# Five nabbed in connection with burglaries, thefts

KOUNTZE - Hardin County Sheriff Mark Davis reported his office has been busy making several arrests of residents connected with a string of burglaries and thefts in the county.

According to Davis, Randal William Warner, 48, and Christopher Keith Loftin, 40, were recently arrested and each charged with burglary of a building.

The sheriff said the burglary occurred in the north Silsbee area and that HCSO deputies recovered nine stolen items.

He noted seven of the stolen item were returned to the property owner.

Warner was also arrested for burglary of a building on FM 92 in the county's northern part.

Davis said Warner was arrested for breaking into Candie's Southern Skillet Restaurant in the 12000 block of FM 92.

Douglas Lee Konstantine, 35,

and Daniel Paul Elmore, 39, were arrested and charged with burglary of a building connected to a break-in at Hidemay Mini-Storage on FM 92.

Davis reported Elmore was also arrested and charged with felony theft.

Elmore is accused of stealing approximately 40 feet of copper

wire from a new home construction site on Hicks Dairy Road.

He stated the copper wire, which was cut up, was recovered in the suspect's vehicle with a search warrant.

Davis reported Cody Allen Comer, 26, of Lumberton, was recently arrested in connection of theft from the Motiva plant near

Sour Lake. The sheriff said the suspect, charged with two counts of felony theft, stole two trailers and

equipment from the plant. Davis added Comer was also charged with felony theft of a hunting lease in Hardin County. He noted the suspect stole an ATV and game cameras.

"During this investigation, we recovered three truckloads of stolen property and several trailers, including a tractor and trailer that was reported stolen from Baytown Police Department," said Davis.

The sheriff said more arrests to

follow.

"It's a work in progress,"

Davis said. "We have stuff scattered all over. We still have three storage areas filled with stuff we haven't even gone through yet. There are more arrests and more recoveries.'

Davis said the suspects arrested would steal items, sell the items and use the money for drugs.

Commissioners table action on OT rate for emergency/



## disaster closings

KOUNTZE – The Hardin County Commissioners Court voted unanimously to table action to amend the County's Hours Worked and Overtime Policy during their March 23 meeting in the Hardin County Court Room.

Precinct 1 Commissioner L.W. Cooper Jr. presented a motion to amend the police to include emergency call outs without prior notification shall be compensated at the overtime rate for the hours worked due to the emergency (other than during а disaster/emergency closing).

Cooper said he, Human Resource Director Debbie Mendisabal and Sheriff Mark Davis were appointed as a committee to review the issue.

He said the committee found some county departments do not have an overtime line item in their budget.

"This could be complementary or monetary," Cooper said.

Cooper's motion and amendment to county policy was "emergency call outs without prior notification shall be compensated at the overtime rate for the hours worked due to the emergency (other than during a disaster/emergency closing).'

He also said he doesn't see any county departments, other than the sheriff's office or Road and Bridge Departments, having an emergency call out.

County Auditor Angela Gore noted the Adult ot Juvenile Probation Department could have an emergency callout.

"Maintenance and IT could also," said Sheriff Mark Davis stated

Precinct 4 Commissioner Alvin Roberts said if there is one or two holidays, they should be made to be part of the 40-hour work week.

"You're getting paid as if you were here, no matter what," Roberts noted. "If you come outside those hours of that day, you should be compensated or paid for it. I don't think emergency should be part of it."

He added there should be a policy that the holiday is part of the 40-hour work week.

Cooper said the reason behind making the request was only due to the weeks where there's a holiday.

Commissioners unanimously approved extending the Families First Coronavirus Response Act to beyond the last pay period in March. Mendisabal reported that one county employee is under the act.

The court approved soliciting bids for overlaying approximately 1.3 miles on Cooks Lake Road and 0.8 miles on Peck Road in Precinct 4.

Commissioners voted unanimously to rescind authorization granted previously to apply for the 2021-2022 Texas Community Development Block Grant Program and reject all proposals received and return all proposals that were due March 25 for grant administrator.

The court tabled action to authorize an agreement for engineering/sanitarian services related to the 2019-2020 Texas Community Development Block Grant Program for sewer projects.

Purchasing Agent Misty Sims said the county attorney is working to review the agreement.

In other action, the court accepted the audited financial statements for Hardin County Emergency Service District No. 4 for the year ending Sept. 30, 2020.

# Watch out for new vaccine survey scams

HOUSTON - The Senior Medicare Patrol of Texas reported they have received reports of a new COVID-19 vaccine email scam where people are asked to complete a survey. They offer a free reward but ask people to pay a nominal fee "to cover shipping".

Survey scams like this are a creative way to steal your identity or money. Many survey scams offer a reward and give you a limited time to respond if you want to take the survey. A legitimate survey would not assign a time limit, nor would they ask for your credit card or bank account to pay for a reward.

Scammers know people have received vaccines and are capitalizing on it. Don't give out sensitive information. Fake surveys can be used for a myriad of uses; to steal your information, collect data about you to commit identity theft, or even install malware on your computer when you click on a link in your email.

CMS, the CDC, and the vaccine companies (Pfizer, Moderna, Johnson & Johnson) are currently directing all vaccine recipients to enroll in the CDC V-Safe program as a post-vaccine monitoring mechanism at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019ncov/vaccines/safety/vsafe.html. There is no other survey being recommended at this time.

