# High school computer team is third at nationals

Locals ace team portion of competition

Liam Callanan, Cassidy Laidlaw and Teddy Ni scored a perfect 40 points out of 40 during the team programming portion of the computer programming nationals late last month, and helped Barrington capture a top three finish at the event.

Seniors Liam and Cassidy and junior Teddy Ni aced the first part of the American Computer Science League ALL Star Competition in Denver, Colo., and tallied 31 out of a possible 36 points in the second part to finish with a final score of 71.

That total placed Barrington in third, behind teams from Andrei Saguna National College of Romania, and Midland High School of Midland, Mich.

"...We fell only two points outside of first place," wrote Mario Correia, the advisor for the Barrington High School Computer Club. "Overall, it was a very successful year for the team with a great finish at the ALL Stars."

Barrington's computer programming team won all four regu-

The second part consisted of individual short answers questions. Each student was given 12 questions to answer within a one hour time limit. The students' individual results were added together to represent the team score — Barrington scored 31 out of a possible 36 points in this part of the competition.



# Local students' letters land them literature awards

#### Barrington boasts two state winners

Hampden Meadows School fifth-grader Kelly Gorman was the level 1 state winner in the Letters About Literature reading program and competition.

Kelly penned a letter to Ruby Bridges about her book "Through My Eyes." Ruby Bridges, now 59 years old, was the first black child to attend an all-white elementary school in the south.

Amelia Pappas-Horii, a seventh grade student at Barrington Middle School, was the level 2 state winner for her letter to Holly Goldberg Sloan about "Counting by 7s." The novel was a New York Times Bestseller that tells the story of a 12 year-old girl who faces a tragic loss.

Morgan Alverson, a fourthgrader at Hampden Meadows, won level 1 Honorable Mention for her letter to Marc Aronson and Marina Budhos about "Sugar Changed the World."

Nicole Fitzpatrick, a fifth-grader at Hampden Meadows, won level 1 Honorable Mention for her letter to Sharon Draper about "Out of My Mind."

And Nora Copple, a seventhgrader at Barrington Middle School, won level 2 Honorable Mention for her letter to Wendy Mass about "Every Soul a Star."

More than 550 letters from Rhode Island students were submitted to The Library of Congress for the 2014 Letters About Literature reading program. The students described how an author's work changed their view of the world or helped them realize something they didn't know about themselves.

With a focus on reader response and reflective writing, Letters About Literature has three competitive levels. The judges name a state winner and honorable mentions at each lev-

■ Level 2 for students in grades

■ Level 3 for students in grades

The winners will receive their awards on May 31 at the RI Statehouse. The ceremony is open to the public. The Kick-Off to Kids Reading Across Rhode Island will follow the ceremony.

# **Police: Cleaning lady** 'cleaned out' local family

Bristol woman facing larceny charge

Leather boots, a purse, perfume and other assorted items that had gone missing from a Riverside Drive home in Barrington were allegedly stolen by a Bristol woman who had been hired to clean the house.

According to police, 26 year-old Bristol resident Meagan Elizabeth Gammage had been cleaning the home for more than a year.

But during a recent visit to the house, the homeowner noticed some peculiar activity. The homeowner told police she had seen Ms. Gammage rummaging through dressers in the rooms of the homeowner's two daughters. When asked what she was doing, Ms. Gammage reportedly told the homeowner she was putting items

That information did not sit well with the local family. During the past year, one of the daughters had told her parents that numerous items from her room had gone missing.

The Barrington residents contacted the Bristol woman's employer who reportedly confronted Ms. Gammage.

On Saturday, June 7 at about 8:30 a.m., Ms. Gammage turned herself into police. Officers charged her with larceny under \$1,500.

Ms. Gammage had reportedly been working for the cleaning company since 2008.

# Spencer Fund needs a second opinion

To the editor:

On June 2, the Barrington Town Council accepted the recommening project at 139 George Street.

This project has been under development since 2008 at a cost of nearly \$285,000. The funding came from the Spencer Fund for purchase, closing, and development costs. Another \$10,000 came from Barrington taxpayers in approved taxpayer contributions.

