### Local mom organizes walk, raising awareness about Apraxia

"I love you, mom."

It's the one phrase Warren mother Melissa Bernard has eagerly waited to hear since she gave birth to her son Jason, on March 9, 2010.

Three and a half years later, Melissa is still waiting.

Just over a year ago, Jason was diagnosed with Childhood Apraxia of Speech, a motor speech disorder where the brain has problems sending signals to move body parts associated with speech — lips, tongue and jaw.

Not much is known about what causes the disorder, and the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders suggests it is rooted in other genetic disorders or caused by stroke or brain injury. But Jason suffered from none of those.

"He's easily frustrated, especially in

social settings, because he knows what he wants to say he just can't say it," said Melissa.

Melissa knew something wasn't right when Jason was about 17 months old.

"The normal babbling and cooing wasn't happening when he turned 1,"

# University takes on local projects

Roger Williams students will get real-world experience

Two Bristol organizations, along with the Town of Bristol, will be working alongside Roger Williams University students on community projects, starting this fall.

The projects, directed through the university's Community Partnership Center, are:

- The Herreshoff Marine Museum: Students will pursue three projects with the museum including researching the history of the Herreshoff Manufacturing Company, incorporating analysis of its business model and documenting its oral history. Graphic design students will also create a project plan to help the museum enhance its brand identity.
- Mount Hope Farm: The project will identify, organize and archive historical documents. Students will also help to prioritize which documents to begin digitizing in an online archive.
- Town of Bristol: Students will create a Bristol waterfront development plan with conceptual specifications for the waterfront boardwalk, including proposed cost estimates and recommended phases for its future implementation.

The Center pairs students and faculty with local nonprofits, municipalities and other organizations to tackle community projects that require specialized expertise or additional

### RWU digitizes old Phoenix papers

Issues converted from microfilm to digital database

Bristol news dating back 176 years is now within reach of every-one's fingertips. Students, researchers and local residents alike can access early issues of Bristol's newspaper of record, The Bristol Phoenix, without stepping foot into a library.

Partnering with the Rogers Free Library, the Bristol Historical and Preservation Society (BHPS) and Rhode Island Historical Society (RIHS), the Roger Williams University Library has digitized 16 years of the newspaper's weekly print editions from Sep. 17, 1837, through Aug. 13, 1853. By converting the issues from microfilm to a digital repository, the newspaper content is now readily available online and searchable by keyword, name or date.

The digital project stems from the steady demand from researchers, genealogists, students and local residents visiting the RWU library, Rogers Free Library or RIHS to access the print or microfilm collection of newspapers. These three locations were the only places individuals could access the archived issues; to search the newspaper content,


patrons had to visit the historical society to reference its card index.

"This project will increase access to the newspaper collection not only for local residents, but for others beyond Rhode Island's borders," said Heidi Benedict, RWU archivist.

The digitization project was made possible by a \$1,535 grant awarded to the RWU Library from the Rhode Island Council for the Humanities. The university library is now applying for additional funding with the goal of expanding upon the initial project and helping to digitize other historic Rhode Island newspapers.

Links to the digital repository will be made available on the RWU Library and Rogers Free Library websites. To access the digital versions of The Bristol Phoenix from 1837 to 1853, visit http://rwunewspaperproject.ome ka.net.

### Ask Dr. Kerwin BLOOD DISORDERS

**Q:** Should a blood disorder affect my decisions about dental treatment?

A: Yes. A blood disorder could definitely play into your dentist's decision about how to treat you. You should discuss any medical condition with your dentist. Medicine that you're taking can also play a role in your dentist's decisions. A blood disorder could decrease the number of platelets in the blood or impair their ability to collect. Platelets are crucial to blood clotting. Therefore, blood can take longer to clot, meaning a patient can bleed longer and more profusely in the course of a dental procedure.

Here are some types of blood disorders. Thrombocytopenia, which can result from an immune reaction in which a body develops antibodies to its own platelets, or from a disease like leukemia, can cause internal bleeding and slow healing. Hemophilia, a genetic disorder in which a

patient is deficient in clotting factors or proteins that are needed for coagulation, leaves the patient vulnerable to bleeding so uncontrolled as to be life-threatening. Von Willebrand's Disease is the most common of the genetic bleeding disorders and is caused by a deficiency in a clotting factor.

### Judge set to rule on Bristol v. Warren school lawsuit

A Rhode Island Superior Court judge is set to rule on whether Warren will have to pay the regional school district \$416,000, plus interest and legal fees, more than a year after town officials refused to pay the district what the town was ordered for the 2012-13 school year.

