Commission honors Hopkins, updates water permit appeal

The Marshall County Commission meeting on Monday opened and closed on a somber note.

Commissioners observed a minute of silence at the start of the session for 9th District Commissioner and long-serving emergency management director Bob Hopkins, who passed away September 14.

His absence was felt at the close of the meeting as well, since, for years, Hopkins had been called on to make the motion to adjourn commission meetings. Commissioners paused briefly before moving to adjourn, without the body's traditional closer.

The commission has an additional seat to fill as well. Mayor Mike Keny read the letter of resignation from Commissioner Wesley Neece into the record.

Neece has moved out of the 5th District and must step down after eight years representing the district.

The county is currently accepting letters of interest to appoint replacements for both seats.

Letters should be submitted to the County Mayor's Office by October 12 at 2 p.m.

Applicants can also submit their name to the County Clerk at the October 25 meeting of the commission.

Candidates must be nominated by a sitting member of the commission at that meeting to be considered for a vote.

Interested persons must be registered voters and residents of either the 5th or 9th Districts, as verified by the county election office.

Successful candidates will serve the remaining terms until the August 4, 2022, general election.

Commissioner Mickey King briefed the commission on the current status of the county's Board of Public Utilities efforts to secure additional water supply for the county.

The county, joined by the Duck River Agency, has filed an appeal of the permit to withdraw water from the Duck River, granted by with the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation in August.

admiral's staff in the Philippine Islands; attend Intelligence School in Washington DC; be assigned to the office of Naval Intelligence in Lisbon, Portugal; and eventually be assigned to the American Embassy in Tokyo, Japan before retiring from the Navy in 1971.

Bill earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from Memphis State University. Continuing his passion for the security and law enforcement work, he spent the rest of his career first at Wackenhut Security, then Director of Corporate Se-

curity for Genesco Inc., and eventually Director of Corporate Loss Prevention at Sherwin Williams Company. During those years, Bill and his family lived in Cleveland, OH, the Tennessee cities of Nashville, Franklin, and Murfreesboro before moving to Assisted Living in Ashland City.

Bill was predeceased by his father, James Greer Floyd; his mother, Rosa Tennessee Floyd; brothers, James Greer Floyd Jr., and James Taylor Floyd; and his loving wife Joan Floyd. Is your safety plan up to date?

One of my many duties at my “day job” is serving as point man for our workplace safety program.

Since I have a hair-trigger for gabbing about bloodborne pathogens, bodily fluids, corrosives, and other appetizing subjects, we no longer have a Christmas party or even a holiday party. No, it’s a “Watch out – there may be a pop quiz on lock-out/tag-out procedures for mistletoe!” party.

Given my history, I am lucky to be around to fill this position, instead of a pine box. During college I worked in a factory for three

summers. I carelessly let my sneakered foot slide into a warm mineral spirits bath; even with repeated rinsing, I wound up with skin that was as prune as the menu at a MACC (Mothers Against Constant Constipation) convention.

On another occasion, at the same factory, I was daydreaming and nearly lost my hand to a roller mill that I had previously seen convert a nickel to a pancake-sized blob. (Perhaps it’s a false memory, but I could swear I heard Aunt Jemima shout, “Mrs. Butterworth can have that one!”)

Every household and workplace needs a well-planned safety strategy. It’s just human nature that shortcuts, laziness, and an attitude of “it can’t happen to me” lead to accidents-waiting-to-happen.

Sometimes sentimentality plays a part. (“I know we probably ought to replace the wiring in the break room, but it’s still attached to Ben Franklin’s kite. Are you a commie

or something, man?”)

I have a knack for sensing when a co-worker truly needs extra attention. You know to watch out when someone has a nickname like “Lefty” or “Stubby.” Try building up the nerve to straighten out someone nicknamed “Sort of push it around with your forehead.”

Occasionally, I have visitors to my safety lectures. For instance, my lesson about preventing slips, trips, falls, and lack of traction was attended by... The American Economy.