The council suggested that Barrington taxpayers may now have to make whole the Spencer Fund given the project has been terminated. The question to be

resolved is how much it will cost taxpayers to make whole the removed Spencer funds, plus the dation of the Housing Board of lost investment income. It is esti-Trustees to terminate plans for the mated that measured in 2014 doltown sponsored affordable hous- lars, the amount due to the Spencer Fund from taxpayers now exceeds \$400,000.

Also unresolved is how the 2008 town council believed this was a good idea, but five years, and \$300,000 later, the project is unsupportable. Is the root problem lack of legal counsel from a qualified trust attorney?

Some history is helpful: In March 2005, the town received \$2.71 million from the estate of the late Wilton H. Spencer. The purpose of this permanent fund known as the Amey Tucker

Spencer Fund was to distribute the interest income on an annual basis to the poor and unfortunate people of Barrington. The average annual income of the Spencer Fund over the last 9 years was \$75,128 or \$676,152 in total.

Sadly, over this period, needy residents looking for assistance with utility bills, prescriptions and medical costs, food, emergency home repairs, etc., were largely ignored. Only a small fraction of the income (\$7,303/annually) was allocated as the Spencer Will requires.

Tap-In, which operates next door to town hall, should have received immediate help in 2005.


No town official has offered an explanation as to why Tap-In was left in the dark. But an explanation might be found in the files of the town planner's office in a document describing the funding of 139 George Street as: "...the Town's Spencer Trust fund ... is designated for the benefit of low income people." This is not what the Spencer Will states, but it appears the town planner's definition was enough for the Barrington Housing Board of Trustees to

interpret as a green light for diverting the lion's share of the Spencer Funds "annual income" into big budget affordable housing projects.

The majority town council was willing to go along with this definitional stretch in spite of the absence of input from a qualified trust attorney as to whether any of this was legal.

It's time for the Spencer Trustees to finally seek out competent legal counsel to correct past mistakes, and ensure going forward, there are no more land grabs for affordable housing by raiding the Spencer Fund. Taxpayers should demand nothing less.

# Bomb threat called in to County Road store

#### ARE ORAL AND MENTAL HEALTH LINKED?

Researchers examining a potential link between oral and mental health recently found that tooth loss and bleeding gums were indicative of middle-aged individuals' declining thinking skills. # Barrington thrower wins state title

Sophomore Bobby Colantonio wins, Adam Kelly is second

Barrington High School's Bobby Colantonio, a sophomore, took first place in the hammer throw event at the state track championship at Brown University on Saturday, June 7.

Colantonio threw the hammer a distance of 215 feet 6 inches, besting his teammate, junior Adam Kelly, by about two feet. Kelly finished second with a throw of 213 feet 8 inches.

Colantonio made it into the flight of seven finalists after throwing a distance of 214 feet 2 inches. At that distance, he had already secured first place even before stepping into the throwing circle for the final round. On his first attempt in the final heat, he surpassed his best throw of the day.

"It felt good," Colantonio said of his winning distance. "I'm happy with what I threw."

He also shared credit for his performance with his teammate, Kelly, who took second place.

"It helps to work out with Adam. We push each other," he said.

In the javelin throw, Barrington's Jamie Heinl set a personal best record with a throw of 175 feet 10 inches to take number two in the state.

Grace Restituyo, a junior, finished third in the girls' discus throw with her distance of 115 feet 7 inches.

In track events, Madison Smith and Megan Verner-Crist placed third - Smith, in the 300 meter hurdles (48.29), and Verner-Crist, in the 800 meter race (2:14.87) and the 1,500 meter race (4:32.71).

Abigail Livingston and Julia Zitzman also ran the 800, finishing eighth and ninth, respectively.

Smith, a senior, also competed in the 100 meter hurdles where she finished eighth.

In the 4x800 meter relay, Barrington's Julia Zitzmann, Lusine Gazeryan, Lindsey Kloc, and Juliana Portelli teamed up to take fourth with their time of 9:53.63.

