

School board calls off special meeting Chairman McKinnon makes statement to address fraud allegations concerning Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr., calls for investigation

FLEMING ISLAND - In an attempt to get ahead of the narrative surrounding last week's allegations that Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr. committed fraud, an internal investigation is being sought.

Using a prepared statement that school board attorney Charles "Dan" Sikes handed her moments prior to walking in front of the cameras at the Fleming Island High School library, Clay County School Board Chairman Johnna McKinnon said the allegations made last week by Susan Sailor,

former Keystone Heights High principal and 1996 Florida Teacher of the Year, have hurt too many people and she is directing the assistant superintendent for human resources to conduct an investigation. McKinnon also said she was cancelling a planned special school board for Aug. 10

that she hastily called for on Monday.

"Violations of this policy have resulted in procedural due process concerns for a number of employees, who may have been personally or professionally injured by the

Authorities look for ways to meet water demands

ORANGE PARK – While developers position Clay County to take advantage of a coming population boom, water authorities plan on how to keep the growing population hydrated.

Officials with the St. Johns and Suwanee River Water Management Districts are currently revising their regional water supply plans and will release a draft of the plan on Sept. 13 for public comment.

The plan proposes projects to find new sources of potable water to guarantee adequate water supplies for the next 20 years.

With nearly 100,000 new residents projected to migrate to Clay County over the next 20 years, finding new water supplies is increasingly urgent.

"We can meet future needs with this fleet of projects," said John Fitzgerald, regional water supply planning

Residents take woes to BCC

Spencers Plantation homeowners dispute where to put playground

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – It's definitely not all fun and games at Spencers Plantation, where a dispute over where to put a children's playground has many of the adult homeowners there seeing red and Clay County commissioners voting to table – at least for now - a decision dealing with the dispute.

The Board of County Commissioners voted at their regular meeting Aug. 9 to table a request from the Spencers Plantation Homeowners Association to replat a section of Spencers Landing so that it is recorded as a playground for local children until there is a resolution on arbitration

inappropriate release of allegations to the local media," McKinnon read to attendees.

She also said she was removing the item that School Board member Janice Kerekes last week asked to be placed on the Aug. 18 agenda stating the issue should be handled much like a confidential human resources matter.

When asked by media in attendance on what grounds McKinnon had to order district staff to do anything, Sikes, who stood by McKinnon's side during the press conference, dodged the question. It is current board policy that no single board member has the authority to order district staff to complete a task.


"What's happened here is a blood lust to go after the superintendent," Sikes said. "Innocent people who have due process rights have been injured. They are the kind of rights we're trying to protect right now."

Reporters asked Sikes if the district would be best served by calling for an external investigation in order to remove any appearance or perception of impropriety or a cover up.

"As much as Mr. Van Zant wants to clear his name, having the hearing in public without letting the individual teachers that belong to the union, staff members and administrators, giving them the opportunity of procedural due process to clear their name first, that needs to happen before we sit there and we smear everybody's name in public," Sikes said.

Kerekes had asked that the board vote at its regular Aug. 18 on whether to hold an investigation into charges that Van Zant ordered high school principals to move students into Exceptional Student Education, or ESE, in order to obtain a waiver from taking the state's new rigorous test required to graduate high school, thus inflating the district's graduation rate.

"I was shocked to hear of these accusations," Kerekes stated in a press release issued Aug. 5 "Dr. Sailor is one of the most well-respected educators in the State of Florida and a former Teacher of the Year for the state. That Superintendent Van Zant


has instructed senior staff to literally do his homework and write research papers for him is appallingly unethical."

Sailor also said she wrote the scholarly paper about communication within the district so Van Zant could complete a master's degree in organizational leadership. At that time in her 31-year career, Sailor was part of the district administrative staff and working under the title of "Principal on Assignment." Since then, she has taken a \$30,000 pay cut and returned to the classroom where she teaches English for Clay Virtual Academy.

"One of my assignments, in May of 2015, was to write a scholarly paper," said Sailor, who holds a doctorate in curriculum and instruction from the University of Florida. "I was to survey the school district employees about the state of communication within the district. Then I was to compile the Survey Monkey results and write a scholarly paper for him and include citations and a work cited page and charts or graphs all in three days' time."

What she said she found in conducting the survey was a dysfunctional organization that had very little internal communication riddled with disrespect.

"I got a firsthand view of how dysfunctional the situation was," Sailor said. There is a total lack of communication and respect for employees. I've been working

as an educator for 31 years now and I've never been treated as poorly as I was at our district office."

Sailor said she had to speak up about some of the things she witnessed while working at the district office after she learned the school district had received a "B" grade from the Florida Department of Education.

"It is a heavy burden to carry and when this year's school grades were issued and our school district dropped to 20th in the state, I felt like I could no longer be quiet. That's really what brought it up for me," Sailor said Aug. 4 in a phone interview.

Sailor, who was also a finalist for Florida Principal of the Year and a gubernatorial appointee to the Southern Regional Education Board under Gov. Jeb Bush, said Van Zant moved her from Keystone Heights High to the district office in preparation for her to move into the position of assistant superintendent for curriculum, a position previously held by the current Deputy Superintendent Diane Kornegay. She said Van Zant and Kornegay first met with her in a conference room at M&S Bank to discuss the move to the Green Cove Springs office.

"In my eight months at the district office, two assignments were actually given to me by Mrs. Kornegay. I spent several weeks on these and when a meeting was called to discuss the projects, I learned that Dr. Weiskopf had been assigned to them before I got to the district office and they were done. So I wasted my time and saw firsthand that there was no communication within the instructional division," Sailor wrote to board members.

Another factor playing into her decision to come forward, she said, was her concern that Van Zant gave no indication that he was going to change after a meeting she and her husband had with the superintendent. She said both she and her husband, Joel Sailor, donated to Van Zant's campaign in the hope that he was going to listen and make appropriate changes she had requested. On Feb. 29, she and her husband made separate \$500 donations to Van Zant's re-election campaign.

Van Zant did not attend Tuesday's press conference nor was he available or transparent to the media after Sailor's allegations were made public. However, after business hours on Friday, Van Zant released a Facebook video in which he alleged that Sailor made the allegations because she had been offered a high-level job by his opponent.

Meanwhile, Addison Davis of Oakleaf, a Republican candidate running to oust Van Zant, stated Aug. 6 he has never met Sailor and indicated Van Zant is reacting out of desperation. "The allegations Dr. Sailor has raised, however, call into question Superintendent Van

Zant's ethics and compliance with both State and Federal law. If these allegations are true, the Superintendent has used his power to instruct staff to complete unethical tasks. Although all Americans deserve full due process and are innocent until proven guilty, it appears Mr. Van Zant has once again demonstrated poor decisionmaking. This would appear to be a gross abuse of power," Davis said.

Sailor and her husband have known Van Zant since 1993, five years before he was elected to the Clay County School Board. He was elected to his current position in August 2012 by defeating incumbent superintendent Ben Wortham by 1,590 votes in a primary in which only Republican voters could cast ballots because a write-in candidate had qualified for the November general election.

coordinator with SJRWMD. "Our goal would be to have more projects than we need to meet the needs. If we did not have a constraint then we wouldn't have to go to these other projects."

The dramatic increase in population is largely due to the completion of the First Coast Expressway through Clay County

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within the next 10 years. The resulting large-scale development of land around the future toll road could increase pumping from the Floridan Aquifer to meet the increasing demand from an increasing population.

Construction for the leg of the limited access toll road tying Blanding Boulevard to Interstate 10 in Duval County is currently under construction. The leg attaching Interstate 95 to Blanding Boulevard is still in the design phase.

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Statute requires water districts to update regional water supply plans every five years. By planning, water authorities can reduce aquifer pumping and make better use of current resources.

The Floridan Aquifer supplies 90 percent of the drinking water for Northeast and East-Central Florida. Within 20 years, SJRWMD projects the demand for water in Clay County will rise from approximately 23 million gallons a day to 34 million gallons a day, shifting the aquifer's equilib-

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rium.

Chief among Clay County Utility Authority's projects to avoid this is to use FCX as a funnel to collect runoff water into storm water ponds. The system would then redirect the water to a centralized plant to filter out heavy metals and petroleum distillates – common vehicle pollutants.