Warren's refusal last year to pay the \$12.165 million ordered by the district's financing authority marked a low point in school relations between Bristol and Warren, which have been bound together as a regional school district since 1991.

Instead of the \$12.165 million ordered, the Warren Town Council voted in April 2012, and voters agreed at Financial Town Meeting that May, to pay the district 

the same amount the town had provided the previous year.

In response, the school district filed suit against the town later last year.

After numerous hearings and meetings, Superior Court Associate Justice Luis Matos met with both sides last Friday and after an hour of testimony, said he will soon make his decision.

The district seeks a declaratory judgement that the Town of Warren is in violation of state laws that govern the financing of the local school district; and wants a Writ of Mandamus, an order that the town pay the amount called for last year, including punitive damages and attor-

"This breaks down very simply," school district attorney Andrew Henneous told

"The town didn't like the amount of money they were required to pay (but) they don't have the right to unilaterally decide that they're going to pay whatever they want to pay."

Mr. Henneous said that many of the town's arguments — the enrollment figures, timeliness and semantics in the state law that govern the district's finances are "red herrings." In seeking a declaratory judgement and writ, he said, the issues before the court are actually quite simple, and come down only to the state law that has governed the district's finances for 21 years without a hitch. That law, and not the Financial Town Meeting, gives the finance authority, and not Warren's Financial Town Meeting or town council, the right to set the school aid amount.

also appeared in court Friday, as Bristol was included as an interested party in the case. He noted that if Warren officials wanted to contest the finance committee's decision, there was a "safety valve" in state law allowing officials to appeal it last Spring. Warren did not do so, he said.

"If either town can, just at its whim," ignore the finance committee's decision, "then why have this legislation?"

Though Mr. DeSisto on Friday sought an additional hearing on the matter, Judge Matos said he will render his decision either in person, or through a written

Mr. DeSisto said that if the decision goes against the town, Warren will have to hold a special Financial Town Meeting to authorize the release of the \$416,000, plus



### RWU students' efforts garners \$861K grant for Bristol

U.S. Sen. Jack Reed, D-RI, met with several town and state officials Monday, announcing the award of a \$861,000 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service boating infrastructure grant to Bristol. The grant would help fund the renovation of the old Naval Reserve Armory building into a municipal maritime center. Bristol was one of six projects funded nation-wide.

The grant was made possible through a collaboration with the Roger Williams University Community Partnership Center, which utilized several business students to conduct a feasibility study of the maritime center. Their study found the average visiting boater spends about \$70 a day in Bristol and that fully utilizing the harbor would cause an economic impact of \$707,000

The \$861,000 federal contribution will be matched by \$896,000 in state and local funds that stem from a \$9-million bond referendum approved by voters last November.



### **RWU** to test sirens **Sept. 18**

At approximately 11:55 a.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 18, Roger Williams University will conduct an operational test of its Emergency Siren Warning System. The system, which broadcasts an 850-Hz siren tone, was implemented in 2008 to satisfy the need for immediate communication in the event of sudden emergencies. The ESWS is activated rarely, reserved for such lifethreatening situations as a sudden, dangerous lightning storm, a chemical spill or a hostile intruder. Periodic testing is crucial to ensure the system will operate when needed. While some local community members in the vicinity of the university may hear the siren tone on Wednesday, Sept. 18, this is only a test – no action is required.

### Ride for Freedom generates \$4K

Bikers raised money for annual Front Line Ministry for Freedom fundraiser

The third annual Motorcycle Ride for Freedom, sponsored by the Front Line Ministry for Freedom, was held Sunday in near-perfect weather conditions from the Pizza Wave parking lot on Metacom Avenue. The route included a 35-mile run through the streets of Bristol, Warren, and nearby Massachusetts. When the riders returned to Bristol about an hour, 15 minutes later, they were treated to a buffet at the Pizza Wave Restaurant, a 50-50 raffle, and prize raffle.

According to race coordinator David Benevides, the event was another great success.

"We had 63 bikes and a total of 136 people that came out to help us support our troops,"

he said. "We raised just over \$4,000."

"I really enjoy supporting this effort," said Kris Carlone, of Bristol, riding in just her second motorcycle run on Sunday. "Tony (her husband) and I participated in the Ride for Diabetes a few weeks ago, and we really enjoyed it. These are worthwhile causes, and I'm all for that."