Zitzmann started out strong on her first two laps around the oval, passing the baton in second place behind LaSalle. After the team fell back to fifth position in the middle laps, Portelli battled to regain the fourth position.

In the team finishes, the Barrington girls finished eighth, and the boys finished sixth.

"We had a great day and were pleased with the sixth place finish," said boys' head coach Bill

He was also happy to see two of his throwers take the one and two spots in the hammer.

"It's great having this level of competition between two guys on our team. I think it helps drive both of them," he said.

"Our 4x800 team of Mars Bish-Marcus Sefranek, Sam Somera, and Lucas Bledsoe posted an outstanding time," Mr. Barrass added.

At 8:09.92, their time fell only two seconds short of the school record, placing sixth in the state

Colantonio, Kelly and Mike Alvernaz, who finished in the 13th spot in the hammer event, will compete at nationals next week, while other members of the team will compete at the New Englands to be held at Bridgewater State University on Saturday.





For more than a half-century, Sam's Bakery has been producing heavenly bread on Fall River's Flint Street

longtime locals, Sam's Bakery is one of those places that can leave a foodie downright con-

flicted: do you shout its greatness from the rooftops, or selfishly keep it to yourself so you are sure that they won't run out of your favorite pie when you do make the trek from the East Bay?

Fortunately, it's not a choice that needs to be made. They have plenty — and it's all good. How good? So good that its Fall River location may well be responsible for a measurable percentage of the opposition to the Sakonnet River Bridge tolls. So good that I (have a friend who) once abandoned a funeral procession after noting how close the cortege would be passing by the Flint Street landmark.

Sam's isn't just any bakery, it is a Lebanese bakery that produces pita bread so thin, so tender and delicious, that one bite will ruin commercially-baked pita for you. Forever.

But what elevates a trip to Sam's to full treat status is their pies. Some open, like a small pizza, others closed like a calzone, the list of offerings range from the standard spinach with tomato and feta to cabbage, chourico, broccoli, meat with laben (a Middle Eastern cheese made from strained yogurt), sweet sesame, and menich, a magi-

cal combination of Lebanese thyme, sumac, sesame, salt and lemon that settles in between your teeth and should not be consumed en route to a date or job interview. (Otherwise, totally worth "Menich teeth.")

The woman behind the legend is Georgette Yamin, who opened Sam's with her husband Saleem in 1961. Georgette hails from Lebanon, the daughter of the town mayor; Saleem was born in the United States to Lebanese parents. His mother brought him to Lebanon as a child and raised him near Georgette's home, and they met and eventually fell in love. Drafted to serve with the U.S. military in WWII, Saleem told Georgette that if she waited for him, he would come back. She did, he did, and not long after, Saleem decided he wanted to return to the United States. Georgette's response? "I told him 'wherever you go, I will go.' I had nothing but love and respect for him. He asked me once, when we were young and

working hard, if I was happy. I told him if I were married to a prince I would not be as happy as I am."

These days, Georgette and Saleem's daughter, Dora Yamin Peterson, is the face of Sam's, and she runs the operation smoothly with the help of a dependable staff, including baker Gabe Martins and Gabe's daughter Amanda, who serves as Dora's right hand.

# Early summer brings garden invaders

'm pretty sure it was Christopher Lloyd of Great Dixter who, in one of his many books or articles, dared us to keep our gardens blooming into summer and fall. "Spring is easy," I think he said. I agree! Or thought I did.

On the one hand, of all the seasons, the one we're in seems the

most likely to make gardeners and non-gardeners alike feel like greenthumbed hotshots. My garden grows and blooms like crazy with or without, and

despite my interference. Even the undead rose and elderberry are budded. The peonies are bonkers. Siberian iris, euphorbia, Atlantic poppy, and false indigo (Baptisia australis) are flying their colors

and the filipendula, yarrow, nepeta, and penstemon are about to join the hurrah. And I'm up for the challenge to keep it going for the next five or six months. In fact, planning and planting for late season color was what I set out to write about today. Right up until I noticed that the other hand was grasping a proliferation of weeds and flinging them over my shoulder in disgust. Suddenly spring — let's call it early summer now that lifeguards are on duty doesn't seem so easy after all and I don't feel like much of a hotshot.

