Even for people like me who have been in the field for a while, you look at her and say, "My gosh, you still can go farther." It's really good to see. It's really uplifting for women to see a female sheriff who does so much good in her community."

According to National Public Radio, women make up just 12% of the law enforcement officers in the country, with just 3% of them serving in leadership. Nearly 6,000 women police officers make up a small fraction of the state's roughly 46.000 sworn officers. Today, there are more than 674 full- and part-time members of the Clay County Sheriff's Office, including 233 women. Broken down into different classifications, there are 195 full-time women employees and 38 part-timers. In total, women employees make up nearly 30% of law enforcement in Clay County, more than double the national average. While many of these women carry a badge, others work behind the scenes as Crime Scene Technicians, Human Resource Specialists, Records Specialists, Mental health Advisors and Victim Advocates, just to name a few.

Women make up significant portions of the rosters – particularly in command – at the Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments. Orange Park has four certified women officers, including Cpl. Samantha Frehulfer, while Green Cove Springs has six women officers, including Cmdr. Barbara Luedtke and Sgt. Tammy Perry, Sgt. Erin Vineyard.

Luedtke has been with the department for 18 years, $% \left({{{\rm{T}}_{{\rm{T}}}}_{{\rm{T}}}} \right)$

"There was only one other female officer, which was Tammy Perry, when I got here," Luedtke said. "It was a man-driven profession and you had to earn your keep, which is the best way I can describe it."

"I spent 5½ years in the Navy and I liked the military structure and the discipline and the ranking structure. And I don't have to guess what I'm wearing every day.

Hayley Flynn has been with GCSPD for 13 months. She said it's a great job for anyone – man or woman.

"Growing up, I always looked up to cops," she said. "I always love seeing how they helped people and seeing how they were able to make a difference. And you know, we get to put bad guys away and we get to help the good guys."

Green Cove Springs has the distinction of hiring the first woman officer, Themla Hiles, in June 1975. Hiles retired in 1989, but not before serving with several departments – dispatcher, uniform crime report specialists, police officer and secretary.

Monday, Sept. 12, was National Women in Law Enforcement Day. It was designed to acknowledge and celebrate the women who protect and serve their communities. Women in Clay County, however, pin their badges and patrol our streets every day without acclaim.

While the percentages of women in law enforcement may be lower than the average workplace, the opportunities for women in the field are only growing, Padgett said. "From when I started, I think in law enforcement, we may have had three, maybe four agents, and now we have so many

females I don't even know them all. And it's really refreshing that we are finally catching up with the times."

CCSO Det. Heather Lanier, who's worked for the agency for 19 years, agreed law enforcement is becoming more diverse and inclusive.

"Even in the background, you don't see a lot of disparity. The possibilities and openness it's huge. It's awesome," she said.

However, not everyone is accepting of women coming into the field.

"Sometimes being a woman in this industry is helpful, sometimes not," Cook said. "For example, I've had people refuse to talk to me because I am a woman. I've had people tell me they wouldn't vote for me because they don't think there should be a female sheriff."

But Cook doesn't let this bother her. If anything, it strengthens her support for

Not guilty Former sheriff Daniels cleared of lying to investigators, tampering with evidence

'This type of government overreach has to stop'

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Saying he was grateful a Clay County jury found him not guilty on all seven charges stemming from a six-year extramarital affair, former Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels compared his three-year ordeal to the persecution of former president Donald Trump and called out the abuse of power by government entities.

The state tried to convince jurists he lied to investigators about the affair and that he wanted his former mistress arrested for stalking. Prosecutors also said he attempted to destroy and tamper with evidence.

Daniels' defense team said he was trying to hide information about the affair from his wife to save his marriage.

The jury needed less than three hours on Thursday, Sept. 15, to agree with Daniels.

Known for his bravado, Daniels issued a statement following the verdict:

"I would like to thank the jury for their service and thank all of the people of Florida for their support during this challenging time for me and for my family. The abuse and overreach that I have had to endure over the past three years is an example of what happens when sectors of our government go unchecked. If this abuse of power by government entities can happen to a duly elected sheriff, then it can happen to anyone. I pledge to all Floridians and people from across the country who offered their support during these trying

times, that I will continue to fight for them to ensure that we all receive equal justice under the law. This abuse cost me my job that I loved and it cost Clay County their sheriff. Similar to what we are seeing happen to former President Donald Trump and now with the Biden Administration working to hire 87,000 new IRS agents to harass and abuse Americans across the country, this type of government overreach has to stop. I look forward to identifying ways to continue to serve the people and working to ensure that the government works for them and not to persecute them."