Front Line Ministry for Freedom is a Christian-based community outreach program designed to support and encourage troops overseas. This organization is largely made up of dedicated individuals from Bristol County churches and many other individuals who are actively supporting this endeavor.

"Our goal is to pray for our troops on a daily basis and to send care packages with some of the comforts of home," said Mr. Benevides. "We have individuals in our organization who have been on the battlefield and know the value of home-based support."

Gail Devine has helped coordinate this event

from the beginning and says there is much satisfaction watching this race unfold.

said. "With each care package that goes out, our ladies write them a note to let them know we are praying and thinking of them. The military enjoys getting packages we send them with comforts of home items. They write us thank you notes letting us know how much they enjoyed what we sent them."

Ms. Devine added, "The military is my love and I get joy out of doing things for them like raising money so we can send them care packages. Since 2008, we have sent out 562 care boxes with comforts of home items. We also send them calling cards around the holidays so they can call their family. From October 2012 to July 2013, we have raised \$7,206.05 for care packages. We raise money by holding candy drives and we also have money banks at business locations."

### Let's see your Vision

n 10 years, there could be a public sailing center on Bristol Harbor.

Or a hiking trail of interconnected green spaces throughout town.

If you envision great things for Bristol, consider attending the Vision for Bristol forum, which starts next

The goal of the public forum is to solicit ideas and opinions about what kind of Bristol we want to have in the next 10 years. An enhanced waterfront, perhaps, with scores of additional docks and moorings. Or how about an increased presence of manufacturing opportunities?

Town officials won't know where to go, or how to get there, without a plan, and that's where you come in.

Your input will help shape the future of Bristol, as the information gathered will be used to help form the 10-year Town Comprehensive Plan. This plan is what will guide officials in making future decisions.

As of press time, 125 people have registered for the forum, which takes place over two week-nights — Sept. 19 and 25, from 6:30 to 9: 30 p.m. — in the basement of St. Mary's Church on Wood Street. Organizer Diana Campbell is hoping for 150.

Registrants represent a cross-section of Bristol residents young, old, rich, poor, activists and those who would normally turn down public service opportunities. A major draw to participate is that none of the town officials will be present. They're not invited and even happily agreed to remain absent. They agree that the presence of a public official might stymie public discourse. Some will, however, be present on the second night, when the ideas generated from the first night will be unveiled in an organized man-

The last forum, Voices for Bristol, took place almost seven years ago, and much of what was discussed was parlayed into the 2009 Town Comprehensive Plan, which was only a five-year outlook.

We ask that you sign up to participate because without your voice, there's a strong chance your desires for Bristol won't be represented.

A crash involving three vehicles sent at least one person to the hospital and forced partial closure of Hope Street just north of Gooding Avenue late Monday morning.

According to a witness who was walking along Hope Street at around 11 a.m., one car was stopped at the traffic light in the southbound lane near the Bristol Medical Center. The witness said

that a flatbed truck carrying lumber materials, also traveling south, failed to stop and plowed into the stopped vehicle.

from Denver, Col. earlier in the day.







she said. "But the pediatrician assured us that he was an early walker, and he was concentrating on his gross motor skills."

Several months later, with Jason still inaudible, Melissa and her husband sought the help of a speech therapist and enrolled their son in an early intervention

Jason received intensive speech therapy, utilizing an iPad to communicate and practice sounds. He also learned some sign language as a way to ease his frustrations when communicating.

"We try not to use the sign language as much because we don't want him to rely on that as a sole means to communicate," Melissa said, "so we work with him con-

Since children with Apraxia cannot communicate their needs effectively, often behavioral issues emerge and a child could struggle in social settings.

"It breaks my heart sometimes, when we're at the park and he starts playing with other kids and then when they realize that he can't talk, they sort of go their own way," Melissa said.

When Jason was first diagnosed, Melissa initially felt helpless, knowing nothing about Apraxia. Little data is available about how many children are diagnosed with the disorder, and even more rare are resources to help families struggling to combat it.

Then she found CASANA — the Childhood Apraxia of Speech

Association — a non-profit organization based in Pennsylvania whose mission is solely to support research and help families affected by Apraxia. It was founded by its director Sharon Getz, whose son was diagnosed with a severe case of the disorder over 12 years

"Little is known about it and through CASANA we bring awareness," Sharon said. "We are the only organization dedicated to raising awareness about Apraxia."

What is known, Sharon said, is that with appropriate early help, nearly all of the kids will develop intelligible speech.

"The extent depends on whether there's co-existing problems," she said. "Many kids may get to the point where no one will ever know there was a speech problem."

