County tourism makes a big splash with national fishing tournament

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Since there are no major amusement parks in Clay County, tourism officials decided to put the spotlight on one of its greatest assets to attract visitors – its expansive waterways.

The county entered an agreement with Kayak Bass Fishing and Airstream Ventures to create a year-long fishing tournament.


"We're not trying to do this as a flash in the pan," said Kayak Bass Fishing founder Chad Hoover. "What we're trying to

USTA provides tennis lessons to children in Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – For the past seven weeks, 22 children residing in Orange Park have spent the last seven weeks participating in a special program funded by a grant provided by the United States Tennis Association through Orange Park High.

After practicing forehands, backhands, positioning and hand-eye coordination for seven weeks, the crew got together for one

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Day as a Deputy enlightens citizens the daunting tasks of being a cop

FLEMING ISLAND — It was unnerving to come around the corner and see two brothers arguing over a \$180 pair of boots, especially when one of them pulled a gun from his waistband and pointed it at the other.

Do I pull my gun? Do I yell at him to drop it? Do I try to coax him into giving up?

The reality is, the brother – or I – could be dead in the time it took to think about any of the options.

The Day as a Deputy Citizens' Academy offered insights into the difficult job of being a Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy.

A group of 16 took the four-hour class on Friday, Nov. 22. We were given insight into answering disturbance calls, as well as getting information on the marine unit, dive team, SWAT team, K-9, traffic enforcement and getting a sneak peek inside the Mobile Command Unit.

It was a lot of information in a short amount of time. It also proved, before a deputy puts on a badge and hits the street, they've gone through hundreds of training hours and real-life situations.

"You guys will get to see some of the fun stuff," said CCSO Undersheriff Ron Lendvay said before the session started.

Fun? perhaps. Enlightening? absolutely. What's clear is being a cop isn't anything like you see on television. Decisions often have to be made in split seconds. And there are no do-overs.

We saw how K-9s are used to alert deputies of the likely presence of illegal substances. The sheriff's office has dogs that are trained for specific jobs. Dogs like Cash and Ory have been responsible for helping

deputies uncover drugs – and make arrests.

What we learned is that dogs can't differentiate between marijuana, cocaine, fentanyl or methamphetamine. If they smell

something, they react.

Perhaps one of the most interesting aspects of the day was learning how deputies enforce traffic laws. Patrol cars and motorcycles are equipped with radar detectors on the front and rear bumpers, so they can get a speeder coming or going. When they use hand-held laser detectors, they are required to estimate the speed of a driver before deploying the laser. Their estimate is supposed to be within 5 mph, either way, of the laser finding. If not, they won't stop you.

But we also learned, since they've seen thousands of cars on the road, they're really good at estimating speed, so slow down.

We learned the waterways in Clay County are so murky or filled with dark tannins, divers have no visibility once they go under. They rely solely on feeling with their hands, and they train by recovering items tossed into a retention pond or creek.

Every aspect of law enforcement can be done inside the Mobile Command Unit, including the 911 call center. In an emergency, it can offer the tools needed to answer any emergency. And it's on wheels.

More important, it didn't cost taxpayers a dime. The money used to buy the truck

came from drug seizures.

Now we go back to answering calls. Anytime a deputy is dispatched, they generally are walking into a volatile — and unpredictable — situation. Worse yet, no two calls are alike

To show that, all 16 deputies for a day were subjected to different scenarios. I had one brother pointing a gun at his brother during an argument. I also had a suspicious SUV parked in an area where there had been a lot of copper theft. When I found the SUV, it turned out to be a couple fighting. They ran from the car with the man threatening the woman

In both situations, I didn't react quickly enough.

When I saw the brother pointing a gun at his brother, I should have reacted by shooting the armed man. In the case of the fighting couple, I should have tried to get between the two to break it up.

In both situations, I not only was unprepared, but I also don't believe I was capable of making such difficult – and physical – decisions.

That's why I'm going to leave it to the professionals.



Fishermen will be required to fish in a kayak, and unlike other bass organizations, fishermen are required to take a photo of the fish, measure the length and return the fish into the river, creek, lake or pond.