The project would inject an estimated 2.5 million gallons of purified water

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Smoking cessation class helps participants quit

ORANGE PARK - Eva Sineveck reached adulthood in the 60s when the feminist movement reached its protesting peak. She was a single mother of two, a feminist, a manager for AT&T and for nearly 50 years, Sineveck was a smoker.

"I was up in the morning, cigarettes," Sineveck said. "In the car on the way to work, smoking. First break at work, smoking, lunchtime, smoking, second break, smoking, after work, get in that car smoke. That was everyday day after day week after week, year after year."

Now, Sineveck, 69, has broken her two pack a day habit through a smoking cessation program and in doing so ensured she will not become one of the 480,000 Americans who die every year from smoking.

A close friend she started smoking with in the 60s, however, was not as fortunate.

Sineveck received a call from her friend's husband in Texas who said her friend's emphysema condition had worsened. She rushed to Texas only to watch her friend die.

"She passed away June 29," Sineveck said. "I'm still coping with it. It's still raw. We started [smoking] together and she's no longer with us."

Sineveck might never have quit, she said, without the six-week smoking cessation class offered by the Jacksonvillebased Northeast Florida Area Health Education Center.

The free class encourages smokers to identify their habits in a cooperative classroom setting with other smokers who want to quit the deadly habit.

AHEC holds smoker cessation classes in Orange Park Medical Center and St. Vin-

cent's Medical Center Clay County as well as other clinics from Green Cove Springs to Jacksonville. Tobacco cessation specialists swear by the program and its 37.9 percent success rate.

Chief among the program's many strengths appears to be the curriculum itself, written by ex-smokers. The nicotine patches, gum and lozenges AHEC provides complimentary for participation undoubtedly help so smokers don't have to quit "cold turkey," but the program's success

comes from self-examination and creating a pathway to cessation.

"Almost everyone who smokes started when they were very young," said Bruce Oliver, tobacco cessation specialist with AHEC. "The smoker learns how to deal with stress by using nicotine, so it actually hijacks their brain. It's not at all easy to quit. If someone has the resolve and is willing to work their plan and strategize and do other things to deal when the stress hits,

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Conservative wave in Northeast Florida? Not quite

Supervisor of elections offices have been inundated with voters switching from Democrat, Independent and NPA (no party affiliation) to Republican. Is there a conservative wave taking over Northeast Florida? Not quite.

Two of the most important races in Northeast Florida include the race for State Attorney and Public Defender for the Fourth Judicial Circuit, which includes Duval, Clay and Nassau counties. As the qualify-

ing deadline approached, the incumbent state attorney, who is a Republican, had two Republican opponents; and the incumbent public defender, also a Republican, had one Republican opponent.

If the races had remained like this, then all registered voters in Duval, Clay, and Nassau counties would have been able to cast a vote in these races.

However, the circumstances drastically changed when a write-in candidate filed in each race. Once the write-in candidates filed, the primaries were closed, and only the approximately 320,000 registered Republicans would have the opportunity to elect the next state attorney and public defender.

The write-in candidates effectively disenfranchised 440,000 registered voters including 97 percent of the African-American voters in the judicial circuit.


Many Democrats, Independents, and NPA voters have decided to change their party affiliation to Republican for the sole purpose of voting in the state attorney and public defender races. The problem with this is that by changing parties many Democrats will be foregoing the right to vote in important Democratic primary races, such as the U.S. Senate, Congressional District 5, and State House Districts 13 and 14 races. All of these races have competitive Democratic primaries.

Therefore, we need engaged Democrats to vote in the Democratic primaries to put our candidates in the best position to succeed in the general election.

Changing party affiliation is not the answer. The answer lies in building a movement to change the ability to close an election due to the entry of a write-in candidate and to make the races for state attorney and public defender nonpartisan.

We all know the importance of having a fair and impartial judiciary. When a judge runs, he or she runs as a nonpartisan without any taint of politics or a political agenda.

faded into the ether, I remember getting a loving surprise from my oldest sister.

She and her husband were planning a summer trip to the Grand Canyon, so one day, while sitting in our mother's kitchen, she asked me if I could tag along on their journey to babysit my nephew. I didn't have to think twice. It didn't matter that I had never been a babysitter before, besides he was only six and I figured I had been six and came through it alright.

The months would go by and I planned the trip. Each time she'd come visit our parents I'd ask if we were still going and everything seemed to be on track. I had even told my friends at church and school of what an exciting summer I was going to have.

Years later. I'd learn that the trip had been planned as one last ditch effort to patch things up with her husband, a PTSD Vietnam veteran.

The weeks would go by and, as it got closer to July, I was itching with anticipation.

And then it happened.

She sat me down one Sunday after church and told me how they decided not to have a babysitter and I was not going with them to see one of the world's greatest treasures.

Clay County has a huge broken promise on its hands and there has been no action to make it right.

It was December 8, 2014, a month after Johnna McKinnon was voted in as chairman of the Clay County School Board.

The meeting was called to order for the sole purpose of whether to accept or deny a proposed letter of engagement for Charles "Dan" Sikes of Starke to serve a maximum of 20 hours per week as interim school board attorney. Note the word interim.

Board members voted 3-2 with McKinnon, newly-elected Vice Chairman Betsy Condon and newly-elected board member Ashley Gilhousen. Board members Janice Kerekes and Carol Studdard voted against the measure on grounds that it was the duty of the school board - as prescribed by Florida Statutes - to hire the school board attorney and not the superintendent.

Here we are in 2016 and Sikes is still on board. A broken promise.

That night in 2014, the meeting was not held in the Teacher Training Center at Fleming Island High, it was held in the old school board meeting room in Green Cove Springs, raising suspicions that the meeting was not broadcast on cable and, therefore, less transparent to taxpayers.

Also that night, the board voted to pay Sikes \$9,000 for December - retroactive to Dec. 1 -and then \$6,000 a month through June 30, 2015. A

The state attorney and the public defender work alongside these nonpartisan judges with the desired mutual purpose of seeking justice.

So, why are state attorney and public defender races partisan? Why do we have politics injected into our criminal justice system?

One of the first actions I will take in the Legislature is to remove politics from our criminal justice system by making the state attorney and public defender offices nonpartisan. In order to have a fairer and more just society, we must have a fair and impartial judicial system that promotes equal justice for all. *Editor's Note:* In Clay County alone, there are 1,946 more registered Republican voters who have switched parties in light of all of the strategic write-in disenfranchisement. As of August 2, there were 31,150 registered Democrats, 78,152 registered Republicans and 33,319 registered as Others for a total of 142,621 Clay County voters. As of April 28, 2016, 31,448 were registered as Democrats, 76,291 were registered as Republicans and 32,936 voters were registered as Others for a total of 140,675 Clay County voters.

seperate vote allowed the interim hiring of Sikes' paralegal for \$3,000 a month for the same six-month period.

Sikes' hiring marked the third friend that Charlie Van Zant Jr. had hired since taking office in November 2012. The first was Gavin Rollins, the district director of public relations, and in summer of 2013, he hired Jeffrey Topping as the district's director of maintenance, who came into the district with a salary of \$87,010, a move never afforded a teacher with comparable years of experience.

When questioned that night about his relationship with Sikes, Van Zant defended it, shrugged it off to similar moves that chief executive officers do at large corporations. Van Zant said that a \$100 campaign donation Sikes made to Van Zant's campaign for superintendent in 2012 had no bearing on his decision to hire Sikes. Instead, Van Zant reiterated that the move is about trust. (So far this year, Sikes has not made a campaign donation to Van Zant's in the Presidential Primary and was slated to serve in both the General Election and Early Voting. I have always served with honor and integrity.

However, the majority of you were not confused; between July 13 and August 1, 2016 we have 942 more registered Republicans here in Clay County (716 changes and 226 new registrations). Thank you and congratulations! Now you can vote for the

re-election effort, according to a review of records at the Supervisor of Elections of-fice.)

That's right. It is about trust.

Sikes was only supposed to be paid for six months.