Her own son, now a teenager, is enrolled in high school, sitting alongside his peers in a typical academic setting.

"It was painstaking to watch, with more than 200 speech therapy lessons," said Sharon. "But the persistence of both him and his speech therapist, it would be an understatement to say it was inspiring. It fueled my passion and desire to see that kids with Apraxia get the help they need."

CASANA utilizes donations through community walks and other grants to fund its programs,

such as iPad for Apraxia. Families of low to moderate income are given iPads with protective cases so they can incorporate apps into a child's therapy program.

"We found early on in a pilot program that tablets and apps can helps kids in terms of speech practice," Sharon said. "And they are communication tools for them, when they aren't able to speak for themselves yet. It's augmentative communication.

"For many families, having a dedicated tool like this for their child is out of the realm of their budgets."

Rhode Island will have its firstever Walk for Apraxia this Sunday, Sept. 15 at Colt State Park. Registration starts at 9 a.m. and the walk starts at 10. Currently, there are more than 200 participants and nearly \$11,000 has been

"I never thought we'd have this much participation," said Kendra Jenkins, a Portsmouth mom whose son Talan, 4, also suffers from Apraxia.

"He was diagnosed just before this third birthday," she said. "He walked late, crawled late, so we

just thought he was a late bloomer and was taking the scenic route.

"Once we got the diagnosis, it was hard. I had no idea what it was. Our first reaction was, 'Will he ever speak?""

Like Jason, Talan was hardly babbling, opting for sounds and grunts to communicate his desires.

"His main form is sign language. He still only says about eight words."

Kendra also turned to the web to learn more about the disorder, discovering CASANA.

"I jumped in head first," she said "I thought about how great it would be to get involved and raise awareness about Apraxia. I contacted CASANA and started organizing the walk a few months ago."

Kendra also started a support group-Facebook page for Rhode Island families affected by Apraxia, Rhode Island Apraxia Families.

"It's comforting to find others going through what we're going through," she said. "We can get together, talk about our journey and have a safe place to go and cry to someone who understands."

Melissa hasn't been to one of Kendra's playgroups yet, but is looking forward to Sunday's walk.

"We're not alone," Melissa said. "I can't tell you how good it feels to know there are other moms who know exactly what I mean when I tell them what we're going through."

### Multi-trip toll deal cut short by RITBA

Also, leaving transponder at home doesn't work

Their E-ZPass account balances have declined faster than some Sakonnet River Bridge users say they had expected, even at the 10-cent per crossing rate now in place.

For one thing, the "pay for just one round trip per day" E-Zpass deal at the bridge is no more. And drivers have also discovered that putting the transponder away is not enough to keep bridge tolls from being charged to their account.

The Rhode Island Turnpike and Bridge Authority (RITBA) board voted recently to cancel the discount for multiple bridge crossings that had been designed to benefit local residents.

David Darlington, RITBA chairman, said the board took the action after the legislature reduced the bridge toll to 10 cents per crossing.

The board decided that the "discounts offered were no longer affordable," Mr. Darlington said Friday.

Some motorists learned of the switch upon receiving their E-ZPass account credit card

billings which showed charges for multiple round trips in the

At the same time, however, RITBA's online E-ZPass page continued to state that "E-Zpass holders do not pay more than one (1) round trip per transponder, per calendar day, per bridge."

RITBA is in the process of changing that language to reflect the policy change, Mr. Darlington said, adding that the change was posted promptly at RITBA headquarters in Jamestown.

And, he said, RITBA has always stipulated that toll rates are subject to change.

Some motorists have also said that the practice of leaving the E-ZPass transponder at home or covering it with the foil bag does not prevent charges from being incurred.

If the tolling equipment at the bridge does not detect a transponder, it works instead with a photo of the license plate, Mr. Darlington said. A computer then checks that license plate against the E-ZPass database.

Mr. Darlington said the practice is the same wherever E-ZPass is used and is meant to protect against a malfunction in which the EZ-Pass transponder is not read which might result in a motorist having to pay a higher cash toll rate.

Drivers who don't want such a backup may access their E-ZPass account online and remove the license plate number that is associated with it, he said.

But if they do, "no other EZ-Pass system in any other state will be able to match your license to your E-ZPass account ... so any toll rate advantage you might have enjoyed would be lost."

Some bridge toll opponents have campaigned for bridge users to leave their transponders at home, aiming to force RITBA to engage in a costly and time consuming effort to collect dime tolls using license plate numbers.