Other organizations rank catches by weight. KBF will use the combined lengths of the monthly catches to determine win-

Hoover said each photo of a fish has to

be sent to the website, and it will be issued a virtual identifier to make sure every fish was caught in any public waterway in Clay County. The fisherman's hand is to be included in the photo to capture a type of fingerprint to keep fishermen from sharing the same fish before it is returned to the water. Hoover's system is so precise, tournament organizers from Lake Erie have asked for information to avoid another scandal after two fishermen were caught adding lead weights to walleyes last month.

The fisherman who catches the greatest length will earn monthly payouts, Hoover said. Then in October, KBF will bring its Trail, Challenge and Pro series national tournaments to Clay County.

Bed taxes, not property taxes, collected from county hotels will be used to pay for the program, county commissioner and Tourism Council Chairman Mike Cella said.

"The No. 1 search word on the (tourism search bar) has been fishing," Cella said. "The good news is that visitors really want to come to Clay County to fish. The problem is we've had very little fishing content on

"Something that we needed to come up with was a way to encourage both folks to visit Clay County, and at the same time, take advantage of our beautiful waterways. We believe we've come up with a pretty creative solution for adding bass fishing content to our marketing efforts and adding another unique national event to a growing list of sports and entertainment options."

Hoover said picking Clay County was an easy choice.

"This is old Florida, right on the east coast. It's the tea-colored water. It's the Spanish moss hanging in the trees. You can catch a redfish on one cast. You can catch a bass on another catch and catch a crappie on another. You can have all those experiences right here."



Green Cove Springs gets \$1.3 million to renovate Augusta Savage cafetorium

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — With grant funding awarded and a design and build contract approved, the City of Green Cove Springs will soon start work to revitalize the last building on the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center Complex.

Originally the cafetorium building of Dunbar High campus, the city planned to renovate the interior as part of the community center complex since it owned the building in 2006. The biggest hurdle was finding enough money for it to meet today's building safety codes. That opportunity came when the city applied for the Community Development Block Grant CARES

Act funding in March 2021. It was awarded \$1,397,600 in September 2022.

"The City Council, staff and the community have long-awaited this last piece of the puzzle in revitalizing the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center Complex. It will be wonderful to see the entire campus open and available to serve the citizens of Green Cove Springs," said Assistant City Manager Mike Null.

Once completed, the renovations will create an open auditorium space for coronavirus testing and vaccination, as well as a community event space when testing and vaccinations aren't conducted. Renovation work includes rebuilding the kitchen as a



commercial kitchen for food preparation and distribution during emergencies, rebuilding the auditorium stage, new auditorium flooring, and new plumbing, electrical wiring and HVAC systems.

The design and building contract for cafetorium renovations was approved by City Council at its last meeting on Nov. 13. City officials estimate the work will take two years to complete.

Twisted Oaks Rescue keeps pets, and owners together

Low-cost spay, neuter program reduces animals taken to shelters

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Twisted Oaks Rescue spayed and neutered 15 local pets, as well as fed 350 dogs and cats during its drive-by Pet Food Pantry on Saturday, Nov. 19.

"Part of our mission is feeding pets in crisis, so people who find themselves in crisis automatically qualify for free pet food," said founder Jessie Heckels. "We distribute it as it comes available so there is no guarantee on the brand or size of food when we do distributions, but we try to make sure that everyone gets something."

The rescue opened Loki's Lunchbox, a Pet Food Pantry, in 2020 as a one-stop shop for many pet needs.

"In the pandemic, I noticed they were doing a lot of 'people food' distributions, but not a lot for pets, so I started couponing dog and cat food and giving it away, and it developed until a tremendous need in the community," Heckles said.

Twisted Oaks Rescue now has a permanent home at 7637 El Dorado Ave. When the Pet Pantry is open for business, cars are usually parked down the street, and up to three hours in advance of opening said.

"We typically feed 150 families a month and the typical family has seven pets, so it's something like a thousand in some animals that we feed in the lake area per month," she said.

Although delivering pet food and supplies is a large part of Twisted Oaks' Mission, Heckels said education has to be the No. 1 goal.