I will neither confirm nor deny that a comment at the meeting was “I WISH we could get a mouse ahold of the steering wheel!”

What does it mean to be an American?

I’ve been thinking a lot recently about what it means to be an American, to have a shared stake in this country and its fortunes. In some ways, I suppose the question is unanswerable: We are a vast, diverse country, and we each answer the question in our own way.

Yet I also think there are characteristics many of us would recognize—traits in common that resonate across communities and divisions, regardless of our age or political beliefs. You could start, for instance, with a belief in the promise and ideals of the United States, in its Constitution and laws, and perhaps above all in the freedom, independence, and opportunity that many Americans consider their birthright.

Yet all along we’ve balanced this quest for liberty with a sense of responsibility to the community around us. As an American, you accept certain responsibilities: to cast an informed vote; to respect the laws and if you disagree with them to work through the system to change them; to defend the Constitution; and to respect the rights, beliefs, and opinions of others, whether or not you agree with them.

This last characteristic is not a nice-to-have add-on. It’s baked into our system. The success of American democracy rests on all sorts of values: open-mindedness, an informed citizenry, honesty, competence. But one of the things I’ve also noticed wherever I’ve traveled in the country is a restless and impressive desire to make things better—to improve our communities and the lives of the people who live in them. On the whole, Americans possess a confident belief that change is possible—that as a nation, we make progress over time based on the efforts of ordinary people and political leaders alike. At its heart, the American system—our representative democracy—is about how we resolve our differences in order to move our towns and cities, states, and the country as a whole forward.

What this means should be obvious: We solve our problems together, by working with all kinds of people, trying to forge common ground, build consensus, and communicate our beliefs and ideas effectively. In the end, this means that the country depends on a set of common virtues in its citizens—mutual respect, tolerance, empathy, civility, humility, resolve, a willingness to step up to challenges and meet them square on—that underlie our ability to make progress together.

I realize that in this day of extreme political division, all of that may seem a bit starry-eyed. There are plenty of Americans who have no patience for those on the other side, and who have no desire to try to understand or sympathize with them. Yet the basic need we confront as Americans has not changed, and that is to use the political system to resolve our fundamental challenges.

There are all kinds of fault lines in American politics right now—between those who want to use the political system to expand individual opportunity and offer a fairer chance at the future and those who want government to protect their livelihoods and way of life, between those who want to make voting easier and those who want to restrict it, between those who embrace a diversifying country and those who worry about its implications in their own lives. Sorting through these differences and resolving them is an ongoing challenge. But being an American means confronting that task, doing our best to find solutions that most Americans can live with—and recognizing that the chance to do all this as ordinary citizens is one of the gifts that being an American bestows on us.

Bulldogs' 'D' dominant at Eagleville

EAGLEVILLE — The Cornersville Bulldogs (4-1, 2-0) coming off a Homecoming game pounding of the Collinwood Trojans, traveled to Rutherford County for a Region 5-1A matchup with the Eagleville Eagles (2-2, 1-0) under a cool three-quarter moon Friday night.

The Bulldogs, continuing their strong defensive showing of the 2021 season, held the Eagles to only 91 yards of total offense and Cornersville sophomore Ben Franklin ran for 153 yards and two touchdowns, one of which included a 77-yard dash up the middle for a score, as they downed the Eagles 22-7 to keep their Region 5-1A record spotless at 3-0.

"It was a total team effort tonight. The defense played well and guys on offense stood up made plays. We need our guys to step up," Cornersville coach Gerard Randolph said.

The Bulldogs won the coin toss and elected to defer to the second half. Carnesville's Eli Welch booted the kickoff to the Eagle 11-yard line and after a 22-yard return by Eagleville's Dylan Pratt, the Eagles went on offense.

After a two-yard rush on first down, Bulldog defensive end Eli Welch broke into the Eagle backfield and sacked the Eagleville quarter-

back for a six-yard loss. "We (defense) came out strong and we didn't stop," Welch said.