Chickweed (Stellaria media) has been in bloom since March, first in the most anemic looking ground-hugging tufts and now stretching robustly skyward, the elastic in its stems defying all but the most determined efforts to pull out its roots. Creeping Charlie a.k.a. ground ivy (Glechoma hederacea) has snaked in from the lawn (where I don't mind its

pretty purple flowers and deep green scalloped leaves) into the beds and woven through, up, and around the crowns of every perennial and into the shrubs. Every leaf node that touches soil roots in. I find unzipping whole strips intensely gratifying — until the zipper breaks.

Mugwort or chrysanthemum weed (Artemisia vulgaris) wormed its way via rhizomes into and all over my front garden. I'm not sure where it came from because according to my dogeared copy of "Weeds of the Northeast", "few viable seeds are produced in temperate North America." No matter how it arrived (most likely in the roots of another plant) the colony is entrenched. Here, evidently to stay, as is the pretty variegated form I planted in the back gar-

I know goutweed (Aegopodium podograria) made inroads in a corner of my garden by way of a gifted perennial. Originally introduced as an ornamental ground cover with pretty lace-like flower umbels, it wants nothing more than to cover every square inch of shaded ground, and will unless I never let it go to seed, and chase down all traces of its bright white rhizomes. Even broken bits will re-sprout and should never be tossed in the compost. Don't bother with Roundup. Goutweed is glyphosate resistant.

Climbing nightshade

(Solanum dulcamara) and Asiatic bittersweet (Celastrus orbiculatus) have already wound tentacles around tree and shrub branches. I keep pulling new shoots out, and bird-sown seeds keep sprouting. Both vines plus Chinese wisteria are included in the invasive amalgam of honeysuckle, Japanese barberry, and multiflora rose that makes up more than half of the hedge between my garden and the neighbors' so I am resigned to their murderous presence in my garden forever. I also noticed a carpet of smartweed (Persicaria maculosa) seedlings where a carpet of tall verbena seedlings should be and crabgrass, like the

next blockbuster, is coming soon.

I need to reclaim my garden. And as soon as I do I'll congratulate myself on a glorious season and get busy filling those fresh vacancies with all of the late blooming annuals and tender perennials that will help me feel like a hotshot again.

them down in a school of pogies that bass or blue fish are feeding on. Live lining, as it is called, can be used without weight or with weight (with a weight slide that

moves along the main line or an egg sinker) to get it down where the fish seem to be feeding.

Atlantic Menhaden enter the Bay to spawn up rivers, and the striped bass follow them as they migrate north from the Hudson River and Chesapeake Bay areas. Menhaden is the primary forage food for striped bass this time of year and this year there seems to be a good supply of it in the Bay. Anglers can purchase them at bait shops frozen or fresh as commercial fishermen net them to sell to bait shops as bait. Ken Ferrara of Ray's Bait & Tackle, Warwick, said Saturday, "We have sold hundreds of fresh menhaden for bait this weekend."

Anglers also locate schools of Atlantic Menhaden and try to catch them themselves to use as bait by snagging them with a treble hook. This weekend Kevin Pellegrino of Swansea said, "I took my buddy John Martin from Bristol out striper fishing in Mt. Hope Bay

on my boat Four Paws for his first time. We found a good school of pogies and I was snagging one and then handed him the rod to reel it in... when a striper hit a pogy... he felt the hit, but had no idea what was happening. He fought it like a champ (on light tackle) and we landed it at 40" and 23.88