"Spay and neuter are super important to our mission because overpopulation in the home is the number one reason why people show up for food. That's kind of the caveat to giving food away; you also must provide additional resources, not just food. The food is a great resource, but it is a band-aid for a bigger problem," she said.

Heckels works with many organizations to provide free spay and neuter resources to the community including Sheltering hands, a nonprofit dedicated to improving the lives of cats through humane care, spay/neuter, adoptions, education and support services, as well as Fix Them All.

"Fix Them All is a 501 (c) organization in Gainesville. It a group of volunteers whose mission is to spay and neuter. They get local vets to join their program to help people get their pets spayed and neutered. That's the program that we run here, through Fix Them All," Heckels said.

Typically, surgeries can cost anywhere from \$35 to \$500. However, Fix Them All offers low-cost spay and neuter cat and dog surgeries for a baseline of \$50 a dog and \$30 a cat. Surgeries are performed by medically trained veterinarians at the rescue's mobile site on their property. Thanks to programs like Fix Them All, they can reduce the number of unwanted animals going into shelters. In January 2017, there were more than 300 animals turned over to shelters. In January 2022, there were less than 50.

"You don't do that unless you have other people and organizations standing behind what you do," Heckels said. "There are different ways that our services are distributed throughout the county. It's not just here. And it's not just us doing this, it's a lot of places. It's amazing to see the community come together to tackle this issue."

Thanks to partnerships, Twisted Oaks can continue to help provide the community with pet services, to "keep pets and their owners together." Ultimately, that's what it's all about, coming together to make sure that pets and their owners stay together.

"People who have resources make better choices, period. It's not a competition. It's sharing. Everyone's sharing," Heckels said


ment in Clay County, Penney Farms.

ORANGE PARK — Florida is the third Spanish-speaking state in the country with 21.8% of all households speaking the language as their primary shared 'tongue' between all members of the household, according to the American Community Survey, which is conducted in 2020 by the U.S. Census

In Clay County, 2020 census data found that those living within county borders include residents that are 10.2% Hispanic, 2.71% Asian, and 9.61% White (Hispanic), other (Hispanic) or Multiracial (Hispanic).



'Children's Art for The Holidays' on display at Clay County Courthouse

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The fourth and final Art in the Courthouse installation was celebrated on Thursday, Nov. 17, during the gallery's open house and reception. The unveiling featured a combination display of artwork provided by Clay County children from four programs: Augusta Savage Art & Cultural Center, Guardian Ad Litem, Quigley House and the Clay County Fair Art Contest.

The installation, showcasing students 3 to 18 years old, may be viewed between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on days the courthouse is open. The display will last until Jan. 3.

As part of the office's annual community outreach efforts, Art In The Courthouse was founded in January of 2022 by Clay County Clerk of Court and Comptroller Tara Green and Public Outreach Manager Mary Justino. The idea for the project arose when Green was in her president-elect role in 2019. After doing "quite a bit of traveling to different clerks' offices," she noticed that, "whether it was in a county administration building or courthouse, they always had community type displays and events."

The project, Green claims, not only enriches the community but creates a more welcoming, accessible place for visitors.

"The courthouse can be a very scary place. Normally, people are not coming here for great reasons, so we were trying to invite people to a public building, a beautiful building, and utilize this pretty area to display our artists," she said.

The fourth-floor gallery has since featured various artists including the Orange Park Art Guild, First Coast Plein Air Painters and a compilation of Orange Park Woman's Club and the Village Improvement Association.

"But Children's Art for the Holidays is uniquely special because it is the only gallery to feature youth artwork," Justino said.

Green and Justino received a wildly positive response for this year's installation, receiving more than 80 works of artwork with more than 60 coming from the Augusta Savage Art and Cultural Center. The gallery features a range of works, including paintings, drawings and sculptures.

"They display here, we took it down beyond the wall and even in front of the window. Whatever came in, we were determined to have it displayed." Justino said. "And it's going to come back to the courthouse by popular demand next year."

Green and Justino would like to see a rotating show, permanently designed for children to display their artwork. While currently working out the logistics, Justino said the community can expect to see the show running next year.