His mistress, Cierra Smith, and Clay County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Christopher Ruby testified Daniels ordered Smith the be arrested for stalking him. She was stopped on May 6, 2019, in an Oakleaf Village Parkway parking lot and taken to the Clay County Jail. Smith said Daniels asked to meet her to get a copy of a CD of an internal investigation at the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office where it was likely he would be identified as having an affair when both Smith and Daniels worked for JSO.

Smith wasn't charged or booked after other agency officials said there wasn't any probable cause. CCSO then drove Smith home.

Within days, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement launched an investigation. They obtained a warrant for seven charges, and the sheriff was arrested on Aug. 13, 2020 - just five days before the 2020 primary. He wound up losing to Michelle Cook by 3,121 votes.

The state found more than 2,000 texts

and voice messages between the couple.

Prosecutors said Daniels lied to Ruby at the scene, telling him he attempted to get a restraining order against Smith earlier in the day. However, the Clay County Clerk's Office said there were no records of any requests.

Assistant State Attorney Toby Hunt told the jury Daniels took action to alter evidence, including asking a CCSO tech to wipe out records on his agency-issued phone.

"He actually did destroy evidence because there is no way for the state to retrieve that now," Hunt said.

"It's just a coincidence that you chose to do this search and chose to delete a 10-year-old Gmail Google account immediately after the woman he had a six-year affair with gets arrested involving him?"

Defense attorney Matthew Kachergus challenged the integrity of Smith and Ruby's testimony in his closing remarks. Daniels told FDLE he never asked Ruby to arrest Smith.

Kachergus said anything erased or hidden by Daniels was to keep his wife from learning the sorted details of their relationship.

After the verdict, Daniels hugged his defense team.

 $``I\ feel\ good.\ I\ promise\ a\ press\ conference\ at\ a\ later\ time,"\ Daniels\ said.$

Kachergus again fired back at the state for bringing any charges against his client.

"Mr. Daniels' arrest five days before an election was troubling, and I'm glad that the jury saw through what this was about and arrived at the verdict that they did. (I'm) glad that my client is able to go home tonight, put this behind him and start the next chapter of his life."

Fleming Island man provides unique education on Tik Tok

FLEMING ISLAND – With videos such as "Things That Will Change Your Perception Of Time," Adorian Deck has a way of going viral, whether it's his own Tik Tok channel or for a client.

Deck started making videos on YouTube when he was 13. In 2009, he started the OMG Facts Twitter account, essentially a brand of education entertainment.

After selling the account, he later founded Decked Out Media. Some of his clients are social media royalty with millions of followers on a platform like YouTube, but Deck's goal is to get them trending on different platforms to increase their earnings. "It really just started by reaching out to people I already knew in the YouTube world. I met all kinds of different people by putting myself out there and going to events," he said. "It started with one of them, saying, 'Hey, I see a massive opportunity to grow."

That knowledge brought him to Tik Tok. He felt his brand of educational entertainment could adapt. But Deck likes a challenge. Video by video, his audience grew. The aforementioned video about perceiving time has more than 14.2 million views. It was time to spring into action with the ideas he had been storing. His videos covered lifechanging facts, disturbing facts and facts about geography and psychology.

In June of 2020, he recalled telling his

now-wife his own Tik Tok channel could hit one million followers by Christmas.

"I got my first million followers in 45 days," Deck said. "It was by the end of July."

Nasty comments are a part of the business. Deck said if he's wrong he'll correct himself because he doesn't want to spread misinformation. Creators develop a thick skin, he said.

"It's about understanding that usually if someone's being mean to you, it's them," Deck said. "It's way easier said than done to internalize that."

Deck now has 43.1 million likes for his videos and 3.4 million followers. Tik Tok's algorithm is the best way to go viral overnight, he explained. A video will be seen by a few

hundred people, the algorithm determines if it's worthy of 1,000 people, 10,000 and so on.