Where's the bite Striped bass fishing is starting to pick up along Southern coastal shores. Phil Matteson of Breachway Bait & Tackle, Charlestown, said "They are starting to land keeper bass out in front, and in Ninigret Pond they are catching school sized bass and an occasional fish in the 28 to 35" range. Anglers are using a variety of artificial lures." "Striped bass fishing is still not strong at Block Island" said Capt. Rich Bellavance of Priority Too Charters, Pt. Judith. "Tuesday of last week striped bass were crashing a school of pogies right in from of Fields Point, Providence. You could see the bass chasing them like tuna just under the surface. Before we could pull in our snagged pogies a bass would hit it so we snapped off the barbs on our treble hooks so we could safely release most of the fish." said Greg Bruning of the Tackle Box, Warwick. John Littlefield of Archie's Bait & Tackle, East Providence said, "Striped bass fishing had slowed a bit later in the week in the Providence River, but Sunday things broke wide open again south of Conimicut Light in the Barrington Beach, Nayatt Point and Rocky Point areas. I think the bass are starting to move down the Bay a bit with the bait. Three customers limited out in two hours fishing the Barrington Beach area with chunks, live lining and yo-yoing Atlantic Menhaden." Saturday angler Mike Imbornone of North Kingstown landed a 38" striped bass while fishing the Poppasquash Point, Bristol area using tube and worm, earlier in the day chunked Atlantic Menhaden was

not working. John Wunner of John's Bait & Tackle, North Kingstown said, "Fishing was great this week. Customers are landing bass and fluke, everyone seems to be happy."

Charlestown Breachway fishing is improving with one or two anglers catching twenty pound fish nightly. Anglers targeting scup are staring to land fish too," said Phil Matteson of Breachway Bait & Tackle. Steve McKenna noted striped bass shore fishing expert and an associate at Quaker Lane Outfitters, North Kingstown said "Shore anglers seem to be having a mixed bag of experiences. Those that know how to fish the shore are experiencing a good bite, and those that do not are not landing fish. I heard of two 40-pound fish being caught from the shore last week." John Littlefield of Archie's Bait said "Colt State Park anglers are catching school bass and just a few scup. The scup just haven't arrived in large numbers yet." Dave Pickering, expert shore angler and author said "I've been out quite a few times in the last week in the Bay both with the boat and from shore, and the results are the same. There are far more blues around than stripers. The blues seem to be everywhere."

Bluefish are being caught particularly where you find the pogy schools. Some are huge. Greg Bruning of the Tackle Box, Warwick said, one of my customers landed a 18.5 pound blue fish while trolling along the wall at Salter Grove, Warwick last week.' This weekend, when fishing in the middle of the East Passage the party I was fishing with picked up smaller blue fish in the 20 inch range when trolling tube & worm for bass. However, schools of bluefish on the surface have not been the case yet.

Summer flounder (fluke) fishing has been improving in shore and is hot off-shore. Capt. Rick Bellavance of Priority Too Charters said "Fishing on the south side of Block Island has been great." Mike Cardinal of Cardinal Bait & Tackle Westerly said "Fluke fishing along the coastal shore has been improving and Block Island is doing very well." Phil Matteson of Breachway Bait & Tackle said, "There is a ton of bait in the water... squid and sand eels. From Matunuck to Charlestown customers are catching fluke in 35 to 55 feet of water landing 3 to 4 pound fish with 6 to 7 pound fish common too." John Wunner of John's Bait, North Kingstown, said,

"They are catching summer flounder in the mid Bay area in the West Passage near Warwick Neck. And Austin Hollow Jamestown, which usually holds fish this time of year, has not been good." Greg Bruning of the Tackle Box, Warwick said, "This weekend fluke fishing really picked up in the middle of the Bay with some nice fish being landed in the flats of Rocky Point in about 15 to 20 feet of water. I weighed in a nice 7.5 pound fish for a customer."

# 'Lie of the Mind' brilliantly set; heartbreaking

he lay of the land in "A Lie of the Mind" is a terrain of heartache and wonders. The play, by Sam Shepard, explores the huge realm of

the heart and the mind, a forbidding frontier but one in which the playwright and the play's director, Brian Mertes, prove to be intrepid pioneers. Make no mistake, this

production at Trinity Repertory Company is magnificent theatre, a stunning and cathartic production that must not be missed.