Welch stopped Eagleville's Jesse Brown after a five-yard gain on the next play forcing the Eagles to punt.

Cornersville's Mason Calahan fielded the punt at the Bulldog 29-yard line but was stopped for no gain.

The Bulldogs, hampered by an intentional grounding call on third down, punted the ball on fourth and 12 to the Eagleville 23-yard line.

A bright spot for the Bulldogs has been the punting by Tyler Brockman, as the junior has averaged over 33-yards per kick with booming punts that gives his teammates time to cover downfield.

The Bulldogs were able to gain a first down on this possession but were forced to punt and Brockman's 30-yard punt gave the ball to the Eagles at their own 41-yard line.

The Eagles faced a fourth and 14 at their own 37-yard line as the scoreless first quarter ended.

As the second quarter began the Bulldogs having forced an Eagleville punt and after a four-yard loss on first down, Franklin burst up the middle, cleared the Eagle secondary and was off to the races on a 77-yard dash to the end zone. Logan Springer's PAT put Cornersville up 7-0.

Woodard ran for 16-yards to the Eagle 9-yard line and after a Bulldog time out Woodard scampered into the end zone and Springer once again nailed the PAT to put Cornersville into the lead, 14-0 with 10 seconds left until halftime.

Warriors' dominance over Rockets continues

JASPER — The Forrest Rockets travelled to Jasper on Friday night riding a three-game winning streak and a boatload worth of confidence in an attempt to break a 0-4 losing record versus Marion County, but the Warriors had other ideas as they ran away with a lopsided 42-15 win.

"I believe you have to play tough competition to get better," Forrest coach Eli Stephenson said. "They showed us what we have to work on. I know our players will learn from the mistakes and get better for

Cascade and the rest of the season."

Forrest faced an uphill battle the entire contest as they fell behind 21-0 early in the second quarter before getting on the board via a Gavin Grissom 20-yard field goal with 28 seconds remaining in the first half.

"We were able to get an offensive drive going in the second quarter and get a field goal," Stephenson said. "That gave us a little momentum, but Marion County got a score before half to gain the momentum back and got in up by three scores."

Marion County quarterback Taye Hutchins scored on a 60-yard run

early in the third quarter to put the Rockets in a deep hole at 28-3 and then hooked up with Mason Keel on a 13-yard touchdown pass to seal the win for the sixth-ranked Warriors (4-0).

"We got the ball to start the second half and they held us to a three-and-out," Stephenson said. "Our offense has to get the ball moving and gain first downs."

"With first downs we get in rhythm and Marion County kept us from getting a rhythm. That is on me. I've got to find a way to move the ball and score."

Hutchins was a one-man wrecking crew, rushing for 157 yards and two touchdowns on nine carries while going 3-for-6 for 100 yards in the air and two touchdown passes.

"Marion County played better than us," Stephenson said. "They blocked and tackled better than us. We got to work on finishing blocks and tackles."

The Warriors out-gained Forrest 421-to-207 with both of the Rockets' touchdowns coming in the fourth quarter on a Hunter Bennett 54-yard touchdown run and a Liam Bell one-yard touchdown blast.

"Marion County is a good football team," Stephenson said. "They will make a deep run in the playoffs in 2A. They are fast and physical and they blocked and tackled better than us."

Forrest (4-2, 2-0) continues its three-game road swing this week

when they travel to longtime rival Cascade for a huge Region 5-AA contest against the undefeated Champions (6-0, 2-0).

The two teams (tied for ninth in the AP Poll) have played 20 times since 2001 and the series is deadlocked at 10-10 with Forrest losing 17-14 at home last season prior to winning five in a row over Cascade.

What stands out in that 20-game span is both teams do not do a good job of protecting their respective home fields, indicated by identical 4-6 losing records at home.

This will also be the first region contest be-

tween the two squads since 2015.