"It's the smartest algorithm to build something from scratch. If you can make something people want to watch, Tik Tok is going to grow that audience for you," Deck said. "This is really the platform that lets anybody take off if they want to in any niche they want." That freedom allows Deck to make videos he would want to watch. At the same time, it's about the viewer, he added.

"I think education entertainment, there are so many different forms of it. I think I want viewers to take away something interesting and you're going to grow and learn something new," Deck said.



Orange Park High sparking student interest with CTE welding training

ORANGE PARK – Welding instructor Sherman Smith watched intently as a student used a welding simulator.

A good welder is as tough to find, Smith said. The rest of the class murmured about what score was received: this is competitive. After the student gets a score of 91, Smith's praise was measured.

"All right, all right, try again," he said to quiet the classroom.

Smith said he needs students to understand the purpose of education, and the reasons to have self-control and discipline. Following directions, preparation and timeliness are expectations from the instructor with decades of experience in the field and teaching.

"I want them to be prepared for life in our society," he said. "They've got to be disciplined to follow my rules. Why? It's to protect them and others."

The modern world is full of distractions.

For impressionable youth, the emphasis on rules before the fun is stressed by the danger of the field.

Smith graduated from Orange Park in 1979 and recalled taking welding classes. A move to teaching made sense because he liked helping younger people.

"It's about having an opportunity to give back what was given to me. I had some people who invested in me and took (the) time to talk to me. I tell people who want to get into teaching, you better love kids. You better love people," Smith said.

Welding is just a part of it, Smith said. The students learn what excellence is because they will be working on projects for homeowners or businesses one day.

"One student came by this morning ... he said, I remember those push-ups I had to do," Smith said with fondness. "Back then, if you were late to class, I didn't write referrals. The way I gauge character is if they did it. If the kid had the discipline, that showed ownership."

The impact of the program is felt by

students. Senior Sal Robinson added the courses offer a chance to be independent.

"Being able to support yourself with a career is something that's important to me," Robinson said.

Senior Jeron Cuyler said there are so many types of welding and it's far removed from an office job. Junior Emily Kuchler said students notice welds, good and bad, and build an appreciation for them.

"(Welding) is so small and so simple but it affects people throughout the world. You never really realize how much stuff is welded together," Kuchler said. "You can look around ... looking at other boats, you think, 'They could have done better with that (weld).' I like that aspect, looking around at real-world things. Even part of this room, somebody had to weld that to-gether."

Back in the classroom, the reality is that welding is a high-skill job always in need of workers. The changes in the field have been enormous and Smith said he maintains contact with companies. He said he pushed for higher wages in the field and relayed its importance.

"The demand is great. You'll never be able to not have human welders," Smith said. "With ships, trains, planes, all kinds of stuff, it's needed. The biggest thing about these companies is finding dependable people. If they find dependable people, they can train them."

Fiber-optic network expands to Orange Park, Fleming Island

CLAY COUNTY - A Jacksonville fiber company is adding service to one of Clay County's busiest areas in a privately funded initiative

Fiber-optic internet service provider, IQ Fiber, launched about a year ago. Rapid growth led to an expansion into Clav County, CEO Ted Schremp said.

The company has expanded to 50 employees and recently opened a facility in Murray Hill.

Its first customer network was established in San Jose Forest, though networks in San Marco and Atlantic Beach are also coming online in phases.

"All the core work is done, to us, this is extending the network into an additional footprint." Schremp said.

Engineering designs and permits have been in progress for months, Schremp added. He said he hopes to break ground in the next couple of weeks for the underground construction.

"The construction requires reels of fiber-optic cable laid underground," Schremp said. "It's labor and equipment intensive.'

The number of potential customers is still to be determined.

Fiber is not new, but its use has slowly come to the fore. The country's internet infrastructure used DSL poles, which were technology meant for phones. Then, the internet used the cable infrastructure meant for cable television.

The scale of the implementation of fiber depends on population, the high cost of building and maintaining the infrastructure.

Internet providers have also tried to thwart the entry of fiber into cities, though fiber entered and created networks in cities such as Kansas City, Atlanta and Salt Lake City. Now, fiber can go into living rooms.

"Over the course of the past few decades to support the internet, it adapted other technologies. Fiber is the core of telecom architecture," Schremp said. "Absolutely everything is frankly using suboptimal adapted technology."