Though this show and its brilliant staging is seemingly surreal at times, if we consider the vast interior spaces within these characters to be our subject matter and setting then this wild and hallucinatory tale seems wholly naturalistic. And that's part of the point. In the canon of Sam Shepherd's many plays folks are fragmentary beings at best, entirely incomplete and searching for their lost bits, halves and selves. The characters we meet here are archetypically American, living on the fringes of the dream but ones who would also be equally at home on King Lear's heath or Samuel Beckett's apocalyptic landscape. What we encounter in "A Lie of the Mind" is a depiction done in deft and haunting poetry of humanity stripped down to its

The grace and scope of Shepard's words are served very well here by Brian Mertes' brilliant direction and Eugene Lee's dreamy, trippy and all-encompassing set. The entirety of the small downstage theater has been painted white. There is a plastic wading pool by the apron of the curved stage and at the rear a wall has been made of a tall stack of square window fans with a door for entrances in the center. Though this empty and desolate space will soon become more cluttered with odds and ends, actors and more set pieces, here the seemingly inchoate is utterly specific, lucid landmarks in a dreamscape.

At the outset we encounter an actor arranging cinder blocks upon the floor and it is as if he is laying the sub-textual foundations for this play, a space where our consciousness shall be both riveted and allowed the contemplative freedom to wander and ponder. This mood is enhanced by the music written and performed onstage by Phillip Roebuck that is earthy, bluesy and pulses throughout and punctuates the action of the play.

As for that action, the main event of "A Lie of the Mind" occurs before the play begins. Jake (Benjamin Grills) has beaten his lover Beth (Britt Faulkner) badly, he believes, to death. It is the consequences of this action on them and their respective families that is explored here; we witness not the brutal blow but the after effects, the lingering, healing bruise and the festering

wound left upon the soul. Along the way we encounter their families as well as the themes that populate Shepard's work: absent fathers, alcoholism, the American west, nonsensically no-nonsense mothers, and, most importantly, a sense of inner emptiness and the urge to retrieve that which was lost.

That is a lot to encompass but Director Brian Mertes keeps our attention rapt and focused and the haunting and visceral stage pictures he devises allows the events of this play to seep into our attention on both literal and symbolic levels. He makes Shepard's text absolutely clear, no mean feat with the lyrical language these characters express themselves in. Beth and Jake utter some stark, simple and essential truths onstage and quite often the dialogue consists of seemingly subconscious reactions to external events, unedited utterances fly out of mouths because the feelings behind them are buried so deep the characters don't know to think about them. It is no accident, for example, that the brain-damaged but insightful Beth confuses the word 'costume' for 'custom'. We face our reality behind an outer façade that we have fashioned, that which is really ourselves lies elusively far below. "You ever think about the things you say?" asks one character and the answer here is "no, we

"How could you know this thought in me?" asks Beth and as she asks the beautifully expressive face of Britt Faulkner, wary, alert and haunted, registers an absolute longing for answers. Hers is a heartbreakingly intuitive performance in the role. As Jake, Benjamin Grills is, appropriately, far more of a feral child than a battering brute. Also quite appropriate and absolutely harrowing here, each of these two actors seem onstage to be a lost soul, searching endlessly for that which has been sliced out of them.

The entire Trinity Rep Company here is absolutely crackerjack. Tim Crowe shines as a sly and

wizened Baylor. As his wife Meg Anne Scurria is a loopy and ethereal presence but one with a heart of steel hidden beneath the layers of wispiness. Janice Duclos is casually chilling in her matterof-fact portrayal of Jake's mom Lorraine.

Rebecca Gibel seems to be ever-toiling under put-upon burdens as Sally. Billy Finn and Charlie Thurston offer honest and insightful performances as Mike and Frankie. All offer spot-on performances as the disparate parts of two dysfunctional families.

As the action unfolds, director Brian Mertes will keep the actors from a previous scene onstage while the subsequent scene starts, either immobile or in stylized motion and this works, these are hardscrabble folks always spinning their wheels and like the bank of electric fans behind them, each is in perpetual motion but getting nowhere. Though, for some, not all hope is lost.