Sikes' name made it into the news again last week. He was identified as the legal counsel for Rep. Charles Van Zant – the school superintendent's father – in a homestead exemption fraud case that was uncovered by the Bradford County Property Appraiser, Jimmy Alvarez. In a phone interview, it became clear that Alvarez took the position that the Van Zants had received poor legal counsel.

That sentiment of shoddy legal advice has been echoed from the chambers of the Clay County School Board meeting room numerous times since Sikes was given the good-ole boy position he holds here.

When is Clay County going to get sick and tired of broken promises and plain old bad advice? On August 30, you decide Clay County.

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Council votes to include Kingsley East's engineering in budget

ORANGE PARK – Orange Park Town Council recently voted to fit in the engineering costs for the Kingsley East project in the current fiscal year budget.

Despite funds for the project allocated for next year's budget and concerned comments from Town Manager Jim Hanson, Councilman Steve Howard's motion to start the engineering process passed unanimously at its Aug. 2 meeting. The predominant reason seemed to be impatience.

Engineering on the project to beautify the three-block section of Kingsley Avenue East from U.S. Highway 17 to River Road will now begin before the approval of next year's budget on Oct. 1.

Now, Hanson must find a way to free up funds in this year's budget to pay for the cost of engineering, estimated at \$78,000.

"We can see what funds we can come up with to do that," Hanson said.

Hanson said the time it would take to get a budget amendment to a second reading would take just as long as it would take to adopt the regular budget.

"Let's not make this complicated – the money's there," said Mayor Eugene Nix. "We have the funds. If we're going to wait till we approve the budget in September then we've lost two months. We've got the money, let's go ahead and get the designers going and working and maybe in two months we can start the thing."

Nix's enthusiasm over the project's forward inertia exceeded Hanson's, whose report to the town expressly stated engineering should begin as soon as the new budget receives approval.

The Kingsley East project is the first major discretionary undertaking on the town's part for many years due to the estimated 10 years of road reconstruction and resurfacing which has taxed the budget.

On June 23, the town allocated \$802,000 from the town sanitation fund balance to pay for the project during the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

Improvements to the road would include curbed medians and parking spots alongside the three-blocks of Kingsley East. Landscaping and decorative lighting could ensure a new look for one of the town's most historic road, the gateway to the St. Johns River.

The town held two public meetings to garner public feedback on what citizens would want to see improved on the road on May 18 and July 6. Support for the project was predominately positive, with 90 residents in attendance between the two meetings.

Previous designs to remodel Kingsley East since 2007 ranged anywhere from \$200,000 to several million dollars and included different designs for piers, brick



paved intersections and native landscaping, so the feedback helped the town solidify the most important parts of the project they could afford with its \$802,000 budget.

The town expects to repave the road, improve storm water drainage problems, include parking spots, the landscaping and possibly add decorative lighting.

Construction for the project could begin as soon as early 2017 and finish later in the year, but if the engineering schedule is pushed up, the schedule could result in an earlier completion date.

Nix said the approval to begin the engineering process marked a "red letter" day for him, the payoff of 15 years of work towards the project. "We don't need to wait until another meeting," Nix said. "Call up the engineers tomorrow."

Help report and prevent algal blooms

JACKSONVILLE – The St. Johns Riverkeeper continues to receive reports throughout the summer of algal blooms in the St. Johns River and her tributaries.

Biolgists recently took samples of an algal bloom in Doctors Lake in Clay County. The test results detected total microcystin toxin levels at 2473 micrograms per liter, or more than 120 times higher than the recommended recreational exposure threshold of 20 micrograms per liter from the World Health Organization.

In every state that has established Harmful Algal Bloom response guidelines and criteria to protect the public from potential exposure, these toxin levels would mandate a public health advisory. Unfortunately, Florida is not one of those states. lgal blooms often occur as a result of an excessive concentration of nutrients. Too much nitrogen and phosphorous in our waterways can feed the uncontrolled growth of algae, depleting oxygen in the water that is needed by fish, reducing light that is essential to submerged vegetation, and threatening the health of both humans and aquatic life.

Excess nutrients result from failing septic tanks, manure, wastewater discharges, stormwater runoff, and fertilizers that regularly wash into the river.

Blue green algae sometimes produce toxins that can result in ear, eye, or skin reactions and hay fever-like or flu-like symptoms.

At high levels, these toxins can affect the gastrointestinal tract, liver, and nervous system.

As a result, do not swallow, swim, or wade in water where blooms are present, and don't eat fish caught in the same vicinity of an algal outbreak.

Wash your skin and clothing with soap and water if you come into contact with a bloom.



Help kids get ready for fall sports season

 Examine and replace equipment if necessary. The right equipment can protect kids from injury and help them realize their full athletic potential. But damaged or outdated equipment can increase kids' risk of injury. Examine kids' equipment long before fall sports season begins so you have time to bargain hunt

should anything need to be replaced.

• Schedule a physical for your child. Many school districts mandate that athletes receive and pass physicals before they can compete. Speak with the athletic director at your child's school to learn the guidelines that govern athletic physicals. The physical will need to be conducted by a predetermined date, but you may also need the physical to be conducted after a certain date for it to be considered valid. Speak with your child's physician if any problems are found during the physical.

• Let kids heal. Kids' schedules are busier than ever before, and many youngsters play several sports during the school year.

Summer vacation may be the only extended period all year that youngsters, bodies get to heal

While it's important that kids stay physically active throughout the summer, make sure they donÕt overdo it, as you should emphasize the importance of rest.

• Gradually get back in the swing of things. While rest gives kids, bodies a chance to heal and develop, it's important that young athletes




stay in shape over the summer. As the fall sports season draws near, help kids gradually get back in the swing of things. Tryouts tend to be physically demanding, so kids who have not lifted a finger all summer may be at risk of injury or missing the cut. Let kids ease back into regular exercise to make sure they are not starting from scratch come their first tryout.

• Speak with coaches. Coaches can be great assets to parents who want to make sure their youngsters enjoy the summer without sacrificing their chances of making the team in the fall. Speak with kids, coaches to determine

if there is any area your son or daughter can work on over the summer to improve his or her chances of making the team. Make sure kids are the ones leading the charge to improve their games; otherwise, they may feel pressured into doing so and that can take away the fun of playing sports.

Scholar athletes should take advantage of the opportunity to relax and recover during summer. But athletes who hope to compete in the fall can still work with their parents to ensure they're ready once the school year and sports season begins.



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Warning signs of childhood vision troubles

METRO CREATIVE SERVICES – Adults know when they are beginning to experience trouble with their vision. In such instances, men and women will book appointments with their eye doctors to determine what's causing their problems. But whether it's a fear or eyeglasses or simply feeling their symptoms are normal, kids might be hesitant to tell their parents about any vision problems they're having. As a result, parents must learn to recognize certain warning signs that indicate their children are experiencing vision problems.

Vision problems in youngsters can be especially problematic, as many of the lessons kids learn in school still begin on a chalkboard. The following are some potential indicators that kids might be dealing with vision problems that require medical attention.

• Reading habits: Vision problems may be most noticeable when kids are reading. As youngsters learn to read, they might use their fingers to keep their place while they figure out the pronunciation of certain words. But kids eventually grow out of that habit. Kids who are still doing so long after they have learned to read may be having trouble seeing words on the page. In addition, kids who pull their reading materials very close to their eyes may be struggling to see the words.

• Viewing habits: Peculiar viewing habits may also be indicative of poor vision. Kids who sit too close to the television may be struggling to see what's on as opposed to just being overexcited to see their favorite shows. Kids who prefer to watch programs on tablets they can hold as opposed to televisions may also make that choice because it's easier for them to see on their tablets than on the television. In such instances, ask why they prefer tablets to television. When kids watch TV, ask them to move further away from the television. If they complain moving back makes it hard to see, book an appointment with an eye doctor.

• Eye rubbing: Many kids, and even adults, rub their eyes when they are feeling fatigued. But kids who seem to rub their eyes frequently and at times of the day when they should not be tired may be experiencing vision troubles and feeling frustrated that they cannot see very well.