Fiber is often referred to as a symmetrical service, which means the upload speeds can equal download speeds. Having fast and reliable internet is a high priority in fields like telehealth, education and for people who work from home.

Part of IQ Fiber's goal is establishing service in underserved areas. She said the private investment is approximately \$20

million. covering a majority of the Town of Orange Park and some of Fleming Island.

"Since 2020, we have had more people working from home than ever before," Smithers said. "It's how we live our lives."

Schremp explained an internet connection is no longer limited to a cellphone here or a computer there. He referenced the Internet of Things, a concept that is an overview of how many devices can use the internet.

It's tough to imagine a garage door or a washing machine requiring the internet, but Schremp said the technology is there now

"The fundamental issue here is providing choice where choice doesn't exist," he said

Moderation in the housing market shows a shift toward affordability in Clay

CLAY COUNTY - In most areas of Northeast Florida, the August housing market reflected a slight drop in median prices while the number of days homes sat on the market has gradually continued to climb.

Buyers can relish the good news that, for single-family homes, the percent closedover list price went down 27.7% as did the average list price, 1%, indicating a small tick up in affordability throughout the region

As far as affordability goes, the market still has a way to go to get back to the point where homes are affordable for people making the median family income. However, there are many indications that it is finally moving in the right direction. For instance, the region's Home Affordability Index inched up 2.9% to 70 for single-family homes.

The index measures housing affordability by measuring whether a typical family earns enough to qualify for a mortgage on a typical home, based on current interest rates, median income, and median home prices. A higher number means greater affordability.

In Clay County, the median price of single-family homes dropped to \$366,250



ing sales rose

19.3% to 309, and new listings rose 9.5% to 473. Active inventory for the county was 776 homes, an increase of 13% from July and a 2.6-month supply. The affordability index registered at 75, a 5.6% increase from the previous month.

"Moving into fall 2022 we continue to see the residential real estate market, which includes single-family homes, condos, and townhomes, continue to moderate and normalize," said NEFAR 2022 President Mark Rosener. "While still an 18% increase year over year, the median price in our sixcounty market has shown mild fluctuations month to month of between \$350,000 and \$365.000 since March. This indicates that

well below the 3,000 to 3,500 peak a little more than a year ago. Median days on the market have continued to increase to 31 days with only 19.1% of homes selling over list price and the sale-to-list price ratio settling into a more normal 98.6%.

New listings are hitting the market and active inventory has stabilized, with 3,200

new listings and 6.348 active listings. The combination of fewer unit sales and our current active inventory has increased the region's months of supply to 2.7 months, which has been stable over the past couple of months."

As far as single-family homes go, \$393,900 was the median price for the region in August, a scant 1.5% decline. As seen in the combined market of single-family, condos, and townhomes, the median days on the market for single-family residences hiked up 34.8%. Still, inventory remains historically low, with a 2.7-month supply and an active inventory of 5,323 singlefamily homes.

St. Johns County remains the most expensive area to live with a median singlefamily home price of \$555,000 and a Home Affordability Index number of 49. Yet the August median days on the market for singlefamily homes leaped up 34.6% to 35 days.

Rolling Hills neighborhood embraces junior tennis, pickleball leagues

LAKE ASBURY – The wheels of America's burgeoning pickleball revolution keep turning.

The past decade has seen a pickleball revolution, especially in Clay County, widely due to its simplicity and availability to several age groups.

The Rolling Hills neighborhood of Lake Asbury has six tennis courts and four pickleball courts. The program has an active schedule with junior players and a monthly U.S. Professional Tennis Association junior tournament on the first Friday night of every month.

Jimmy Haynes is a USPTA and International Federal of Pickleball and the Professional Pickleball Registry certified instructor. He began teaching at Rolling Hills in March of 2020, in addition to teaching at Oakleaf Plantation and his work as a minister in Jacksonville.

Haynes has witnessed the explosive growth of pickleball first-hand. He likens it to a combination of ping pong and tennis.

"It's just growing like crazy," Haynes said. "All around Duval County they are converting tennis courts to pickleball and it's happening a bit in Clay County as well."

There are tournaments almost every weekend in Clay and oftentimes people are waiting to play. Haynes said pickleball is accessible and takes less of a toll on the body. It's also inexpensive, not requiring a new ball as frequently as tennis.