"We have identified an area of the second floor that is very close to where the

family court takes place, so a lot of times it's where children are coming in, not for good reasons, but what better place to have artwork that adds a little color to the walls, a little levity, maybe is comforting and inspires them," Justino said. "That's what we would consider Phase 2. We'll be working on that in 2023." Besides offering a welcoming atmosphere, Justino believes there are many benefits to having artwork in public spaces. "I wasn't sure what the response would be until I saw it. It's not only what you are seeing tonight. Folks are enjoying it because it's the art community. But what I see during the regular business day is what really inspires me," she said.

"I have seen our own employees come up here with their bagged lunches to look at the artwork on their lunch break. The attorneys come out of court and seem very preoccupied and busy but they stop when something catches their eye. You can see that it causes them to slow down, stop and think, and appreciate something other than the nitty-gritty of what's going on in the courtroom. So that's what really inspires us more than anything."

"Kids are teaching us through what they are doing. As adults, sometimes we might even give up on looking into our own creativity and our own ability to create something, but when you see their artwork on the walls, you start to think, if that child can do that, maybe we need to dig a little deeper as adults and our creativity," Justino said. "It teaches us that no matter your age you can create art. You can appreciate art. You can definitely have a place to display it, and I think there will be more and more venues in the future at other public buildings."

Aside from safety guidelines established by local authorities, there are not many rules when it comes to decorating for the holidays. Some individuals prefer a more understated look marked by a Christmas tree in their front windows, while others go all-out and cover their homes in colorful lights. At that time, small bonfires known as "luminarias" were lit along roads to help people travel safely to Midnight Mass on the final night of Las Posadas, a traditional celebration in many countries with significant Hispanic populations that runs from December 16 through December 24. The celebration is meant to serve as a remembrance of the story of Mary and Joseph seeking lodging in Bethlehem prior to the birth of Jesus Christ.

Where is luminarias practiced today?

In North America, luminarias remains a tradition in Mexico and the southwestern United States, though FLIC Luminaries© indicates it is practiced in communities throughout the U.S. and Canada. Modern lights have evolved so individuals interested in introducing the tradition of luminarias in their communities need not light traditional candles if they're concerned about safety. Battery-powered, electric and solar options are available as alternatives to candles lit by a flame.

The tradition of luminarias can bring communities together in celebration of the holiday season.

What is luminarias? | Jingle Bells

The instantly recognizable "Jingle Bells" has become a wildly popular Christmas carol despite not mentioning Christmas or any other holiday. That poses a significant safety hazard and underscores the importance of using a sturdy stand. Fastening the tree to a wall, much like one might do with a television that isn't mounted, adds a further layer of protection from tip-overs.
- · Block off the base of a live tree. Live trees need water to stay green and keep their needles throughout the season. That water could prove enticing to thirsty pets. Drinking water from a tree stand could increase the risk of the tree tipping over and the water could upset the stomach of pets if the tree was treated with pesticides prior to being brought home. When decorating with a live tree, make sure the base of the tree where the water will be is blocked off. A small fence around the tree

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could keep curious pets away. The room where the tree is located should be locked or inaccessible when pets are home alone.

· Inspect and conceal light wires. Wires can become frayed over time, and that could pique pets' curiosity. Lighting wires should always be inspected prior to decorating and frayed or damaged wires should be thrown away, even if it means replacing lights. If wires are still sturdy, conceal them along the base of the wall using



a cable concealer, which prevents pets from chewing on them.

- · Avoid lighting candles. Candles should not be lit in homes with pets. Even candles on shelves that are seemingly beyond pets' reach can be hazardous, as pets, especially cats, have a way of accessing spaces they seemingly shouldn't be able to reach. Use electric candles in lieu of traditional ones.
- Speak to a vet about seasonal plants and flowers before bringing them into the home. Pet owners can speak with their veterinarians before bringing poinsettias, holly and other seasonal plants and flowers into their homes. Some pets could suffer allergic reactions if they eat certain seasonal plants, so it's best to err on the side of caution and speak to a vet before including live plants and flowers in decorative displays.

Decorating is part of the holiday season. Pet owners must exercise an extra bit of caution to keep their pets and homes safe when decorating during this special time of year.