• Eye activity: Some kids begin to close one eye when reading, watching television or attempting to read signs. That may be indicative of a refractive vision disorder, in which the eye struggles to focus, or refract, light correctly on the retina. Such problems can often be corrected with eyeglasses or contact lenses, but some refractive disorders may require surgery.

• Squinting: Kids who squint a lot may be finding it difficult to focus on words on a chalkboard or even television programs. Squinting may also be brought on by a corneal abrasion. Parents who notice their youngsters are squinting should consult the childÕs eye doctor to determine the cause of the problem.

Vision problems can be especially harmful to children, who rely on their vision to perform their schoolwork. Parents who learn to recognize the various warning signs of vision troubles can nip problems in the bud before they have too great an impact on youngsters.





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Shop for sports eye protection

METRO CREATIVE SERVICES – The end of summer is crunch time for families preparing for the new school year. So many items make up back-to-school shopping lists that it can be easy to overlook supplies necessary for extracurricular activities.

Autumn marks the beginning of many scholastic sports seasons, including cross-country, field hockey, football, and rugby. Sports can be exciting and challenging for athletes, but athletes also are at constant risk of injury.

Prevent Blindness America notes that more than 40,000 people seek treatment for sportsrelated eye injuries each year. While many of those injuries affect children, the good news is that sports-related eye injuries are largely preventable. Sports eye protection is a must, and protective eyewear should be included on back-to-school shopping lists.

In addition to wearing protective eyewear when playing sports, athletes can take the following steps to avoid sports-related eye injuries.

• Wear helmets. Kids who play youth baseball should always wear batting helmets with polycarbonate face shields when batting. When playing hockey, use helmets with face shields approved by the U.S. Amateur Hockey Association.

• Wear safety goggles. Regular glasses or goggles may not offer adequate protection.



Wear proper safety goggles that have lensed polycarbonate protectors for racquet sports or basketball. All eye guards or protective eyewear should be labeled ASTM F803-approved, according to Prevent Blindness America. This eyewear is guaranteed to offer the highest


levels of protection.

• Recognize non-contact sports also can be dangerous. Even non-contact sports such as badminton can present a chance for injury. Individuals should exercise caution any time they play sports that require the use of balls, racquets or flying objects.

• Speak with coaches and teachers. Open a dialogue with coaches or physical education administrators in an effort to highlight the importance of protective eyewear and learn about the steps being taken to protect athletes and their eyes. Include youngsters in these discussions so they learn about the need for protective eyewear and the benefits that such eyewear provides in sports where there is a high to moderate risk of eye injury.

• Protect eyes from the sun. Athletes who play outdoor sports should take steps to protect their eyes from the sun. When shopping for goggles, find ones that offer UV protection. In addition, look for tinted lenses that reduce glare.

• Exercise good sportsmanship. Always follow the rules of the sport and be a good team player. Use the equipment in the way it was intended so everyone, including teammates and opponents, is as safe as possible.





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Recognizing cyber bullying


According to Cyber bullying statistics from the i-SAFE foundation, more than half of adolescents and teens have been bullied online.

Building a strong parent-teacher relationship

STATE POINT MEDIA – Once a school year begins, many students spend more time in the classroom with their teachers than they do at home with their parents. That's especially true in dual-income households where both parents work outside of the home.

Though many parents would love to spend more time with their children, doing so can be difficult when both parents must go to work every day. Because kids spend so much time with their teachers, it's important for parents to work toward building a strong parent-teacher relationship. Such a relationship fosters communication, which can help a young student do his or her best in and out of the classroom, something that's a goal for parents and teachers alike. Parents interested in developing a strong relationship with their kids' teachers can take several steps to make that happen.

* Meet your child's teacher at the beginning of the year. Teachers have many students come in and out of their classroom on any given day, so it can be hard for teachers to initiate a relationship with parents. Parents have significantly fewer children to look after, so they should take the first step toward building a relationship with teachers. Introduce yourself at the onset of the school year, providing phone numbers and email addresses where you can be reached. Let the teacher know you're available for discussion any time during the school year and that you look forward to the coming school year and working with the teacher as the year progresses.

* Attend "Back to School Night." School events like an open house or a "Back to School Night" are a great way to help kids grow acclimated to their school. But such events also make great opportunities for parents to learn more about their kids' teachers than they might have learned during their introductory meeting.



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Developing a strong relationship with a child's teacher can help parents ensure their kids are doing their best in the classroom.

Such events may allow teachers to explain the curriculum for the upcoming year, and teachers may feel encouraged when parents show an active interest in such events.

* Prioritize parent-teacher conferences. Parent-teacher conferences are a great opportunity for parents to speak to their children's teacher one-on-one. Unlike an introductory meeting or an open house at the beginning of the school year, a parent-teacher conference allows parents and teachers to specifically discuss students in private. Teachers may provide insight into how a child is performing and behaving in the class-



room, offering advice as to how to improve that performance or suggestions as to how to encourage kids to keep up the good work. Such conferences may be your only opportunity for a one-on-one, in-person discussion about your

media sites and/or phone conversations. What makes cyber bullying more difficult to detect and remedy than traditional bullying is that sometimes this type of bullying is veiled in secrecy.

Those who engage in cyber bullying can create aliases and accounts under false names, allowing them to covertly engage in bullying behavior. As a result, tracking down bullies can be challenging.

Although cyber bullying is on the rise, there are some things that parents and children can do to help put a stop to such unfortunate instances.

• Parents who feel their child is not emotionally ready for the responsibility of a digital device can hold back on purchasing a smartphone or choose one with very limited features. Some schools set strict limits on phone usage at school, and children who go only from school to home and vice versa may not have the need for an "emergency phone" that can open up a window for trouble.

• Adolescents and teens should feel comfortable talking with their parents without the fear of reprimand. Otherwise, they may hide instances of cyber bullying or not know how to broach sensitive topics like bullying. Parents can engage in conversation with their children often and stress that the doors of communication are always open. Meet your child's teacher at the beginning of the year. Teachers appreciate compliments just like other professionals, and parents should express their gratitude to those teachers who are working hard to make learning fun for their youngsters.

Establishing a strong relationship with a child's teacher can help parents ensure students are making the most of their time in the class-room.

• Teens should be made aware that cyber bullying is a very real occurrence and is not just other kids "having fun" or "joking." If behavior is repetitive and hurtful, it should be made public and addressed.

• Parents can monitor and limit their children's personal accounts. Some smartphone and tablet applications can be mirrored on the main account, enabling parents to see incoming text or video messages.

• A laptop or desktop computer should be placed in a shared space so that usage can be monitored. Parents can restrict tablet or smartphone usage to public areas.

• When online, children should be advised not to share personal information. Social media sites may be used by bullies to gather sensitive information about a person that can be used against them at a later time. Children should be urged to keep passwords secret and to never give information such as birthdays, phone numbers and addresses to people who aren't close friends. Friend lists should be restricted to only those people students interact with frequently to minimize the chance for bullying or other inappropriate behavior.

•Teens who have been bullied can keep evidence of the bullying and may benefit from talking with a counselor.

Cyberbullying is a growing concern for educators and parents and has far-reaching implications. Getting smart about this phenomenon can help staunch new cases of online bullying.

connected with the matter that is currently taking place. The section is currently platted as a parking lot.

The vote was a unanimous 5-0 from the BCC, which spent a lengthy amount of time listening to a number of homeowners from Spencers Plantation who appeared at the meeting to present their side of the situation. Among their complaints was that the current HOA Board of Directors is, in their opinion, actually an illegal board.

"The 2016 election was conducted fraudulently," said one of the speakers, Charlie Weaver. "It was not a fair election."

Weaver added that the 2016 election, staged Jan. 12, is currently under "election dispute with the Department of Business and Professional Regulations," which deals with such items.

Spencers Plantation homeowners who attended the BCC meeting on Tuesday presented several videos from the Jan. 12 HOA meeting, which they said showed proof of the ongoing dispute.

Among the problems involved with the vote were how proxies and mailed-in ballots were handled, and a later report that the envelopes involved were reported on April 8 as being stolen, said Weaver.

Including Weaver, seven homeowners from Spencers Plantation, which is located in the Argyle Forest area in northern Clay County, spoke before the BCC to plead their case and ask the BCC not to approve the parking lot and playground replat request.