"It's a huge region game for both of us," Stephenson said. "The winner of this game is in the driver's seat to win the region."

"We have to learn from our mistakes against Marion County and we have to work on getting better."

Cascade has not started a season at 6-0 since the 2008 campaign when they won 11 straight games before losing 22-0 to Jo Byrns in the Class A state quarterfinals.

"I was nervous, but after I caught it and scored, I felt good," Tapp said. "It feels great being the first one to ever do it."

With the win, the Rockets entertain Fayetteville Thursday night in the Duck River Valley Conference championship game with kickoff scheduled for 6:30 p.m.

"It feels amazing, but also there are a lot of nerves and a lot of pressure that comes with it," Johnson said. "But this team has been handling adversity all

year long. They are really good listeners and they know when we say something what we want them to do it. So I feel real good going into next week that we are

going to have a really good ballgame."

FMS won at Fayetteville 38-0 earlier in the season.

The Rockets scored early and they scored often, beginning with a Hill three-yard touchdown pass to Cohen Grissom.

FMS added 24 points in a big second quarter with Eli Bell, Grissom, and Antonio Marable coming up with touchdown runs.

Forrest took a 32-0 lead to the halftime break and in the third quarter, the Rockets scored two more touchdowns on a Hill 49-yard touchdown pass to Fletcher Fields.

After a defensive stop by the FMS defense, the Rockets had the ball at the Community two-yard line where Johnson dialed up the play for the Tapp touchdown catch.

Corral, Young set for 'Bama-Ole Miss clash

Matt Corral and Bryce Young left Southern California as hot-shot prospects bound for Southeastern Conference stardom.

The two quarterbacks convene Saturday in Tuscaloosa, Alabama as the early Heisman Trophy front-runners.

Corral leads No. 12 Mississippi and the nation's top offense against Young and No. 1 Alabama in an SEC West clash that also has the makings of a potential Heisman showdown.

Not that the star passers are interested in awards talk — not just yet anyway.

"That's cool, right? It's awesome that people are saying that, but it's not a point of focus," Corral said. "I'm not putting any energy into it and the team shouldn't either. And they don't. They don't come up and talk to me about it."

A month into the season, Corral is the +150 favorite for the Heisman according to FanDuel SportsBook. Young is next at +300, followed distantly by No. 2 Georgia's JT Daniels (+1400), another SoCal-to-SEC quarterback transplant.

"Being the top for some Heisman media talk now means nothing," Rebels coach Lane Kiffin said. "It only matters if you win the thing."

For now, "the thing" is this game.

Both quarterbacks are coming off huge performances against lesser competition. Young completed 20 of 22 passes for 313

yards and five touchdowns in a rout of Southern Miss. He threw his first interception of the season when the ball bounced off the chest of Jameson Williams while his 15 touchdown passes in four games is tied for second nationally.

Corral became the first SEC player to pass for three touchdowns and run for four in a romp over Tulane before an open date.

They've been the SEC's two most efficient passers and rank in the Top 10 nationally. Corral has passed for nine touchdowns without an interception while running for five scores through just three games.

The two have crossed paths over the years but this will be their first game matchup as starters. Corral's Long Beach Poly team was clobbered by Daniels and Mater Dei 55-13 in 2017. Young transferred to Mater Dei the following season, succeeding Daniels.

"Mater Dei is ridiculous, but so is Alabama," Corral said.

Both ultimately headed South as five-star prospects after initially committing to USC. Young, the nation's top-rated quarterback two years ago, said he wanted to "compete against the best" in both practice and games.

Corral trumps Young, a first-year starter, in experience. He became the first SEC quarterback to lead the nation in total offense last season and has picked up where he left off.

And they're well aware of each other, especially Young, who was coming up when Corral was already well known.

Georgia defense bracing for physical Razorbacks

ATHENS, Ga. — Georgia linebacker Nakobe Dean doesn't have to look at this week's Top 25 poll to know the Bulldogs are about to play a much improved Arkansas team.