Secret samplings

Periodically, Clay Today will review one of our local restaurants. Without notice and unannounced, we will try to sample a variety of menu items, as well as observe the ambiance, décor and the reactions of other diners. This week: La Catrina Tacos and Tequila Bar at 2720 Blanding Blvd. in Middleburg.

La Catrina Tacos and Tequila Bar serves phenomenal food, drink, atmosphere

MIDDLEBURG – From the outside, it seems like just another establishment. But make no mistake: La Catrina Tacos and Tequila Bar is no ordinary eatery.

When you walk inside, you quickly notice they are cooking down-home, fresh-to-order, Mexican-style favorites, which is why they already are recognized as one of the premier restaurants in the southern part of the county.

After Clay County residents give La Catrina the full go-round, they may not only find it to be one of the most underrated eateries inside the large plaza featuring 11 businesses but perhaps the best in and around Middleburg.

The first of the five senses that might draw you in: the aroma. The pleasant aurora of the fresh ingredients of the Mexican food can be detected from as far away as 50 yards away in the parking lot.

Then, the next sense: sound, which will be activated once you get closer to the door where customers can relax to the soft, soothing Mexican soul music playing from La Catrina's inconspicuous speakers.

But that's just the beginning. The experience will engage all five senses. La Catrina opened its first restaurant in St. Augustine, and that proved to be so successful, it expanded to Middleburg in mid-October.

The store frontage is decorated with Christmas-style bulb lights lining the ceiling of the open-air breezeway that houses La Catrina and several other shops.

Diners are greeted by two real-life, artistic depictions of human beings dressed in Dia De Muertos (Day of the Dead) themed garb, both figures which are attached to two benches right outside the restaurant.

Before a friendly staff member finds your seat, take a moment to enjoy the beautiful artwork ordaining the walls of La Catrina's, which is easily discernible throughout the establishment. A psychoactive rainbow of color is apparent at all corners within.

The work, which was perhaps crafted by a highly-paid professional artist features authentic depictions of Mexican culture that jump out at customers while they enjoy chowing down on fresh-to-serve antojitos, tacos, burritos, quesadillas, fajitas, nachos or other hot-off-the-grill menu item favorites that would perhaps be best coupled

with a glass of wine or specialty margarita cocktail.

The "stars of the show" include three standout portraits – two of women and one of a man. On the left wall, Dia De Muertos is apparent, with beautiful flowers painted alongside the lady. Then, another in an Indian headdress, perhaps depicting Aztec times of old. Last but not least, the man is a singer donning a sombrero, whose eyes seem intent on singing another hit Salsa song.

If that's not enough, the bar table and leg space are custom-set with maze-like circles that should enthrall customers of all ages. 12-point, black, star-like light structures hang down to provide additional brightness.

But let's face it. The biggest reason you'd come to La Catrina is the food.

Customers are treated to a large and diverse food and drink menu, which could make an especially nice option for those looking to mix it up and try something new.

All sorts of Mexican classics are on the menu, but if you want to go for a flavor bomb, try three (or more) of the specialty tacos. Seven options are available, but while I was visiting, server Jaylin's recommended the surf and turf (grilled steak and shrimp, topped with avocado and sriracha mayo), Mr. Papa (grilled potatoes and chorizo, topped with pico de gallo and queso fresco) and the Chinola ribeye (ribeye steak topped with house chimichurri, pico de gal-

lo, and gueso fresco).

If you want to keep it simple, stick with the 210 Burritos, with the star item featuring two flour tortillas stuffed with ground beef, nacho cheese and ranchero sauce.

There are 22 brands of tequila, seven versions of handcrafted drinks and nine options of Cerveza Mexicana (Mexican Beer) for customers looking to kick it back after a long day's work. The recommendations were spot-on.

If that's not enough, make sure to come in during lunch hours where they serve 11 hearty, warm and budget-friendly menu options that should especially make for a treat during the cold winter months, including tacos, quesadillas or burritos with a side of delicious and filling rice and beans.

His bond was set at \$355,008 and his next court appearance is scheduled for Dec. 12.