"First off, it's a lot easier than tennis, it's not as strenuous. You usually play doubles," Haynes said. "If you play it right, you don't have to do a lot of running."

Haynes highlighted the sport's sociabil-

ity. The games are played in close quarters, one-third of a tennis court's size. He said the pickleball community has a reputation for being friendly and helpful.

"It's a very addicting sport," he said. An American Association of Retired Persons report said the median age of a

pickleball is 38 years old. For older ages, the sport combats physical inactivity and boosts cognitive functions critical to preventing dementia, a 2020 study from the Lancet Commission reviewed health risk factors for people later in life.

While pickleball continues to boom, tennis can be an outlet for students who miss out on baseball, basketball or football. A person need not be an amazing athlete to pick up tennis, Haynes said.

"You can play if you're not athletically gifted. If they want to play tournaments, we can step it up with lessons," Haynes said. "We have a lot of success stories like that, they're sitting around the house and their parents are worried. They get the tennis bug. Then they're on their high school teams. It really can be a life-changing experience."

Haynes also teaches a lesson for homeschool students every Wednesday at 10 a.m.

"It becomes their physical education," he said.

The free learn-to-play clinic takes place Monday at 6 p.m. at 3212 Bradley Creek Road. Rolling Hills offers classes for novices, and intermediates as well as competition in open play, tournaments or matches between clubs.

Beautiful Mess" and "Unbelievable" from their expansive catalog of hits that includes a No. 1 and 22 Top-20 hits, as well as three certified Platinum and five Gold albums

And while the band was formed in 1989, Roe said two songs mean the most to him.

"You know they're all we wouldn't have recorded them at the time we did a perfecting them." Roe said in an exclusive interview with Clay Today. "As much as we possibly could have released them if we didn't already really love them. So we're fully invested in those songs. They're somewhat like children, I guess, but for me as a singer, as a vocalist, you know, I believe 'One More Day', you know, the current, the current part allows me to kind of step out I think a little more. Another one is "Mama Don't Forget to Pray For Me." I lost my mother this past year. She was almost 90 years old. She had a great life. And she's with the Lord now."

Since the shutdown, new and classic bands alike have noticed fans haven't just returned, they've come back in huge numbers. Venues are filled with fans who grew tired of being forced to sit at home.

"I think that definitely, the whole nation figured out that 'hey, we'd like to congregate and we like to get together and unemployment is very, very low.' I think they have a new appreciation for anything to go out and enjoy the fruits of their labor. And that's what we intend to try to deliver and have fun and we play we try to get to all the songs we've been blessed to have through the years. Because I feel like that's when I go to a show to see some of my favorite acts. That's what I want to do. I want to hear what caused me to be a fan."

The group still does 80 shows a year.

The final month of their tour will revert to plaving songs from their Christmas album. "A Diamond Rio Christmas: The Star Still Shines." Not bad for a band that's been on the road for 33 of the last 34 years.

"We're able to maybe be a little more picky with how many dates we do in the year," Roe said. "This year, you know, 2020 kind of reset our lives. I think, a little bit. We're not ready to quit and we were reminded of how much we do enjoy what we're doing and how thankful we are for that and we worked hard to create a pretty good discography. We like going out on gigging and the money's good. There's three of us (original members) we're not all that old."

Roe said music always will be a way to silence the noise of discord. Once the band hits the stage, there are no political, social

or racial divides. It's time to sit back and enjov the moment.

That may be the reason live music has rebounded with such fervor.

"I'm completely in the moment," Roe said. "We have so many fans who have those particular songs that have really marked a milestone in their life or help them through some tougher times a lot of times. As a musician, what we do is entertainment business. Some of it is brutal to it is it's just kind of background noise, but a lot of times when you have a song that makes a lasting impact on the audience that is very gratifying for us because it is our life.'



On the first day, 92 households were able to destroy 5,116 pounds of sensitive materials in just two hours. Each one of these events is focused on convenience for the consumer and streamlined processes for the staff.

Residential consumers now follow the signs to the drop zone, complete a short form, donate and drive away without ever having to leave their vehicle. To save even more time, both the form and donation have been made available in advance online.