The shared experience of witnessing "A Lie of the Mind" is so special and singular that description tends to diminish this event. Though it clocks in at three hours you wouldn't know it, time, as in dreams, seems to fly by. During intermissions and after curtain call a collective hush seemed to hold sway over the audience, none wished to break the spell of what we had just seen. This production at Trinity Rep is just that profoundly moving and director Brian Mertes weaves a spell with Sam Shepard's words to create as great a depiction as humanly possible onstage of our fractured and frenzied consciousness. "How could I know something that I didn't know?" muses Jake and Brian Mertes highly intuitive interpretation of this great American play goes a long way towards answering that question, an answer found not in the mind but in the heart. The lies our minds devise prove here to be utterly heartbreaking.

Gabe's day begins at 3 a.m. with a cup of strong, black coffee, and ends at noon. ## Heat and other summer hazards can take a toll on pets

Dear Dr. Evans, My husband and I are driving to North Carolina this July with our cat and dog to spend a few weeks with family. On the way, we'd like to stop at the restaurant where my husband proposed to me in south Jersey. We'd stop around six and figure that dinner will take about an hour. If we roll the windows partway down, Max and Sable should be ok, right? -Mary M.

Dear Mary,

I'm afraid it's drive-through for you. New Jersey is actually one of fourteen states with actual laws on the books against leaving an animal in a parked car under circumstances likely to cause harm. And being left in a car without air conditioning or adequate circulation can cause harm pretty darn fast. Hundreds of pets die every year from being left in an overheated vehicle; on a 78 degree day, the interior of a car can soar to 120 degrees in minutes. Cracked windows don't help. Remember that dogs and cats can cool themselves only by panting and by sweating through their paw pads, pretty inadequate mechanisms against hyperthermia. Brain damage and death can occur in a very short time. Please don't take the chance. Rhode Island doesn't have a specific law about pets in parked cars, but anti-cruelty laws apply in every

Your question gives me a chance to remind you that, despite all its joys, summer is a tricky time for dogs and outdoor cats. It's time to up your game on parasite protection. Modern veterinary flea and tick medicines are infinitely safer and more effective than their OTC counterparts, so use them as directed. Most veterinarians advise using them year-round, but summer is prime time for critters. For dogs, the manufacturers of Frontline, a widely-used topical, have recently offered NexGard, a flavored flea and tick tablet that makes monthly flea and tick control simpler than ever. In addition to being revolting, fleas and tick can carry disease, transmit parasites, and cause discomfort, even severe allergic reactions.

The Fourth of July barbecue? Awesome for you, potentially disastrous for Max. Sure, sharing a

bite of hot dog probably won't hurt (most) dogs, but watch out for the shish kabob — that skewer can skewer an intestine if swallowed. And a corn cob can easily lodge in the gastrointestinal tract and cause a life-threatening obstruction. Make sure any chicken you share is boneless and white meat. Sure, treat your dog a little — who doesn't? — but even relatively benign foods, if high in fat, can inflame the pancreas or cause vomiting and diarrhea. So share wisely.

Use sense on walks. Carry a water bottle, and choose your path with naked paw pads in mind. Concrete and asphalt heat up, so if you wouldn't walk barefoot there, don't ask your best friend to. Bear in mind that smushed-in-face dogs, like boxers and pugs, and dogs with heavy or dark coats overheat easily, so use common sense when planning the route and time of day you walk.

Finally, don't assume your dog likes to swim (and definitely assume your cat doesn't like to swim). If you have a pool, supervise your dog until you are confidle. Some dogs are actually phobic about the water, so never force them into a pool. And if you take your dog out on the boat or kayak, make sure he or she wears a doggie life jacket.

You'll notice this column is pretty dog-centric. That's because most summer pet hazards involve the great outdoors, and by far the best and safest place for a cat is the great indoors. The average life span of the 100 percent indoor cat is sixteen years; the average life span for an outdoor cat is three. Something to think

So, Mary, I'm sorry to put a damper on your dinner plans, but when you get to the hotel, and Max and Sable snuggle down with you for the night, safe and well, you'll be glad you opted for take-out.