"I don't believe that," John Vitkevich of Portsmouth, a leader of that effort, said Monday after

It's a Portuguese thing

*The razor-sharp wit and easy* camaraderie of the 'The Portuguese Kids' are pulling in audiences from Virginia to Vancouver.

Elsa Maxwell, a mid-20th century gossip columnist and "professional hostess" once opined, "Laugh at yourself first, before anyone else can." The Portuguese Kids, a Fall-River based improv group that's rapidly seen its reach stretch to the West Coast and throughout Canada, has turned laughing at themselves into an art form.

With skits and spoof songs ("Portuguese and I know it," "Luso Style") sketch comedy pieces about Portuguese 911 calls and voicemails, and their own take on cultural touchstones like the housewives franchise ("Real Housewives of Ponta Delgado"), the Kids have audiences across North America, Portuguese or not, in stitches.

Recently returned from a tour of four California venues in four days, the "Kids" were regrouping in their office, a large loft space in one of Fall River's ubiquitous mill buildings, when East Bay Life caught up with them.

Kids they are not, technically. Though all in their thirties, Derrick DeMelo, Brian Martins, Al Sardinha, and Jason Casimiro have known each other all their lives, or nearly so. Their parents all emigrated to Fall River from the Azores, and they grew up together. So, although their group has been performing in earnest since 2004, the seeds of their everexpanding act were planted more than two decades ago.

They attended different high schools, took some college classes, and took on various odd jobs and fledgling careers, but they continued performing at local events and on public access television, until a few years ago when they approached Improv Asylum in Boston for a series of training sessions.

They also brought a business plan to the improv incubator. "They saw that we wanted to know how to run a business, that we respected what they did," said DeMelo. "What we were were doing," added Sardinha, "was showing them we were serious about performing for a

living." That approach worked, and Improv Asylum loaned them enough seed money to get the Portuguese Kids off the ground as a legitimate business. "We had other jobs," said DeMelo. "But we never really had a 'plan B'."

Despite the Portuguese inside jokes, accents, and (depending on their audience) off-color language, their comedy is universal. Their target demographic is the children of immigrants, and they have found there is carryover whether they are Portuguese, Spanish, Italian, Greek, Jewish, or Korean. "Our comedy speaks to the cultural story of the immigrant trying to assimilate," said Sardinha.

"We appreciate the sacrifices that our parents made, bringing us here, and all they did. But there is something awkward about being the first generation in a new country," De Melo says. "Not like the Italians and Irish who have been here for a while, and assimilated. "Growing up a first generation Portuguese kid, we never thought our culture was hip."

Using humor, and having fun doing it, the Portuguese Kids are changing perceptions—but don't interpret that to mean that any of them would want to see their culture so assimilated that they lose their sense of self (not to mention their gold mine of comedic material.)

DeMelo, who recently appeared on an

episode of Andrew Zimmern's "Bizarre Foods," shopping with Zimmern before taking him home to meet (and be fed by) his mother, is clear that he does not want to see a franchise do for Portuguese food what another well-known franchise has done for Italian food. "If our generation, and our kids, think it's cool to be Portuguese, and they want to speak the language, we'll hold on to our traditions and cultures."

On stage, every show is different, and the group takes care to manage their lineup and keep it fresh, and generate new material. As much time as they spend touring, they estimate seventy percent of their man hours are behind the scenes, booking and merchandising, managing social media and building their brand. It's a hectic schedule, "and we put in a lot of hard work, long hours," Martins pointed out. But, as of this spring, the hard work has mostly paid off, in that all four have left their day jobs to focus on their comedy full time. "It was a very scary leap," Martin admits. "With a pay cut," Casimiro adds.

It's a delicate balancing act, given that all but Sardinha are in committed relationships and/or fathers of young children. "Al's the only one living the rock star lifestyle," DeMelo says. "We don't have a lot of groupies—though Brian

in the first place and there was no path to victory in 2014. While he blamed Rhode Islanders' "irrational negativity," for his poor standing, I can't be the only one who thinks that his "I'm right and the rest of you are wrong" attitude contributed to voters' scorn. He calls it "principled leadership," but some of us hear "if you don't agree with me, you are stu-

Aside from polls, Governor Chafee does not have to hear what Rhode Islanders are thinking, but he has heard from their representatives in the General Assembly. Rhode Island's constitution has made the governor's office a weak one and governors during the past twenty years have all realized at one point or another that they will get nothing done unless they work closely with the General Assembly and respect their place in the legislative process. Governor Chafee has ignored the General Assembly's role repeatedly by issuing executive orders on hot button issues ranging from E-Verify to health insurance. Worst of all, after an emotional 2011 special session on pension reform where legislators took a really tough vote, Chafee is doing his best to undermine and unravel the very pension reform law which he has heralded as an accomplishment of his administration.