No one in favor of the replat spoke at the BCC meeting.

Those appearing said there is a better spot for the playground, a spot which is favored by many more homeowners than the parking lot location, and that issues such as permits, insurance and maintenance costs have not been addressed.

Judith Martin, a Spencers Plantation homeowner who spoke, said the community has not had a voice in the playground issue.

"Thank you all for giving our community a voice," she said, adding that the community has never had an opportunity to discuss the playground issue. "The community should have a choice in the location."

Martin said the parking lot location is a "very, very busy" secondary entrance for Argyle Elementary School.

"Parents park there while they are walking their children to and from school... It has high usage," she said, adding it has also historically been used to host the annual national "Night Out" event with the Clay County Sheriff's Office and the fire department, as well as a community block party and seasonal barbecues and parties.

"We now have nowhere to hold these events," she said.

The area is now dangerous in more than one way – it is hazardous for the children trying to cross the street to their school, and because of what she termed "improperly installed and maintained (playground) equipment," one child has been injured, Martin said.

The playground structure, which she termed "residential" and similar to what someone would put in their backyard, was never completed nor properly maintained, Martin said.

"I have pictures of the parking lot where this has been put in. You'll see broken glass, you'll see the benches were never put back on it, you'll see broken fences, you'll see broken wood. There's nails on the floor," she said. "It's totally unacceptable in anybody's definition of acceptable."

Chad Williams, Clay County zoning chief, who said that while the items concerning the arbitration and ongoing dispute being raised at Tuesday's meeting were new to him, the county had been contacted in January that there was an unpermitted structure in Spencer's Plantation.

"The staff went and saw that it was an unpermitted structure," he said. "We did a stop order at that time."

When an application, titled under Spencers Homeowners Association, subsequently came in for the replat from parking lot to playground – a move necessary to issue the required permits for the playground structure – it had to be recommended for approval, Williams said.

"We have reviewed it and it meets the technical aspects of the code. We are required to recommend it (for approval to the BCC) based on the technical aspects," he said.

County Attorney Mark Scruby described the situation as "quite the mess," and said that basically, the BCC had three options: approve, disapprove or table. Commissioner Wayne Bolla, in whose district Spencers Plantation is situated, said he would opt for tabling a decision because of the dispute being under mediation.

"There will eventually be a resolution by an arbitrator as to whether this is a legally elected board that's making this request or not," he said.

Bolla added that he knew there was some "sword rattling" going on about lawsuits, and while he didn't want to get the county into "an expensive undertaking," he said, (if necessary) "If I had my say, I would go to court on this because these people have a legitimate gripe. I was there. I saw this happening. It happened just like it showed (on the videos)."

The remaining commissioners agreed with the concept of tabling the issue until they get a resolution on the arbitration situation, with most of them calling what they had seen on the videos presented "disturbing."

In other action, the board approved hiring Courtney K. Grimm as the new county attorney with a contract that will pay her a base salary of \$186,000 a year and a deferred compensation package that would be half for the first two years of employment and then the maximum after two years, said Stephanie Kopelousos, county manager, who presented the contract.

The commissioners approved the contract by a vote of 4-1, with Bolla dissenting.

Bolla said his "no" vote was not a reflection of what he thought of the candidate, but rather that he would like to address the county's practice of buying out unused sick leave when an employee leaves.

"I don't think that's appropriate for this kind of professional job," he said, later adding, "I think we need to stop that."

Grimm will replace Scruby, who retires at the end of August after some 30 years of service. Kopelousos thanked Scruby for his service.

"I don't think anyone realizes how much we rely on you," she said. "These are big shoes to fill and we are sad to see you leave. You have truly been not just a counselor to us but a friend."

that reason, Kari said, the hospital looked into opening a café.

OPMC reviewed a corporate climate survey and found their employees wanted other options at lunchtime besides the cafeteria. The hospital's leadership decided to act on it and began the search for a partner who could run an in-house café.

Previously, Kari and David flipped houses, but wanted to own a local business to have another source of income. Kari found out that OPMC was looking for a café through an online advertisement and began formulating a plan.

Soon after opening however, the café proved to be a 116-hour a week job for them. It took two weeks for Kari and David to manage the customer rushes and work out any remaining kinks.

"I actually worked there with them for about three days on their bar when they first opened to make sure everything went smoothly," said Steven Kelley, operating partner of Brass Tacks Coffee Company, and a Green Cove Springs City Council member. "It's definitely fantastic. We got them setup with all their equipment. They bought through us and we service it and maintain it that way we can make sure

it's standing."

Kelley worked on the front end, before the café even opened, to help make their entry into the hospital successful on the artisan coffee front. He created the café's training manuals and trained the baristas to make coffee similar to what guests taste at Kelley's Green Cove Springs coffee shop. Spring Park Coffee.

All the work seems to have paid off. The medical staff seem to enjoy it based on the steady procession of scrubs in the café's line. "I think it's been a fabulous partnership and much needed, not to take away from our cafeteria operations, but really just to add another layer of visibility," said Kathy Hester, chief nursing officer at OPMC. "The only negative is they want it open 24/7."

Quickfire Café opens at 7 a.m. and closes at 9 p.m. currently, but they're going to experiment with later hours to catch different shifts.

then they're better prepared to be successful."

The ritual, the routine of it all – identifying what triggers a smoker to light up is just as important as identifying why. When smokers break the routine and replace it with healthier behaviors in tandem with "clean nicotine," Oliver said – then smokers have a much higher success rate.

The smoking cessation program also focuses on educating students about the consequences for their loved ones, the people the students smoked around.

"People that are raised by people that smoke but they're not smoker themselves –

there's health consequences," said Patricia Lind, an AHEC tobacco treatment specialist. "More than 53,000 die in the U.S. as a result of second hand smoke. You know, that's a lot."

Although smoking has declined from 20.9 percent in 2005 to 16.8 percent in 2014, a preventable threat still exists, especially • Risk of cancer of mouth, throat, esophagus, bladder, kidney and pancreas decrease

• Risk of coronary heart disease comparable to that of a nonsmoker

for those who live below the poverty line.

Sineveck smoked two packs of cigarettes a day near the end of her addiction – and even though she smoked whatever was cheap, she spent \$60 a week, accounting for an annual loss of \$3,120.

Sineveck was a "chimney" before her first class. She smoked everything she had and went into her first class on Monday morning with clean hands. She hasn't smoked a cigarette since that Sunday –

three and a half months ago.

Food tastes amazing now, Sineveck said, and her sense of smell has returned. Smoking is a relapse-ridden addiction, Oliver said, and very few people ever quit the first time. The key to eventual success lies in identifying what caused the relapse, and for many it's the muscle memory of the morning coffee ritual.

"I believe I'll make it for life, but I don't know that," Sineveck said. "I don't ever want to go through anything like this again to quit something."

Deputies find pop up meth lab in Keystone Heights

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – A Keystone Heights Woman faces charges of manufacturing and trafficking methamphetamine after Clay County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Unit and SWAT team stormed her home.

CCSO arrested Virginia Rose Moore, 33. at her home at the 6000 block of Wofford Drive on Aug. 5 at

11:11 a.m. Deputies and officers from the CCSO Narcotics Unit and SWAT team arrived at Moore's home on July 29 with an arrest warrant for Howard Smith, who was staying in Moore's house. During Smith's

rived, and she consented to a search of her car. Police found a box of generic-brand pseudoephedrine, a decongestant used to make methamphetamine.

According to the report, Moore said that she planned to take the box to Interlachen, Fla. to sell for \$50 to a manufacturer of meth, and that she uses meth occasionally but does not make it. Further investigation revealed that she had purchased pseudoephedrine 29 times since May 14, the report said.

A search of Moore's bedroom yielded 41.3 grams of meth oil. 2.3 grams of meth hidden in a flashlight, four amphetamine pills, one gram of marijuana, a nine-millimeter handgun, a box of pseudoephedrine, and other materials used to make meth, the report said.

According to police, Moore allegedly denied knowledge of the lab in her bedroom, and explained that Smith had been

staying in it for a few days due to his illness, lung cancer. Smith said that he had used meth before but no longer used drugs due to his illness. When questioned about the marijuana, he confessed that he used it for his lung cancer. Smith told police he knew nothing of the meth or its manufacture in the bedroom, the report said.