Dean can see the changes in the way No. 8 Arkansas plays, making the Razorbacks a challenge in Saturday's visit to No. 2 Georgia.

"They are not the same Arkansas team that we faced," Dean said Monday, referring to Georgia's 37-10 win over the Razorbacks to open the 2020 season.

"They are way more physical. That's the game that we at Georgia look for. ... We pride ourselves on our toughness and physicality, so I'm sure everybody on the team will be excited for a game like this. I know I am."

Last season's opening win was the debut of Arkansas coach Sam Pittman, the former Georgia offensive line coach. Pittman has orchestrated a dramatic turnaround.

The Razorbacks gained respect with last week's 20-10 win over No. 7 Texas A&M. The No. 8 ranking is the highest for Arkansas since early in the 2012 season.

The Razorbacks (4-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) are averaging 35.8 points, posing perhaps the toughest challenge yet for Georgia's stout defense.

The defense scored the only touchdown in the Bulldogs' 10-3 shutdown of then-No. 3 Clemson to open the season. The score

came on a 74-yard interception return by Christopher Smith.

The Bulldogs lead the nation by allowing only 5.8 points per game, allowing Georgia (4-0, 2-0) to overcome injuries to quarterback JT Daniels and at wide receiver. The visit from Arkansas is an important — if unexpected — midseason test in the SEC.

Pittman said the success of the Bulldogs' defense begins with Jordan Davis, Travon Walker and Jalen Carter on the line.

"They have so much talent on their D line," Pittman said. "Certainly they are big, physical. It starts with Davis and Carter. Nolan Smith. Walker. They are very, very talented. They rotate guys as well so they keep them fresh."

Georgia has reloaded after having six defensive players, including four defensive backs, selected in this year's NFL draft. Overall, nine Georgia players were taken in the draft.

"They've recruited really well there," Pittman said. "And so they're going to have depth and that's just Georgia. Hopefully Arkansas will get that way here soon in the near future where somebody leaves and next guy steps in, he may be as good, he may be better than the guy that left. But that's where Georgia is. And that's a credit to their staff and Kirby for recruiting."

Georgia, coming off a 62-0 win at Vanderbilt, has allowed only one offensive touchdown this season. Daniels started but played only the first quarter and is expected to start against Arkansas. The Bulldogs forced nine

three-and-outs against the Commodores.

Dean said the defense isn't satisfied.

"We're not getting comfortable," the Georgia linebacker said. "There's no complacency going on."

Dean has 14 tackles and two sacks as one of the leaders of the unit.

Arkansas will pose a unique challenge. Dual-threat quarterback KJ Jefferson is the SEC's only player to throw for at least 800 yards and run for at least 200 this season. Jefferson leads FBS quarterbacks with his average of 18.4 yards per completion.

Jefferson missed much of the second half of the win over Texas A&M with a bruised knee. He returned for the final drive and was still sore on Monday, according to Pittman.

"I don't think it'll be a problem for the game," Pittman said.

Jefferson's top target is wide receiver Treyton Burks, who had six catches for 167 yards, including an 85-yard touchdown, against the Aggies but left the field in obvious discomfort with an undisclosed injury in the fourth quarter. Pittman said Burks also is expected to play Saturday.

Burks has 19 catches for 373 yards and two touchdowns and has a catch in 24 consecutive games.

"It really doesn't feel like we're 4-0," Burks said. "We're just playing our ball and having fun with it."

Kings Mountain turned tide of American Revolution

October 7 is the 241st anniversary of the most important victory in Tennessee history. During the Revolutionary War, a British commander named Patrick Ferguson led an army of British loyalists through South Carolina. Along the way, he sent a message to the Scotch-Irish settlers in present-day northeast Tennessee, telling them to lay down their arms or he would “lay waste to their country with fire and sword.”