I was recently asked who benefits most from Chafee's departure from the 2014 governor's race and I said "the Rhode Island voter." This is not a slam against Chafee. The simple truth is that the tone of the race will be much different. Rather than re-living the gaffes of this administration, all the candidates will have the opportunity to lay out their competing visions for Rhode Island. If one the expected candidates (Block, Fung, Raimondo and Taveras) win, we are going to have a governor under the age of 50 for the first time since John Chafee won in 1963 and are likely to have a "first" with an Asian, woman or Latino winner.

As someone who falls in the middle of the political spectrum, I always described myself as a "John Chafee Democrat" and I am grateful to the Chafee family for their service to our state. However, I will not be sad to see the Chafee administration end any more than I'll miss hearing "Enter Sandman" and watching Mariano Rivera mow down Red Sox hitters with his cutter. They do have one thing in common—they knew when it was time to go.



resemble a small cod but they are different. They usually range in size from 9 to 15 inches. They are also bottom feeders and bite any bait greedily... clams, shrimp, worms or cut fish and squid. They are often found in harbors, at the mouth of streams and off docks. Both tomcod and Northern Kingfish are good to eat.

#### Where's the bite

Off-shore fishing has been heating up. According to Elisa Martin of Snug Harbor Marina, the charter vessel 'Big Game' with Captains Shamus Mara and Brian Bacon landed four yellowfin tuna Saturday and Dr. Rick Turner caught a

bluefin and yellowfin tuna at Tuna Ridge (at the 30 fathom mark about out 35 to 40 miles off Block Island). And this week, the 'Thirty-Three II', a 19-foot vessel, landed a 215 pound Mako shark."

Roger Simpson of the Frances Fleet party boats said, "First tuna trip of the season was quite successful this past week with the emphasis on quality as they boated several big eye tuna all in the 160 to 200-pound range along with yellowfin and a nice bunch of albacore to 60 pounds, a handful of Mahi, two swords (one 150 pounds!), and last but certainly

### A tackle box you won't want to fill with bait


**Q.** I have an old wood fishing tackle box which still has its original decal ("PONDBROOK, PROVI-

A. Your wood laminated tackle box was made by John W. Gilson in

Stuart, Florida. He was an avid fisherman and started making the boxes in the 1940's. He opened his own tackle shop and met George Briggs, who was visiting Florida on vacation. Briggs owned a store and supply company and Spo Provider development which regions in the region of the provider development of the p



called Pondbrook Co., Fishing and Sportsman's Specialties in Providence. Briggs and Gilson developed a business relationship which resulted in Briggs becoming the national distributor of Gilson's tackle boxes. The tackle boxes came in two models: "The

Sportsman" (which I believe is what you have) was used for fresh and saltwater fishing. "The Seamaster" was designed for saltwater use. It was slighter bigger and had fewer compartments, so the larger saltwater lures and reels would fit properly. These are hard to come by and are prized by collectors. Some have sold for \$250 at auction.

**Q.** I have this old game board and do not know if it is worth



anything, or what to do with it now that the playing pieces are long gone. Anything you can tell me will be helpful.

A. This wooden game board was made by the Carrom Co. from Ludington, Michigan. Yours is the "Q" Style Board which is 28 inches square. This game board is from the late 1930's-early 1940's. It has chess or checkers on one side and Carrom or "Karrom" on the other. The corner pockets were used in

Karrom much like you would play billiards. Yours is in good condition and with the vibrant colors would be most desirable for a wall decoration. Prices vary but those in good condition currently sell in the \$75-\$150 range.

not least, a 70-pound Wahoo!"
Black sea bass fishing has been good with a lot of short fish mixed in. Angler fishing for fluke on the Frances Fleet caught fewer black sea bass this week. Roger Simpson of the Frances Fleet said, "... not as many sea bass as we had been seeing but still some hefty ones from time to time with the best for the week just over the 4-pound mark."