# TCSO investigating Spurger homicide

Victim is Lufkin man, 32

SPURGER — Authorities are investigating a homicide that occurred March 21 near Spurger.

According to Tyler County Sheriff Bryan Weatherford, deputies responded to a residence located on FM 1013, west of Spurger at 1:45 a.m., in reference to an individual being shot.

Weatherford said that once the deputies were on the scene, they observed several individuals standing over the victim, a male, who appeared to have been shot multiple times in the chest and stomach area.

The man, identified as Jamerion D. Mitchell, 32, of Lufkin, was pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Jim Moore. An autopsy will be conducted within the week in Beaumont.

Weatherford said prior to the victim being pronounced deceased, CPR was being administered to the victim, and the deputies assisted with medical attention until EMS arrived.

TCSO deputies, along with Department of Public Safety state troopers secured the scene and locate several shell casings near the victim's body.

Weatherford said the residence was the scene of a party, where more than 100 individuals were gathered, yet "very little cooperation is being given by individuals that may have witnessed the shooting itself, or that are withholding information that could lead to the arrest of the suspect(s) responsible for this homicide."

Weatherford said that the circumstances around the murder are giving investigators a hard time identifying who the actor(s) could be.

Anyone with information is asked to call the Tyler County Sheriff's Office at 409-283-2172, or Crime Stoppers at 936-639-TIPS. Tipsters calling into the Crime Stoppers hotline with information that leads to an arrest may be eligible for a cash reward.

The X-Change is a partnership between Shetland Arts in Scotland and McNay Art Museum in San Antonio.



# TAASA announces priorities for Legislature

AUSTIN — The Texas Association Against Sexual Assault (TAASA) put forward its legislative agenda for the 87th Legislature to address policy issues affecting survivors of sexual assault in Texas.

The organization's legislative agenda was adopted late last year by TAASA membership and includes five key priorities as well as a broader goal of maintaining or increasing funding levels for the state's more than 80 rape crisis centers.

TAASA's legislative priorities

#### include:

• Confidentiality protections to ensure sexual assault victims are provided the same legal protections as family violence victims.

• Trauma-informed law enforcement practices to provide a more responsive criminal legal system for victims who choose to report the rape.

• Strengthening community responses to sexual assault with multidisciplinary response teams that bring together community advocates, law enforcement agencies and sexual assault nurse examiners, shown to improve both health and judicial outcomes for victims.

• Updating the language of non-consent by addressing professional deception and sexual assault while in police custody.

• Improving access to healthcare for survivors of sexual assault to ensure they receive the same level of treatment

## **Opinions** COVID has been challenging for all of us

This COVID thing has challenged every inch of our wellbeing.

During my day-to-day activities, I cannot help but see the effects that it has had on us.

Small businesses that were once semi profitable or at least profitable enough to satisfy their owners' desires are hanging on by a thread. I know; I own a couple of them. Many of the less fortunate have already closed.

Employers are not only challenged by the loss of revenue associated with smaller crowds of shoppers, but they are challenged by a continuous shortage of workers.


I spoke with one owner of an eating establishment this week, who stated that they had already closed one of their eating places and were considering closing a second. The reason for the closure was that they could not find enough help to man the food lines.

They pointed out other food handlers who are so short of workers that they are now open shorter hours.

I know of another place where the managers are waiting tables. Some of the big stores are forced, at times, to shorten hours because they cannot operate the stores.

#### Dear Editor:

I am deeply concerned and troubled with the behavior and actions (in many cases the lack thereof) of the Silsbee ISD superintendent and school board. A severe incident involving the Silsbee Elementary school nurse occurred in the fall of 2020. Part of a school nurse's job is to maintain all students' current standard immunization status per state regulations. Mr. Weiss apparently did not agree (with state guidelines) and proceeded to go to SES, walk into the nurse's office, close the door and placed a chair in front of the door. This man was unhappy with what this woman was doing and blocked her in a room, verbally assaulted her and asserted his physical dominance (not to mention he broke fire code by blocking the door). He expressed his disdain for the nurse complying with state standards and DOING HER JOB. When she received an emergency call and had to leave, she had to explain that she must leave and had to maneuver around him in order to exit. This situation in any arena would be considered at least harassment. November 2020, Silsbee's superintendent Gregory Weiss entered the Sils-



It is very different. On the other hand, the food handlers who can find enough help report that their sales are reasonably strong.

Part of the reason for the shortage of workers is that many have come to rely on government handouts like extended unemployment packages. Many of the government checks are many times larger than normal, and the potential employee may make more money by not working than they do by working.

In the old days, one of my friends told me, "A lot of my relatives are not like you, and want to get rich. They just want to make enough money to get by. And for some of them, that does not take a lot of money." I remember hearing that nearly 30 years ago.

Today, we are looking at a situation in the face where families are getting large stimulus packages. If you get \$1,400 per person, a man and wife with five kids might make \$9,800. Now that will not make you rich, but

bee Elementary campus and barged into Teshauna Turk's 3rd grade class and begin verbally attacking her over his displeasure about a Facebook post Mrs. Turk made simply asking why Silsbee was not given an early release as they always have been in order for students, parents and staff to attend the game if they chose. 