The average household drops off about 55 pounds and donates \$14 a visit. Considering that most drop-off shred sites charge more than \$.50 a pound; the Shred for Good's Residential Shred Drop-Off Program at \$.26/pound is a cost-effective alternative for the community it serves.



By crashing through the gate and challenging his ex-girlfriend, Parrish defied an order for protection against domestic violence

Parrish turned himself into the sheriff's office on Sept. 16. His bond was set at \$350,015.

through the mail. The arrests came after the CCSO SWAT and Narcotics Unit raided two homes on Sept. 10 and seized 30 firearms, as well as a large cache of drugs.

"We've been working on it since late June, early July," Clay County Sheriff Michelle Cook said. "We could have continued this investigation, but these guys were distributing so much. We had to pull

them off the street because just in a couple months time they had brought in enough fentanyl to kill four million people. And so we had to remove them as quickly as possible because they truly are a danger to soci-



ety with that level of distribution."

The arrests were part of a multi-agency, including federal, state and county agencies, investigation that started in June, Cook said. The arrests were in conjunction with large seizures of cocaine, fentanyl and methamphetamine in both Jacksonville and Nassau County. Less than a week before Setzer and Mercado were taken into custody, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office confiscated more than three kilos of fentanyl, more than one kilo of cocaine and 6,000 pills containing fentanyl.

Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody joined sheriff's office officials Wednesday afternoon to provide details of the investi-

gation and arrests.

According to two lengthy arrest reports, Setzer and Mercado received fentanyl, methamphetamine and cocaine from an address in California. Packages were sent to Setzer on William Paca Street in Orange Park and Mercado at houses on Eagle Cove Drive and River Breeze Drive on Fleming Island.

According to the arrest report, bricks of the drugs were "broken down and then

distributed."

The drugs were sent to various locations in Northeast Florida and cash was mailed back to the same address in California, Cook said.

On Aug. 5, deputies watched Mercado deliver a priority mail box to the Fleming Island post office. The return address wasn't valid, the post office said, and the name on the box was Calvin Marco. Detectives detained the box and they got

a warrant to open it after CCSO K-9 Ory alerted them of the likely presence of illegal drugs. To be sure, deputies placed

five other "control" boxes with the package believed to contain drugs. On Aug. 8, the dog only picked OUT the package delivered by Mercado. According to USPS records, an addi-

tional five packages were sent from a Jacksonville post office - one weighing 11.19 pounds – to the same California address.

Since the investigation started, CCSO investigators have taken 8.35 kilos of fentanyl, 1.36 kilos of cocaine, 2.38 kilos of methamphetamine and \$183,000 from the enterprise operated by Setzer and Mercado. According to the Drug Enforcement Agency, fentanyl is 100 times more potent than morphine, and it only takes two milligrams to kill a person. Cook said the amount of fentanyl distributed by Setzer and Mercado in the past four months was enough to kill everyone in an 18-county area of Northeast Florida.

On May 11, Cook said Aleksejs Kovilov was found dead of an overdose that included fentanyl. Michael Edgar Stanley, 39, was charged on Sept. 20 with manslaughter for selling him the drug a day earlier at a retail store on Fleming Island.

The cases aren't related, Cook said.

Cook said there have been 261 reported overdoses in Clay County this year with 34 drug-related deaths and six suspected overdose deaths.

Both men were arrested in separate stops on Sept. 10 and they were charged a day later. Setzer's bond was set at \$17.105 million, while Mercado's bond was set at \$10 million. Both are due to be in court on Oct. 17.

women in law enforcement.

"Women bring perspectives and life experiences that are needed in this profession. I encourage any young woman who wants to make a difference in their community to consider a career in law enforcement," she said.

Lanier and Padgett said women are needed in the field.

"No matter who you are, everyone has something to bring to the table. Everybody has something they are good at and really. it's a team effort. And I think women are just such an intricate part of that team," Padgett said.

'We bring that nurturing vibe," Padgett explains. Padgett, a member of the Sheriff's office for over 20 years, came into law enforcement at an early age after being re-

moved from an abusive home. Since then, she has always wanted to be the kind of person that a child can look up to for protection.

"We are protective of the people that we are trying to represent. We are better communicators," Padgett said. "Men have always been 'do what I say and that's it' and I think women are a little bit more empathetic and understanding. I guess it's in our genetic makeup."