Summer flounder (fluke) fishing continues to be good for this time of year. Craig Castro of Erickson's Bait & Tackle, Warwick, said, "Two customers caught keeper fluke Friday off Warwick Light." Mixed reports coming in about fishing for fluke around the bridges and Elisa Martin of Snug Harbor said, "Fluke fishing off southern coastal shores has


slowed but it is till good at Block Island in 70 to 80 feet of water." Roger Simpson of the Frances Fleet said, "Tuesday and Wednesday were the best outings of the week. On Tuesday about half the boat was limited out on fluke... and the big fish... a fine slab of just under 8 lbs that fell victim to a whole squid."

Tautog fishing continues to be slow, however, increasing numbers of smaller fish are being caught with some keepers being caught too. Ken Landry of Ray's Bait & Tackle, Warwick said, "Customers are starting to catch keeper tautog in the Bay which is a good sign. With cooler weather coming things are only going to get better."

Striped bass fishing has slowed on Block Island with bluefish extremely thick at the north rip and southwest sides. Fishing in the lower part of the Narragansett Bay is improving. Manny Sousa of Lucky Bait & Tackle, Warren said, "Some customers have caught keepers off Bullocks Point but there seems to be more action south of the bridges. We are hoping thing open up as the water cools and we have bass thoughtout the Bay like we did this spring."





When Clint Hill, FBI agent, was assigned as Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's personal bodyguard upon her husband's election to the presidency, he was not happy. Anticipating a continuous whirlwind of teas, receptions, and shopping excursions, he was, in fact, very disappointed. After all, he had served on the Secret Service detail of a number of previous presidents, and felt slighted to not continue in that role. 

Sage is reclusive, withdrawn and very self-conscious of a facial scar received in the same accident which killed her mother, and in which Sage was driving. In order to avoid social contact, she has chosen to work nights alone in a bakery where she makes the most wonderful ethnic breads. These appear to be the attraction for the German, Josef Weber, who begins to visit the bakery regularly just at closing when Sage begins her evening shift. Over coffee and conversation one night, he confesses a secret he has kept hidden for 70 years: he was a Nazi officer during WWII. Since Sage is of Jewish origin, though not practicing, this revelation causes her intense conflict and forces her to confront history and make some difficult choices. The author very cleverly weaves a story-within-a-story; a kind of allegory about mythological, blood-thirsty beasts with an insatiable and uncontrollable urge to prey upon their victims. This is a plot involving moral themes: personal choices, guilt, punishment, atonement, justice, and ultimately forgiveness.

### Why Governor Chafee won't run

olitical pundits are all parsing the reasons why Governor Lincoln Chafee has declined a reelection run. Most attribute his declination to the fact that he has less than a 26% approval rating. While that poll number is relevant it is symptomatic of the real reason why he won't be a candidate, namely, he feels unappreciated.

Before you conclude that this is "over-psychologizing," look at the

two rather unusual statements he made when he announced he would not seek a second term. He bemoaned the fact that there was an "irrational negativi-

ty" around his positions on such issues as driver's licenses for undocumented residents, and his refusal to call the State House holiday tree a Christmas tree. He added that if one were to look up the definition of "principled leader" in the dictionary, you'd see a picture of Linc Chafee...That (will) never change." He also predicted that in time, his positions would be

vindicated. Certainly, there's a fair amount of hubris when politicians pontificate that they are "principled," a leader, and correct on the issues. Then again, faint egos don't populate the political ranks. Folks can admire a straightforward recitation of a position but that doesn't equate with the fact that the office-holder can't be wrong. Even if there is some merit to a stance which a voter likes, the whole kit and caboodle can sink a politician. Perhaps neither position above was fatal to Mr.

Chafee—just his lack of creative solutions. The Christmas tree fiasco could have been settled like the Menorah, with the placement of the Christmas tree by a private party like the Knights of Columbus who could call it what it wanted. This was the distinction made for the correct appellation of the Jewish symbol. The argument about "regulating" drivers ignored real issues as to how drivers' licenses are a de facto identification for many programs which ostensibly are for citizens only. The lack of solutions can be overlooked on one or two matters but they all add up if there is a confluence of unsolved issues like unemployment and stagnant economic growth that cloud an administration. Mr. Chafee's vacillation on

some issues didn't help his cause either, and contributed to the less than "principled" stance he embraces. His vacillation over the pension reform undertaken at the expense of great political capital of many leaders, of allowing the unionization of day care providers, and the grand daddy of them all, a massive hike in overall sales taxes, all contributed to the lack of "appreciation" for his lead-

Sometimes there are multiple solutions to problems and, yes, one idea can be as good as the next without a concomitant fallout. Assuming that one's analysis is always "spot-on" is a blind

The Governor has some 16 months left in his term. Hopefully, he will do great things that will make the state a better place than he found. I hope that he does so well that in the future, voters will wax poetically about his accomplishments and the "good ol" days" of the Chafee administra-

### **DINING REVIEW**

### Roberto's voted Best Italian-East Bay

R oberto's Ristorante continues to please area diners with its classic Italian menu and the feel of a real Italian trattoria — comfortable, but elegant. The restaurant also has been voted Best Italian-East Bay in Rhode Island Monthly for a few years now.