# Wine and Bobolinks at Greenvale Winery

arely do I get a chance to engage in my two favorite hobbies (wine tasting and bird watching) at the same time, so imagine my surprise when it happened at the Greenvale Winery in Portsmouth. The owner of Greenvale, Nancy Parker Wilson, was taking Ned Newton and I around the grounds of this lovely vineyard when we heard Pan on his Pipes coming from a large uncut havfield. It was the bubbly song of a bobolink, one the rarest and most desirable grassland bird species. The bobolink song harkens back to the pastoral day of New England; it is rarely heard today but was common in Thoreau's day.

The reason bobolinks are so rare these days is twofold. Hayfields are being turned into housing developments and most of the remaining fields are haved in June, killing the young bobolinks on their nests. There is also a problem of perception; while I prefer bobolinks, fireflies, and wildflowers, there are those who



prefer the florescent green artificial-turf look.

Aquidneck Island only has a handful of bobolink fields left and the mainland in Rhode Island is in no better shape. One can judge the quality and stewardship of the land just from the birdsong; the dirge of the house sparrow indicating the worst while the bobolink's exuberant trill is the ultimate indicator of a beneficent location and management.

bobolinks in her fields, we retired to the Greenvale barn to try some wine. As we were serenaded by a great crested flycatcher overhead, we tried a variety of excellent whites and a couple of surprisingly good reds. Surprising because our climate is just too pleasant in the summer to mature the heat loving classic grapes such as Cabernet Sauvignon or Malbec. Blazingly arid days, infertile soil, and cool nights are the perfect conditions for elite cabs and Malbecs, but there are a few Rhone varieties such as Merlot and, especially, Cab Franc that can just barely ripen in our area. With trepidation I took a glass of the Greenvale Cabernet Franc, but was pleasantly surprised by its delicious, heady aroma. Some of the northern Cab Francs might sport a nice nose, but also have a wicked tannic bite; thankfully the Greenvale Cab Francs were easy on the tongue as well as the nose.

The strength of the wineries in our area are the white wines and Greenvale did not disappoint. For red wines, I seek out the wines of Portugal, Spain, Italy, Argentina, or France, but for whites I first look to the local wines. Maybe it is that I am more forgiving or less picky about whites, but the local wines seem on par with the high-priced whites from France, Italy, or California

Nancy Wilson started us off with the Greenvale Chardonnay and Chardonnay Select. Each of these had a lovely fruity aroma, but it was more pronounced in the Select. The Rosecliff Pinot

Gris had a refreshing citrus aroma and taste; this would be a great wine with seafood. I found the Vidal Blanc to be dry, and crisp with a mineral accent. The Skipping Stone white was almost transparent; this light, refreshing, slightly-sweet wine would be perfect for a hot July evening when a heavier wine would be too much.

I have always thought that spring and summer are the best times to tour the local wineries. Everyone has different tastes in white wines so I would recommend that you try the whites at local wineries and decide for yourself. As far as the red wines, you might just be surprised by some of the local reds such as Greenvale's Cab Franc.





# Martin's Garden Notes The Joys of Perennials

Perennials, plants that return every year, offer forms and blooms that can't be found with annuals. With perennials, the garden becomes more dramatic and colorful each year, with out replanting. The challenge is to have a long season of bloom with the understanding that each variety provides a few weeks of blooms. This makes for a garden that offers a changing look from week to week all season long.

While annuals have their place in the garden to bring all season bloom, perennials offer shapes and flowers that annuals can't. The graceful display of Bleeding Heart or the elegance of Japanese Iris can't be found in an annual.

Perennials, being more or less permanent residents in the garden should be prepared for fairly deeply with lime, compost and a modest amount of fertilizer. This preparation will support growth and bloom for years to come.

As the hot summer weather comes, watering is helpful. Water deeply on a 7-10 day schedule to keep the plants happy. Mulches will aid in keeping weeds at bay and moisture conserved.