Isaac Shelby and John Sevier, leaders in northeast Tennessee, decided to raise an army and fight Ferguson before he had a chance to carry out his threat.

On September 25, these men gathered at the Sycamore Shoals of the Watauga River (present-day Elizabethton). There were

240 from Washington County, 240 from Sullivan County, and 400 from Virginia. Most of these men had no military training. None had real uniforms. Some didn't even have shoes! But they were skilled with rifles, and many had previous experience fighting against Native Americans. These men said goodbye to their families, not knowing if they would ever see them again.

The “Overmountain Men,” as they became known, crossed the Appalachian Mountains—marching, walking and riding 330 miles in two weeks. On October 7, they tracked down Ferguson's army on one of the few hills in the northwest part of South Carolina, a hill Ferguson had dubbed “Kings Mountain.” The colonial

forces split into groups and surrounded the hill. Ferguson's men lined up and prepared to defend themselves.

The battle that followed was not long or complicated. The colonial forces yelled at the top of their lungs and charged up the hill. They fired, ducked behind the nearest rock or tree to reload, and fired again. They used tactics they had learned from fighting Native Americans on the frontier. Ferguson's men fired, reloaded and fired again. On at least two occasions, his men affixed bayonets to their rifles and charged down the hill. The Overmountain Men ran from the bayonets. But after Ferguson's men headed back up to defend the top of the hill, the Overmountain Men turned around and

chased them.

There are many first-person accounts of the battle. One soldier, Leonard Hice, was shot twice in the left arm, once in his left leg, once in his right knee and once in the chest. He kept firing after the first two bullets hit his arm by resting his rifle against a tree. “Whether my bullet brought the enemy down or not, I cannot say, for many were as good a marksman as I,” he later wrote.

We believe the men shooting from the bottom of the hill were more likely to hit their targets than the men shooting down at them, in part because of the rocks and trees they hid behind.

About the time colonial soldiers made their way to the top of the hill, they killed Ferguson. (A later examination of the body revealed that the British commander had been shot seven times.) At that point, the battle became a slaughter. In the Battle of Kings Mountain, 244 members of Ferguson's army were killed, 163 were wounded and 688 were taken prisoner. Only 29 colonial soldiers were killed and 58 wounded. Coming at the time that it did, after British victories at Charleston and Camden, Kings Mountain was a huge boost for the American side. One final story about Kings Mountain: After the battle, Sevier chose

a Washington County soldier named Joseph Greer to deliver the message about the battle to the American Congress. Greer, a physical giant by standards of the time, made the journey by himself, avoiding British soldiers and Native Americans the whole way.

When Greer got to Congress, the doorkeeper tried to bar his entrance. The veteran of Kings Mountain pushed him aside and delivered the message to the representatives there, who were thrilled with the news.

Joseph Greer later moved to Lincoln County, where he lived until 1831.

How to ensure social media doesn't harm your teen's self-esteem

Here are a few strategies to consider:

- Alternatives: When it comes to the way young people pass their time outside of school, there are limitless alternatives to social media. Whether it's sports, playing in a band or taking a pottery class, you can encourage your child to both embrace hobbies and interests outside the world of

their screens, as well as to spend more time with friends in person.

- Real talk: One of the major aspects of social media is that what people choose to share publicly is not always a reflection of reality. Have a conversation with your kids about the many ways that influencers and other social media users apply filters, photo editing software and other tools to create impossible goals for their followers. This might also be a good time to discuss what sort of content they're engaging with so you can try to steer them in a more positive direction.

- New tools: Attempts to set social media boundaries can be easier said than done both for the primary user (your teen) and you. Apps designed for this purpose can help. For example, the parental guidance app OurPact allows you to install a profile on your child's device. Then, you can remotely set up automated schedules for when internet and apps are unavailable, or block access manually to the device for a specified period of time. Features like URL whitelisting and blacklisting and daily screen time allowances can help you stay engaged with how your child uses their device.