Lanier shares a similar perspective.

"When I first started in this line of work, even though it's only been a short amount of time, I knew that this line of work was predominately male," Lanier said. "We were very short-handed for female deputies back then. There were only three of us.'

However, she has seen a huge push for women in law enforcement over her career.

"I think, in a lot of instances, we bring


a softer side to law enforcement and that's needed." Lanier said. "It allows us to build trust in our community. But we are not afraid to handle business either."

Cook said women bring needed insights. "Women have to rely on their words more often than physical strength, which I think helps build trust and respect," she said

To the future female law enforcers, Lanier said: "Go for it. I knew what I wanted to do, but I was nervous. I was scared. But my best advice to give is, stay levelheaded. Stay true to your strengths. Build on them.

Never stop learning because that's all this job is. And never be afraid to stop learning and stay humble. If you make a mistake, it's okay. We're at a higher expectation of maintaining professionalism, but it's okay to admit when you're wrong. Learn from your mistakes, move on, and get the job done."

Myers duels to Bales N Trails win

BARTRAM TRAIL - Fleming Island High cross country runner Graham Myers, a top 10 finisher in Class 1A last year in cross country and track (second in 3200) for St. Johns Country Day School, has been on fire as a team frontrunner now that he is at Fleming Island High with two sub-16 minute finishes under his belt.

Saturday loss, rain, mud; Thursday: Clay wins

GAINESVILLE - This week if you searched the word adversity, a picture of the Clay Blue Devils would show up. Last week, due to field conditions the game was played on a humid Saturday morning. After the loss to Orange Park, the team went back to work Monday, was on the field two days and prepared for a Thursday night away game

at Gainesville. The Gainesville Hurricanes normally play at Citizen's Field Municipal stadium. With all the rain, that field too had the consistency of a wet sponge, thus moving the game to the backvard of Gainesville High School; a practice field that closely resembled the mortar practice range at Camp Blanding. Despite all those cards stacked against the Blue Devils, the team won the coin toss, took the ball, and went to work. With a Payton Dykas kick runback to the 43, the Blue Devils used the opening drive to go 57 yards in seven plays capped by a Dykas corner catch touchdown reception cracking open the scoring, never relenting the lead in the 28-10 road victory.

"Monday was like our Sunday watching film. A lot of film. We went a little bit, but not much. Tuesday we went back to work. Wednesday was our normal run through and we were back at it," said Clay Head Coach Kyle Kennard. "I think it was a good thing playing Thursday because the kids were eager to get that bad taste (of the Orange Park loss) out of their mouth. They knew we didn't play very well against Orange Park. The film showed the effort was not what we expect from the Blue Devils so we challenged them to come back and give it a great effort. The extra day this week will be a luxury for us as we have Tocoi Creek coming and they've had a great season so far. We're looking forward to it."

After the Clay opening drive score, on the Gainesville counter, Clay defender Bryan Prince had the first of his three quarterback sacks, this one for a five yard loss. Gainesville running back John Cooper would be a thorn in the Blue Devil's side all night, this time going 80 yards off a screen

pass to even the score, 7-7. When they had the ball back, Clay was forced to punt away.

From their own 35, Gainesville passed on first down getting intercepted by Dykas who looked to go all the way for a pick-6 until a flag brought the ball back to the 20 due to holding. "I play both sides and I am tired,' said Dykas. "But coach told me to watch nine (Gainesville's Cooper). He did a little speed out and I saw them throw the ball. I jumped his route, went up and got it." Dykas finished the night with 12 receptions for 175 yards and two touchdowns.

Back on offense, Dykas moved the ball 10 yards closer with a power sweep. Quarterback Merrick Rapoza wasn't letting Dykas have all the fun as he tucked the ball from six vards out and used a rugby scrum to cross the goal line to go ahead 14-7. Rapoza finished the evening with 175 passing yards, no interceptions and two touchdowns. Early in the second quarter, driving from mid-field, Gainesville was moving on Clay until Prince had his second sack for a 10 vard loss. Gainesville attempted to recover on third down, only gaining back five yards. Lined up for a Gainesville field goal attempt, Jason Goflin shot across and got a hand on the kick, blocking the three points.