Middleburg man indicted for illegally possessing firearms

JACKSONVILLE – U.S. Attorney Roger

B. Handberg announced the return by a grand jury of an indictment charging Paul Steven Hulbert, 27, of Middleburg, with unlawful possession of a firearm by a person convicted of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence, unlawful possession of a firearm by a person subject to a domestic violence injunction, and two counts of possession of an unregistered short-barreled rifle and short-barreled shotgun.

Hulbert faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in federal prison on each count.

The indictment also notified Hulbert that the United States intends to forfeit multiple firearms which are traceable to the offenses. Hulbert made his initial appearance in federal court today and was ordered detained.

According to the indictment and public records, in August 2021, Hulbert was convicted of the misdemeanor crime of domestic battery, in Clay County, Florida. During this timeframe the Clay County Court also issued a "Temporary Injunction for Protection Against Domestic Violence with Minor Children" against Hulbert, which specifically prohibited him from possessing firearms and directed him to surrender any firearms in his possession to the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

After the domestic battery conviction and issuance of the domestic violence in-

junction, both of which prohibited him from possessing firearms, Hulbert obtained seven firearms that included rifles, pistols and a shotgun. The barrel of the shotgun and one rifle were illegally modified to shorten their length.

An indictment is merely a formal charge that a defendant has committed one or more violations of federal criminal law. and every defendant is presumed innocent unless, and until, proven guilty.

This case was investigated by the Clay County Sheriff's Office and the Jacksonville Office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. It will be prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Kevin C. Frein.

The case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods, a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and gun violence, and to make our neighborhoods safer for everyone.

On May 26, 2021, the Department launched a violent crime reduction strategy strengthening PSN based on these core principles: fostering trust and legitimacy in our communities, supporting community-based organizations that help prevent violence from occurring in the first place, setting focused and strategic enforcement priorities, and measuring the results.

Camp Chowenwaw:

Forming a generation of leaders, thinkers, activists

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Summer camps have long been a highlight of Girl Scouting.

Troop One, founded in 1912 by Juliette Low in her hometown of Savannah, Georgia, was made up of just 18 girls. During a time when women weren't allowed to vote and stuck to strict social norms, the Girl Scouts taught them they could do anything, and be anyone, encouraging them to embrace their strengths and find community in one another. The Girl Scouts of America became a nationwide movement and quickly spread throughout the country and Northeast Florida was no exception.

When Elizabeth Starke founded the first troop in the area at Mayport in 1916, the United States had just officially joined the movement. During WW1, many worked with the Red Cross to roll bandages and knit goods for servicemen, as well as played a key role in supporting the nation's food supply. Others took on a more operative role. Cherokee Rose Troop One helped patrol the First Coast after school hours.

"They had their Girl Scouts on horseback with shotguns patrolling the beaches for German invaders," said Chowenwaw Park Naturalist, Barbara Beyerl.

Although the Girl Scouts have come a long way from riding horseback with shot-guns in hand. The legacy of these young women lives on in the organization's commitment to serving the community, and most importantly, in its perseverance.

By the time the Girls Scouts Council of Duval County was incorporated in January 1927, four more troops were active in Jacksonville. And in the early 1930s, Clay County was looking to build a campground. Before the construction of Camp Chowenwaw in 1933, several potential camp properties were considered and rejected, including Lakeside, Keystone Heights and Fleming Island. It wasn't until a free federal labor program provided free construction during the early years of the Great Depression, that the council officially decided on the property in Green Cove Springs.


"[They] were looking for someplace to have a summer camp for the girls, and they came upon this property which is out in the middle of nowhere. It had been a foreclosed dairy farm during the depression and it was up for sale," Beyerl said. "The Girl

The overwhleming majority of Camp Chowenwaw - 100 of 150 acres - is considered swamp and water ways.

Scouts originally bought a very small piece of this land. It was 20 or some acres and then they added on over the years. Now it's something like 150 acres -50 acres are dry land and 100 is swampland."

The initial property was purchased for \$250. Daily work crew numbers of 30 to 75 otherwise unemployed men. The first load began working on Jan. 17, 1933 with practically no equipment other than logs on-site and a rented saw mill attached to a Fordson Tractor. The workers harvested raw materials from the property as much as possible: pine for log walls, flooring and support beams, and the clay for chink-

ing between the logs was taken from the natural clay pit that would become Otter Springs.