Deputies arrested Moore on August 5. She is now in the Clay County Jail on charges of manufacturing and trafficking meth, with a bond of \$350,003.

Store clerks urged to be aware of counterfeit bills

ORANGE PARK - A Spring Hill, Fla. Man faces charges he intentionally passed counterfeit \$100 bills in Clay County just so he could obtain real money as part of his change.



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Teacher works to spread the word about Crohn's disease

MIDDLEBURG – After years of medical concerns and rounds of testing, an emergency appendectomy and the removal of a foot of her small intestine, April Martin was diagnosed with Crohn's disease at age 23.

Crohn's and colitis are painful, medically incurable inflammatory bowel diseases that affect around 1.6 million people across the United States. according to the Crohn's and Colitis Foundation of America. Today, Martin works to raise awareness about the ailment and encourage those with it, to keep fighting.

"I think of Crohn's as very inconvenient," said Martin, who teaches economics and American history at Middleburg High. "When you're in the middle of dealing with teenagers all day long or giving the kids a bath at night, it's just not convenient to have. Sometimes you plan your life around access to the bathroom. I can tell you where any bathroom is in many restaurants and malls. When you have Crohn's, you have to be resourceful."

As a five-year member of the planning committee for Take Steps Jacksonville, Martin is always the first to suggest creating t-shirts proudly displaying their cause – finding a cure for Crohn's and colitis. Getting the word out about her disease is just as important as raising money to Martin, and she is able to do both as not only a planning committee member, but also a runner, coach and ambassador for Take Steps for Crohn's and Colitis.

"I communicate with everyone around me, friends, colleagues, so people know that I need help," she said. "When you're suffering from a disease that can really be embarrassing at times, it's hard for some people to talk about, and some people are so shy. But that's why I want to make sure that I'm telling my story. I want to help people find a way to be able to talk about it and to make it easier for others."

Martin became involved with Take Steps after responding to a Facebook post by the North Florida Chapter of the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation of America, an orga-

nization dedicated to finding cures and improving the lives of those with the diseases. A runner since she was a child, Martin's involvement with CCFA over the past eight years quickly moved from being a member of the planning committee of Take Steps to traveling across the country as a runner and a coach for Team Challenge, CCFA's

half marathon fundraiser.

"People have asked over the years if I've ever been involved in a support group, and I haven't, because the people that I've met along the way through Team Challenge and Take Steps, they've really been my support group," said Martin. "It's awesome

straight into the aquifer. Current estimates set costs at \$26.8 million.

"It'll get us a long way there to be sure," said Jeremy Johnston chief operations officer at CCUA. "Does it get us all the way there? That's still to be determined, but it will probably get us into the next planning cycle."

The project and the aquifer face a similar dilemma – rainfall. During dry periods, when demand for storm water is high and supply is low, the system would be difficult to use. Designers hope a horizontal well system would help trap more water for longer periods. Each county in SJRWMD's 18-county service area received low rainfall in July, noteworthy considering July is typically part of Florida's rainy season.

Over the last few years, CCUA has spearheaded an aggressive water conservation effort. The utility authority launched a tiered rate structure in 2010 to target customers who abused water resources. In June, 7.5 percent of residential customers accounted for 26.1 percent of residential potable water billing.

"The tiered rate structure has had an enormous impact on our customers," John-

ston said. "Not just our customers, but most of the utilities in Florida."

In the last seven years, CCUA has reduced its total pumping from the aquifer by over 14 percent, so they intend to build on their success. In the future, the utility authority intends on implementing a system where customers can monitor their own usage. Finding new water sources runs in tandem with water conservation, "Conservation is number one," Fitzgerald said. As the population grows that means more reclaimed water grows and that means more reclaimed water becomes available. Part of the alternative water supply effort is looking at making advanced waste treatment systems such as reverse osmosis filtration systems, ultra violet and ozone systems more efficient, more viable, Reclaimed water, Johnston said, would probably never be potable. CCUA's filtration systems can't process pharmaceuticals, so the water is better used for agriculture where it can supplement drinking water. Workshops for the North Florida water supply plan will continue through October with board approval slated in December. If approved, water authorities will have a clear picture on where to move ahead to meet a growing demand for water.

some to be able to connect with all these people. I'm very open about my battle with my disease, and I consider it a privilege to be able to influence other people's lives."

With the help of organizers, fundraisers, and participants like Martin, Take Steps Jacksonville's 2016 walk, held April 30 at Riverside Park, saw almost 300 participants and met their goal of raising more than \$50,000 for the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation of America. For Martin, however, fundraisers like Take Steps and Team Challenge are less about raising money, and more about raising awareness.

"It's cool to wear pink every October,



and everybody knows about breast cancer. Crohn's and colitis is harder to make popular," said Martin. "Let's be honest, nobody wants to talk about poop, so it's really hard for some people to talk about. But the more we get this out there, the more questions people ask. If people can at least know a little bit about what we're going through, we can make everyone's lives a little easier." Martin's advice to others living with Crohn's

and colitis – maintain a sense of humor. "I have moments where I have my pity parties, but for the most part I can laugh about it," she said. "There have been a few times where I've barreled right through the finish line, straight to the bathroom! You're either going to laugh or cry and 98 percent of the time, I choose to laugh."

Upcoming Public Hearings, and Regular Meeting

The Board of Supervisors for the South Village Community Development District ("District") will hold the following two public hearings, and a regular meeting on Tuesday, September 6, 2016 at 6:30 p.m. at the Eagle Landing Residents Club, 3975 Eagle Landing Parkway, Orange Park, Florida 32065.

The first public hearing is being held to receive public comment and objections on the District's proposed budgets for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2016 and ending September 30, 2017 ("Fiscal Year 2016/2017 Budget"). The second public hearing is being held to consider the imposition of operations and maintenance special assessments ("O&M Assessment") upon the lands located within the District, to fund the District's Fiscal Year 2016/2017 Budget; to consider the adoption of an assessment roll; and, to provide for the levy, collection, and enforcement of assessments. At the conclusion of the hearings, the Board will, by resolution, adopt a budget and levy assessments as finally approved by the Board. A Board meeting of the District will also be held where the Board may consider any other business that may properly come before it.

Description of Assessments

The District imposes special assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative, operations, and maintenance budget and providing the funds necessary to pay debt service on outstanding bonds as reflected in the District's debt service budget. A geographic depiction of the District (i.e., the property potentially subject to the assessment) is identified in the map attached hereto.

All benefited lands within the District pay these assessments, including undeveloped and developed lands. Lands within the District are assigned units of measurement in accordance with their use and as described more fully in the District's assessment methodology on file at the offices of the District Manager. All platted lots are assessed equally.

The table below shows the schedule of the proposed O&M Assessments for each product type within the District:

For all 0&M Assessments levied for Fiscal Year 2016/2017, the District expects to collect no more than **\$1,625,093** in gross revenue. The proposed 0&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which the County may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the proposed 0&M Assessment shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for operation and maintenance assessments. This means that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased. Note that the 0&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.


By operation of law, the District's assessments each year constitute a lien against benefitted property located within the District just as do each year's property taxes. For Fiscal Year 2016/2017, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on certain developed property, and will directly collect the assessments imposed on the remaining benefitted property by sending out a bill prior to, or during, November 2016. For delinquent assessments that were initially directly billed by the District the District may initiate a foreclosure action or may place the delinquent assessments on the next year's county tax bill. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title, or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.

Additional Provisions

The public hearings and meeting are open to the public and will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Florida law. A copy of the proposed budgets, proposed assessment roll, and the agenda for the hearings and meeting may be obtained at the offices of the District Manager, located at 475 West Town Place, Suite 114, St. Augustine, Florida 32092, Ph: (904) 940–5850, during normal business hours. The public hearings and meeting may be continued to a date, time, and place to be specified on the record at the hearings or meeting. There may be occasions when staff or board members may participate by speaker telephone.