The dining rooms have taupe walls above black beadboard wainscoting, hardwood floors, fresh flowers on the tables, snowy white linens and a big mural of the Tuscan countryside and a field of poppies in the main dining room.

The bar area just glows with the mahogany bar and massive wine racks. Bell-shaped hanging glass lamps across the front windows create a welcoming glow from inside and out. The bar is divided from the main dining room with a mosaic wall of the wooden sides from cases of imported wines.

And, for those who enjoy dining at Roberto's for graduations, rehearsal dinners, showers and other special events, a private room next door, decorated in the same style as the dining room, seats up to 45.

We settled at the bar on a recent, cool evening and Neeley set us up with wine from the extensive, expertly stocked wine list. Owner Bob Vanderhoof is a wine aficionado (Roberto's hosts occasional wine dinners, too) and can help with a recommendation if you need one.

There are wines from around the world and in all price ranges, with a heavy emphasis on Italy, of course. And there's a good selection by the glass, with some by the half-bottle, much appreciated by those of us who are both white and red lovers.

Chef Chris Ferreira will soon be tweaking the menu for fall, but all the favorites never change. To begin, there are house, Caesar, Caprese and bread salads, antipasto, pasta e fagioli soup, shrimp cocktail, grilled shrimp or scallops, grilled

Portabello mushrooms, crabcakes, calamari, and a soup and pizza of the day. (The soup was a tomato basil bisque; the pizza a white version with mozzarella, fontina, chicken, sun-dried tomatoes and spinach).

Entrees run the gamut from the classic shrimp, veal and chicken piccata, lasagna, aglio e olio, risotto, shrimp scampi, braciole, and carbonara, Bolognese, saltimbocca and marsala dishes to unique offerings, such as the Shrimp Pepe Nero (roasted garlic, mushrooms, plum tomatoes in a black pepper cream sauce), cod Scarpriello (capers, olives, roasted peppers and hot peppers in a light vinegar sauce) and pork Albicocca (a 10-ounce bone-in chop in an apricot demi-glace).

A page of pasta dishes is a favorite, because you can choose from 10 dishes and order each with chicken or veal.

With our wine, we enjoyed a basket of Tuscan bread and a dish of olive oil full of creamy, soft, roasted garlic cloves.

Then, we started with the manzo croccante, which is so popular because it creates a stir in the room every time we order it. A huge, flat, white, widerimmed bowl holds a mound of tender, seared beef in a savory red wine demi-glace with caramelized onions, topped with julienned and fried scallion

greens and decorated with frizzled leeks. Then, three 9-inch triangles of fried pasta crisps are tucked into the edges. It's a unique dish and beautifully executed for a contrast in textures and flavors.

The braciole, the chef's special, is a generous meal — two, fat rolls of tender veal medallions stuffed with a filling of cheese, pine nuts, spinach and wild mushrooms, surrounded by a rich, lingonberry demi-glace swimming with roasted garlic cloves. Accompanying it were a massive cloud of creamy mashed potatoes and spears of fresh, grilled asparagus drizzled with a balsamic glaze.

Neeley raved about the lobster a la Dina and it met all expectations. A real taste of summer, the dish features penne, big pieces of sweet, perfectly cooked lobster, chopped plum tomatoes, spinach, pine nuts and shallots all tossed in a light sherry cream sauce that doesn't overwhelm all the fresh, delicate flavors.

At Roberto's, you want to save space for dessert. There's caramel flan, tiramisu, Italian lemon layer cake, New York-style cheesecake, two gelatos (salted caramel and chocolate chunk and peanut butter/brownie on our visit) and raspberry and lemon sorbet.

The Italian lemon layer cake is our favorite — a moist cake with a large crumb is split and filled with a lemony, mascarpone filling and dusted with confectioners' sugar.

But, everyone recommended the salted caramel and chocolate chunk gelato, so we had to try that. The salty/sweet gelato was perfect to split after our big meal and went well with coffee.

Or, add an espresso, cappuccino, dessert wine or port to cap off the evening.