"Even the furniture was made of magnolia trees cut down on the property," Beyerl said. Once completed, the camp included the five sleeping cabins, a bathhouse, the Orange Blossom "Health Lodge," the "Cook's Cabin" and the "Big Cabin" consisting of a huge lounge with two stone fireplaces on either side, a dining hall, kitchen and serving room, the first of the buildings to be constructed.

"It was a gathering space and a dining hall. They ate their meals here or they

gathered here to sing songs," Beyerl said.

The camp provided the girls with a place to learn new skills and talents as Girl Scouts from cooking and first aid, to athletics, pioneering and art. The 4,700-square-foot Big Cabin is still the main space for large groups, although it's generally rented out for weddings and parties.

"When the Girl Scout camp closed in 2005, it went up for sale and in 2006, the county bought it," Beyerl said. "The whole place was in disrepair. It was in really bad shape, but the county wanted to restore it for preservation purposes, so they made repairs that the Girl Scouts made in the 70s: they took out the old logs, put in new logs, removed the support posts, and built a whole new roof and a new floor. It was just amazing the work they had to do."

The Board of County Commissioners voted in 2011 to spend \$403,000 to renovate the Big Cabin. Now, the women's restroom is the only part of the cabin that still has the original floors. Even the clay between the wooden log slats was replaced with concrete mortar.

The Girl Scouts left such an indelible mark on Camp Chowenwaw and Clay County, it is home to the Historic Girl Scout Museum. Although the park has seen many changes over the years, Camp Chowenwaw pays respect to the 1930s campground with the preservation of many of its original structures and even received awards for the restoration of its buildings.

in the second set, but could not close the gap, falling 25-18. Spring Hill closed out the Lady Tigers in the third set, 25-13, en route to winning their fourth consecutive SIAC championship and will represent the conference in the 2022 NCAA Division II National Tournament.

Edward Waters had difficulty controlling the Badgers' heavy hitters, surrendering 50 kills to SHC in the match, while only totaling 18 themselves. Fatima Ramirez, the SIAC Player of Year in 2022, led Edward Waters with six kills, while Saldy Amparo Smith finished with four, and Saniya Spalding totaling three. Mataiya Barber, the SIAC Setter of the Year in 2022, dished out 12 assists, while Andrea Diaz Merced, playing in her final collegiate match, fin-

ished with 13 digs for the Lady Tigers.

Diaz Merced finished her season with 503 digs in 2022 with 87 assists.

Valmyr is in her second season as assistant coach with the Blue Devil standout the womens team win their first-ever conference title in the Gulf Coast Athletic Conference last year before Edward Waters joined SIAC.

Despite the loss, Edward Waters has a lot to be proud of this season. EWU finished the year with a 26-10 overall record, 17-2 in SIAC play in the regular season, and clinched the 2022 SIAC East Division Championship. The Lady Tigers will look to regroup and reload in the offseason with their sights firmly squared on a championship in 2023.

Clay Iron Ladies host triple summit

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - With an historic season last year with two team state titles and a handful of individual state champions, Clay High girls weightlifting coach Rodney Keller created a summit of sorts to see just what the rest of the county might look like, competitively.

"Nothing really changes from last year to now," said Keller, team state champions in Traditional and also in Olympic Snatch in 2021. "The process is the same. You return and try to do that same things that were successful last year."

Keller's invites for the tri-meet with Middleburg and St. Johns Country Day School featured five state champions in one room and a much-larger number of challengers to the Lady Blue Devils dominance.

"We have a few champions returning at Clay; Geniyah Stevens, Emma Heck, Kyleigh Lafary, so the expectations are really high," said Keller. "We have a process that worked and will be sticking to it."

From St. Johns Country Day School, coach Justin Frisbee saw a two-fold jump in his team with twice as many athletes coming out for the team after a stellar first year from his own state champion; daughter Addison Frisbee in the Olympic Snatch discipline.

"We've got double the size in here; 12 girls, so that's good," said Frisbee. "We are hoping to qualify a couple of them this year. You can look around the room and see the new faces."

Frisbee's optimism is evident in the fact that his small team is included in the mix of county powerhouses.