Any person requiring special accommodations at this meeting because of a disability or physical impairment should contact the District Office at (904) 940-5850 at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the meeting. If you are hearing or speech impaired, please contact the Florida Relay Service by dialing 7–1–1, or 1–800-955-8771 (TTY) / 1–800-955-8770 (Voice), for aid in contacting the District Office.

Please note that all affected property owners have the right to appear at the public hearings and meeting, and may also file written objections with the District Manager within twenty days of publication of this notice. Each person who decides to appeal any decision made by the Board with respect to any matter considered at the public hearings or meeting is advised that person will need a record of proceedings and that accordingly, the person may need to ensure that a verbatim record of the proceedings is made, including the testimony and evidence upon which such appeal is to be based.








Make your yard more Florida-friendly

In the heat of the summer, many homeowners are scrambling to find ways to keep their landscapes healthy with an onslaught of ir-_____

rigation, herbicides, fertilizer and pesticides. However, there is another approach to landscaping that is both lower maintenance and better for the environment of Florida. Florida-Friendly



project of the University of Florida IFAS Extension Service designed to protect Florida's unique natural resources by conserving water, reducing waste and pollution, creating wildlife habitat and preventing erosion, which is the loss of soil. Any landscape can be Florida-Friendly if it is designed and cared for according to the nine Florida-Friendly Landscaping Principles. The Florida Yards and Neighborhoods is the residential program of Florida-Friendly Landscaping and can be a way for you to help create a more sustainable Florida.

The following are the nine main principles of Florida Friendly Landscaping:

Right Plant, Right Place

By knowing the culture of your soil and yard, you can select plants that will thrive in that area with little maintenance.

Water Efficiently

Irrigation of lawns and landscapes can be a major drain on a limited resource. By irrigating by the recommendations of the water management district and utilizing micro-irrigation and other technology, you can use less water.

Fertilize Appropriately

Excess fertilizer spread on yards is wasted and eventually pollutes surface and groundwater. By selecting the proper fertilizer and applying it at the proper rate, these issues are reduced.

Mulch

A properly chosen and spread mulch will help to prevent weeds, hold moisture and add to the organic matter of the soil.

Attract Wildlife

Wildlife can be a dynamic part of your landscape, it can bring an interesting and fun component of the ecosystem to view in your own yard. Many species of wildlife also help to pollinate flowers and control pests.

Manage Yard Pests Responsibly

Pests can be a damaging part of the landscape but by detecting pests and choosing the most effective and environmentally friendly response can greatly reduce the impact of pesticides on the environment and save you money.

Recycle Yard Waste

When you have yard waste hauled away you are also losing all of the nutrients that are in that plant material that could be going back into your soil. Composting can be a great option to build up the soil to grow a more robust garden.

Reduce Storm Water Runoff

Whenever it rains, the rainwater can carry material and chemicals with it, sometimes into surface water and storm-drains where it can pollute the water. By allowing the water to naturally pass through our soil or collecting it and reusing it to water the garden, this impact is reduced.

Protect the Waterfront

Waterfront property, whether it is Black Creek, the St. Johns River, Lake Geneva, or a retention pond, it is especially important to manage to reduce water pollution. By protecting these waterways, we can help ensure healthy ecosystems and safe drinking water in the future.

Rio2016 Dressel gets Olympic gold medal

Fifth seed for 100 free final

RIO DE JANIERO – Clav High alum Caeleb Dressel got Clay County's first Olympic gold medal on Sunday doing what he does best as a swimmer; start fast, scare the field and hold off the rest of the field. With that strategy, Dressel gave Olympic swimming icon Michael Phelps enough space on his second leg of the mens 4 x 100 freestyle relay to push the American team ahead for their eventual gold medal win over defending gold medalists France.

On Tuesday, Dressel doubled down in the 100 freestyle heats with the second fastest qualifying time; a 47.91 which was also a best ever time, then made his first Olympic individual final with a scintillating semifinal finish of 47.97 to take the fifth fastest time of the night. Dressel and

Dressel continued his chase for an individual gold medal by advancing to the 100 freestyle final on Wednesday with top three finishes in the preliminary heats and semifinals on Tuesday.

American teammate Nathan Adrian, the defending Olympic 100 free gold medalist. both made the final with Adrian rebounding from a disastrous 16th place preliminary finish of 48.58 to top the semifinal field with the fastest split of the night; a 47.83. The 100 free final was scheduled for Wednesday evening.

In the 4 x 100 freestyle relay held on Sunday, Dressel popped off the fastest start off the block, the fastest first 50 before handing off to Phelps for the second leg

The American team got a riveting second leg from Phelps to win the gold medal in 3:09.92. That time held off France's 3:10.53 and Australia's bronze medal split of 3:11.37. Ironically, France defeated the United States in 2012 with a 3:09.93 winning time.

In the moments before the Rio Olympics 4 x 100 mens relay final on Sunday, the American team lineup was still in question as the four members were to be

determined from six athletes with Dressel, a junior at the University of Florida with four Southeastern Conference titles, three NCAA titles and a recent second place finish at the U.S. Olympic Trials 100 freestyle, being one.

In the final count, Dressel's magnificent reaction time from the starting gun blast to the water was a deciding factor in putting the University of Florida junior on the leadoff leg. Dressel was first off the block, first in the water and first to the 50 meter turn. After his 22.77 split at the turn, he just held on as the rest of the field crept up to him. Dressel gave second leg Michael Phelps a second place start by just about a hair off the pace. Dressel's 48.10 was just off of France's Mehdy Metella's 48.08 who had the fastest leadoff leg for the event.

"I just wanted to get my hand on the wall and do the best I could for our relay and everyone watching, " said Dressel, in a post race interview.

Dressel delivered a first off the block start, a first to the wall at the 50 meter mark and a personal best time of 48.1 seconds that passed the race to the legendary Michael Phelps for the second leg. Dressel was not the fastest split of the leg, but it was close enough to allow Phelps to assert his magic.

"It felt good to get—the last 400 free relay of my career—this thing around my neck," Phelps said, pointing to his gold medal during the awards ceremony. "We got this back."

Gold medals have been a part of Phelps' swimming career for a long time and the 23 lifetime medal winner delivered with an astounding flip turn and underwater, the part after a flip turn that a swimmer stays underwater before surfacing to start his swim, put the American mens 4 x 100 relay team in front of the pack with a 47.12 split.

"I wanted to hit the wall good and get under the wake of the swimmers next to me," said Phelps, who executed the same strategy in 2012 to give the American team the lead, but France's Yannick Agnel outkicked American anchor swimmer Ryan Lochte to the finish for the win. "I stayed under longer to get to the clean water in front."

The second rookie of the night, Ryan Held, himself just a junior at North Carolina State, was to battle with a pool full of sprint specialists with years of competition time.

Held held his own ground with a best 47.73 split and gave defending 100 meter gold medalist Nathan Adrian the final leg with about a half body advantage.

"I was just thinking, whatever I do, don't lose any ground," Held said, in a post race interview. "I knew I was going to be one of the slower legs tonight, but I was thinking, whatever I do, do not lose any ground. I had faith in Nathan that he was going to bring it home."

Adrian blasted off the block, hit the wall in an amazing 22.10 and provided a stunning 46.97 finish to bring the gold medal back to America after their stunning defeat to France in 2012. Adrian, the Olympic Trials champion, had the fastest American split of the season with a 47.00 early in May and will compete with Dressel in Tuesday's 100 meters freestyle preliminaries.

"I had a feel that someone was going to challenge me," said Adrian. "This is the Olympics and everyone wants that gold medal."

In Tuesday's preliminary and semifinal action, Dressel continued his strategy of blasting the first 50 then fending off challengers in the second 50. In his preliminary heat, Dressel was ahead until the 85 meter mark where Australia's Kyle Chambers, an 18 year old swimmer, surged in the final 10 meters to out-touch Dressel with a 47.90 split with Dressel in at 47.91. Adrian survived elimination with a pedestrian 48.58 split, well off his season best of 47.00 prior to the Olympics, to finish 16th and just make the final.

"I had a long night after the relay which was as emotional a race as I've ever been in," said Adrain after his Herculian semifinal heat re-established the defending gold medalist as the man to beat. "It's all part of the process."