After exchanging punts, Clay was again driving with 3:40 until the half. Using runs by Dominic Martin who finished with 33 yards on 11 carries, and another short pass to Dykas, Rapoza again saw Dykas open in the corner on second and goal to go, hitting his target to go up 21-7 heading into the break. Gainesville opened the second half with a drive that fizzled out inside the five yard line and stayed safe with a successful field goal, 21-10. The Blue Devil defense would again get another highlight sack by Prince to force a Hurricane punt.

In the final stanza, Clay drove to a first down and goal to go looking to score again when the ball squirted out and was recovered by Gainesville. The Blue Devils would show the hard afternoons in the weight room paid off as they were faced with a Gainesville fourth down and four yards to go, this time shutting down Cooper and taking the ball over on downs.

With the ball back, from their own 32 Dykas and Martin drove the ball to the Gainesville seven yard line. On second down, Rapoza tucked the ball again and crossed into the endzone for the final score at 4:03, 28-10. After another unsuccessful Gainesville drive, with the ball back and under a minute to play, Clay was forced to punt away to Gainesville. The receiver couldn't keep the ball tucked away and Clay recovered the ball with :47 ticks to burn. Rapoza would take a knee twice to complete the contest.

Sharks bite Broncos

MIDDLEBURG – Middleburg's Jayden Jenkins threw for two scores and ran for another, but it was not enough to lift the Broncos into the win column as host Middleburg dropped a 35-20 decision to Ponte Vedra and quarterback Ben Burk on September 16.

Burk accounted for five touchdowns, three passing and two rushing, as the Sharks rolled up 435 yards in total offense. The junior completed his first nine passes, six of them on Ponte Vedra's opening drive, a 13-play, 66 yard march during which he converted three third downs.

The offenses ruled the first half, in which neither team punted. Middleburg took the opening kickoff and scored in just three plays. Mike Mitchell, in action again after serving a two-game suspension, got behind the defense on a post pattern and caught a perfectly thrown bomb from Jenkins for 66 yards and a 7-0 lead.

Ponte Vedra knotted the game at 7 on a five-yard pass from Burk to Landon Okra on a third and goal to go.

Seven running plays later, Middleburg regained the advantage when Jenkins faked a handoff to Mitchell, took off inside the left end and raced 16 yards to the end zone, dragging Sharks safety Bryson Hubbard across the goal line.

The Broncos' Joe Forte forced a fumble

with a big hit on the ensuing kickoff, recovering the ball himself at the Ponte Vedra 44 yard line. However, Middleburg failed to capitalize on the turnover when T.J. Lane gained only one yard on a third and eight from the Sharks' 14 yard line and Wade Mathis missed a 30 yard field goal attempt wide left.

The Sharks took over and drove 80 yards to tie the game on a 10 yard scramble by Burk.

The game's turning point came as Middleburg was poised to answer, having quickly driven 50 yards to the Ponte Vedra 16 yard line. Mitchell swept left and had already gained 12 yards when, struggling for extra yardage, the ball came loose. Linebacker Trooper Price fell on it for the Sharks at the four yard line.

"There were two guys holding me, and one of them punched it [the ball] out," explained Mitchell after the game.

The two empty trips to the red zone proved fateful for the Broncos, who found themselves down 28-14 when Burk outran the Middleburg secondary to the near pylon from 12 yards out on the final play of the first half and connected with Nathan Bunkowski on an out and up for an 18 yard touchdown to cap the first drive of the third quarter.

"Other teams capitalize on their opportunities. We get opportunities and we squander them," Middleburg head coach

Ryan Wolfe said of his Broncos, who fell to 0-4.

Facing a two-touchdown deficit, Jenkins, who threw only three passes in the first half, made 16 throws in the second half, completing five of them. After combining to rush for 116 yards on 21 carries in the first half, Mitchell and Lane combined for only three rushes and eight yards over the final two quarters.

"When you get down by 14, you have to start chasing points," said Wolfe. "It changes your game plan a little bit. We had to throw more than we wanted to."

Burk connected with Okra for a second touchdown, this one on a deep slant from 29 yards out, to give Ponte Vedra a 35-14 lead early in the fourth quarter. 


Orange Park's team speed could be the game changer.

After two shutout losses, the Keystone Heights High football team got a strong 38-12 home win over Impact Christian Academy on Friday to push to 1-2.