"It's not often that a team like ours, just kind of getting our feet on the ground and building gets invited to a meet like this where there are five state champions walking the floor," said Frisbee. "Most of the kids come first to improve their other sports; we got four softball players here, and then we got some that this is their first time lifting weights. I've learned that I don't have to travel far to get good competition."

For Middleburg coach Rhiannon Weiskopf, who had her own contingency at the Class 2A championship meet last year, along with husband Chase, the chase (no pun) to take down Clay is part of her process after both were put into Class 2A.

"Of course, this being our first meet is a good one to get all of our nerves out and see where we are," said Weiskopf. "The entire county's success has added to all the school's programs. We have 85 athletes just in our program and that makes it difficult to pick 30 of the best to go to meets."

Weiskopf sees a trend in other sports athletes using weightlifting as a supplement, then finding it a new sport for themselves.

"We get athletes come into the room for their other sports then find out they kind of love the sport," said Weiskopf. "It's a good situation for both sports."

In 2022, volleyball stars Allison Cox and Taylor Mills were to of Weiskopf's state lifters with Katlyn Griffin an unlimited region champion.

SJCDS Scott goes Arkansas

ORANGE PARK - St. Johns Country Day School sports has created a truckload of NCAA Division I athletes in the past 20 years; mainly girls soccer with their dominance landing more top tier scholarships under coach Mike Pickett, but Thursday, it was girls basketball taking the lead with senior point guard Taliah Scott inking a ride to the University of Arkansas.

"I've been to the school twice and just love the atmosphere and the coaches," said Scott, who averaged a bit over 30 points per game last year with 6.2 rebounds, 3.4 steals and 4.0 assists. "I think I will be able to complete quickly in the system with my skill set."

Note: Arkansas is currently unbeaten; 4-0, in regular season play after seasons of 18-14 and 19-9 under coach Mike Neighbors who is the winningest coach against Division opponents in his nine years.

St. Johns coach Yolanda Bronston has had Scott for two years and has seen the emergence of Scott as a nationally-acclaimed player.

"Obviously her skill level is the first thing coaches notice," said Bronston. "What she has done is become a great team leader and to bring her teammates along with her. Her approach to the game brings her teammates to a higher level."

Bronston got Scott after Scott lead the 8A Oakleaf High basketball team to a state semifinal, but Bronston did not think there was any transition time for Scott when she arrived at St. Johns Country Day School.

"Her game is her game whether she is at the 8A level of the 2A level," said Bronston. "Taliah is going to do what Taliah does. Right now, I'd like to find a way to clone her to keep a version of her here for a while."

Scott, who had nearly 30 offers from colleges across the country, had two games above 50 points, five games above 40 and

six above 30 for her immense point production.

"I never really had a top five," said Scott. "They were the first school to show the commitment. They came to a lot of my games and kept in touch."

Bronston concurred that Scott's physical preparation to step on the Arkansas court has been impressive.

"Her practices are already like a college level athlete and I can't wait to see her at that next level." said Bronston.

As for her preparations, Scott, a wicked outside shooter, a tenacious inside drive specialist and a dominating face-to-face defender, Arkansas is asking for one small piece of the puzzle.

"After talking to coach Neighbors, the main thing they want from me this year is to get stronger," said Scott. "This season, I want to work on perfecting stuff in my midrange and being ready to translate my game to the college level. I want to have fun with my team to see how far we can go."

Under coach Yolanda Bronston, at St. Johns for four years, Scott has been asked to be a more vocal leader and to pull the rest of the talented Spartans; with the talents of feisty guard duo Juliet Moody, a senior, and long-range shooter Mary Kate Kent a junior with an astounding 69 three pointers, and senior power forward Semai Williams, Scott wants to improve on last year's 21-6 season record, but, more importantly, the Spartans early exit in the region playoffs, a region semifinal loss to top-seed Florida A&M, 53-45. St. Johns also looks to avenge a district championship game loss to University Christian. University Christian eventually lost in the Class 2A state semifinal.

"I know I'm not the loudest person on the court and coach Bronston wants me to be more vocal out there," said Scott. "We have a lot of players that are talented and it's my job to put that all together."