In the semifinals, Dressel again took the first 50 meters hard in his heat, but was not the first swimmer to the wall as Russian Vladmir Morozov got to the wall first.

In the final 50, Dressel maintained position near the top three to eventually finish third at 47.97 with Adrian, in lane eight by the pool wall, first at 47.63 and Australian Cameron McEvoy second at 47.93. Five of the eight finalists finished under 48 seconds. In the prelims, Dressel was one of just two who had splits under 48 seconds.


Schermerhorn volleyball 'smarts' improved for 2016

HOUSTON, Texas – Three Clay County track athletes came home with best times and top 10 finishes at the AAU National Junior Olympics Track and Field Championships held Aug. 6 in Houston.

Fleming Island High senior Cameron Dill, a region 800 meter athlete for the Golden Eagles, ran back to back 1:56 split 800 meters with a 1:56.35 best time ever in his preliminary heat to the final and a 1:56.72 in the final to finish eighth behind the winner's time of 1:51.28. ORANGE PARK – St. Johns Country Day School has had its share of great soccer players. The one that stands out the most, Carson Pickett, is now playing at the professional level with a couple of her teammates at the Rio Olympics.

On the flip side, Monday, August 8 was a pretty good day for Spartans girls soccer coach Mike Pickett, who got a special visit from daughter Carson Pickett, who shot around with a small elite level camp Mike Pickett was running at the St. Johns campus.

"Because we have a couple of Olympic team players down in Rio; forward Megan Rapinoe and goalkeeper Hope Solo, yes the Hope Solo that you all know about, the team has taken a two week break in our season before continuing our last five games," said Pickett. "It's obviously awesome that I get to play with players of their caliber, but they are very down to Earth teammates."

Pickett's Seattle Reign pro soccer team, in the National Womens Soccer League, picked Pickett out of Florida State University as the fourth overall pick of the 2016 pro draft and her life changed very quickly.

"First, moving all the way to Seattle was a little daunting with my family all here, but I live in a host house with a family that makes things easier and not like living in a hotel room," said Pickett, now 22 years old. "Mom (Oakleaf High Principal Treasure Pickett) and dad have come to five games out there and we just played in Orlando this summer, so I get to see them often enough."

When Pickett got to Seattle, she made an immediate impact as she started in her familiar defender role, got switched to a forward and has recently returned to the defender slot.

"My coaches told me that if the other team has a superfast forward, they'll put me on her," said Pickett. "In college, we attacked more from the back."

Pickett, who kicked a state title winning final shot in 2012 for the Spartans that fueled a five consecutive state title run for the school, was the Gatorade/ESPN Florida player of the year as well as the Dairy Farmers Miss Florida Player of the Year for her effort. At FSU, Pickett was integral in four Final Four appearances and a national title for the Seminoles.

At the pro level, Pickett cited the speed of play and the physical level of play as being a dramatic up tick from her college days.

"At the college level, most teams have two or three really outstanding players that are dominant players," said Pickett, who said Solo was one of the first Seattle players to start a conversation with the rookie. "At the pros, everyone is a great player. There has been a lot of 'wow' moments for me just to see the level of talent at our practices."

Pickett, herself an amazing player on her own, said the 'wow' moments make her work harder

"It's crazy how they can have five de-

JACKSONVILLE – Fleming Island High School junior cross country runner Andrew Miller stamped his name out as a top contender in the upcoming 2016 season with a sterling three-wins in three-races title in the annual Tour De Pain Jacksonville Grand Prix running series event staged Friday and Saturday in Jacksonville. The Tour de Pain, staged by 1st Place Sports, features a three-races in 24 hours format with a four mile beach run Friday night, a morning 5K on Saturday and a mile run Saturday morning.

"I thought what better way can I test myself to see if my summer cross country training has done anything," said Miller. "I missed just four days of running for the summer."

Miller won the 14-19 age group in decisive fashion with a Friday win in the beach four miler done in 22 minutes, 50 seconds for fourth overall, a fifth overall 17:00 age group win the 5K and an eighth place overall 5:03 age group win in Saturday's mile sizzler. His total time for the three events; 44:52, won by nearly eight minutes over the runnerups total time of 52:49.

"I wanted to break five minutes in the mile just to do that for the first time," said Miller, who went out for the Fleming Island High cross country team last year and was, at the first meet in 2015, the Spurs and Spikes Classic in Flagler, Miller ran an 18:40 time to be the Golden Eagles' fifth finisher but only improved to 18:30 by the season-ending district meet.

With the top four teams advancing from districts to regions, Miller's effort got the Golden Eagles close, but only teammate

University of South Florida, is the epitome of a defensive secondary athlete with great speed; a recent 4.6 in summer sessions, great hands; played some slot receiver in 7 on 7 matchups and a nose for the ball; second leading tackler for Oakleaf in 2015 behind a guy named Shaq.

In 2014, Roberts was named the Clay Today Defensive Player of the Year with his seven interceptions and 70 tackles for the Knights that finished in the region championship game after an unbeaten regular season.

"Last year, they stayed away from his side of the field with passes; plain and simple," said Reynolds. "He still hustled across the field and got tackles, but they never threw the ball his way. That's a shutdown corner doing his job and opposing coaches knowing it."

Roberts' right hand man in the secondary will be Kwame Clark who is just as fast, just as good a tackler and just as smart on his side of the field. Clark also caught passes over the summer for Reynolds.

"We lost Khalif Copeland, one of our best tacklers, to a move back to Illinois and that will be a hole to fill, but Nick and Kwame are solid senior leaders that can mentor the third guy," said Reynolds. "Kwame looks like a linebacker and he's athletic enough to be a little further out."

For Ashe, nicknamed 'K.B. Clutch', who will be the leader in experience and savvy for coach Damenyum Springs' defense, an improvement of his own intellect to the position has made him the guy not to throw against.

"He was solid last year and had his share of big plays for us, but he has become a student of the game this summer to learn the little things that make for a dangerous guy out there," said Springs. "Body position, hand-fighting for the ball and using the sideline as a tool to finish the job. Field awareness is a big part of being a good player not only on the corners, but every position. Downs, yards to go, hashmark ball placement, all that plays into how aggressive a corner can be and where to lineup to decrease the opportunity for either a first down on say first and four or a long ball over the top. K.B. is as smart as they get and he will be attached to the best guy on the other side."

Ashe also saw duties as a quarterback for Springs in summer sessions, but Springs saw that as just a utility position for his senior back.

Next to Ashe is Isaiah Walker, a track fast athlete with ball instincts to take any interception the length of the field. Walker made more plays on offense in summer sessions, but can face any offense and be a threat.

Around the county, one noted absence, at this point, from the list of impact defensive backs will be Keystone Heights' Rian Prieto who suffered a season-ending knee injury last year a five interception game and an area leading seven interceptions total for coach Chuck Dickinson. "He may or may not be back by midseason and our district line up, but he will be hugely missed," said Dickinson. "He was just starting to become comfortable out there and dangerous to passers. His closing speed got better and better where he could anticipate where passes were going."

The overall Panther defense graduated a lot of talent; Jackson, Louis-Charles and Baptiste, and big shoes will be need to be filled.

"Both boys are three year players for the defense so I expect them to be the leaders," said Porch. "We lost a great linebacker crew and we will wait and see how that group improves, but the secondary should be solid. I will go to my safeties during the game to see what's going on and they need to smart out there."

Middleburg High showed some defen-

sive ability to snatch passes with eight interceptions in the a summer 7 on 7 with Fleming Island with 6-foot-2 safety Tyler Bryant, only a sophomore, snagging three passes. "All the key returners on this team are defensive players," said Macpherson. "Darrius will run the defense from free safety. Goodbread is kind of a Swiss Army knife and can do a lot of things."

At St. Johns Country Day School, new head coach Bill Sellinger, also the defensive coordinator the past four years, will have the Myers' brothers, Cody and Troy, both strong defensive skill players with Cade Walden a possible secondary athlete. Eighth grader Max Monroe has taken snaps at safety and quarterback.



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





Fire volleyball coach Aubrey Goldsberry liked Schermerhorn's progress within the program as she credits Schermerhorn's ability to dissect the game.



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


